Trustees approve plan to assist staff in need

Iowa Park school trustees approved a proposal which will allow employees to donate leave days to another employee who has a catastrophic illness or disability.

The policy received unanimous approval from board members when they met in a regular session Thursday at Kidwell Elementary.

Also approved were one-year contract extensions for all key personnel, including the assistant superintendent, principals, assistant principals, counselors, athletic director and tax collector.

Employees will be permitted to make volunatry donations of one to five annual leave days a year to another employee who requires time from work and has used all state sick leave and annual leave days.

The sick leave pool policy can be used only by another employee who has a catastrophic illness or disability, according to the policy.

Two extracurricular activities for female students will be added next year.

At the request of Athletic Director

Weidon Nelms, the board approved addition of softball and volleyball for girls for the 1995-96 school year.

This will be the first time softball has been offered in the local high school. Volleyball was in the district program a few years ago, but was discontinued due to a lack of participation.

The board officially called for the district's annual trustee election for May 6. Terms of Max Henderson and Dennis Yeager expire this spring.

February 20 will be the first day for candidates to file.

Board training hours during the past year were reported, as required by state legislation. The hours included: Keith Fisher, 115.25; Randy Catlin, 62.75; Martha Dudley, 48; Max Henderson, 37.50; Dennis Yeager, 23; Larry Dutton, 14.25, and Bert Williamson, 6.

Twenty hours are required by the legislation.

The board accepted the resignation of Marsha Duffie, junior high T.L.C. teacher, effective Feb. 28. Mrs. Duffie is moving from the district.

Trustees approved the emergency purchase of a refrigerator for the Bradford Elementary cafeteria. Low bid of \$2,699 was submitted by Wichita Restaurant Supply.

There are 90 more students enrolled in the district's four campus than a year earlier, Supt. Glen Mitchell reported.

December sales good here

December was a good month for sales in Iowa Park, according to the state comptroller's sales tax report.

The City of Iowa Park this month received a check for \$33,384.45, which includes taxes collected during December by businesses filing monthly returns in January, and quarterly filers for the fourth quarter of 1994.

The \$33,384.45 was a 14.21-percent increase over the \$29,230.47 the city received in February of last year. So, for the first two months this year, Iowa Park has received 14.28 percent more than at this same time last year: \$50,051.15 as compared to

\$43,794.77, according to the report. Wichita Falls is the only other city in Wichita County on the plus side besides Iowa Park, having increased 1.12 percent over 1994.

Burkburnett is a minus 9.39 percent and Electra minus 5.20 percent.

Council closing streets for housing addition

The city council Monday night approved ordinances to close portions of five different streets, allowing the final platting of Indian Springs Addition, which is located in the extreme eastern part of the city.

Property owner David Parkey explained the closing of Saratoga, Seneca, Hawthome, Penn and Alcott portions that extend into the new housing development area would provide for designing of the addition.

Aldermen accepted a proposal to allow a paved parking area on the west side of Colorado, across from Park Clinic, but declined a request that city equipment and personnel be used to do the work.

Dr. Erwin Soell explained that the parking area would allow off-street parking in the area where clinic patients already parallel park on the pavement shoulder.

He said another physician is expected to join the clinic staff, which will likely increase the number of patients, and all available parking area on clinic property is already paved and being utilized.

Dr. Soell added that the additional parking area could benefit the library parking space.

Mayor Wayne House said the city crews already have as much or more work than they can accomplish during the year, and offered the city's seeking bids for the project, suggesting a lower bid might be received by that manner, which would cost the clinic less.


In another of the three public appearances by individuals before the council, Mrs. Essie Johnson discussed the Clean and Green Committee conducting a survey of residents to determine if a walking track around Lake Gordon was desired.

It was decided that, instead of the Committee members contacting residents, the city could do the same thing by having the survey question printed on the backs of monthly utility bills.

A 90-day waiver from the city's solicitation permit requirement was granted to Bo Watson, but on a 4-1 vote by the council.

Watson, an employee of Edward D. Jones & Co., sought the waiver so he could visit residents at their homes to introduce himself, and not be required to pay the city's solicitation permit fee.

