## Couple observes early anniversary on Nile

An Iowa Park couple fulfilled a lifelong dream of touring the antiquities of ancient Egypt and sailing the Nile. Doyce and Joe Jennings returned last week from a vacation tour to Egypt
and month-long visit with their and month-long visit with their live in Saudi Arabia

Superstition not withstanding, this Iowa Park couple departed on Friday, January 13th for the long flight to Cairo. Flying British Airways from DFW via London to Cairo, Doyce and Jo were pampered by ground and flight crews which had been previously informed that this was a special trip for these Iowa Park passengers. In 1997, Doyce and Jo will celebrate their 50th Wedding Anniversary and this was an early Golden Anniversary present from their daughter and son-in-law.

Arriving on a typical rainy moming at London's Gatwick Airport, they boarded a shuttle bus, complete with hostess who served tea and coffee, for the one-hour ride through the English countryside to the London-Heathrow Airport. At London-Heathrow, they were esconed to the Passenger Lounge which includes shower facilities and rest areas to await the next leg of their flight to Cairo.

Cairo is a city of 15 million people and spans both banks of the Nile, from the Pyramids at Giza, the city stretches The cab ride from the airpor to the
hotel immediatcly gets the adrenaline lowing. A mixture of old and new, Doyce and Jo saw camels being herded buildings, main street between high rise ing with Mercedes in congested traffic. The Jennings spent three days in Cairo visiting the Pyramids, Egyptian Antiqueities Museum where the priceless golden treasures of King Tutankhaman are on display, the labastar Mosque, and the temples at emphis and Sakkara
Departing Cairo, they flew to Luxor (Thebes) to board the Sheraton up the Nile to the first cataracts at Aswan. In Luxor, they were taken on a guided tour of the vast Temple at Karnak where, after dark, visitors are treated to a sound and light show that retraces the building of the Temple and its symbolism.

Day two in Luxor began with a tour of the Valley of the Kings and Valley of the Queens. Doyce and Jo ventured into the tombs of several Pharaohs, including King Tutank-
haman(whichishistorically significant haman(which ishistorically significant, paintings and hieroglyphics of other tombs). After lunch, the riverboat set off towards Aswan.

The Nile Riverboats are operated by the major hotel chains including Sheraton, Marriott and Hilton. Comfortably furnished, passengers are treated to exotic meals cooked onboard, bar service and live entertainment in the evenings. One evening, the passengers had to entertain each other

The "Concealed Handgun" bill which was passed by the Senate Criminal Justice Committee earlier this week, would allow law abiding Texans who pay a licensing fee and pass a safety course to obtain a license to While I believe that the While I believe that the vast malegislation, I would like so take this opportunity to explain why I have consistently opposed gun control and supported the constitutional right of Texans to protect themselves by carrying a concealed handgun.
Perhaps the most powerful argument in favor of this legislation was made clear by Ms. Suzanna Gratia, who testified before the Senate CriminalJustice Committee last week. While I usually caution against changing state law based on the emois too powerful to ignere Ms her story parents were killed by as. Grata Killeen, Texas.

You are probably familiar with he incident at Luby's Cafeteria Killeen -- Ms. Gratia was there

According to Ms. Gratia, who escaped being killed by running through a broken window, she caries a handgun in her purse when traveling in her car, but took the gun out of her purse before entering Luby's out of fear that she would lose her chiropractor's licenseif caght with an If egal handgun.

If she had kept the gun in her purse, she believes that she could have were killed. At the very least, it would have evened the odds.

It pains me to think that the curent state law might have caused her to lose both her parents.

Ms. Gratia's testimony was being discussed throughout the Capito Tuesday afternoon, as people realized that Texas is one of only six states in which Ms. Gratia would have had to leave her gun in the car.

In most states, such as Florida, New York and California, Ms. Gratia
or another Luby's patron might have been able to stop the killing perhap before it started.

I want to make sure that Texans are never helpless again in such situation.
Another issue that I would like to address regarding the debate on con cealed handguns is the question of whether or not to have a referendum on this issue.

I think that we have already had a referendum on this issue when Gover nor Bush defeated Ann Richards Governor Richards vetoed such meas I believe hat she and I believe
that veto. Those
hose who call for an election are simply delaying the inevitable, and are willing to have the taxpayers pay for their delaying tactics through an expensive election.
onot think that those tactics ar going to fool Texans who believe honesty and astraight forward approach in goveming. I would ask those folk working to delay this issue throug forcing another election to stand up and make a tough decision withou dumping another on the voters.

As currently drafted, Senate Bill 60 has several safeguards againstabuse which I feel are important to ensuring
that concealed handguns increase per sonal safety, rather than crea'e a "wild west" mentality.

For example, only persons who have never been convicted of a felony or who have not had a Class A or B Misdemeanor conviction in the pas five years will be able to carry a conIn addition.
In addition, persons whohave been found to be mentally ill or chemically carrying a concealed handgun.

Persons who have defaulted on debts, such as child support or educational loans will have to become curreng a license.

A person who meats all these re quirements will have to pay a $\$ 140$ licensing fee, as well as pass a 10-15 hour gun safety course, before re ceiving a license. All of these re quirements should help ensure tha

Requirements have also been written into the bill which prevent a handgun from being carried into a school, a polling place, a racetrack, a govermment building, a liquor store, or saying that guns are prohibited.

These requirements should help keep guns out of places where we would all agree guns are inappropri-
ate.
As I mentioned, S.B. 60 passed the Criminal Justice Committee on Tuesday. It will be considered by the full Senate next week, and then be sen to the House for
next month or so.
Governor Bush has indicated that he will sign the bill when he receive it, so it is probably only a matter of time before Texans can have this fundamental right guaranteed by our Constitution restored.
