Weekend storms drench area

Moisture almost everyone in the area had been asking for this spring finally arrived, but it was an awful lot in a very short period.

Storms over the weekend deposited 4.55 inches of rain on Iowa Park, as measured by Virgil Woodfin.

But they were also accompanied by very strong winds and considerable lightning, both of which caused damage throughout the city.

City street department workers were called out to install barricades on flooded streets, including Park Plaza, Smith Road, Valley and Wall, Second and Washington and Second and

Alameda.

Besides causing some damage to the city's computer, lightning was blamed for striking a tree in the 100 block of Hope, causing it to fall onto a natural gas meter, breaking it.

Firemen were called out in case of a fire at the broken meter, until Lone Star Gas maintenance workers arrived.

Electricity was knocked out in various parts of the city for a short time, until repairs could be made by TU Electric linemen.

Homeowners in several areas of the city reported tree damage, ranging from large broken limbs to complete

mature trees being laid over onto the ground.

Iowa Park, along with several area counties, was under both severe storm and tornado watches both Saturday and Sunday.

Several homeowners also reported flooding after the heavy rains, most of the water coming from overflowing streets.

Woodfin said he measured 1.60 after Saturday's storm, and 2.95 after Sunday's.

A half-mile stretch of the westbound lane of Old Iowa Park Road was about a foot deep in water for a period of time Sunday afternoon.

Council okays project, nixes drive-in proposal

After canvassing Saturday's election results, the city council turned its attention Monday night to servicing the newest housing addition and acting on a businessman's request.

Following the canvassing, Mayor Wayne House announced the winners and stated that administering of oaths of office would be held at the May 22 meeting.

Sewer service to Indian Springs Addition, which is located north of the creek and between Bell and Victoria, will possibly require an investment of some \$100,000 eventually, but initially, the council accepted the city administrator's suggestion to start out on a lesser expensive plan.

Mike Price proposed that, because the original construction will be in the

eastern portion, the sewer line could be laid first to Bell, and then southward to an existing lift station near the softball fields.

Besides serving the new homes, residents along Bell now receiving sewer service also could be accommodated, Price said.

At a later date, the existing lift station likely will have to be enlarged, he said.

The council voted to accept Price's recommendation and advertise for bids to lay the line.

Following a lengthy discussion on a request from Joe Hughes to allow him to install a drive-up window on the west side of Hughes Pharmacy, the majority of the council voted against the proposal.

Aldermen cited as their reasons statements from the city's engineer and legal counsel that any accidents caused by the arrangement could be blamed on the city, in case of litigation.

Additionally, the driveway would be on city right-of-way, it was pointed out.

Hughes had asked permission to allow patrons to be served on the driver's side, which would require south-bound traffic on Yosemite to cross the north-bound lane to be served at the window.

Alderman Virgil Woodfin offered a motion to allow the drive-up window, and after a period of silence, the mayor declared the motion had died for

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V-E Day evokes memories

More than 50 years of memories have flooded her mind in the last year, becoming even more real as the days progressed from D-Day anniversary June 6, 1994 to the 50th anniversary of V-E Day, May 8, 1995.

Special memories are always present for Marita C. Holdsworth each D-Day anniversary. She thinks of the enormity of all the events surrounding that time and since, and they still are overwhelming.

She was serving as a U.S. Army nurse with the 50th General Hospital stationed at Cowglen Hospital near Glasgow, Scotland. They were working and waiting for the impending invasion of Europe.

Then, as she reflects on the half century since V-E Day, she vividly recalls May 7, 1945. She and three other American nurses from the 50th General Hospital, now stationed in Commercy, France, were in Paris on a three-day pass.

She said when it was announced the Nazis had unconditionally surrendered, the people in Paris became jubilant.

"It is impossible to imagine the joy they felt after so long a time living under the oppressive and cruel Nazi regimen," Marita said.

"I had never been in the midst of thousands celebrating the end of oppression and tyranny," Marita continued. "It was both exhilarating and frightening."

"Our hotel was close to the Place de l'Etoile, one of the largest Paris

Voters turn out two incumbents

Two incumbents, a school trustee and city alderman, were unseated in Saturday's elections.

Virgil Woodfin, who has served in Place One on the city council since being elected in 1987, was defeated by newcomer Tracy Fears, 212-315.

And Max Henderson lost his bid for re-election to the school board by another newcomer, Jeff Wats, 241-508.

A total of 753 voters turned out for the school election and 535 for the city's. Both totals likely were cut somewhat because of heavy storms Saturday morning.

Early voting contributed to the total votes cast, as 94 were counted in the school's box and 65 in the city's.

Dennis Yeager was successful in his first bid for a full term on the school board, drawing 467 votes to 272 for Pat Pelz.

