School, city polls open Saturday for voters

School and city voters will cast their ballots Saturday for their choices of trustees and aldermen.

The polls, which will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m., will be at Kidwell Elementary and Bradford Elementary for both school and city voting, and a third poll, at the West

Wichita Co-op Building in Valley View, for school patrons.

Based on the turnout of early voters during the past week, Saturday could well be a busy one for election officials.

When the early voting polls closed Tuesday afternoon, 94 votes had been

cast in the school election and 65 in the city's. A week earlier, only 14 and 22 ballots had been cast, respectively.

Early voting was about the same as last year in the school's election, when 107 ballots had been cast prior to election day.

None of the council positions last

year were challenged, and as a result, only 17 early ballots were cast.

School trustee candidates include Place Five incumbent Dennis Yeager and challenger Pat Pelz, and Place Four incumbent Max Henderson and challenger Jeff Watts.

City council candidates include

Place One incumbent Virgil Woodfin and challenger Tracy Fears; Place Five incumbent Mark Raby and challenger Terry Johnson, and Place Three incumbent Bob Hamilton, who did not draw an opponent.

To assist voters -- especially those new to the area who do not know the

candidates personally -- the *Leader* has requested each candidate to draft statements concerning their candidacies.

All 10 candidates responded, and their statements appear unedited herein:

Council to meet Monday

Following the canvassing of votes cast in Saturday's election Monday night, members of the city council will consider two annexation requests, a housing development plat and a businessman's request.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Though the winners of the election will be verified by canvassing Saturday's voting, the administration of oaths will not take place until the next council meeting, according to state election code.

Public hearings on two annexation requests, one in the McCluskey Addition and the other in Quail Valley Estates, will be held.

April big month for building

Three major projects and two mobile homes boosted April's building permit total to \$411,547, bringing the year's sum to \$1,369,193.

The major projects included permits for the new Friendly Door building, a new home, and reroofing of a business.

Police re-arresting violators

Iowa Park police continue to demonstrate that they intend for those

who have not taken care of their fines or appeared in municipal court when they were supposed to, that those persons will be arrested again.

Outstanding warrants are issued in those situations, and three such cases appeared on the police blotter during the past week.

Rhonda Kay Willis, 23, was taken into custody Thursday evening at Victoria and Cash, on a capias pro fine warrant issued by municipal court. She was booked and later released after paying a \$130 fine.

The next evening, police arrested Floyd Yarbrough, 67, on a capias pro fine for public intoxication. He was booked and later released after signing a promise to appear in municipal court May 9.

Also arrested Friday evening on outstanding local warrants for speeding in a school zone and having an expired drivers license was David Ray Meissner, 26. He was booked again at the police station, and then released after promising to appear in municipal court.

A patrol officer stopped a vehicle at 12:25 a.m. Friday in the 100 block of South Hawthorne when it was noticed the vehicle had a defective tail light.

Both occupants were determined to be intoxicated, and placed under arrest and taken to the police station.

Bill Jack Selby, 45, was released at 8:38 a.m. after promising to appear

in municipal court. Brenda Sue Wiggins, 34, of Wichita Falls paid \$50 toward a fine of \$280 and was released, according to the blotter entry.

A man attempting to sell meat by going door to door, without a required solicitor's permit, was arrested Saturday afternoon in the 700 block of East Bank.

William M. Hunziker, 40, paid a fine of \$81.50 for violating a city ordinance and was released.

Six persons injured in two-vehicle crash

A two-vehicle collision Monday evening at the intersection of Victoria and Washington resulted in six persons being transported by ambulances to hospitals.

According to the police accident report, an automobile driven by Clyde Knight, 65, was driving east on Washington and crashed into a van driven by Anette Marie Layne, 37, that was traveling south on Victoria.

The impact spun the van 180 degrees and came to rest in a deep ditch on the south side of Washington.

One occupant of the van, Rachel Leah Layne, 11, was reportedly thrown through a window and into the ditch.

Her injuries included a broken shoulder and hip. She was released Tuesday from the Sheppard AFB hospital to recuperate at home.

Mrs. Layne and her other two daughters, Charlene Marie, 15, and Rebecca Elise, nine, also were transported by ambulance to the base hospital, where they were treated for minor injuries and released.

The Knight vehicle spun about 180 degrees upon impact, and somehow the transmission was shifted into reverse and it wound up crashing into a tree in front of a home at 314 East Washington. The impact shattered the rear window.

Both Knight and his 64-year-old wife were transported by ambulance to Bethania Hospital, where they reportedly were treated for injuries and released.

