

# Area raked by strong storms

Many Iowa Park and Kamay residents were forced to take cover twice in four days in what has been a bad week, weather-wise.

Wednesday evening of last week, spotters were called out in Iowa Park and Kamay when they were alerted that severe thunderstorms were approaching.

A funnel was reportedly spotted five miles south of Electra moving east-northeast, and Kamay volunteer weather spotters noted rotation in the clouds at Kadane Comer and just north of Kamay.

Sirens were sounded in Iowa Park, although residents reported very little rain and some hail. That system pro-

duced no rain in Kamay.

Saturday began as a cold and windy day but quickly turned stormy.

When the storm hit at about 9:20 a.m., many baseball and softball players and their parents were lined up on Park Ave. for Iowa Park Little League Baseball's opening day parade. At the same time, third through eighth grade students from Iowa Park, Vernon, Graham, Jacksboro and Bowie were at Iowa Park Junior High competing in UIL literary events.

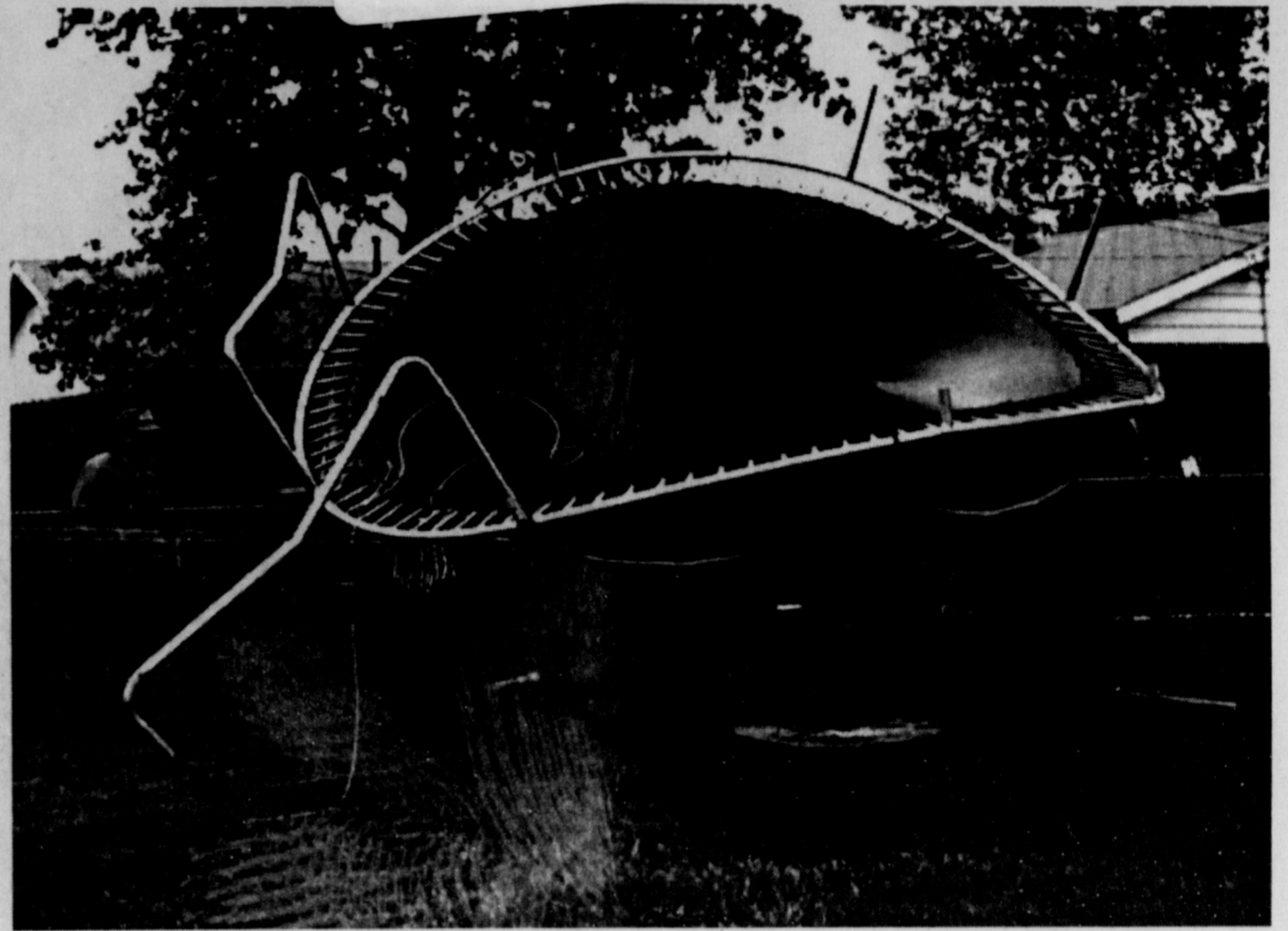
The parade was already in progress when news came that tornado sirens were being sounded in Electra, with storms moving toward Iowa Park. The procession, led by Iowa Park Police

Chief Ray Smock, quickly dispersed.

Shortly after, students and teachers at the literary event put their practice of tornado drills to use and took cover under desks.

Virgil Woodfin reported .38 rain and a trace of hail in Saturday's storm. However, large amounts of rain and hail were reported in the west part of town, and almost all storm damage, including felled electrical poles and uprooted trees, was reported west of Yosemite.

In the Kamay area, 1 3/4 inches of rain was reported by Marie Cravens. Trees were uprooted in the storm and electrical poles were reported down.

## Council delays decision on businessman's request

The city council voted to delay taking action on a proposal to permit a local business install a drive-up window facility on North Yosemite, during Monday's regularly-scheduled meeting.

By a 4-1 vote, aldermen approved delaying action on a request from Joe Hughes, owner of Hughes Pharmacy, who asked council approval for the drive-up window's installation.

