School's end a problem for police

For some reason, the end of school always brings about problems involving juveniles and vandalism, police say.

And this past week was no exception.

Wednesday evening of last week, the owner of a vehicle reported to police someone had used a sharp object to scratch the paint from front to back, while it was parked in the 500 block of West Highway.

Friday morning, school officials found where someone during the previous evening had put a rag on a door to the building and set it afire. No damage was inflicted, however.

Later Friday evening, an officer on patrol discovered six young men, all students at Iowa Park High School, swimming in the pool there.

All were taken to the police station and booked, but no charges were filed, according to the police blotter.

Two young juveniles were stopped while walking in the 100 block of South Bell at 2:10 a.m. Saturday, in violation of the city's curfew law. They were taken to the police station and parents notified to pick them up.

Sunday afternoon, a window was found to be broken out at Bradford Elementary, and a rock laying beside the building.

Jeremy Keith Kingcade, 20, was picked up in the 300 block of West Highway at 10:32 p.m. Friday on an outstanding warrant issued locally.

Kingcade paid \$110 toward a fine of \$315 for failing to obtain liability insurance, and was released.

An officer on patrol found a man asleep at 1:47 a.m. Sunday in the 1400 block of Johnson Road, and received permission to search the vehicle.

Roland F. Parrin, 32, was then arrested for possession of marijuana, less than two ounces. He was transported to the county jail at 4:38, according to the blotter.

Police are investigating a reported assault that evolved in a domestic dispute Monday afternoon at a residence in the 600 block of West Texas.

Friday designated 'Woodfin Day'

In Monday night's meeting of the city council, an out-going alderman was given due recognition for his eight years service to the community.

Tomorrow was declared by resolution as "Virgil I. Woodfin Day."

Mayor Wayne House, while presenting Woodfin with a framed copy of the proclamation and special plaque, pointed out that Woodfin had attended approximately 300 meetings involving the city since his election in April 1987.

Woodfin is succeeded by newly-elected alderman Tracy Fears, who, along with incumbents Mark Raby and Bob Hamilton, were administered the oaths of office by city secretary Janice Newman.

In other business, the council approved proposals to close two blocks of West Bank to traffic Saturday, holding an auction to sell surplus items, and begin holding a series of called meetings to work on next year's budget.

Also approved was an ordinance annexing three lots in the McCluskey Addition, placement of a stop sign at the intersection of Callie Lane and FM 368, and the mayor's appointments of electrical board members.

Aldermen took no action on a request for a tap on the raw water line that crosses Quail Valley Estates, and tabled discussion of permitting the Will Burnett Ball Field to be used for girls' softball play.

Bank Street will be closed from

Pacific to West Highway between noon and midnight Saturday, because of an outdoor concert at Wal-Mart which is expected to attract between 3,500 and 6,000 persons.

Police Chief Ray Smock told the council he had requested the assistance of personnel from several county and state agencies to assist in traffic and crowd control Saturday.

A list of city-owned vehicles and equipment declared as surplus will be sold at auction on Saturday, June 10.

The council decided to accept the low bids on all items the day of the sale, except for two cars, a truck and a tractor. Bids on those items will be considered at the June 12 meeting, and either accepted or rejected.

The first of an estimated four budget workshops will be held at 7 p.m. Monday, June 5, at the Tom Burnett Memorial Library. All such meetings are open to the general public.

Three lots fronting on Texowa were formally annexed into the city, following the third required public hearing on the proposal.

The first street built in the new Highland Park Addition, north of US 287, will have a stop sign for traffic entering onto FM 368, as result of the ordinance adopted at the meeting.

Three members of the electrical board were re-appointed to serve, including Kenneth McCreary, Kenneth Via and Mike Reed, and Dale Cox was named to succeed Stewart Moss, who

has moved.

Jimmy Duggins, president of the Iowa Park Little League Baseball Association, discussed with the council his concerns that the newly-acquired land south of the existing fields would be large enough for a senior league field and also allow for additional parking.

The mayor said all measurements indicate the tract is of adequate size, and apologized that city crews had not been able to accomplish much thus far to prepare it, because of heavy workloads.

Because the Burnett Field is being considered for the new Iowa Park High School girls' softball program, House said negotiations would be held with Athletic Director Weldon Nelms on those details.

Duggins also asked for the city's assistance in further development at the boys' senior league field, where improvements such as restrooms and a snack bar were needed.

He was assured of the city's desire to assist however it could.