Mark Raby earned his third term on the city council by defeating challenger Terry Johnson 336-183.

Bob Hamilton, who was unopposed on the city ballot, drew 417 votes.

Yeager was first appointed to the school board, to finish out the first year of a two-year term held by Robert

Cook. Yeager ran last year, and was elected to serve the balance of that term of office, also drawing more votes that year against Pelz.

School board incumbents have had problems being re-elected to office the past few years.

Last year, Larry Dutton unseated Wendall House and Bert Williamson won over incumbent Sheri Kennedy.

Neither Randy Catlin nor Keith Fisher were challenged in their bids for re-election in 1993, but the year before, Henderson unseated Jerry Reed and Cook out-pollied Denny McCarthy.

Local man survives shooting

Melvin Lee Koerth, 42, of Iowa Park was last listed in critical but stable condition at a Wichita Falls hospital after being shot numerous times Monday night at a home in the 4200 block of Old Iowa Park Road.

Koerth sustained gunshot wounds to both sides of his upper torso, left hand, right hip and right upper arm.

The incident occurred at the home of Terry and Karen Hicks, according to David Duke of the Wichita County Sheriff's Dept. Mr. and Mrs. Hicks were separated, but continued to operate a family business adjacent to their home.

Although the tie between Mrs. Hicks and Koerth remains unclear, Mrs. Hicks told investigators that she had tried to break off any relationship she had with Koerth. She stated that Koerth would not leave her alone, and harassed and threatened her and her family.

According to Duke, Mrs. Hicks said she went to Bonham Sunday, and early Monday morning Koerth arrived at where she was staying. She said she contacted Bonham police at about 4:45 a.m., and Koerth was told by police to leave the premises and was warned of trespassing. Shortly thereafter, according to Bonham police reports, the

windows of her car were shot out. That matter is still being investigated.

At some point Monday, Mrs. Hicks called her husband and asked him to check their property, according to Duke.

According to investigator accounts, shortly before 8 p.m. Hicks arrived at the home to find the north-east door standing open. He then went to his business and got a .357 Magnum revolver loaded with hollow point bullets and returned to the home. Upon entering the bathroom, Hicks noticed movement behind a shower curtain, and fired all six rounds of the revolver into the curtain.

He then left the home and went to his pickup where he called 911 on a cellular phone. Duke said the call was logged at 7:55 p.m. Just following the 911 call, Koerth staggered outside the home and collapsed.

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Storm keeps police busy

There was very little activity for the police department during the past week, crime-wise, but the weekend storms kept officers busy.

An officer on patrol Thursday evening stopped a vehicle in the 900 block of West Highway for displaying an expired motor vehicle inspection sticker, and determined through a computer check the driver had an outstanding warrant for his arrest.

Ronald Lee Forsgren, 24, was wanted on a warrant issued by the Wichita County Sheriff's Office for capias pro fine on a charge of unauthorized use of a television cable decoding device. The charge carries a \$355 fine.

He was booked at the police station and later transported to the county jail by a sheriff's deputy.

Saturday evening, officers responded to a domestic disturbance call in the 200 block of East Garden, which resulted in the arrest of Arlan Edward Dixon, 26, on a charge of assault to prevent family violence.

Dixon was released three hours later after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

The department is investigating a burglary of a habitation complaint relating to the possible theft of a refrigerator and two window air conditioning units from a residence in the 100 block of West Garden.

A woman filed an official complaint Wednesday of last week, that her mother had assaulted her the previous day, during an argument at a residence in the 300 block of West Crystal.

Melissa Roberts said she suffered a head wound after being assaulted by Donna Fowler.

The charge is to be heard in municipal court.

squares. From its center, 12 avenues diverge. The best known is the Avenue des Champs-Elysees and in the midst stands the Arc de Triomphe, a huge monument that shelters the Unknown Soldier's grave.

"It was evening and we were on the Champs-Elysees surrounded by thousands. We were in American uniform and we were encircled by exuberant Frenchmen, who expressed their gratitude to the Americans with kisses, hugs and expressions.

"The lights were on again in Paris, illuminating the Arc de Triomphe. All of the huge allied flags in the archway rippling in the breeze was a magnificent sight. But, the most beautiful of all was our own Stars and Stripes. I felt so proud and humble that I was an American. And, with tears in my eyes I knew I would always be grateful--and that feeling has never changed in 50 years."

Still, as Marita speaks of the memorable sight, tears quickly come to her eyes, as they do when she thinks of all of those who lost their lives, and their families.

Mrs. Holdsworth, a native of Washington State, has lived in Iowa Park about two years. After the death of her husband, she came here to be near her daughter and son-in-law and her grandchildren.