The proposal included installation of the window on the west side of the pharmacy.

Alderman Bob Hamilton voiced concern over the proposal because a window at that location, as Hughes pointed out, would permit vehicles driving south on Yosemite to cross the north lane to the window, and then exit by again crossing the south lane.

Hamilton said he had no objection to the window being used, if the passenger side of vehicles were used and the north bound lane were not crossed.

Mayor Wayne House said permitting such a traffic pattern would involve the city's liability, should an accident occur.

Hughes said his major concern was service to his customers, especially to drivers with small children who often are left in the car while the driver goes inside to do business.

Aldermen Virgil Woodfin and Bud Mercer both said they saw no problems with the proposal.

Alderman Johnny Crawford said his major concern was the city's property being used as a driveway, because the city right-of-way extends to the building's west wall.

Alderman Mark Raby asked that a traffic count be made, in order to assess the possibility of traffic congestion. He also asked how many times a day such a window might be used.

Several business people were in the audience, all speaking in support of Hughes' proposal.

When a vote was called whether to delay action on the proposal until the council's next meeting, all aldermen except Woodfin voted for the delay.

The council voted to accept a bid of \$15,518 submitted by Texoma

Tractor for a John Deere brush hog type mowing tractor.

Also approved was a resolution authorizing the mayor to enter into a lease agreement with Iowa Park Ready Mix Concrete to retain its plant next to the wastewater treatment plant.

The resolution calls for a five-year lease with an option for the same length of time, for an annual fee of \$1,200.

The first of three required public hearings was held on a request to annex six lots on South Texowa into the city, with no comment from the audience.

No action was taken on an ordinance abandoning part of the right of way in the 1000 block of East Magnolia, between Bell and Saratoga, until additional measurement information can be provided.

The preliminary plat of the second

phase of Indian Springs Addition was approved.

Mayor House read three proclamations he had signed, including: National Day of Prayer on Thursday, May 4; Water Utilities Awareness Week, May 7-13, and Field Training/Mobileer Week, May 22-28.

The latter special event is carried on at Sheppard AFB, and two persons representing the base were present for the reading and to receive a copy.

During general discussion, Hamilton proposed that council members sign a letter to each of the state legislators from this area in opposition to three bills being considered in the House of Representatives.

All council members agreed, and are to sign the letters individually once they are written.

## Early voter turnout light

Only a handful of voters likely will determine the winners of the May 6 school and city elections, based on early voting turnout.

As of 3 p.m. Tuesday, only 14 early votes had been cast in the school board election, and by noon Wednesday, 22 ballots had been cast in the city council race.

If the eventual number of votes cast in either election is based on the early voting participation, many observers use for forecasting, next week's election may set a record low for Iowa Parkans.

Early voting will continue through Tuesday at the two polls, which are the school administration building for school trustees and city hall for city aldermen.

Both incumbent school trustees have drawn opponents.

Incumbent Dennis Yeager, who seeks return to Place Five, is being challenged by Pat Pelz, while Place Four incumbent, Max Henderson, is opposed by Jeff Watts.

Yeager, 41, resides at 32 Surrey. A trust officer, he has resided 41 years in Texas and 18 years in the school district.

Pelz, 39, is a pharmacist. A 16-year resident of the state and 10 in the district, she resides at 567 FM 369 North.

A life-long resident of Iowa Park, Henderson, 39, lives at 1020 West Louisa. He is employed as an applied statistician at Cryovac.

Watts, 34, lives at 4384 SH 370, and is self-employed as a fish farmer.

Two of the three incumbent city aldermen are being challenged for their seats this year.

Virgil Woodfin, a 79-year resident of Texas, of which 48 of those years he has lived in Iowa Park, retired a few years ago as manager of the Texas Experiment Station here.

Seeking Woodfin's Place One seat is Tracy Fears, 34, who resides at 703 Louisa. Fears, a salesman, has lived in Texas 35 years and in Iowa Park eight years.

Mark Raby, 39, is the Place Five incumbent. A life-long resident of Texas, he has lived in Iowa Park 20 years and currently resides at 703 West Magnolia. He is employed as an office manager.

Seeking to unseat Raby is Terry Johnson, 36, of 902 Dossia. Also a life-long Texan, he has lived in the city 30 years. Johnson is employed as a police officer in Vernon.

Place Three incumbent Bob Hamilton, 64, is unopposed in the election. The co-publisher of the *Iowa Park Leader* has lived in Texas 60 years, 25 of which have been in Iowa Park.

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# Bradford recalls life as chuck cook, barber

To observe him--always clean-shaven, with gray hair neatly trimmed, speaking softly, walking erect--much straighter than most in their 8th decade of life--you don't immediately associate W. T. "Brad" Bradford with a heritage of cattle, cowboys and rodeos.

No, you wouldn't think about him having been a bronc and bull rider.

That's in his past, but he still wears boots and a western style hat. Born on a farm in the edge of King County, his family moved north of Guthrie when Brad was a year old. His dad farmed and worked for the Pitchfork Ranch and 6666 Ranch that joined it on the north, when he wasn't farming. He also made quilts and was a wagon cook, in fact, he did anything he set his mind to, Brad fondly recalled.

When Brad was old enough he began helping his dad on the farm. "He ran a lot of hogs and fed out steers. We raised most of what we ate," he said. "We didn't have to buy anything but the staples". They farmed 200 acres in Cottle County, near Paducah.

Bradford began working for the Pitchfork and 6666 Ranches, working cattle and following the cattle drives as they changed the cattle from one pasture to another on the thousands of acres of ranchland. He was chuckwagon cook.

He worked as wagon cook four years for the Pitchfork. Usually they were out about two months each time.

Brad remembers one April he and 19 cowboys got rained in for about a week in a 24-foot long dugout. "Those boys were always hungry," he said. While he and "hoodlum" (his assistant) would be preparing their meals and making sourdough biscuits, they would just reach in and grab a handful of food. But, the one in charge finally put them "in their places and made them stay put until we could get it ready."