A request by Mrs. Larry Crumbliss to permit a tap on the raw water transmission line that crosses her property on Quail Valley was not acted on, because no motion was made for action.

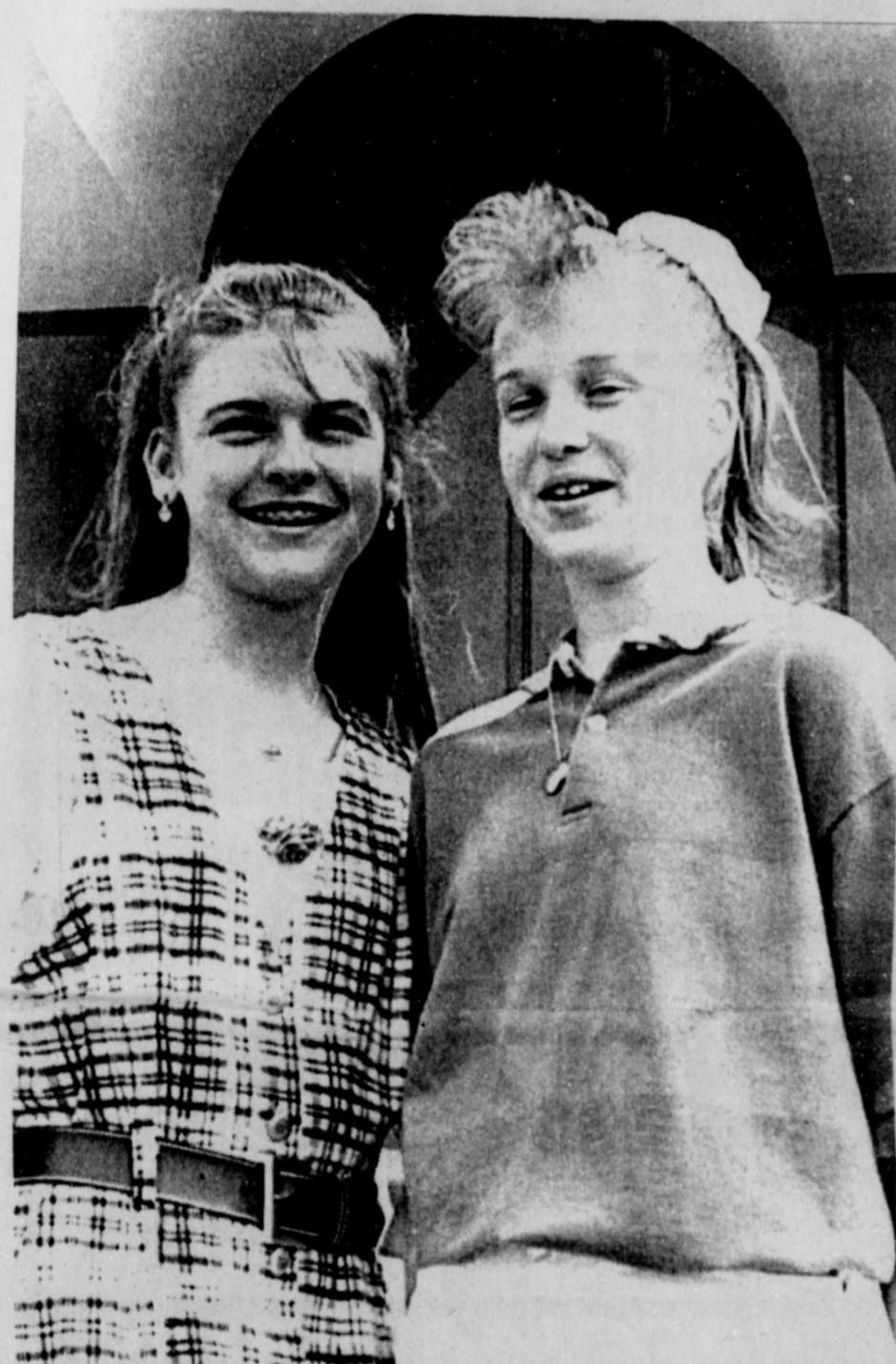
Administrator Mike Price discussed with the council a proposal that a sludge disposal unit be purchased for the water treatment plant. No action was taken.

Tuesday storm deposits 1.3 rainfall

Man charged with cattle theft

Iowa Parkan Danny Lynn Martin, 23, is out of Wichita County Jail on \$3,500 bond after being arrested last Thursday and charged with theft of livestock. Theft over \$1,500 charges are also pending.

