3 local men arrested for credit card abuse

Three Iowa Park men were arrested after a Feb. 22 search warrant served at one of the men's automotive shop turned up property charged on stolen credit cards.

Willie Thomas Sims, 24, Tommy Cecil Sims, 28, and Jerome Koerth, 21, were arrested by Wichita County deputies and charged with credit card abuse.

David Duke of the Wichita County Sheriff's Dept. said the charges stem from a Wichita Falls man accidently leaving his wallet on top of a newspaper stand at J&C Komer Feb. 1. When the man returned to get his wallet, it had already been taken.

According to Duke, the wallet was obtained by the Sims' and Koerth, who within the span of four hours, charged \$3,000 on credit cards found in the

wallet, all at Wichita Falls businesses. Deputies, later aided by represen-

tatives of the Iowa Park Police Dept., Wichita Falls Police Dept., and the Wichita County D.A.'s officer, ran the search warrant at 1578 Hwy 287 East, which houses Tommy Cecil Sims' automotive shop.

Duke says that during the search, about 90 per cent of the items charged on the stolen credit cards were recov-

A list of the recovered items include Craftsman twin-cylinder air compressor and air hoses and a Craftsman tool set, Pioneer CD indash auto stereo system, two six-ton jack stands, one-2 1/4 ton floor jack, three Campbell Houseed socket sets, Campbell Houseed impact wrench, air ratchet, air drill and four-piece air chisel set, triple guage kit, two sets of Night

Blaster quartz halogen lights, two portable halogen worklights, two gallons gear oil, two Bayco flourescent worklights, two 25-feet extension cords, Grant steering wheel, super funnel, and two gasket sets.

Willie Thomas Sims has been charged with two counts of credit card abuse, and is still in Wichita County Jail under two \$10,000 bonds.

Tommy Cecil Sims was charged with three counts of credit card abuse, and is out of Wichita County Jail on three \$10,000 bonds.

Koerth was charged with one count of credit card abuse and is out on a \$5,000 bond.

Duke said other charges are pending against the three men, and arrests of other individuals related to this case are expected.

week. Chamber considers printing new maps

A new city map which can be distributed to new residents is being considered by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

During Monday's monthly meeting of the Chamber's board of directors, Glena Via said she had contacted two different businesses that produce such maps, but had received a response

from only one. The firm that produced a directory for the community a couple of years ago said it would print 3,000 maps, and sell advertisements on it for a mini-

Mrs. Via suggested waiting on making a decision in order to hear an offer from the other firm, as well as waiting until the city's new housing addition plats were ready for printing.

Action on two project proposals was postponed until the March meeting. One concerned the Chamber's possible sponsorship of a Christmas in Spring project, while the other related to a proposed resolution involving electric utilities legislation to be considered in Austin.

When added to the \$312,411 in permits issued during January by city hall, the year's total thus far is \$862,725.

development proposed by David Parkey and Kenneth Beall conflicted with the original townsite plan, city officials had to abandon portions of streets and alleyways that had been dedicated since Iowa Park was incorporated.

A discussion developed after the new plat was viewed by aldermen. Bob Hamilton questioned the length of one street, saying he was concerned over a quarter-mile length of street without an intersection.

However, when the vote was called on accepting the proposed plat, all four aldermen (Johnny Crawford was not present) expressed their approval.

Aldermen also approved a proposal to authorize Administrator Mike Price to advertise for bids to construct a sewer line that will extend from Park Tank Truck Service westward to Wigley Road.

The new line would provide sewer service to all homes along the Access Road, as well as to homes on Quail Valley that are inside the city limits.

Estimated cost of the project is between \$85,000 and \$100,000. Bids are to be opened on Mar. 23.

Price also was authorized to advertise for bids to purchase a new fourwheel loader/tractor to be used as the waste water treatment plant.

Aldermen approved a proposal for the administrator to enter into a contractual agreement with David Brock, to demolish the old water treatment plant, which has not been used for a number of years.

Cost of that project will be \$4,000, aldermen were told.

The council confirmed Mayor Wayne House's re-appointments of Jim Medlinger and David Padgett to the city's Planning and Zoning Commis-

A resolution was approved for the city to accept a water line construction project and final payment of \$5,616 to the contractor, Potter Bowles Const.