At times Brad would prepare meals for 72 hay hands. He had seven 16-inch Dutch ovens that would hold 30 to 35 sourdough biscuits each.

The Pitchfork had 60,000 acres and bought 70,000 more from the Matador Ranch.

Brad and his five brothers got the "rodeo" fever. They would come to Wichita Falls to the old Spudder Park in the early 1930s and participate in the rodeos held there. And, he received his share of wins.

"It didn't take much winnings then to get by," he said. "We would bring our bed rolls and sleep in a nearby school yard."

"You could get a good breakfast at a cafe then for 35 cents. We would eat a big breakfast and then buy a loaf of bread and some weiners and make it the rest of the day."

He smiled as he remembered those days and said, "Those old bulls look a little bigger and a lot meaner to me now than when I was riding them."

Brad said he didn't do any roping because he is left-handed and didn't work well with the rope.

He said the ranchers were really good to help the farmers when they needed it. He remembered the ones on the Pitchfork and 6666 were good hearted and helped a lot of them.

"I remember one time my dad contracted to do some work and build fences on one of the ranches. By the time he hired some help, etc., he just broke even. When he completed his job and showed the manager his cost, which he had agreed to do, the man said, 'You aren't making money very fast that way are you?' My daddy told him some things had come up that raised the cost, but that he figured a man should be as good as his word, so we got the job done."

As his dad started to leave, the rancher called him back and handed him a check for \$300.

Brad tried to enlist in the army,

but they wouldn't take him because of an injury he received in a wreck he had in the 1930s. He almost broke his back and the end of his nose was cut off.

He said when he came to after the wreck, he could see something he thought was a blood clot, but when he felt it he realized the end of his nose was just hanging there. He had to have reconstructive surgery for that.

"After Dec. 7, 1941, they got in a hurry for me to join the army. They asked what I could do and I told them I could cook. They said they would see about it," Brad said.

He started out in the army in Mineral Wells and got out four years later in Colorado City as a staff sergeant.

In Mineral Wells he was working at the station hospital. "They made me a bedpan technician at first," Brad said.

At the time they were using civilian cooks. They decided to get rid of them and use the soldiers. He started out as a butcher and cook supervisor.

He said the head cook was very good at his job and he asked him if he really wanted to learn more about cooking. He wanted to teach me to cook for more than I had been used to cooking for, so he could take a six-week vacation.

"I reported for duty and saw the sign to prepare meals for 2,300. I'd fed 72, but 2,300? They soon made me first cook," Brad said.

He spent a lot of time in California and the Philippines and on troop ships in the Pacific.

Brad had met his future wife, Arah Mae, in Paducah. They were married in Los Angeles after he was in service.

While stationed in California he would cook one day and have the next day off. On his days off he worked extra as a fry cook and made as much money in two weeks doing that as he made in the army in a month.

He worked in a large steak house and they would bring him a bunch of orders at one time. Some wanted their's rare, some medium, some well done and some "barely warmed on both sides" Brad said. "They sure don't eat their steaks like Texans do."

He was sent to Fort Collins, Colorado where he stayed a short time.

He was outfitting mule packs for cavalry camp training, but because of his nose injury he couldn't take the weather and he was sent back to Cali-

The Kell House is the home that was occupied by Wichita Falls industrialist and civic leader, Frank Kell. This house of Colonial Revival style with Neo-Classical elements was considered to be on the edge of town when it was built in 1909.

Because Kell played such a key role in the region's formative years through his vast milling and railroading interests, the family home was often a gathering place for state and national leaders.

The house was continuously occupied by members of the Kell family until it was purchased in 1980 by the Wichita County Heritage Society.

Furnished with original furniture and objects belonging to the Kells, it now serves as a house museum open to the public for tours. It continues to be a showcase of community activity and pride. It is recognized as a National, State, and Local Landmark.

During the business meeting held in the Annex Building of First Baptist Church, reports were heard on the Santa Rosa District meeting held in Paducah, where the club received seven awards.

Members participated in the city-wide clean-up campaign and the city-wide garage sale sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

This is a nationwide, non-partisan campaign which will culminate with the 1996 elections and is designed not only to encourage more women to vote, but to insure that they are informed voters.

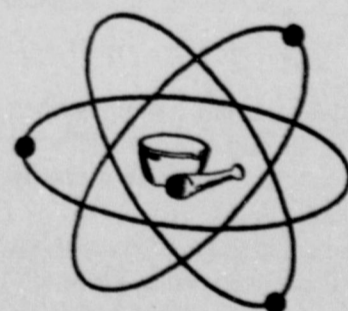
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Dorothy Johnson

to watch him play whenever possible. Among her recipes, Dorothy said "Refrigerator Rolls" is her favorite. Several of the recipes come from the Girl Scout Cookbook, and "Grandmother's Meat Loaf" is a recipe that belonged to Ken's grandmother, the late Ruby Good.

## Refrigerator Rolls

6-6 1/2 cups all-purpose flour  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 tsps. salt  
2 pkgs. active dry yeast  
1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened  
1 egg  
Salad oil

Early in the day, or up to 1 week ahead:

1. In large bowl, combine 2 1/4 cups flour, sugar, salt and yeast; add butter or margarine. With mixer at low speed, gradually pour 2 cups hot tap water (120° to 130° F.) into dry ingredients. Add egg; increase speed to medium; beat 2 minutes, occasionally scraping bowl with rubber spatula. Beat in 3/4 cup flour or enough to make a thick batter; continue beating 2 minutes, occasionally scraping bowl. With spoon, stir in enough additional flour (about 2 1/2 cups) to make a soft dough.