Wichita County Sheriff's deputies allege that Martin stole some 37 head of cattle in the last month or so. Over half have been recovered, according to David Duke with the sheriff's department.

Martin told deputies he operates a business, Martin Livestock Transport, in which he transports cattle for ranchers.

The first theft of cattle reported was on May 17 when Bruce Sheperd of Burkburnett informed the Sheriff's Dept. that 11 head of cattle, valued at about \$5,000, were missing from his lease property northeast of Iowa Park. He believed they had been taken May 15 or 16.

On May 18, John Mann of Punkin Center reported a stock trailer stolen around the same time. The trailer was valued at \$2,000.

That evening around 9 p.m., Lt. Stan Horton and Sgt. Kenny York were

patrolling the area of FM 367, and spotted a 1977 Chevrolet flatbed pickup pulling a stock trailer with no tags. The two deputies stopped that vehicle and checked the tags on another suspect vehicle following the pickup. However, that vehicle was not stopped.

According to deputies, the trailer, which belonged to Martin, was carrying eight head of cattle that belonged to John Porter, who operates a ranch southwest of here. Porter had not yet reported those stolen.

During an interview with deputies following the traffic stop, Martin allegedly told deputies the cattle were taken from a location on Continental Road, southwest of Iowa Park.

He then took deputies to another location southwest of Iowa Park, where several head of stolen cattle were being kept including some of Sheperd's, and some belonging to Marvin Klinkerman, who had not yet reported any stolen. In all, according to Duke, 18 head of cattle were recovered that night.

The trailer belonging to Mann was also recovered at that location.

Thousands expected for Wal-Mart concert

At 7 p.m. Saturday, veteran country group Shenandoah, backed by solo artist Woody Lee, will play for what is expected to be a few thousand people in Iowa Park Wal-Mart's parking lot.

The free outdoor concert is part of Wal-Mart's Country Music Across America Tour '95, which is bringing several country artists to smaller Wal-Mart stores in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Tennessee.

The concert, according to Marty Raybon, lead vocal for Shenandoah,

Iowa Park Wal-Mart manager Janice Jordan said some four-to-five thousand people are expected to show for the concert, which will be played outside on the west parking lot.

Jordan and other associates will go to Altus tonight, where Shenandoah and Lee are performing, to get an idea of what to expect here.

An autograph session will follow the show inside the store, and last "until the last person leaves," according to Jordan.

Should it rain, the concert will be moved indoors for an "unplugged" version.

Parking will be available at Wal-Mart, in the field directly north of Wal-Mart, and in the parking lot adjacent to Wal-Mart to the west. It has been recommended that attendees take lawn chairs.

Jordan stressed that no alcoholic beverages will be allowed on Wal-Mart property.

Wal-Mart's head office selected concert sites with the criteria that each

Saturday will be "Splash Day" in Iowa Park.

The Sesquicentennial Swimming Pool, located on the west side of Iowa Park High School, will open at 12-noon and close at 6 p.m.

A special season-opening rate has been set for both Saturday and Sunday, at \$1 per person. The pool will open at 1 p.m. Sunday, according to Linda Gray, manager.

During the season, general admission will be \$2 per person, with children two years old and under free with a paying adult. And a 10-ticket

sheet can be purchased for \$12.

Season memberships include: \$75 for families (immediate members); \$25 for individuals, and \$15 (per individual child) for daycare businesses.

The facility is available for parties, at a two-hour rate of \$50, plus \$7.50 per hour for lifeguards.

Each Wednesday and Sunday has been adopted as \$1 day, to be observed throughout the season.

For those who like to mix their activities while taking advantage of the city's pool, the school's gymnasium is open for use during pool hours.

3/4 cup catsup
1 1/2 tsp. mustard
3 Tbsps. syrup
1 large onion, chopped

When mixed, pour into large, greased casserole and top with bacon slices. Bake 2 hours in 325 degree oven.

Spenny's Cornbread

- 1 cup flour
1 cup cornmeal
1/4 cup sugar
4 tsps. baking powder
3/4 tsp. salt
2 eggs
1 cup milk
1 stick butter, melted
Mix together and bake 20-25 minutes at 425 degrees.

Sour Cream Chocolate Cake

- 1 box yellow cake mix
3/4 cup water
3 eggs
1 small ctn. sour cream
3/4 cup oil
1 small box instant chocolate pudding
6 oz. pkg. chocolate chips (stir in last)
Grease and flour bundt pan. Sprinkle about 1/2 cup pecans (chopped fine) in bottom of pan. Bake 55 minutes at 325 degrees.