Another resolution approved expressed the council's concern of legislation being considered in Austin which would, according to the city, cause undue expense of tax dollars. The bill deals with any type construction when dirt is dug having to be inspected by utility companies.

Though an executive session was included on the meeting's agenda, none

Topics mentioned during the council's general discussion period, on which no decisions were reached, included rate increases by TCI Cablevision, requesting asphalt being removed from US 287 for surfacing the north entrance to Lake Gordon, revenue from alarm permits in excess of budget, and signs believed to be required by the Americans with Disabilities Act at city hall.

1 onion (med.) sliced Salt and pepper



Pecan Tarts

Mix: 1/2 cup margarine 1/2 cup sugar

Stir in: 2 egg yolks

1 tsp. vanilla 2 cups sifted flour

Press evenly into tiny tart muffin tins. Bake at 400 degrees 8-10 minutes. Remove from oven.

Bring to boil: 1/2 cup margarine

1/3 cup dark Karo syrup 1 cup confectioner's sugar

Stir in: 1 cup chopped pecans

Spoon into shells. Bake in 350 degree oven 5 minutes. Makes 4 dozen.

Beef Noodle Bake

1 large onion, sliced 2 Tbsps. fat

1 small can sliced mushrooms, drained 1/2 lb. American cheese, diced

1 pkg. wide noodles, cooked & drained Saute onion in fat; add ground

beef; cook until done. Add all remaining ingredients except noodles. Simmer until cheese is well blended. Add noodles; mix thoroughly. Place in 2-quart casserole. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees until light brown on top.

Date-Apple Coffee Bread

1 Tbsp. instant coffee crystals (optional) 1 cup boiling water

1 1/3 cup snipped pitted dates 2 1/4 cups all-purpose flour

3/4 cup packed brown sugar

2 tsps. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. baking soda

1 beaten egg 2 medium apples, peeled, cored & shredded

1/2 cup pecans

1 Tbsps. margarine

Dissolve coffee crystals in boiling water; pour over dates and set aside. In large mixing bowl stir together flour, brown sugar, baking powder, salt, and baking soda. Combine egg, shredded apple, pecans, melted butter or margarine and coffeedate mixture. Add to flour mixture, stirring just until moistened. Turn into a greased 9x5x3-in. loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees 60-65 minutes. Cool in pan 10 minutes. Remove.

IRISH RESEARCH: The Irish have been coming to America since its earliest days of settlement. Virginia, Maryland, New Jersey and South Carolina were the colonies to which many of the early Irish immigrants

Later, many others settled in the large urban areas of New York City, Philadelphia and Boston. By 1790, at the time of the first U.S. census, it is estimated that about 400,000 people of Irish birth or descent lived in America.

From 1820 to 1920, about 4.7 million Irish crossed the Atlantic to the U.S. and it is among these numbers that so many Americans find their immigrant Irish ancestors.

To trace an Irish ancestor successfully in the old country, one must determine the exact origin of that individual. That information usually will be found in American records. Also, a knowledge of geography is extremely important to successful research in Ireland.

These are two books that you might find very helpful in your Irish research. They are "Tracing Your Irish Ancestors", by John Grenham and "A New Genealogical Atlas of Ireland", by Brian Mitchell.

The next meeting of the Iowa Park Genealogical and Historical Society will be March 11 at 2 p.m. at the Tom Burnett Memorial Library. The scheduled guest speaker is Nikki Reed, who will give a program on finding, reading, and understanding Old Land Records.

of Garden Club program

Jeff Nolen, owner of Southern Gardens, was the authoritative speaker Friday for Iowa Park Garden Club. His topic was "Spring Yard and Garden Care".

Nolen was introduced by Freddye Skinner, vice president.

He told club members, "It is never too late to use pre-emergent. It needs to be kept in the ground continuously as seeds from the weeds germinate at different seasons". Nolen said preemergent should be applied four times a year.

"We have a clay soil here, therefore, the landscape beds need to be kept loose to allow the soil to breathe," Nolen stated. He also stressed the importance of sending a soil sample to be tested and explained that helps the gardener to know what nutrients the soil needs.

Nolen continued his informative discussion by saying that one mistake people make is putting their water hose away for the winter, the roots are growing during the winter and need moisture. He added that it is especially important to water trees, shrubs and ground cover before a freeze.