2. Turn dough onto lightly floured surface and knead until smooth and elastic, about 10 minutes. Shape dough into ball and place in greased large bowl, turning over so that top of dough is greased. Cover with towel, let rise in warm place (80° to 85° F.) away from draft, until doubled, about 1 1/2 hours. (Dough is doubled when two fingers pressed lightly into dough leave a dent.)

3. Punch down dough by pushing down the center of dough with fist, then pushing edges of dough into center. Turn dough over; brush with salad oil. Cover bowl tightly with plastic wrap and refrigerate, punching down occasionally, until ready to use.

4. About 2 hours before serving: Remove dough from refrigerator; grease 15 1/2x10 1/2" open roasting pan. Cut dough into 30 equal pieces; shape into balls and place in pan. Cover with towel; let rise in warm place until doubled, about 1 1/2 hours. (Dough is doubled when one finger very lightly pressed against dough leaves a dent.)

5. Pre-heat oven to 425 degrees. Bake 15 to 20 minutes, until golden brown. Brush rolls with melted butter or margarine. Remove from pan and serve immediately.

## Grandmother's Meat Loaf

1 1/2 lb. ground chuck  
3 eggs  
Salt to taste  
Pepper  
1 slice of bread soaked under the hot water tap  
5 to 6 crushed crackers  
1 can tomato sauce

Mix all together real good. Put in baking dish; form a loaf. Add crushed cracker crumbs over the top. Sprinkle Tabasco sauce and tomato sauce over all. Bake at 375 degrees approximately 40-45 minutes.

## Sunny Lemon Cheesecake Squares

1 pkg. lemon cake mix  
1/2 cup margarine or butter, softened  
8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened  
11 oz. can mandarin orange segments, well drained  
2 eggs  
2/3 cup coconut

Heat oven to 325 degrees. Lightly grease 12x8" (2-quart) baking dish or 9-inch square pan. Reserve 1 cup of

the dry cake mix. In large bowl, combine remaining cake mix and margarine at low speed until crumbly. Reserve 1 cup of crumb mixture. Press remaining crumb mixture in bottom of greased baking dish.

In same bowl, combine reserved 1 cup cake mix, cream cheese, orange segments and eggs at medium speed until well blended. Stir in coconut. Spread over base. Sprinkle with reserved 1 cup crumb mixture. Bake at 325 degrees 30 to 40 minutes, or until center is set. Cool completely. Refrigerate until serving time. Store in refrigerator. Serves 16.

## Corn Casserole

2 - 16 oz. cans whole kernel corn  
1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese  
1 stick butter  
1 - 4 oz. can mild green chilies

Melt cream cheese and butter in a covered, microwave-safe dish. Add corn and green chilies. Heat through until hot. This is quick and delicious.

## Pretzel Salad

2 cups crushed pretzels  
3/4 cup oleo  
3 Tbsps. sugar  
1 lg. box strawberry jello  
2 - 10 oz. pkgs. frozen strawberries  
8 oz. cream cheese  
1 cup powdered sugar  
Large ctn. Cool Whip

Melt oleo; add sugar and pretzels. Put in 9x13 pan and bake 8 minutes at 400 degrees.

Mix jello with 2 cups boiling water; add strawberries and refrigerate until almost set.

Mix cream cheese, sugar and Cool Whip and put over pretzels when cool. Put jello mixture over the cream cheese mixture.

## The Often Chronic Discomfort of Allergies

- Each year, more than 40 million Americans suffer from allergic rhinitis, also known as hay fever.
- These "allergic bouts" of a stuffy head and watery eyes can occur one or more times a year, or they last practically all year round.
- Three million work days and two million school days are lost each year to allergy attacks.
- Normally harmless substances can cause allergic reactions in sensitive people. These substances commonly include: pollen from plants, dust, mold, foods, and dander (skin particles) from animals.
- Americans spend an estimated \$500 million each year on allergy treatments. Although there is no cure, there are a number of ways to fight allergies.
- Over-the-counter medications and prescription medicines are the most common forms of treatment. Immunotherapy, or injection therapy, is both expensive and time-consuming, so it is generally used only in severe or chronic situations.
- Avoidance, in principle, is the simplest therapy. Once the allergen has been identified, the sufferer can try to avoid it.
- Some of the most common allergy symptoms are:  
**Eyes** - itching, tearing, reddening, or swelling  
**Nose** - sneezing (often repetitive), itching, congestion, or runniness  
**Skin** - a rash develops that is almost always itchy and consists of spots that are raised, flat, red, or white, hive-like, or raw and oozing  
**Digestive tract** - nausea, vomiting, cramps, loose stools, or diarrhea from eating a particular food.

## Busy week for police

AUSTIN — The Texas Senate slammed the door last week on efforts to initiate interstate branch banking in Texas.

On a 30-0 vote, the Senate passed legislation allowing the state to "opt out" of adopting recently enacted federal branch-banking laws for another four years.

The state Senate joins the House, which earlier voted 142-0 to "opt out" of federal branch-banking laws.

Expectations loomed that, had lawmakers approved a branch-banking measure, large banks, such as Bank One, Nationsbank and Chemical Bank, would turn their Texas facilities into branches of their out-of-state main banks.

"This unanimous vote by the Senate reflects recognition of the importance of this issue to the economy of Texas," said Chris Williston, president of Independent Bankers Association of Texas. Williston's group argued that federal branch-banking laws would hurt small towns and result in the loss of an estimated \$18 million in state tax revenue.

Robert Harris of the Texas Bankers Association, told the *Houston Chronicle* that his group believes that consumers wouldn't notice much difference if control of banks went out of state.

"It's a disagreement between

bankers and has very little if any impact on the average person,"

Harris said.

Both banking groups agreed, however, that details of interstate branch banking should be worked out between now and 1999, such as whether banks will follow Texas usury laws or the usury laws of the home states of out-of-state banks.

In other legislative action last week:

■ The Senate approved a proposed constitutional amendment that would allow Texans to take second mortgages out on their homes to finance such things as sending children to college.