Marita received her nurses training in a Catholic hospital in Everett, Wash. She was recruited by Seattle College (now University), where she graduated. One of her instructors started pushing for the reactivation of the 50th General Hospital right after Pearl Harbor. What she really liked was bedside nursing, but she was also trained as a surgical nurse.

She enlisted and was sent to Camp Carson, Colo. Before being sent overseas, she served 18 months in the States.

While stationed with the US Army 50th General Hospital in Glasgow, Marita had a blind date in late January with Al, a USAF pilot with the ATC, stationed at Preswick Air Base near Ayr. They fell in love.

With some trepidation they set their wedding date, knowing they would soon be separated for an uncertain length of time.

Al was going to be sent to the States for treatment of an injured elbow and she was scheduled to go with the 50th to France after the pending invasion.

However they received permission from US Army Headquarters to marry in Scotland. The date was set for June 6, 1944. Marita somehow knew their marriage was not a wise undertaking, but Al wanted them to be committed and she hoped too for a long and happy life together when the war was over.

The morning of June 6 they awoke to the news "Operation Overlord" was under way. Decision Day (D-Day), the invasion of the Continent had begun. American, British and Canadian troops were storming the beaches and paratroopers were being dropped at Normandy, France.

Marita said, "I was engulfed with many emotions...my wedding day...a



day to be happy...a beginning and yet aware many lives would be lost or changed forever...the families...young wives and children...and my thoughts went to the Pacific where my two brothers were...what were our families at home thinking?

"I expected our leaves to be cancelled and probably be restricted to our post to prepare for the wounded we'd be receiving in a matter of a day or two.

"But they were not cancelled and we had a brief ceremony in a chapel at the Presbyterian Church in Glasgow, then caught a tram to Aberfoyle for a few days. This was a sweet, poignant time that later became lost for 33 years."

But, that is another part of the story.

June 11, Marita and Al said goodbye. "We didn't know where, when or even if we'd ever meet again. It was a sad and confusing time," Marita remembered.

Some officers and corpsmen had been to England earlier to supervise and assist with packing equipment the 50th would need to operate a 1000 bed hospital, with the capability of expanding to 2000.

When they finally got to their destination, Marita said during the Battle of the Bulge they did have about 2500 patients. They also had special equipment (not government issue) for the lab and for surgery. Bing Crosby and Bob Hope had been generous with a money gift, and they also had instruments for their band.

"Some of our men were very talented and formed a band, providing music for the officers and enlisted men's dances as well as for formal retreats and parades," Marita related.

The 50th continued to wait in Glasgow, but they were caring for patients in Glasgow at the Cowglen hospital and were receiving D-Day casualties sent from England to be prepared for transportation by ship or plane to the States for further treatment.

While they were waiting, a sort of numbness or maybe suppressed anxiety seemed to take over, Marita said. The only music they had was when someone cranked up the old phonograph and played their only record--Eddie Cantor singing "Pop Goes the Weasel".

June 22 they were issued dun colored underwear, two waists (wool OD), three pair of socks, four winter vests, four pair of panties and one pair of overshoes.

"With summer ahead, we thought we might be going to a cold climate. Our khaki class A shirts were cotton. Our so-called vests were actually like long sleeved T-shirts and our 'panties' came to our knees, or lower, depending on the individual's height, and our overshoes were big and black," she explained.

They left Cowglen Hospital July 3, when an American Evacuation Hospital arrived to relieve them and they had to move out. Since transportation was not available to take them to the staging area in England, they literally camped across the road from Cowglen, but Marita said they were there only four or five days.

She said, "We enjoyed Scotland and the Scottish people, but the time had come 'to get on with it'."

The Allies had gained a foothold in France, won at fearful cost. Smaller medical units had moved in, "and now we were needed as the battle raged on," the retired nurse said.

"And while we left our quarters in the hospital complex at Glasgow where there were more than 40 women in each, and it wasn't exactly ideal, we had no conception of what our future accommodations would be, but we were ready," she recalled.

After spending a few damp and drizzly days in the fields near Crookston, they finally boarded a train outside Glasgow on their way to southern England, they assumed.

They arrived in Plymouth, England and were billeted in buildings. There were thousands and thousands of troops gathered. They were making their final preparations to go to France. "It was a miserable time," Marita said, "we were in crowded quarters complicated by packing and repacking of our belongings."

Their decisions were made for them when it came to what they took with them. They had to leave their one Class A uniform and all that went with it, and their brown and white striped seersucker duty uniforms packed in their footlockers.

Marita related how they put their fatigues under their bedding so they would have a fine press and also they added protection from the cold seeping up through the cot, and their clothes felt warmer when they dressed on cold mornings.

At the staging area they had to roll and strap their bedroll so it would not exceed a certain size and weight. It and their suitcase would accompany them, mostly moved by the men, but

the nurses had to be able to move them if necessary.