He also gave tips about planting caladiums. He said, "If you scoop out the central bud it will cause the tuber to produce many small shoots and leaves". He suggested planting petunias after the spring rains are over as the rain drowns petunias.

A business meeting was conducted by Norma Fortner, president. Joyce Short gave the Thought for the Day. Bonnie Illingsworth read minutes for the last meeting and gave the treasurer's report.

Club members voted to place a brick at the RAC in memory of Lavena Harlin who was a long time member. As an Arbor Day project members voted to buy four crepe myrtles to be placed at the junior high school.

AUSTIN - Sen. Bill Ratliff's ambitious 1,088-page school reform bill would strip much of the Texas Education Agency's authority over local schools and shorten the school year from 180 days to

Ratliff's bill would place local school districts under an operating charter and cede more control of education to parents, teachers and school boards.

The bill has already drawn opposition over proposals it contains that would allow private school vouchers, charter schools, textbook selection by school boards and recall elections of school board mem-

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, who has endorsed Ratliff's bill and wields considerable power in presiding over the Senate, has acknowledged that special interest groups are working against the bill.

Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, chairman of the Senate Education Committee, has been described by Bullock as "the most knowledgeable person about education in the Senate" and "the best appointment I have ever made.'

House Approach Cautious

In contrast to Ratliff's sweeping package of education reforms, Rep. Paul Sadler, chairman of the House Education Committee, is leading a more cautious effort that allows limited experimentation with innovative methods of education.

Last week, Sadler, D-Henderson, said his committee was working on a bill that would limit charter schools to a few pilot projects and

may not propose the implementation of private-school vouchers.

"I think we will structure a school system that looks very traditional," Sadler told the Houston Chronicle, adding that he anticipates "great reluctance" among lawmakers to alter the school finance system recently approved after bouncing in and out of state district court for years.

Sadler also pointed out that Ratliff's proposal to cut supplemental funding to the smallest school districts could force many of them (400 to 500) to consolidate.

Regarding Ratliff's proposal to reduce the minimum number of days children must attend school, Sadler said, "We need to add days to our school year, as many as money will allow us."

Lawsuit Liability Compromise

The House and Senate sponsors of lawsuit liability reform bills announced last week that they had reached a compromise that would free companies that aren't responsible for most of the blame in a lawsuit from being forced to pay all of the damages.

"Joint and several liability" is one of many tort reform measures under consideration in the Legislature, though business lawyers and trial lawyers on opposite sides of the debate agree that the liability issue is the corner stone of tort re-

Rep. Rob Junell, D-San Angelo, and Sen. David Sibley, R-Waco, jointly announced that in most cases, companies would only be liable for 100 percent of the damages if they are found at least 51 percent responsible for the injuries.

Under current law, companies could be forced to pay 100 percent of damages if they are found as little as 11 percent responsible.

Sex Education Poll

Most Texans say the state should require grade schools to educate

children about sex, sexually transmitted diseases and the use of condoms, according to the winter Texas Poll.

The telephone survey of 1,011 adults, conducted Feb. 2-11 by the University of Texas for Harte-Hanks Communications Inc., show-

ed that 56 percent of Texans favor mandatory sex education in schools.

However, 32 percent of respondents said sex education in schools has done more harm than good, the poll indicated.

Support for condom education was higher among respondents under age 30 (73 percent) and Democrats (69 percent) than Independents (68 percent) and Republicans (52 percent). Fifty percent of respondents 60 and older favored condom education.

Kids' Lotto Temptation

Rep. Dan Kubiak, R-Rockdale, says he is skeptical about the new vending machines that will be dispensing scratch-off tickets from the Texas Lottery.

"I don't want them near schools. It makes it too easy for youngsters to play," he told the Houston Chronicle.

Texas Lottery Commission Director Nora Linares said store personnel will be able to turn off the vending machines by remote control if children attempt to use them - but only 10 percent of the machines have the remote control fea-

Other Highlights

In response to the announcement by Kelly Air Force Base that 258 employees will be terminated, Gov. Bush last week dispatched the state Rapid Response Team to San Antonio and instructed the Texas Department of Commerce to assist the impacted workers.

■ The 15-member State Board of Education would no longer be elected under a bill being considered by the House Committee on Public Education. The measure by Rep. Curtis Seidlits, D-Sherman, would reduce the panel to a sevenmember board appointed by the governor.