The action marked the first time home equity lending has ever been voted on by the full Senate or House, said sponsor Sen. Jerry Patterson, R-Pasadena.

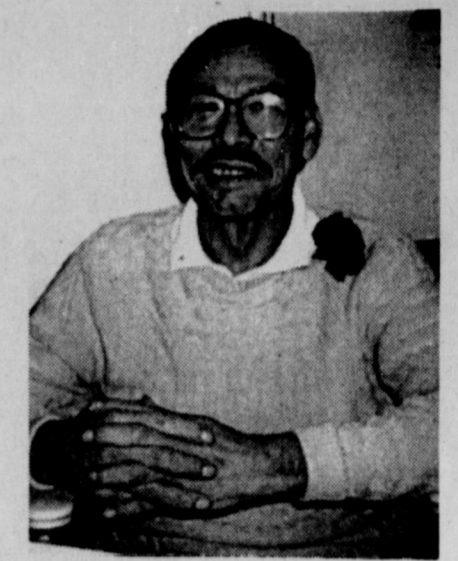
■ A special legislative committee, headed by Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and House Speaker Pete Laney recommended that the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse will be placed in conservatorship.

The action will take place as soon as Gov. George W. Bush names three financial experts willing to serve on the State Conservatorship Board.

The vote for conservatorship came after Col. James Wilson of the Department of Public Safety testified that investigations have turned up evidence of "probable misuse and at times theft of state funds."

■ The Senate scrapped a revised vehicle emissions-testing plan and instead approved a two-year moratorium on the tests.

The bill now goes to the House, which is writing its own revised emissions-testing proposal.

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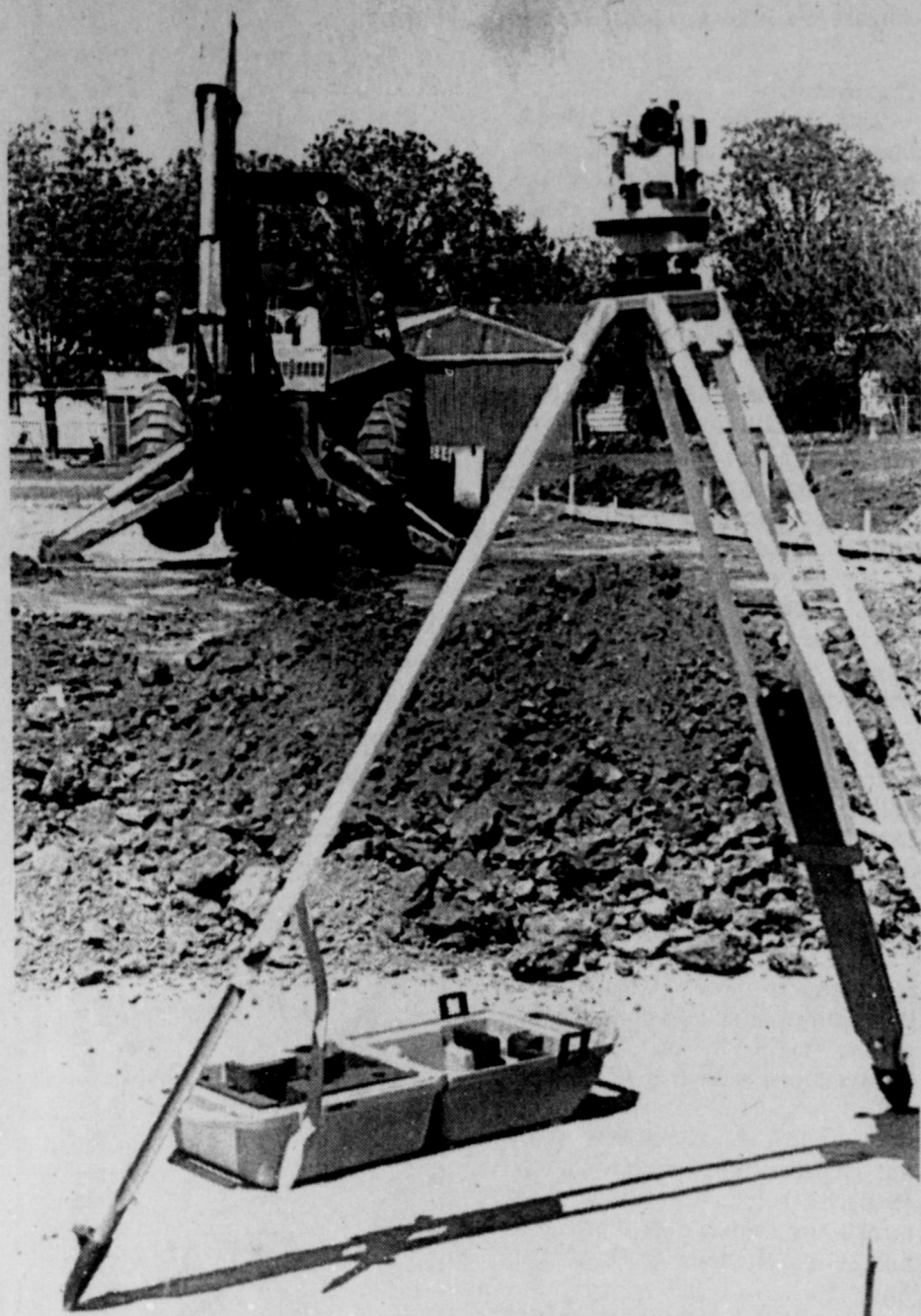

