December was a good month for sales in Iowa Park, according to the state comptroller's sales tax report

The City of lowa Park this month received acheck for $\$ 33,3 \$ 4.45$, which includes taxes collected during De cember by businesses filing monthly returns in January, and quarterly filers for the fourth quarter of 1994. Th.e $\$ 33,384.45$ was a 14.21 -pe cent increase over the $\$ 29,230.47$ the
city received in February of last year So, for the first two months this year, Iowa Park has received 1428 percent more than at this same time las year: $\$ 50,051.15$ as compared to $\$ 43,794.77$, according to the report. Wichita Falls is the only other city in Wichita County on the plus side besides lowa Park, having increased 1.12 percent over 1994

The tour group landed in Tel Aviv, an industrial center of Israel. Dr. Stutte said in spite of the cloudy, cold, rainy weather, they saw many interesting sights, both biblical and modern.
From Tel Aviv they traveled to Haifa, the main port of Israel. Dr. Stutte explained that the Jordan River is made up of fresh water springs which Wout of the slopes of the mountains.
He said the water flows into the He said the water flows into the River flows south from the Sea of River flows south from the Sea of
Galilee to empty into the Dead Sea. "The water in the Dead Sea is 10 times saltier than regular water and the beach of the Dead Sea is sandy, dry and salty," Dr. Stutte said.
The group visited Capernaum, the lown where Jesus entered the minisry. Jesus preached his Sermon on the Mount on the hillside nearCapernaum. There they saw the remains of a ynagogue.

Aspirin and ibuprofen may be used for relief of joint pain, fever, stiffness, The use of aspirin may help prevent hear, and sprains.

It is my hope that the sam unanimous support that I received on my simple bill will be a sign of things o come on more contentious issues, such as tort reform. As I mentioned carlier, three separate bills are currently being considered by the Senate Economic Development Committee: bill to prohibit lawyers from "venue hopping" around the state to find plaintiff friendly jurisdictions to ury heir cases, a measuse for which each mount of is responsible in lawsuit, and a measure to put reasonable limits on the amount of punishment, or punitive damages, a jury may award. I would like to discuss each of these bills in a little more detail. The first bill, regarding "venu shopping," would require that law suits be filed in the county where the accident, injury, or claim occurred. This means that if a person is injured by a defective toaster in Abilene, they would be required to file suit in Taylor
searching the state for a county that
has a history of high jury verdicts, or worse, from finding a judge to whom the attorney had given large campaign contributions. The bill being consid ered makes the system more practical, predictable, and sensible. For those a county far away from their home, the a county far away from their home, the

The second bill being considered clarifies that a person is only liable for the percentage of injury caused by their acts. Under current law, an attorney will often sue every possible defendant in the hope that one of the parties sued has "deep pockets." In other words, they take a shotgun ap-
proach to lo litgation by spraying the proach to litigation by spraying the playing field with lawsuits, hoping to
hit a jackpot. Sometimes, a defendant with only a tenuous connection with a plaintiff can be made to pay an entire jury award simply because they had the most money. This is wrong, and must be changed. This bill would hold defendants liable for their percentage of damages, not the entire amount.

Finally, the third bill to be considered by the Senate Economic De velopment Committee would set a punishment a jury can inflict on punishment a jury can inflict on a
plaintiff. In much the same way as the State has placed certain limits on fines forcrimes, this bill limits the ability of jury to award such a high amount of punitive damages that a company is driven out of business. I must stress to you that this bill does not limit, in any way, a plaintiff's ability to be compensated for their damages. An in jured or wronged person must be made whole by a jury verdict for actual damages -- as it is a fundamental right. It is the punishment phase of the awar that is being capped under this legis actual economic damages awarded under the bill as currently drafted Ihave suggested to my colleagues hat punitive damages should be paid to a crime victim's compensation fund or go towards education, since punitive damages are not designed to compensate a victim, but rather are intended topunisha wrongful act. Since all fines for criminal activity are paid to the State, I think that fines for wrongful acts in civil cases should go to the State as well. Time will tell if that