Unusually warm weather has brought out the gardener in almost everyone.

The following garden check list will certainly keep you on track and busy during March.

Remember that our average last frost date is March 25. Tender, warmseason flowers and vegetable plants such as tomatoes will have to be planted after that date unless you are a real gambler.

Planting:

* Plant containerized trees, shrubs, fruits, berries and pecans. Watch for special plant sales from local nurser-

* Cool-season vegetable crops such as onions, potatoes, broccoli, cabbage, and brussels sprouts can be planted. Also asparagus roots can be installed now. Use Extension Service recommended varieties for best performance. Lists available at your local county extension office.

* Colorful cool-season annual flowers such as pansies can be planted for early spring color.

* Prepare garden soils now and build raised bed gardens for spring plantings.

* Test garden soils to determine fertilizer needs and potential problems. Your local county extension office has complete soil testing instructions available.

* Transplant existing landscape plants which are in the wrong spot or have overgrown certain areas.

* Establish or overseed fescue

Fertilizers:

GARDENING HINTS

* Apply a 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio lawn food to fescue lawns in early March.

* Warm-season lawns (bermuda, St. Augustine) should not be fertilized until mid-April.

* Fertilize pecan trees with 21-0-0 fertilizer in late February to early March. Apply one pound for each inch of trunk diameter. Broadcast the fertilizer at the dripline of the tree. Weed and Pest Control:

* Apply a pre-emergent to established lawns for control of warm-season annual weeds.

* Apply dormant oil to scale and gall prone plants such as fruit trees and pecans before leafing out. Apply when temperatures are moderate for several days (40-70 degrees).

* Watch out for aphids on tender growth of bedding plants. Apply controls as needed. Follow all label rates and directions when using pesticides and fertilizers. Pruning:

* Prune bush-type roses to an open center form. Reduce height of roses by about 50%. Important note: Do not prune climbing roses until after they have flowered. Pruning now would eliminate all flowering wood.

* Prune peaches, plums and apricots to an open center form.

* Complete shade tree pruning as

soon as possible. Never top a shade

* Spring flowering vines and shrubs such as quince, forsythia, and wisteria should not be pruned until after they bloom.

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



Lake Worth quickly built its lead back to 9 at 69-60 with 1:57 remaining and Iowa Park never got closer than that the rest of the game.





Gilbreath recalled as team-minded individual

Prior to the start of the running finais of the annual Iowa Park Lions Club Hawk Relays Saturday afternoon in Hawk Stadium, the late Bobby Gilbreath will be inducted into the Hawk Track Hall of Fame.

The following article was written by Dawson for the Iowa Park Leader's Centennial Edition in 1988.

All who follow his school athletics and who remember individual and team efforts often have different opinions about who was the best.

During this centennial year it is fitting that one former member of the Hawk track teams of 1958-61 be mentioned for the benefit of those fans with short memories or for those who never had the opportunity to witness any of his performances.

Most long-time track and field fans will tell you, without hesitation, that Bobby Gilbreath had an unequaled track career and that his overall achievements have not been matched by anyone who has worn the green and white.

A "team player," who did not concentrate his efforts, but instead he chose to compete in a number of events, in order to gain points for the team. During Gilbreath's final three years of competition, he earned and won in six different events.

School records were set by him in the long jump, 880-yard dash, 180yard low hurdles and the 440-yard dash. The 440-yard relay and the mile relay teams on which Bobby was a member

also established school records. He also set state records in the low hurdles, tied the state record in the 440, and was a member of the 440 and mile relay teams that set state records.

Gilbreath scored 60 points and brought home eight first-place medals from the state meet for the three years he qualified to participate at the state

His first places in the state meet

1959 - 880-yard dash

1960 - Long jump, 440-yard dash, 440yard relay, mile relay

1961 - Long jump, 180-yard low hurdles, mile relay.

Highly recruited by many colleges and universities, he chose to enter Texas A&M University. During his freshman year at A&M, the NCAA listed his time in the freshman 440-yard hurdles as the fastest in the nation.

Death from encephalitis ended his outstanding career in November of his sophomore year.

No single atmete has brought as much recognition to Iowa Park High School as Bobby Gilbreath. His funeral service was held in Iowa Park's First Baptist Church, with the coaches and track team of Texas A&M serving as honorary pallbearers.