Their rather large musette bag held extra underwear, personal supplies, writing supplies (no addresses in case they were captured), some reading material, a deck of cards and toilet articles.

They were issued several boxes of K-Rations for emergency food, each box about the size of a pound of butter. The rest of their equipment was their tent roll, half the canvas for a pup tent, half the tent pegs and a blanket all wrapped in a piece of canvas (to sleep on), tied together with the tent ropes. They had been trained to put up the tent with a buddy.

Now, their wearing apparel for the next eight or nine months would be dun colored underwear, twill fatigues, ankle high shoes with canvas leggings, A-lined below the hip-length jacket with a drawstring at the waist, a helmet with liner, a wool knit cap, gloves and a scarf.

Their tent roll and musette bag was carried on their shoulders. They were accessorized with a belt to which their mess kit and canteen were attached, and they had to have their gas mask handy, so it was hung on them.

Marita said, "Yes, we managed to laugh, I think humor was laughing at ones self--anything to relieve the tension and keep our morale high."

They were at the staging area from July 8 to July 16. Then they were "all geared up" she said and standing on the quay waiting to board a British Liberty ship. The quay, some type of stone blocks, was damp and slippery even with their "new big black" boots.

"We were such a small part of the activity, there were many ships gathered together loaded with troops and supplies. We were loaded onto small boats and lifted to the ship. As soon as we could we went down to the large area, which was crowded and hot." Another General Hospital unit was on the same ship.

"The food was English--bland--but we were fed so we couldn't complain, and we were treated as royally as possible by the British crew. I remember it took us overnight crossing the English Channel. Fortunately the water was smooth.

"Blimp type barrage balloons were attached to some of the ships and they bounced about overhead to discourage the German planes from bombing or strafing the convoy. We were down below and couldn't see anything. Loaded down as we were, we would have sunk had the ship been struck. We did have the comfort of being issued a "Mae West" jacket," Marita said.

The nurses had been told prior to landing they would go from the nets on the side of the ship into small landing craft (LCTs), be taken close to shore

and then wade in, the reason for the boats.

But Marita said the engineers had been busy and had constructed a pier so they climbed down the nets to the pier and walked onto the beach.

"I remember it was a hot July afternoon and we trudged over the sandy, rocky Utah Beach, Normandy, France--39 days after D-Day.

"Not all the debris of war had been cleared away. Tanks, boats, and other implements of war still were visible as we paused to envision the scene. It was impossible to realize the lives so cruelly lost and crippled on that very beach not so long before.

"As we walked to higher ground, we could see the remnants of German fortifications, the war was near, we had arrived in France," she continued in reverie. That time almost 51 years ago, still so fresh on her mind in many ways.

They were told they would sleep in the open that night. It was time to put up their pup tents, eat a K-Ration and prepare to settle for the night. They also were told that after dark blackout conditions would be maintained. No smoking.

"Much to our surprise US Army trucks arrived on the scene to take us in to Cherbourg, they had found shelter for the women. We learned later the men of our unit had a long march to Carentan, where we joined them later."

"As we were driven along we could see the devastation--the war now became a cruel reality. Torn up country side, the vehicles of war scattered about, bombed out towns. Ste Mere Eglise stands out in my memory. French people were searching through the rubble, an occasional cart, loaded with belongings, being pushed or pulled along the roadway, homes demolished. Where were they going? I wondered.

"So many killed or maimed for freedom. How precious the right to be free," Marita mused.

They arrived in Cherbourg at the French Naval Hospital, known as the Louis Pasteur. During the occupation the Germans had used the facility. As the Allies advanced the Germans had beat a hasty retreat, and an American Evacuation Hospital had taken it over and was operational.

The nurses were billeted in quarters hastily vacated. She said the rooms were filthy, the toilets plugged, etc.

"The last meals must have been canned cherries as pits had been spit all over the premises. We cleaned up the best we could, spread some disinfecting powder around and settled for the night.

"The next morning there was more cleaning and the plumbing was restored so we could clean our bodies. We were more or less restricted to our quarters, but we did look around outside the hospital and that's when we saw the condition of the grounds and learned bodies had been left behind in the morgue," Marita said.

She related that they decided they deserved a party and made some interesting snacks by combining some of their K-Rations. "Well, we found out that was a very big 'No-No' and we got chewed out by our chief nurse for that little bit of ingenuity. Our mistake--we should have invited her to our party."