Knight was ticketed for failure to yield right of way at the intersection, according to the report.

After Berry's discharge from service, they returned to his home area of Wichita Falls. They have been residents of Iowa Park 44 years.

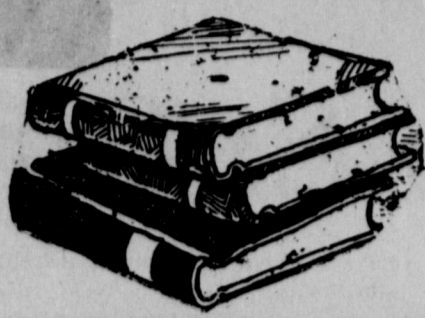
They are members of First United Methodist Church. Mrs. Berry is a member of United Methodist Women.

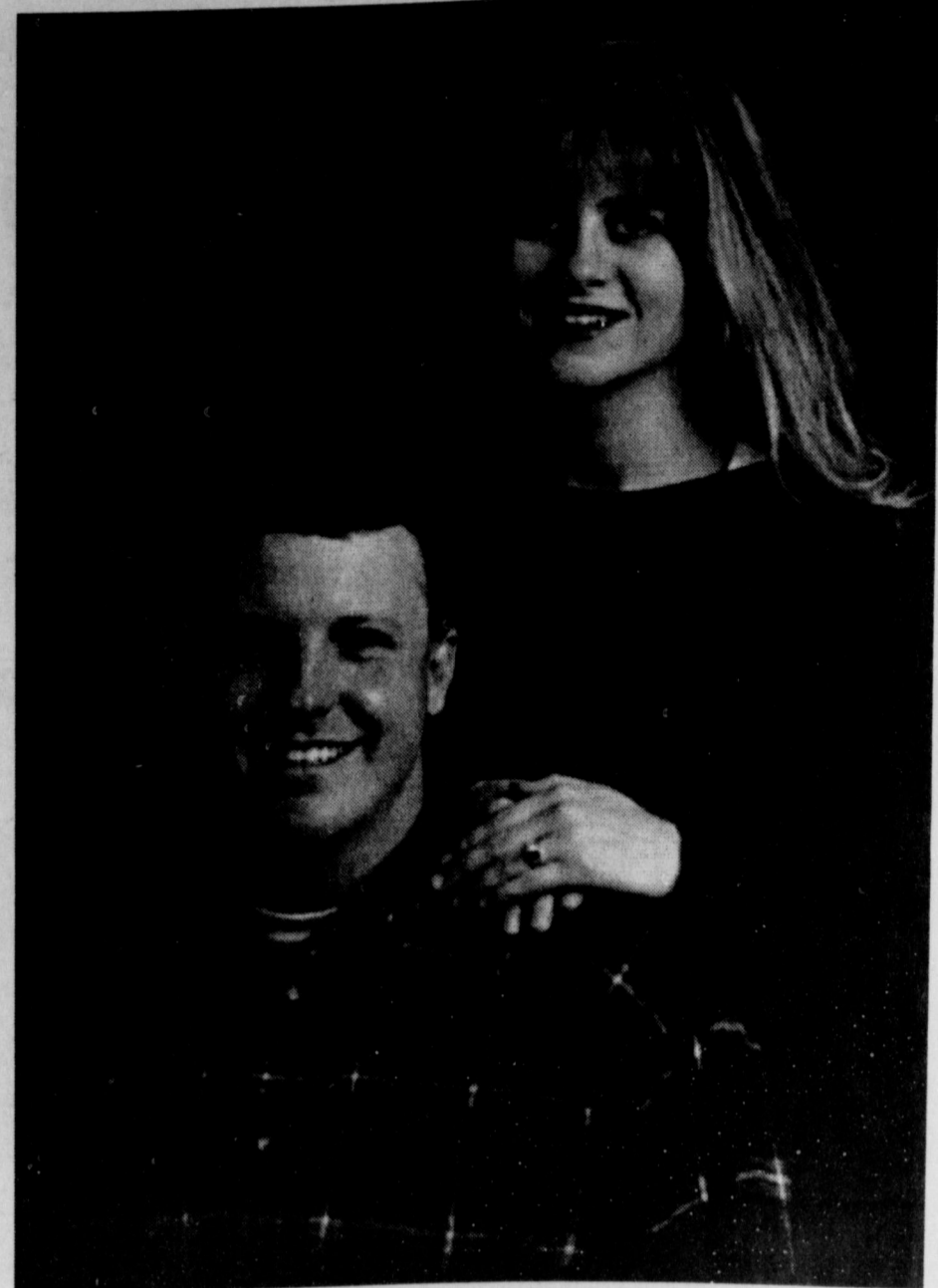

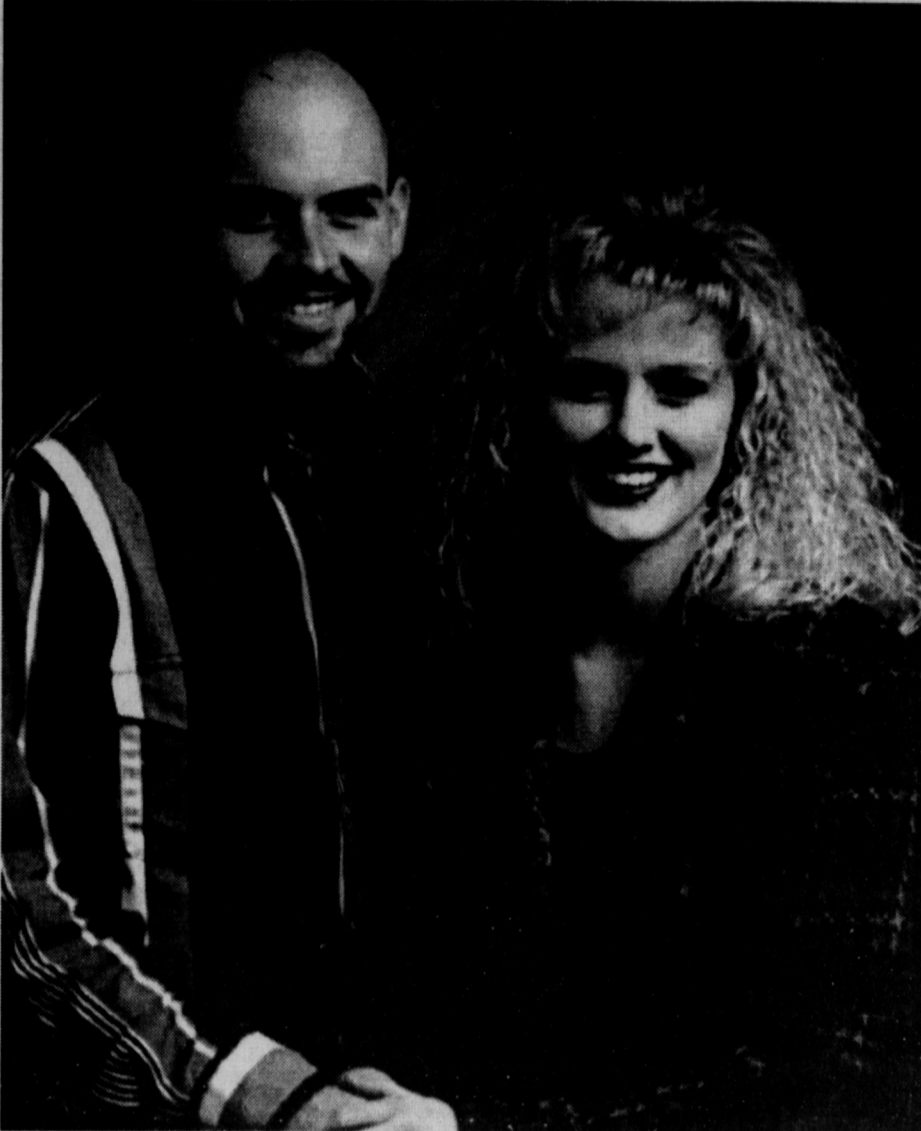

That terrible bomb blast in Oklahoma City was bad enough, but out of it has come another problem of lesser importance, but none the less one that gives me heartburn.

It has to do with typecasting. The national media has jumped onto militia organizations with a frenzy, and loving it.

That, of course, is because the people involved had, at least previously, reportedly been members of a militia at one time or another.

The media can conjure up all kinds of scenarios, given a hint like that. Just like they had the people on the lookout for foreigners and religious cult members, in the early reports of the disaster.

No, I've never been a militia member, nor have I ever visited such a facility.

But I am against typecasting of any sort.

All individuals are not the same. I've known government people I couldn't stand, sales persons I couldn't stand, preachers I couldn't stand, and newspaper people I couldn't stand.

But I realize they were individuals, and I just don't typecast.