Mexican Stew

- 1 lb. ground meat
1 can corn
1 can Ranch Style beans
1 can chopped green chilies
1 med. onion

- 1 can hominy
1 can tomatoes
1 cup picante sauce
Brown meat and onions. Drain corn and hominy. Mix in other ingredients. Add salt, pepper, and garlic powder to taste. Simmer until thick.

Methodist Youth Banana Pudding

- 6-8 bananas
1 box vanilla wafers
Combine:
2 cans Eagle Brand milk
3 cups cold water
Add:
2 small pkgs. vanilla instant pudding mix
Beat until well blended. Chill in refrigerator for 5-10 minutes.
Stir in:
1 - 12 oz. ctn. Cool Whip
Layer pudding, bananas, and vanilla wafers, ending with pudding mixture. Just before serving, garnish with crushed wafers shaken on top.

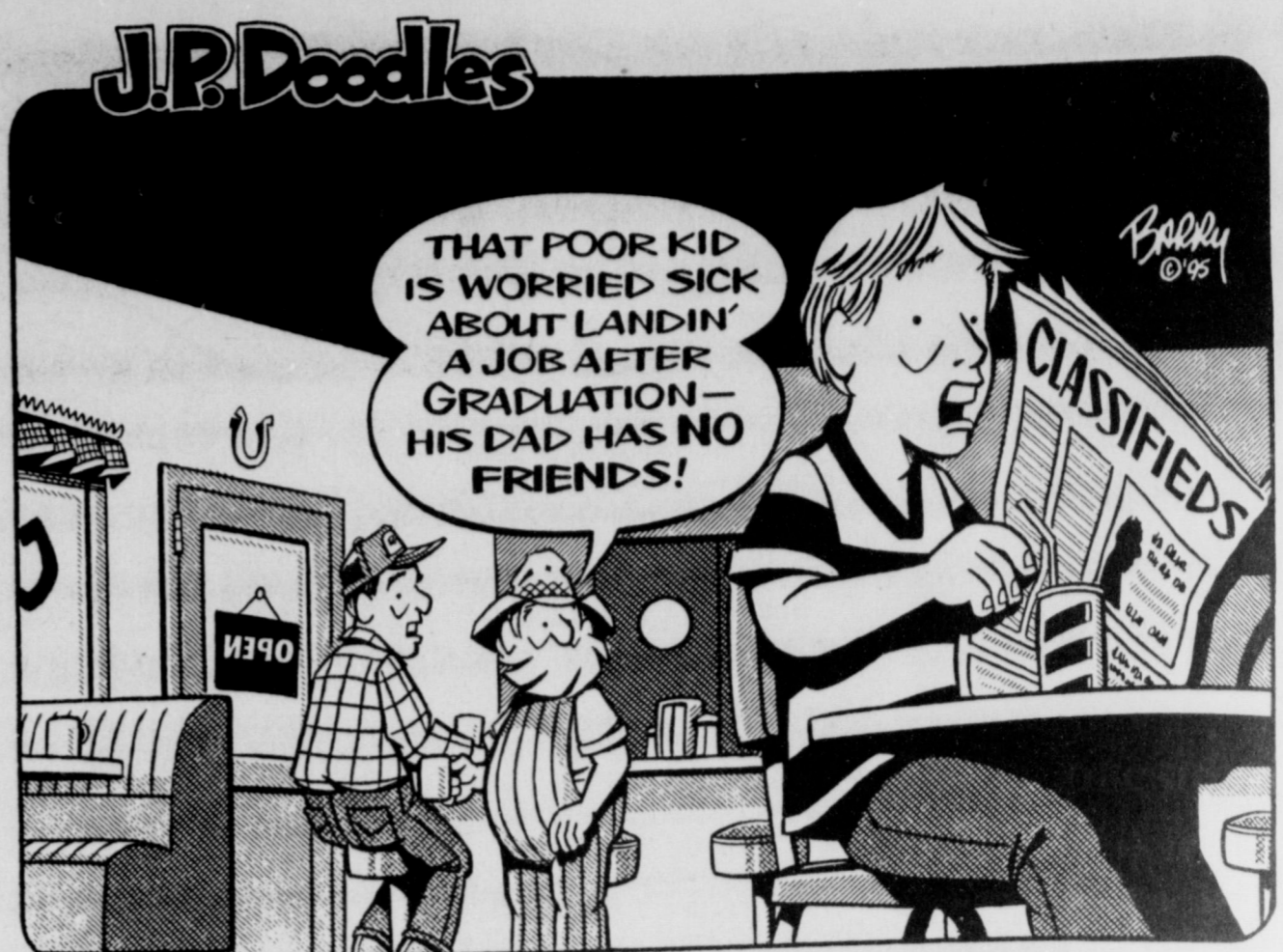

NEWS OF THE IOWA PARK GENEALOGICAL & HISTORICAL SOCIETY



Whenever there is a job or project to work on we need tools. This is also important in compiling genealogy and family histories.

Charlene Parks presented a program at one of the first meetings of the Iowa Park Genealogical and Historical Society last fall.

She showed us the results of the search, gathering and putting together a record of her family, one that can be added to through the years, genealogy and history goes on and on. We too will be ancestors some day.

Charlene not only shared the wonderful results of her efforts but she gave us some valuable tools to get us started and to continue our genealogy projects.

Included in the 10-page handout was **Beginners Suggestions for Family Research.** Every family has "bits and pieces" that have been gathered and saved through the years.

The **Beginners Suggestions** is most

helpful and tells the tools you need to get started. First, a two or three ring notebook binder in which to write down the information you will obtain in your family research.

You will need more notebooks, file boxes, etc., as you progress. Printed forms to record the data are available from various Genealogical Firms, those printed in "help" books, and also you may copy from libraries. There will be forms available at the Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

Now that you are well organized! The best place to start to gather information is with yourself and your family, your parents and grandparents, if living.

Write all the information down in a notebook or on printed forms. It's a good idea to use pencil at first. Document where you obtained this information.