Through the years the track records established by him and the relay teams have one by one gradually fallen, but no one individual has ever set records in as many events or won the number of first places at the Texas State University Interscholastic League Track and Field Meet, as Bobby Gilbreath.

Coach remembers his talented athlete

My first recognition that Bobby Gilbreath even existed was in the spring of 1958 when he was a freshman competing for Iowa Park High School and I was the coach at Holliday.

I noticed very quickly that he wasn't an ordinary freshman.

We had a dual practice meet with Iowa Park and he ran the low hurdles, high hurdles and long jump (broad jump then).

The thing that was most impressive to me was the smooth manner that he ran the hardles. Here was a freshman who was taking 7 steps between the lows, and 3 steps between the highs without having to reach or cut his stride.

The next year I moved to Iowa

The thing that set Bobby Gilbreath apart from anyone else was his quiet, confident competitive spirit. He hardly ever said anything, but his presence was always obvious.

Whether it was in football or track he never complained or boasted.

I saw him play hurt in football and I saw him compete in track with great discomfort, but I never saw him or heard him offer any excuse or a com-

He never tried to blame anyone else on the few times that he didn't win first. On these rare occasions he didn't win he took it much better than I did.

When he was a sophomore he got the flu the week of the Regional meet. He got 3rd in the 180 lows and 3rd in the broad jump, but he was really

He had a jump of 22'+ which would have won but he was called for a scratch. I believe to this day that it wasn't a scratch, but Bobby did not even change his expression.

Then he came back and ran the 880. He won it, but he was as white as this paper when he finished.

He went on to win the State in the 880 two weeks later.

In 1960 and 1961 he won a total of 7 more gold medals at the State meet.

In 1962 he had the best time in the nation for freshmen in the 440 hurdles, while competing for Texas A&M. In October 1962 he came home for


our homecoming. He said that A&M had a cross country that morning, but that he didn't compete. He said that he was too sleepy. I

knew that something was wrong, and the next Monday we learned that he had encephalitis.

He died 5 days later.

I have had many disappointments in my life, but besides learning that my mother had passed away in 1961, nothing was more devastating to me than when Farris Nowell told me that they had just been informed that Bobby Gilbreath had died.

To me, Bobby Gilbreath was more than a great athlete. He was a truly good friend, and every time that I want to use someone as an example of a real champion I refer to Bobby Gilbreath, because he was a champion in every

Seets assists in humanitarian effort

In June 1994 Chuck Seets returned from a missionary and humanitarian trip to Russia, which took him to Minsk, Belarus, located southeast of Moscow.

The trip was coordinated by the Common Wealth Independent States, achurch-development foundation with headquarters in Amarillo.

Seets, a retired education administrator, had made other trips to the area with CWIS and had become well acquainted with a Russian family in Minsk.

Participants who make the trips, pay their own way, which costs \$2,100 round trip from Amarillo

Seets always feels the cost is well worth it to be able to help people who yearn to hear and discuss religion. He believes his trip last summer was especially significant and that in addition to discussing religion with the Russian people, he also was instrumental in helping in a humanitarian

When he returned in June, Seets related that medically the Russians have nothing, and told of requests from physicians there for such simple things as thermometers.

Through the wife of the Russian family he knew, who was secretary to Dr. Alexander S. Vladyko, Seets met the physician.

Dr. Vladyko is chief of the Viral Diagnosis Laboratory, Department of Special Pathogens with the Ministry of Belarus Republic Health, Byelorussian Research Institute for Epidemiology and Microbiology in Minsk.

Seets learned that in their collection of arenaviruses at Minsk Institute Laboratory Dr. Vladyko lacked two prototype strains of lymphocytic choriomeneningitis virus (LCM): a) WE and b) ARMstrong to use with his base for identification of diseases. If there was an outbreak of an unknown illness, he would not have what he needed to identify it.

Seets told the physician that he was going to Atlanta when he returned to the States and that he would see if he could arrange for the two viruses to be sent to him.

Seets went to the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta and spoke with

The latter part of December the two needed strains were sent to Dr. Vladyko with Dr. I.S. Lukashevich, who was working in the laboratory of Dr. M.S. Salvato at the University of Wisconsin Medical School's department of pathology at Madison.