This was Watson's fourth appearance before the council on the subject, and all aldermen except Bob Hamilton have consistently voiced approval of his requests.

Nancy (Mrs. Michael) Moede enjoys working with people. This is evident through her choice of employment, and participation in several organizations.



The pace is definitely picking up, with committee meetings and Senate sessions lasting for several hours and, occasionally, several days. While it will get even busier, I am already impressed with the amount and variety of activities occurring on a daily basis.

As we discussed last week, I want to discuss with you this week three bills which are currently being considered by the Senate Economic Development Committee regarding lawsuit abuse. First, however, I would like to give you a brief synopsis of other major legislation passed by the Senate this week.

A "major" piece of legislation which I must tell you about is Senate Concurrent Resolution 30. This "important" legislation will allow the Texas Y.M.C.A. Youth in Government Program to use the Senate and House Chambers for their annual meeting. Why is that legislation so important? It was my first bill to pass the Senate! It is a long standing Senate tradition that Senators who bring their first bill up for Senate consideration must endure a barrage of pointed questions, all in good fun, which are intended to "throw" the Senator, and provide an initiation into the Senate's arena of open and spirited debate. After taking a few barbs from my colleagues, I prevailed and the bill passed unanimously! So far, so good for my legislative success! It is my hope that the same unanimous support that I received on my simple bill will be a sign of things to come on more contentious issues, such as tort reform. As I mentioned earlier, three separate bills are currently being considered by the Senate Economic Development Committee: a bill to prohibit lawyers from "venue shopping" around the state to find plaintiff friendly jurisdictions to try their cases, a measure to clarify the amount of damages for which each defendant is responsible in a lawsuit, and a measure to put reasonable limits on the amount of punishment, or punitive damages, a jury may award. I would like to discuss each of these bills in a little more detail. The first bill, regarding "venue shopping," would require that lawsuits be filed in the county where the . accident, injury, or claim occurred. This means that if a person is injured by a defective toaster in Abilene, they would be required to file suit in Taylor County. That prevents an attorney

searching the state for a county that has a history of high jury verdicts, or worse, from finding a judge to whom the attorney had given large campaign contributions. The bill being considered makes the system more practical, predictable, and sensible. For those situations where a person is injured in a county far away from their home, the miracle of VCR technology and closed circuit television can bring the courtroom across hundreds of miles electronically.

The second bill being considered clarifies that a person is only liable for the percentage of injury caused by their acts. Under current law, an attorney will often sue every possible defendant in the hope that one of the parties sued has "deep pockets." In other words, they take a shotgun approach to litigation by spraying the playing field with lawsuits, hoping to hit a jackpot. Sometimes, a defendant with only a tenuous connection with a plaintiff can be made to pay an entire jury award simply because they had the most money. This is wrong, and must be changed. This bill would hold defendants liable for their percentage of damages, not the entire amount.

Finally, the third bill to be considered by the Senate Economic Development Committee would set a reasonable limit on the amount of punishment a jury can inflict on a plaintiff. In much the same way as the State has placed certain limits on fines for crimes, this bill limits the ability of a jury to award such a high amount of punitive damages that a company is driven out of business. I must stress to you that this bill does not limit, in any way, a plaintiff's ability to be compensated for their damages. An injured or wronged person must be made whole by a jury verdict for actual damages -- as it is a fundamental right. It is the punishment phase of the award that is being capped under this legislation. The cap would be twice the actual economic damages awarded under the bill as currently drafted.

"Part of that team concept began to disappear as I read your article. I wonder if any of the other players from that team experienced the same feeling," he continued.


Another part of the letter has got to come out in print. My friend said:

So, once more I'll repeat myself. Not because of having my hand called, but because of the 1969 Hawks, all this year's players and all those yet to come.





Domestic Violence Bills

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The Senate last week unanimously approved six domestic violence bills, the latest in a wave of legislative attempts to "break the cycle of violence" and offer better protection for victims.

Still being considered, however, by the Senate Criminal Justice Committee, is a bill by Sen. Mike Moncrief, D-Fort Worth, that would require battered spouses who file charges against their abusers to testify against them in court.