Write or visit older relatives or any others who may have known family members. It is helpful to always enclose a stamped self-addressed envelope.

Try to identify all the old family photos, photocopy family Bible records, old letters, diaries, military records, old wills, newspaper clippings (births, deaths, marriages, etc.). Note all dates if possible as these will sometimes help to verify other data.

Need help? Society members are available to assist and workshops will be held in response to interest. Join us!

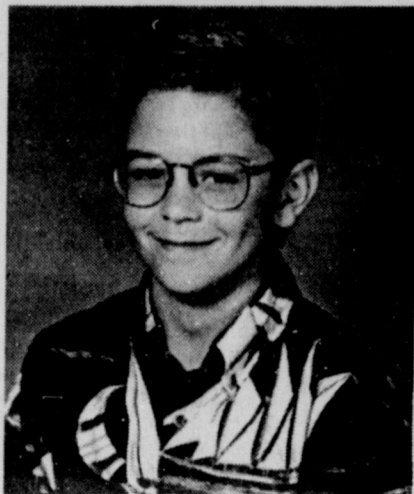

Cold bats end Hawks' season

After winning the District 3-3A title over Graham last week, Iowa Park decided to play the best two-out-of-three games against District 4-3A runner-up Aledo.

And after the first of the three games, a 4-0 Hawk win Thursday at Hoskins field, things looked good on paper for the Hawks, who had two pitchers with 4-1 records waiting in the wings for Saturday's games.

But things didn't turn out exactly as planned.

Did you ever get ready to go out of town and just as you got about half way there you couldn't remember if you might have forgotten something?

Well, the Hawks looked like they forgot their bats as Aledo swept the final two games of the series to advance to play Stanford-Fritch in the Regional Tournament by bouncing the Hawks from the playoffs.

After allowing seven hits and four runs in the first game, the Aledo pitching staff held the Hawks to only

five hits and three runs in the next two games, winning 5-1 in the first and 3-2 in the finale.

In Friday's game at Hoskins Field, Iowa Park jumped out to a 2-0 lead in the bottom of the first when leadoff hitter Dusty Owen led off with a single to center field. Rudy Hawkins was hit by a pitch to put runners at first and second. Owen was thrown out trying to steal third on a missed hit and run, but Clint Scobee followed with a walk to again put runners at first and second. Robert Klinkerman then delivered an RBI single to left-center to score Hawkins and Todd Yeager, who was running for Scobee, came in to score on the same play when the left fielder made a bad throw to the plate to give Iowa Park a 2-0 lead.

Meanwhile Chris Norris was more than the Bearcats could handle, as the junior starter went the distance to pick up his sixth win of the season, allowing only four hits and walking only three while striking out 10.

