Bill's maternal grandparents were

Her family later came to Texas and settled in Wichita Falls where the owned a dairy located where Lucy
Park is today. Bill's mother told him she had to milk 22 cows by hand every morning.

Bill's paternal grandmother was
minn Zurich, Switzerland, where her family were ship builders. His grandfather came to this country from Germany when he was 16 years old. Eventually he migrated to Texas
and Bill's dad was mornin and Bill's dad was born in Temple. His Mahler grandfather was a traveling preacher of the Evangelical convic-
tion, that has now joined with the Methodist Church.

Bill's mother's brother owned th John Maier Bakery. Around the time of Herman and Maggie's marriage Herman bought a quarter interest in the bakery and they moved to lowa Park in 1928.
Bill had diversified job experience when he was growing up around the environs of Iowa Park. And, varied experiences in his chose
endeavor after high school. endeavor after high school.
old, he began "working" at Maiers bakery. "I got a nickel and a sweet roll for working from early in the morning until I could quit at about 1 o'clock. cleaned out the cases, swept the floor and did anything they told me to, unless it was to stay out of the way."
Bill continued, "I finally got up to making 50 cents when sweeping the sidewalk was added to my duties. remember there was a crack in the sidewalk and I always had trouble
getting the dirt out. But, I was also getlowed to eat everything they didn't get scraped out of the bowls."

In 1941 or ' 42 , they sold the bakery and Bill began working at Met Cafe, washing dishes. "I had my firs restaurant steak there. They gave me my meals."

He worked for Earle Denny cleaning his insurance office and do ing odd jobs. The insurance office was Thangs now occupies. When Bill was 13, the late Raymond Cope got him ajob with hin at the Texas Agricultural Experiment
Station. "Lester Brooks was superintendent at the time, and he would hire high school boys to do odd jobs," Bill explained.

bove that, where spray did not reach, the canopy will be thin with small leaves and often the characteris
tic twig dieback of zinc deficiency.

## Pecan trees require zinc sprays for

 trees as well as commercial orchards. Untreated trees produce small leaves and rosetted shoots characteristic of zinc deficiency.Soil applications of zinc have not given satisfactory results. Foliarsprays are the most effective means of applying zinc to pecan trees.
Foliar zinc sprays should be ap plied now while pecan leaves are young. Zinc is needed for leaf growuh so the most critical time for zinc spray the young leaves are developing the young leaves are developing. our times in the spring period (Aprilto May). Young, vigorously growing tree should receive zinc at two to three week intervals from late April through August.
Common choices of zinc materials that can be sprayed include zin sulfate, NAN or zinc nitrate. Avoi spraying in midday, especially on ho windy days.
To get adequate penetration of zinc into the foliage, the spray needs to remain wet on the leaf as long as possible. Centain other plants, including peach urees, are readily domaged by
elemental zinc sprays, so limit the zinc sprays to pecan trees only.
Zinc does not move from leaf to leaf, so spray coverage of the entire canopy is important.

Good nitrogen and zinc management are only one part of a successful care program to grow healthy pecan rrees. Irrigation, weed control (espe trol and proper training are all vitally important to develop healthy trees. lower limbs where spray coverage was good.