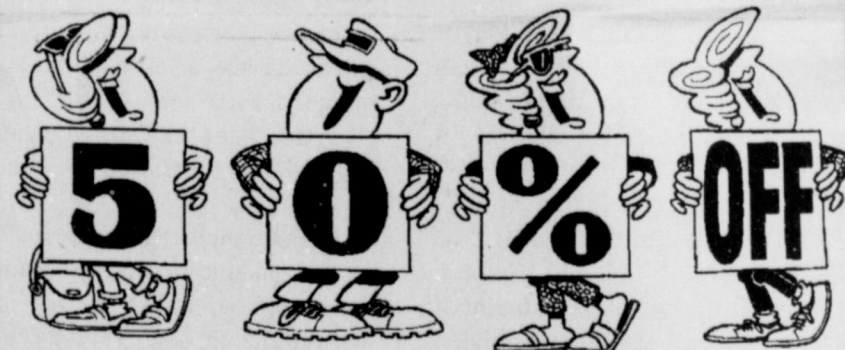
Marita was one of 20 nurses who were asked to help out the American Evac Hospital. "I thought it would be good to be busy and an added would be meals in their mess, maybe a move up from K-Rations to C at the very least."

Their plans and preparations were again abruptly interrupted when about

11 p.m. they were told to pack up and be ready to leave in about 30 minutes.

They arrived at their next destination well after midnight and were pleasantly surprised to recognize the rest of their personnel. The 50th General Hospital was reunited in a French cow pasture near Carentan.

Tents had been set up for them and they were warned they were in a dangerous area. They had been strafed that day and one of the ambulances was hit. They were under blackout conditions and were told keep quiet because of snipers.

The fighting in Normandy went slowly from field to field. The weather was cloudy and there was no air support. Gen. Omar Bradley's armored troops won St. Lo from the German Panzers July 18. "We arrived at our assigned station, Carentan, July 20, 1944," said Marita.

When their hospital supplies arrived, the 50th General Hospital was set up in the fields.

"July 25, we watched as thousands of our bombers and fighter planes flew over. The field was covered with metalized paper strips dropped from the planes to disrupt detection by the enemy. The planes attacked enemy positions. It was close and we could see some of the bombs drop and hear the detonations," Marita remembered.

Marita was on one of the two teams to be assigned to the 13th Field Hospital, working in a shock tent in a field unit. Each team had a doctor, a nurse and a corpsman.

"It seems hard to remember we had not seen or heard much about penicillin until the spring of 1944--the first of the true antibiotics. It was so precious a ward officer (MD) had to give it only for special illnesses. Sulfa was used, but the new antibiotic prevented many infections and saved many lives," Marita said.

She said "As important as the medical people were to the men's well being under so much stress, I want to say how important the Chaplain was to the spiritual and emotional needs of the wounded.

"He went quietly from patient to patient offering prayers and comfort, writing names in his little notebook and later he wrote notes to their families.

"I'll never forget the mortally wounded soldier, head swathed in bandages, lying quietly on a cot, away from the others, slowly dying--nothing we could do. We needed the presence of the Chaplain too."

The 50th General Hospital opened officially Aug. 5, 1944. Aug. 13 Marita's group returned from detached service. The 50th was operational and caring for patients, although "it was somewhat primitive--actually very primitive," Marita said.

The food was dished up outside and according to Marita, the yellow jackets were plentiful and fierce. "But, we plunged the spoon through them to get into the food containers--the patients had to be fed. One of our dietitians was stung on the tongue when a yellow jacket followed a morsel of food into her mouth."

"Regardless of the deprivations our morale was high. We were beginning to do what we were in this Army to do, care for our wounded and sick soldiers. Don't forget we women had volunteered," Marita said.

She says her main interests are her daughter, son-in-law and grandchildren, and her faithful Dobberman companion, Schatzi.

But she likes to garden and knit, and she stays busy with her word processor, working on her memoirs, genealogy, little stories and poems, and she loves to read. She attends First Presbyterian Church and is a member of the Iowa Park Genealogy & Historical Society.

She is a charter member of the American Womens Memorial Foundation.

Another special interest of Marita's is seeing a fitting memorial started and completed for American Service Women.

Throughout the history of America, women have always served in the armed forces voluntarily, never drafted.

Groundbreaking is planned June 22 this year at the gate of Arlington Cemetery for a fitting memorial to honor all American women who have served their country from Revolutionary days onward. Almost 80 percent of the money needed has been raised.

Congress has approved the site and plans, but there will be no appropriation of funds for the memorial.

It will be of graceful design, using diverse elements of glass tablets on the upper terrace, etched with inscriptions by and about women who have served. As the sun passes over Arlington, these historic words will be reflected on the walls of the Education Center inside the Memorial.

The Education Center will bring to life military women's contributions to the nation, where the 14 alcoves that comprise the gallery will serve as individual exhibit areas representing the various periods of women's service.

Heart of the Memorial will be the Computer Register--a place to honor service women in America's history--with the names, photographs, and individual stories of each woman's service on permanent display.

Marita urges all women who were and are in the armed services and all Americans, who had an ancestor, friend or relative in the service to contribute in your or their names.