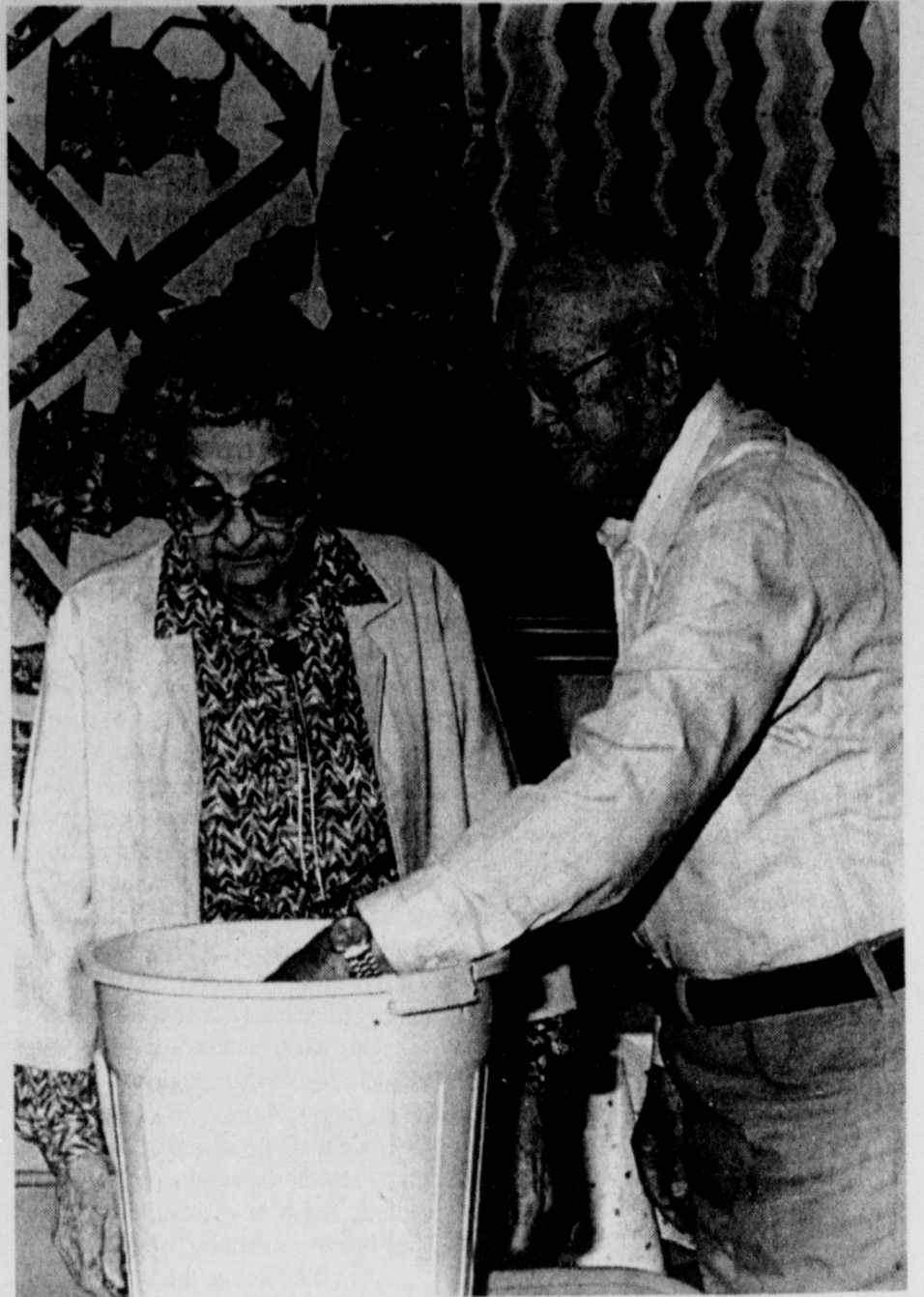

Nancy said she got most of her recipes from her mother. Her family doesn't eat a lot of desserts, but she included the ones she prepares for special occasions.

Mexican Casserole

- Flour tortillas
- 1 1/2 to 2 lbs. ground beef
- Chopped onion
- 1 can ranch style beans
- 1 can Rotel tomatoes and green chilies
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- Velveta cheese
- Chili powder
- Garlic salt or powder
- Salt and pepper

Line a 13x9" baking dish with tortillas. Brown ground meat and onion lightly. Add chili powder, garlic salt or powder, salt and pepper to taste. Drain meat and spread over tortillas. Spread ranch style beans over meat. Add a layer of Velveta cheese. Mix cream of mushroom soup with Rotel (only use 1/2 of the Rotel if you like a milder taste). Spread this mixture over the cheese. Cover tightly with foil and bake at 300 degrees for one hour.