Domestic violence bills that have passed the Senate and now move on to the House would:

 Allow magistrates to issue temporary emergency orders without a court hearing;

 Increase punishment for those who repeatedly violate protective orders; and

 Allow authorities to hold suspects charged with stalking for 48 hours after bond has been posted.

"Texas is trying to adopt an attitude of zero-tolerance to violence in any shape, form or fashion. That's our mission," Montcrief told the Houston Chronicle.

Caucus Finance Disclosure

Rep. Layton Black, D-Goldthwaite, has filed a bill that would require legislative caucuses to report their finances and expenditures.

Rep. Warren Chisum, D-Pampa, who is chairman of the Texas Conservative Coalition, said he will fight the bill, and that the coalition will never disclose the names of past contributors.

In early January, before the

Legislature convened, the Texas Conservative Coalition held a \$500 to \$10,000 a plate fund-raiser.

After the fund-raiser, legislators adopted rules requiring future disclosure and banning caucuses from raising funds 30 days before and after a legislative session, or during a session.

Deily of Houston to the University of Texas System Board of Regents last week. He also named former congressman Tom Loeffler of San Antonio to a second six-year term.

Evans, who chaired Bush's inaugural committee, is chairman and chief executive of Tom Brown Inc., a Midland energy company. Deily is chairman and president of First Interstate Bank of Texas.

If confirmed, Evans and Deily will replace Mario Ramirez and Robert Cruikshank.

Other Highlights

Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston, has introduced a bill requiring all candidates for public office to submit to drug testing. State law allows drug testing of employees by both the government and the private sector. "Why should we be exempt? We are not a privileged class," Wilson said.

 Housing and Urban Development Secretary Henry Cisneros has lost his bid to have his former mistress' lawsuit dismissed. In the ruling denying Cisneros' request for a summary judgement, State District Judge Blair Cherry of Lubbock said the suit must continue because, "... there are disputed fact issues that must be resolved."

 A group of property-rich school districts plans to ask the Texas Supreme Court for a rehearing on its decision last week that upheld the state's tax-sharing school finance law. The districts involved include Borden County, Glasscock County and the Seminole district, all in West Texas, and Barbers Hill near Houston. Lawyer Earl Luna said other districts are contemplating joining the action.

Bringing Texas History home

More students of Texas history may soon be looking to the nearest historic structure or local landmark for their next lesson.

In keeping with an educational trend toward providing students with hands-on learning experiences, the Texas Historical Commission (THC) has launched a series of lesson plans to help students see that history happened not in textbooks, but all around them.

Titled "Lessons in Texas History," the easy-to-use plans are published as regular features of The Medallion, a bimonthly publication of the THC, and are intended as curriculum supplements to help teachers better utilize the community's cultural resources to teach Texas history.

By discovering the stories of events and people associated with local landmarks, students learn that history is something they can relate to.

The lessons, which encourage students to care about their heritage, are coordinated with the state's essential learning elements for middle school and junior high students and include a multicultural component.

The first lesson in the series appears in the January/February issue of The Medallion and focuses on some of the state's most treasured landmarks --

A lesson on the monuments to Texas' leaders and heroes whose remains are interred in the State Cemetery in Austin also includes suggestions that apply to local cemeteries. Most communities have an old burial ground, and like the State Cemetery, these are open books of Texas history waiting for students to read them.

Alternately with "Lessons in Texas History," The Medallion will present a parallel series of information briefs. Titled "Preservation Matters,:" this series is designed to asisst preservationists with activities ranging from fund-raising to developing historic walking tours.

The Medallion, which also offers news and feature articles on preservation issues and events around the state, is available for \$7 per year.







Little League sign-up set


Registration for Little League Baseball and Softball will begin Saturday, Feb. 18, for Iowa Park youth.

In the re-match with top-ranked Graham, the Hawks came out flat and shot a season low 29 percent (20-66 from the floor) as they fell 91-64.


Iowa Park managed to score only 27 points in second half while the Steers scored 46 to blow the game open.




Cheerleading Classes