But now--as Paul Harvey would say--here is the rest of the story--that was mentioned earlier in this story as "another part of the story".

It adds an aura of romance to the 33 years that became lost.

Marita and Al were married on D-Day, June 6, 1944. Three years later their divorce became final June 6. They both remarried. His wife died and her husband had died. Al was living in San Antonio and she was in Washington State.

Al contacted a person who happened to know Marita's brother, so Al called him. Her brother would not give Al her phone number, but told him he would give his number to her if she wanted to contact him.

After a day or so Marita decided to call him and they made arrangements to meet in Las Vegas and renew their acquaintance. The outcome of that meeting was their second marriage on June 6, 33 years after their divorce.

They made a trip back to Scotland and the place where they spent their first honeymoon.

Twelve years later Al died suddenly on June 6, D-Day--Decision Day--June 6, will always hold special memories for the retired First Lieutenant Marita Holdsworth who is "proud to be an American".

Donations urgently needed

Dear Friends,
I do not even know how to begin to tell you what I want to tell you, as these situations are always supposed to be happening "to somebody else," or "in someone else's family." However, I am now facing the fact that this situation is for real and it is happening in MY family!

My young brother, Terry Henry, is in a very critical position right now. I am enclosing a copy of a letter he

wrote about a month ago explaining his plight (and also a copy of a short note my parents wrote with Terry's letter). Since the time he wrote that letter his need for the bone marrow transplant has become even more urgent.

He was told this week that he needs to have the procedure now before he begins to regress.

I was tested to see if I could be a marrow donor for him, but I did not match (and neither did our only other sibling -- an older brother). But then our parents were each tested and miraculously our father is a "match" and can be his donor!

Therefore, our most serious barrier at this point is MONEY!! Just this week, when it became evident that Terry cannot wait long enough to possibly raise the whole \$250,000, a state representative in Austin was contacted and intervened on Terry's behalf -- inquiring of M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston to see if they could possibly accept Terry there even though he does not have insurance and has only a little over \$30,000 raised at this time.

Well, we got a little encouragement when Terry was then contacted by M.D. Anderson and told they would accept HALF payment upon admittance for the procedure. That means he needs "only" \$125,000 now (and will owe the other half at a later date).

That brings me to the point of asking personally for your help. Every single dollar will help my brother in his quest for survival.

Please don't feel that your donation -- no matter how large or small --

would not make any difference, because we are finding out that donations coming in from MANY people really do add up.

Help us financially if you can by sending your donation to the TERRY HENRY CANCER FUND at the address on Terry's letter.

If you do not feel that you can send a donation at this time, please add Terry and our family to your prayer list -- and perhaps mention his name in your church for prayer.

Richard and I appreciate all of our friends so much, and I would never ask for help from any of you if I thought that it would offend anyone. Thanks so much for understanding.

lack of a second.

Then, Alderman Bud Mercer moved to not allow the request. It was seconded by Bob Hamilton, and the motion passed 4-1, with Woodfin voting against it.

The council were unanimous in approving a proposal that the city participate in the 1995 Federal Urban Aid Street Program.

Aldermen had accepted a plan to rebuild Victoria, adding curbing, from Cash to East Aldine, and resurfacing the rest of the street from that point to the Access Road.

As explained by Ralph Self, Iowa Park resident who is an engineer with the Texas Highway Dept., the city's cost would be approximately one quarter of the project.

Other projects under the program include South Wall and all of Washington.

Self suggested that the city initiate the program, if they decided to participate, early enough to allow the work to be completed by early fall, and aldermen agreed.

Mercer, who resides on Victoria, abstained from voting on the issue.

Another street project the administrator proposed also was approved. That was to put curb and gutter on the south side of the 700 block of West Magnolia, and add a crown to the middle of the pavement.

Price explained that the plan was needed to eliminate flooding residents experience on the south side of the street.

In reaching a decision on this project, another alderman abstained from voting. Mark Raby lives in that block.

The city had received approximately 500 responses to its survey concerning a proposed walking track around Lake Gordon.

Price said additional forms were being received, and final tabulation of the results were not ready for presentation.

Following a 25-minute executive session which was closed to the public, the council voted to authorize the city attorney to settle a claim brought against the city by the federal EEOC department.

No additional information or explanation was made available.

Duke noted that just before Hicks' 911 call was received, a 911 call was made from inside the residence, presumably from Koerth.

Iowa Park EMT's were called to the scene to assist until an ambulance could arrive, as well as Iowa Park Police officers for crowd control. The request for crowd control was cancelled, however, when more county help arrived.

Duke said the Sheriff's Department is not anticipating filing any charges against Hicks, citing "intruder-type in the home - self defense." He said the case has been referred to the District Attorney's office to be heard by the grand jury.