Baked Chicken and Rice

- 1 chicken, cut into pieces
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. paprika
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 tsp. celery salt
- 1 cup uncooked rice
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 2 Tbsps. margarine
- 3 cups chicken broth

Brown rice and onion in margarine and spread in a 13x9x2" buttered baking dish or pan. Add broth and celery salt. Sprinkle chicken with salt, pepper, and paprika and place on top of the rice/broth mixture. Cover tightly with foil. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour. Remove foil and bake 15 minutes longer or until chicken is browned and tender.

Potato-Cheese Casserole

- 6 med. potatoes
- 2 cans cream of mushroom soup
- 2 cups milk
- 2 large onions, thinly sliced
- 2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
- Salt, pepper, and paprika

Cover potatoes with salted water and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and cook about 30 minutes or until tender. Peel and cut into 1/4" slices. Combine soup and milk, stirring well.

Layer half of potatoes, onion, and cheese in a greased two-quart casserole dish. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Pour half of soup mixture over cheese. Repeat layers. Sprinkle paprika over top. Bake at 300 degrees 45 minutes or until bubbly.

Hamburger and Rice

- 2 Tbsps. margarine
- 1 lb. ground meat
- 1 small chopped onion
- 1/2 cup uncooked rice
- 1 - 16 oz. can tomato juice (or, 1 - 8 oz. can tomato sauce plus 1 can water)
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1 tsp. chili powder
- 1/2 cup grated Cheddar cheese

Melt margarine in skillet. Brown meat, onions, and rice together. Add salt, pepper, chili powder, and tomato juice. Place in a one-quart greased casserole dish. Cover tightly with foil. Bake at 350 degrees 20 to 30 minutes. Remove casserole from oven, top with grated cheese, and return to oven for a few minutes, until the cheese melts.

Honey Bars

- 1 egg
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup honey
- 3/4 cup cooking oil

- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. salt

Mix first five ingredients together, then add dry ingredients and mix well. This will be a very thick mixture. Spread in a 13x9" pan which is sprayed with Pam. Bake 20 minutes in 350 degree oven.

Glaze for Honey Bars

- 1 Tbsps. margarine
 - 1 Tbsp. water
 - 1 cup powdered sugar
- Combine melted margarine, water, and powdered sugar. Drizzle over bars when cooled. Cut.

Coconut Cake

1 yellow, white, or butter cake mix
1 can Eagle Brand sweetened, condensed milk
1 can Cream of Coconut
1 med. container Cool Whip

Mix cake as directed on box. Punch large holes in cake with a fork while hot. Pour Eagle Brand milk over cake, followed by Cream of Coconut. Let cool and put covered in refrigerator overnight. The next day, cover with Cool Whip (and coconut, optional).

Bambi earns Austin trip

By only one quarter of an inch, freshman Brandi Butler will make sure Iowa Park is represented in the State Track Meet that gets underway at Memorial Stadium in Austin Friday of next week.

Butler's long jump of 17-0 was just enough to put her in second place ahead of a Slaton jumper and earn her a ticket to Austin. Butler came into the Regional meet with a personal best of 16-1.

"I didn't think I could jump 17

feet," said Butler. "I really wanted to go to state, and I was pumped up for this meet."

Butler's state qualifying jump came on her third attempt in the preliminaries. She followed it with a jump of 16-11.75 which would have put her in a second place tie with the girl from Slaton. Butler also qualified in three other events at Odessa but felt her early success in the long jump might have hurt her in her other events.

"I still tried my best, but there wasn't that feeling of if I don't win I'm not going to state," Butler added.

Other regional qualifiers included Julea Ricks who finished third in the discus with a throw of 137-3.

Iowa Park's 400 meter relay team of Bambi Pryor, Kim Overman, Lisa Halady and Wendy Bridwell finished with a time of 52.10 while the 800 meter relay team of Sharla Hughes,

Bridwell, Overman and Pryor finished with a time of 1:52.59. Deamber Koerth finished with a time of 66.25 in the 400 meter dash while Butler finished just ahead of her with a time of 63.06. Overman also ran the 100 meter dash and finished with a time of 13.10 and Butler, in her last event, finished with a time of 2:32.86 in the 800 meter run.

District 3-3A will be sending three representatives to Austin. Joining Butler are Terrance Gaines from Vernon who qualified in the 100 meter dash with a time of 10.89 and Tracy Eubanks from Bridgeport who qualified second in the high jump with a 5-4.

In the boys' division, Iowa Park had two athletes qualify for the Regional Meet.

Shawn Fulfer finished 10th in the high jump with a leap of 6-0, while Tim Estrada finished 15th in the 3200 meter run.