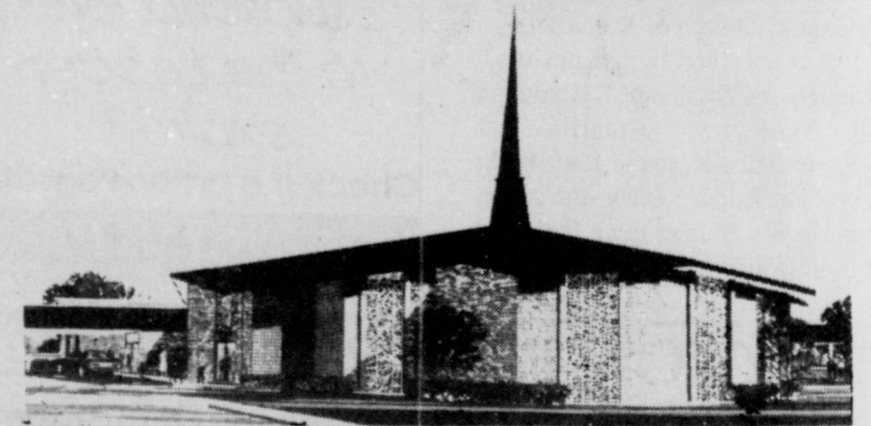

# Bradford recalls cook, barber careers

At Torrance there were 3,900 soldiers to be fed. Then they were sent to Camp Young on desert maneuvers, near Indio. The post commander there was Gen. George Patton.

"He got out among us and was very nice and friendly and acted like one of us. He told us he was doing a job just like we were and not to feel we had to do anything special for him," Brad recalled.

After Bradford was discharged he and his wife and family moved to Amarillo where he was to take over management of a ranch. But that didn't last long. The owner also owned a business and knew nothing about ranching.

"I couldn't go along with his thinking, so I quit. I had been a 'shade tree barber' a long time. In fact I cut hair on the troop ships and the boys would give me \$1," he said.

He decided he would go to Barber College. He got a job cooking at the Herring Hotel while attending to help pay his way.

They sent both of their sons to barber college in the summer to give them something to do.

Brad and their son Gary, trade haircuts now. He just likes his son's haircuts, because he knows how he wants to wear it.

When Bradford began barbering he was getting 75 cents for a hair cut. When he retired 30 years later, he was getting \$5.

Brad and Arah Mae moved to Iowa Park 11 years ago at the insistence of their son, Gary, who was stationed at Sheppard AFB. He and his family had purchased the old Herman Mitchell home in Iowa Park and they wanted his parents to move here.

A short time after they moved Gary was sent to Arlington, where he is with the Department of Defense in investigative service. But when he retires they plan to come back here to make their home.

Brad still does all of the cooking at home. His wife doesn't like to cook, "But she likes to tell me how," Brad

jokingly remarked. Arah Mae quickly commented, "Yes, but I do have to do all the cleaning up after you cook."

While they lived in Amarillo Arah Mae worked a half day for a wholesale florist. She later worked 15 years for an Institutional Food Company in the purchasing department. She was born in Arizona in the 1920s and grew up in Paducah. She is a member of First Baptist Church.

One of Bradford's specialities is sour dough cornbread, which he says a lot of people never heard of. And I've been told that his pecan brittle is really something special. He also makes sour dough biscuits and hot cakes.

Every day when he is in town he can be found at the City Cafe some time during the day, where when the other coffee drinkers can get him started he can regale them with nostalgic stories as he thinks of them.

The Bradford's other son, Jimmy, is a Vietnam veteran and is a vocational rehabilitation therapist at the VA Medical Center in Long Beach.

He also does beautiful woodwork and the Bradfords proudly display his handiwork.

Jimmy received the GEICO Public Service Award for physical rehabilitation in 1993. His newest project for the patients' occupational therapy is gardening. The paraplegic patients plant seeds by blowing them through a straw.

Brad has shared his recipe for sourdough starter and sourdough cornbread with readers of the *Iowa Park Leader* who would like to try their hand at making it.

### Sour Dough Starter

Use a two or three gallon container, with deep well  
1/2 pkg. Fleischmann's dry yeast, dissolved in warm water  
2 Tbsp. sugar  
Put the above in container and add 1/2 cup lukewarm water  
Add flour to mixture until medium, thick  
Peel one medium Irish potato and drop into mixture  
Cover and let stand overnight  
Use this as liquid for biscuits

### Biscuits

I mix the old-fashioned way, with my hand. Use a round pan 3 inches deep and about 10 or 12 inches across and make a nest.

To this I add:  
3 cups starter and 1 tablespoon Crisco  
2 Tbsp. baking powder, put in flour next to starter

2 tsp. salt, added with baking powder  
Mix by hand until desired thickness for biscuit, pinch off into desired size of biscuit and put in a greased 9x12 pan. Let rise in warm place and put in oven and bake at 400 degrees until done.

### Sour Dough Cornbread

In mixing bowl use:  
1 egg  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. sugar  
2 Tbsp. cooking oil  
1 cup water  
1 cup sour dough mix  
1 Tbsp. baking powder  
Pinch of soda  
Thicken with cornmeal  
Grease 9x12 pan. Heat pan in pre-heated oven. Pour cornbread mix in pan and put back in oven. Cook at 400 degrees 20 to 25 minutes, or until done

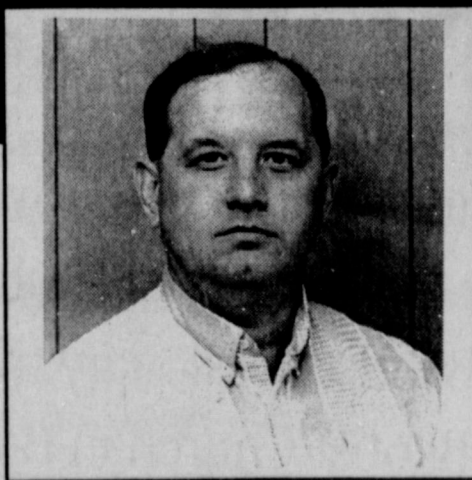

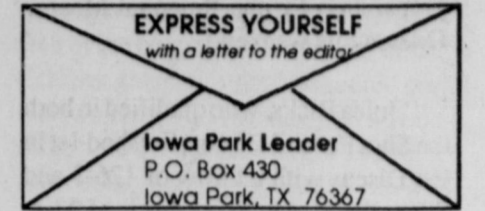



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# Thinclads head for Region One meet

Both the Hawks and the Lady Hawks traveled to Lake Dallas for the Regional Qualifier's Meet last week in preparation for the Regional Meet in Odessa this weekend.