Duke also said he cannot speculate on whether or not charges will be filed against Koerth, as that matter has also been referred to the DA's office.

Among her recipes, Cindy has included "Pancakes", one of Joseph's favorites, and "Toll House Pie" is one that her daughter likes.

Enchilada Casserole

1 lb. ground beef
1/2 cup chopped onion
1 clove garlic
1 - 8 oz. can tomato sauce
1/2 cup water
1 1/2 to 2 1/2 tsp. chili powder
1/2 tsp. salt
4 round corn tortillas
2 cups grated Cheddar cheese
Brown meat, onions, garlic. Add tomato sauce, water, and seasonings. Alternate tortillas, meat sauce and cheese, ending with cheese. Cook in microwave until hot.

Pancakes

1 1/4 cup flour
1 Tbsp. baking powder
1 Tbsp. sugar
1/2 tsp. salt
1 beaten egg
1 cup milk
2 Tbsps. melted bacon fat
Combine dry ingredients, then add the others. Cook in hot skillet until bubbles on surface pop, then flip. Cook until brown.

COOK OF THE WEEK

Toll House Pie

2 eggs
1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 cup melted butter, cooled
1 - 6 oz. pkg. chocolate chips
1 cup walnuts or pecans
Beat eggs until foamy, add flour, sugar, and brown sugar. Blend in butter. Add chips and nuts. Pour into unbaked pie shell and bake 1 hour at 325 degrees.

Chocolate Angel Food Cake

1 1/4 cup sugar, divided
1 cup sifted cake flour
1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa
12 egg whites
1 1/2 tsp. cream of tartar
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla extract
1 tsp. powdered sugar

Sift 1/4 cup sugar, flour and cocoa together in a small bowl. Set aside. Beat egg whites on high speed until foamy. Add cream of tartar and next 3 ingredients; beat until soft peaks form, gradually add remaining sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, beating until soft peaks form. Sift flour mixture over egg white, 1/4 cup at a time, folding in carefully after each addition. Spoon batter into 10-inch tube pan. Spread evenly. Break air pockets by cutting through batter with knife. Bake at 375 degrees 30 minutes or until cake springs back. Remove cake from oven; invert pan and cool completely. Loosen cake from sides of pan using knife. Sift powdered sugar over top of cake.

Crispy Oven-Fried Chicken

1/4 cup plus 2 Tbsps. frozen egg substitute, thawed
1 Tbsp. water
1 cup crispy rice cereal, crushed
1/3 cup wheat germ
1 Tbsp. minced onion (instant)
1/2 tsp. herb seasoning blend
1/4 tsp. garlic powder
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
1 chicken, cut up
1/4 cup flour
Vegetable spray

Combine egg substitute and water in shallow dish; stir well. Combine cereal and next 6 ingredients in shallow dish; stir well. Place chicken pieces and flour in a bag; shake until coated.

Dip chicken in egg substitute mixture and roll in cereal mixture. Place chicken on rack of a broiler pan coated with cooking spray. Bake at 350 degrees 1 hour or until chicken is brown.

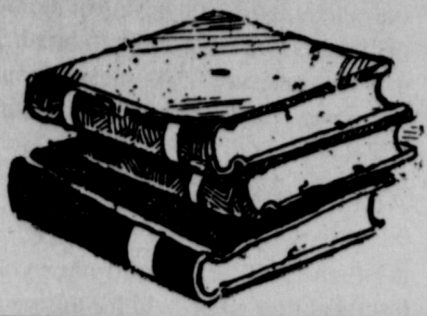



Students will be able to shop during regular school hours today and Friday, and the fair will be open from 5 - 7 tonight for parents or grandparents to shop.

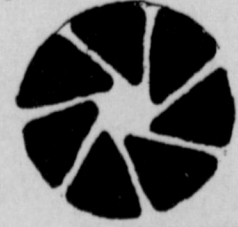

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Disappointing loss confuses who gets crown

The Iowa Park Hawks had a chance to settle the District 3-3A baseball championship on the field Tuesday when they traveled to Graham, but a disappointing 3-2 loss has things up in the air as three teams could be tied for first after Friday's games.

The Hawks, 12-10 overall and 7-2 in district play, are tied with Graham at 7-2 while Vernon, who still has a pair of games to make up against Jacksboro, remains in the picture at 5-2. All three teams still have one game remaining on their regular schedule and must win to remain alive in the playoff hunt.

Graham's win was a must as the Steers would have been eliminated had they lost to Iowa Park. The Hawks, who beat Graham 3-0 earlier in the year, could have wrapped up a playoff spot with a win over the Steers.

The Steers got on the board first with a run in the bottom of the second when a leadoff walk came around to score. The runner advanced to second on a balk then to third on a wild pitch and came in on a sacrifice bunt. Graham made it 3-0 in the bottom half of the fifth when they strung together a pair of singles and then took advantage of three errors in the field by Iowa Park.

