## AUSTIN NOTEBOOK

While the Senate Economic Development Committee I serve on did not vote on the next major piece of lawsuit reform this week, another a major piece of legislation I have a major piece of legislation I have
wholeheartedly supported for years.

Since this legislation is on the ast-track in the Senate, I will shift my focus on lawsuit reform of the last few columns to this issue.

Many legislators fear the prospect of this legislation. Most voters strongly support the idea.

In fact, the most recent Texas Poll conducted for Harte-Hanks Commu nications inc. and released publicly
February 24th, shows that $77 \%$ of Texans favor it for state and federal legislators.

By contrast, a Dallas Morning Newsquestionnaire of elected officials found that only $54 \%$ of state legislators support it.

Yet, trying to get our legislators to allow you, the citizen, he opportunity to vote on such a straightforward law as term limits has been difficult to say the least.

Although it could be stronger Senate Joint Resolution 4 (SJR 4) by Senator Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, is mjor piece of legislauion
if ven it next November. This con stitutional amendment limits offices to 12 years for any senate, state representative or statewide elected office, other than a judicial office.

For a member of the state senate or
state house of representatives to be ineligible, the member must have served six full or partial legislative sessions. A statewide elected official would be ineligible once the official has served 12 calendar years or more. Youmightwonderhow, alcryca of not being able gecer is front of by career politicians and special interests, this amendment to the constitution has such an excellent chance of
passing.
There are several important factors. First, SJR 4 would not start the and limits excludes any legislative service prior to 1997. prior io 1997. nessage last November when a smal but select number of state legislators who opposed ierm limits were ousted from office.

Third, the grassroots efforis of groups like Texans for Term Limitations, with thousands cf members al across Texas, have had a clear impact on a number of legislators who had previously been keeping a low profile Finally

Finally, and most importantly, we have had strongleadership fromelected officials like Governor Bush,
Governor Bullock and Senator Bivins

As presiding officer over the Senate, Bob Bullock, in his extraordinary conser sus-building sty!e, has been especially instrumental in putting this legislation on fast-track. Along with Senator Bivins, there are now 19 co authors, including myself, signed on to SJR 4.
During my campaign for this eat, I signed the Texans for Term Limitapromised to fight for term limits. Ialso went a step further by making a personal pledge to obey the term limits bill, regardless of whether or not it passed.

I strongly believe in term limitations as a way to take back our government from career politicians.

It is not the only answer to reforming government and restoring the people's faith in our elected officials, but it is a great place to start.

Term limits finally appears ready toclear all the hurdles in the legislative obstacle course.

There will still be attempts by handful of career politicians and special interests to work every back door but they will be defeated as long as the people continue to demand change.

## Coach remembers

his talented athlete

My first recognition that Bobby Gilbreathevenexisted was in the spring of 1958 when he was a freshman competing for Iowa Park High Schoo and I was the coach at Holliday. I noticed very quickly that he wasn't an ordinary freshman.
We had a dual practice meet with Iowa Park and he ran the low hurdles high hurdles and long jump (broad pt then).
The thing that was most impres sive to me was the smooth manner tha he ran the hardles. Here was a fresh-