Julea Ricks, who qualified in both the Shot Put and Discus, finished 1st in the Discus with a throw of 126-3 and 5th in the Shot with a throw of 33-4, to lead the Lady Hawks.

"Julea has an opportunity to medal and go on to State," said head coach

Bruce Merrell. "There's a girl from Childress who's thrown 138-144 and another girl from Alpine who's throwing in the 128-132 range and Julea's best throw is right in there with both of them so I think she has a good shot at doing well."

Also advancing to the Regional Meet in the Shot Put is Jodi Young who threw 32-0 in the Qualifier's Meet.

Brandi Butler, who qualified in four different events, finished 3rd in both the 800m run and the Long Jump

while running a 64.0 in the 400m and running on the 400m relay team.

"Brandi has a chance if she runs real well," Merrell added. "She needs to get down into the 2:26 range (2:31 best so far this year), but she is capable of doing that. She's in good shape in the Long Jump with two girls jumping right at 17-0 and the rest of the pack somewhere in the 16-1 to 16-5 range (personal best 16-1 so far)."

Other qualifiers include Sharla Hughes who cleared 4-10 in the High

Jump and Deamber Koerth who ran 68.0 in the 400m run.

Both the 400m and 800m Relay teams were not running at full strength and had to be filled in with some subs but both still finished strong and should be ready to go heading into the Regional Meet.

## Hawk golfer shows well

Iowa Park High's John Wood failed to qualify for the state UIL golf tournament, but made a strong showing this week in the Region One meet at Odessa.

Wood, runner-up medalist for Dist. 3-AAA, had rounds of 80 and 83 for a 163 total in the 36-hole meet at Odessa.

Advancing to state as medalists were Josh McCoy of Perryton (67-76-143), and Lane Dyer of Tulia (75-70-145).

The two 3-AAA teams competing at Odessa were Bridgeport, which finished in fourth place, and Graham, which tied with Childress and Decatur for seventh.

Tulia won the team title, followed by Abilene Wylie, and Breckenridge finished third, four strokes behind Wylie.

Graham's girls ran away and hid from the field at Regional, finishing 32 strokes ahead of second-lace Abilene Wylie, 702-734. Bridgeport had a 790 for ninth.

Merrell. "Hopefully, we'll have some luck and have two or three girls advance to State. When you're at one of these kind of meets, anything can happen."

Tim Estrada also qualified for the Regional Meet in the 3200m run. Estrada was well off his personal best time of 10:31 running 11:16 and 5:00 in the 1600m run.

"Tim, I think, will finish in the top six," Ellis added. "There's a kid from West Texas who's run 9:55 but I feel Tim can run in the low 10:20's and that should be good enough to place. It would take a low 10 to advance to State, but if he gets after it he should do well."

"Both Tim and Shawn should score points and if Shawn has a real good day, he could be in the running for a shot at State," Ellis said.

## WHOOOOOOPS! 1995 Lady Hawks not first champs

The *Leader* last week mistakenly stated the 1995 Lady Hawk track team was the first to win a district championship.

In fact, they were the second. The 1989 Lady Hawks were the first girls' track team to earn a district title for Iowa Park High School.

Both years, Iowa Park defeated Vernon for the coveted title. This year, the Lady Hawks out-scored the Lady Lions 149.5-133.5. The point spread was closer in 1989, 123-119.

IPHS grad Jerry Reed called the error to the paper's attention in a Letter to the Editor, saying:

I know you would want to keep the record straight.

The April 20th edition of the *Leader* stated that the Lady Hawks had just won their first ever district track championship. That's incorrect!

Another group of talented freshmen help lead the Lady Hawks to the district track title in 1989!

## AT ARROWHEAD

# White Bass count quadruples

The Wichita Falls Inland Fisheries office of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. recently completed their Lake Arrowhead spring sampling.

TPWD targeted white bass and catfish species by setting 15 gill nets overnight at locations throughout the lake.

Gill net sampling has been conducted each spring at the same locations since 1992. Information gained from the surveys gives fisheries biologist an idea of the relative abundance, reproductive success, size structure and population trends of targeted species.

Results from sampling this spring indicate a boom in the Lake Arrowhead white bass population over the last few years. In 1992, Arrowhead's catch rate averaged 4.8 white bass per gill net, and in 1993 rose to 5.5.

In 1994 the rate jumped to 13.5 and this spring climbed to 19.0 fish per net.

This four-fold increase in the white bass population in just four years makes Lake Arrowhead one of the best white bass lakes in the state.

For comparison, Lake Kemp white bass catch rates were 4.3 fish per net and Lake Kickapoo was slightly less, with 3.1. Lake Ray Roberts averages 14.5 and Lake Texoma 3.2.

Even more exciting is that 84 percent of the white bass sampled were of legal size and above (10 inches). Large numbers of smaller fish (7-9 inches) were also collected indicating good reproduction and a strong white bass population in the future.

Lake Arrowhead channel catfish numbers are also increasing, although not as dramatically as white bass.

Gill netting yielded only 10 channel catfish during the entire 1992 spring survey, and only increased to 14 in 1993.

In 1994, however, 39 channel catfish were sampled and 40 this spring.

This information indicates Arrowhead channel catfish are reproducing and anglers have access to a stable population that will continue to produce good fishing.