The Hawks cut the lead to 3-2 in the top of the sixth when Clancy Lalumia led off with a double and was followed by Chris Norris who also doubled to drive in Lalumia. Clint Scobee then walked and Corky Petty delivered an RBI single to score Norris. Rudy Hawkins reached on a fielder's choice for the second out and Casey Moser ended the inning with a groundout to second. The Hawks couldn't pull off the comeback in the top of the seventh as they went down in order to end the game.

"We were real nervous throughout the whole game," said head coach David Fuhrman said. "We're a little disappointed we didn't take care of business on the field like we wanted too, but we have to get it back on track for Bowie on Friday. We have to win that game to stay tied for first."

Wednesday of last week, the Hawks may have played their best game of the year to beat Vernon 8-0 to avenge an earlier 3-1 loss to the Lions.

The Hawks took a 3-0 lead in the second when Hawkins walked, David Waterbury doubled before Lalumia doubled to drive in both runners. Dusty Owen followed with an RBI double to drive in the third run.

Iowa Park made it 7-0 in the fourth when Lalumia and Cory Thompson led off with singles. Owen delivered an RBI single then Scobee followed with a three-run homer to clear the bases. The Hawks added a single run in the seventh to make the final 8-0 when Hawkins, who had walked, came around to score on a passed ball.

In Friday's game against Bridgeport, for the second time this year, Jason Young and Norris combined for a no-hitter as Iowa Park shutout the Bulls 4-0.

The Hawks took a 2-0 lead in the bottom of the second after Hawkins led off with a double, and moved to second when Moser reached base on an error by the first baseman. Waterbury followed with a double that drove in both runners. Iowa Park added single runs in both the third and fourth before the game had to be called after five innings due to rain. Young went four innings and struck out eight while walking three. Norris pitched the final inning picking up one strikeout and a pair of groundouts.

Iowa Park will play host to Bowie Friday at 4:30 p.m. in the final regular

season game needing a win to remain in a tie with Graham who has Jacksboro (0-7 in district) left on their schedule. Vernon, the other team who could finish at 8-2, has to play Bridgeport on Friday and still has a pair of make-up games against Jacksboro to play possibly today.

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GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

When carefully selected and properly placed, annual bedding plants give you more impact, more bang for your landscaping buck than any other type of plant.

Coleus, a warm season bedding plant long prized for its bright, colorful foliage, has been recommended for years for use in partial shade. Historically, however, its performance in full sun has been marginal at best.

That picture is now changed because, with the encouragement of Neil Sperry and leading nurserymen, Texas A&M Extension horticulturists and research scientists have completed, what is to our knowledge, the largest field trail of sun-tolerant coleus ever undertaken in this region of the United States.

This massive testing effort evaluated over 70 different cultivars and spanned three years, including two years of in-depth testing in Wichita Falls and in other Texas cities.

I'm happy to report that, based on data from these studies, we have identified two truly sun-tolerant cultivars -- the new SuperSun coleus collection. The highest rated cultivars are "Plum Parfait" (pronounced par-fay) and "Burgundy Sun."

Plum Parfait has a beautifully ruffled, lance-shaped leaf which is purplish-plum color early in the growing season, this dark color being a survival advantage which helps the young plant to tolerate hot, full sun conditions.

In full sun, both cultivars are vigorous growers which can quickly attain mature heights of three feet. They grow at a more leisurely pace in dappled

shade where they attain heights of only 18 inches.

The A&M trials proved that these SuperSun coleus possess many outstanding attributes.

- * Very low maintenance for an annual bedding plant.

- * Extremely easy to grow (almost foolproof when planted in a well-drained soil and not overwatered).

- * Possess excellent adaptability to various climates (great for the entire Texoma region).

- * Have foliage that is resistant to bleaching and scorching in full sun which enables them to tolerate a wide range of light intensities. In fact, they give excellent performance from day-long dappled shade at one end of the spectrum to melt-the-fillings-in-your-teeth full sun at the other extreme.

- * Naturally assume a pleasing, compact growth habit (without constant shearing).

- * Reduce maintenance requirements because they are not plagued by early or excessive flowering (coleus is grown for its foliage, not its blossoms, and flowering is considered a detriment by most consumers).

- * Will grow in almost any soil, even highly alkaline, heavy clays, as long as they are well-drained.

- * Provide landscape color over a long period of time (nonstop from mid spring, throughout the summer, and well into the fall).

- * have no serious insect or disease problems when grown outdoors in properly prepared beds or containers.

With their outstanding resistance to pest problems, these SuperSun cultivars are also the first coleus to receive the very prestigious "Earth-Kind" designation from the Extension Service.