The blue catfish is a relatively

new sport fish for Arrowhead that was stocked in 1987. The original stocking has now resulted in a small population of large blue catfish (19 inches).

This spring a new lake record blue catfish weighing 17.02 was caught by Anthony Nader.

The 1995 survey collected a number of small blue catfish between seven and 10 inches and several between 19 and 24 inches. This indicates that the larger blue catfish are becoming sexually mature and starting to reproduce.

The Arrowhead blue catfish population should be helped by new minimum length regulations that go into effect Sept. 1. That will raise the minimum length limit for both channel and blue catfish from nine to 12 inches and allow more of the smaller fish to survive to spawning size.

# Hawks in 3-way tie for district lead

Since the last time you've read about the Iowa Park baseball team in the *Leader*, the Hawks have run off a nice three-game winning streak, outscored their opponents 31-3, and have moved into a three-way tie for first place in District 3-3A with Vernon and Graham.

The Hawks started the week by blasting Jacksboro 19-0 Tuesday of last week in a game which saw Iowa Park's Jason Young and Chris Norris combine to throw a no-hitter against the Tigers and three different Hawks hit home runs.

Corky Petty had an RBI single in the first to give Iowa Park a 1-0 lead after one inning. The Hawks added six more runs in the second to take a 7-0 lead when Norris and Clint Scobee both drove in a pair of runs to go along with Petty's second RBI of the game.

Iowa Park added two more runs in the top of the third before erupting for

nine in the fourth. The Hawks sent 13 batters to the plate in the inning and picked up nine hits. Jeff Taylor had a two-run double, Casey Moser added a two-run home run, David Waterbury and Clancy Lalumia each added RBI singles before Scobee ended the fireworks with a three-run blast to cap the scoring in the fourth.

Waterbury's solo shot in the fifth made the final score 19-0. Young picked up the win going three strong innings to improve to 1-1 overall. Young struck out eight in his three-inning stint while Norris added three K's in his two innings of work.

Since district play started, the Hawk pitching staff has worked 22 consecutive innings without allowing an earned run.

Iowa Park's second win of the week came on Friday when they traveled to Bowie and came away with a 9-3 win over the Jackrabbits.

The Hawks took a 2-0 lead in the

first inning despite picking up only one hit. Robert Klinkerman walked and went to second on a passed ball and with two outs scored when Petty reached base on an error. Moser followed with a single to put runners at the corners and Petty came around to score on another Bowie error.

The Rabbits scored a pair of unearned runs in the bottom of the first to tie the game at 2-2. After Hawkins had struck out the first two batters, two walks put runners at first and second when the next batter hit a high pop up to Hawkins who mis-played it to load the bases. The next batter singled to drive in a pair of runs to knot the score.

The Hawks took the lead for good in the third when they scored three runs to take a 5-2 lead. Lalumia had a ground out for an RBI before Dusty Owen singled driving in Lalumia and Norris who had walked. Iowa Park made it 6-2 when Moser singled to plate Yeager who was pinch running for Scobee.

Then it happened. The Hawks gave up an earned run. It would turn out to be the only one so far this season in district. Hawkins' fastball offering to the leadoff hitter in the bottom of the fourth was deposited over the left-center field fence to cut the lead to 6-3.

Iowa Park added a single run in the top of the fifth and a pair in the top of the sixth when Moser hit his second homer in two games to make the final 9-3.

Hawks went five innings to pick

up his third win against only one loss and struck out eight along the way. Petty and Young each got one inning of work to close out the game.

That set up the showdown for first in district against Graham Tuesday. Graham came into the game unbeaten at 3-0 in league play and left tied for first at 4-1 after Iowa Park blanked the Steers 3-0 behind a strong pitching performance by Norris.

Norris pitched all seven innings to improve his record to 4-4 striking out eight while walking only three. The win moves Iowa Park's record to 9-9 overall.

Iowa Park jumped on top 1-0 in the bottom of the first when Yeager, who was running for Scobee, came around to score on Petty's RBI single.

The Hawks made it 2-0 in the second

when Lalumia walked and stole second, then came in on Owen's seeing-eye-single just past second base.

Iowa Park added the final run in the fifth when Scobee singled with two outs and Yeager, who was running for him, came in on Klinkerman's RBI single to center field to make the final 3-0.

The shut-out ran the total to 36 innings with only the one earned run allowed.

"This just goes to show how tough our non-district opponents were," head coach David Fuhrman said. "We've been pitching well all year long. You've got to remember Rider beat us pretty bad and they look like they're going to win their 5A district and the Coyotes beat us as well and they look like they're going to make the playoffs."

"So the pitching's really been there

all along, it's just we've not been hitting the ball like we are capable of," Fuhrman added. "Plus we've been leaving way too many base runners on. One of the best signs coming out of the Graham game was that we scored our last two runs with two outs and no one on base. That's something we haven't been doing a good job of early in the year."

"Graham is a much improved team since we played them earlier this year," Fuhrman said. "I thought Dollar did a good job on the mound for them but they didn't swing the bats very well, but Norris can make you look bad at the plate. I don't think the bottom half of their lineup is as strong as our's is."

The Hawks will be looking to stay in first place when they play host to Jacksboro tomorrow at 4:30 p.m. at Hawk Field.

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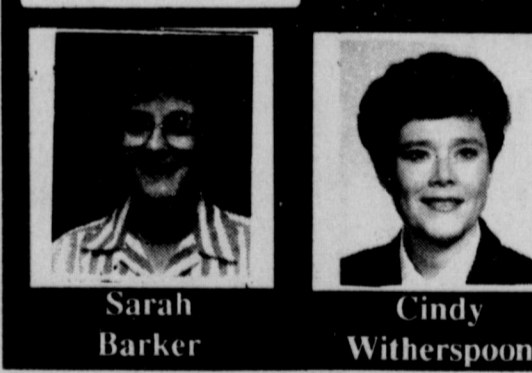