With the score remaining 2-0 into the fifth, the Hawk defense showed its stuff. With one out and a runner on first, the ninth place hitter tried to bunt, but Norris caught the ball in the air and easily doubled off the runner at first.

The Hawks added a pair of runs in their half of the fifth when Owen and Norris scored to make the final score 4-0.

In Saturday's first game at Arlington Heights Field it was the Hawks who again jumped out to a first-inning lead. Owen walked and came around to score on Klinkerman's RBI double to the fence in right field to give Iowa Park a 1-0 lead.

That would be the last run the Hawks would score for the next 10 innings as the bats went cold.

The Bearcats tied the game at 1-1 in the bottom of the third without a hit when Jeremy Scott walked, was sacrificed to second and went to third on an error came in to score on John Bowman's sacrifice fly to deep left to knot the score.

Aledo went on to score one run in

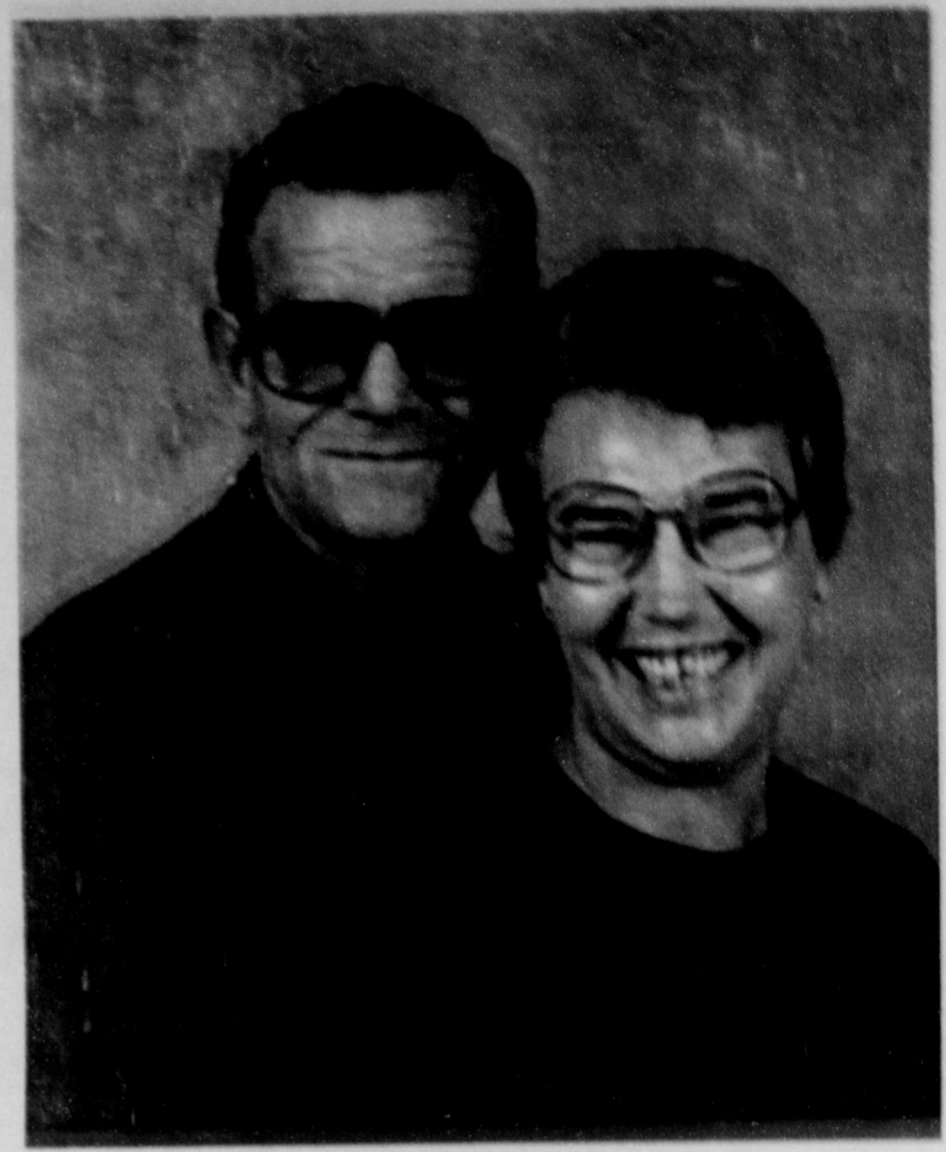

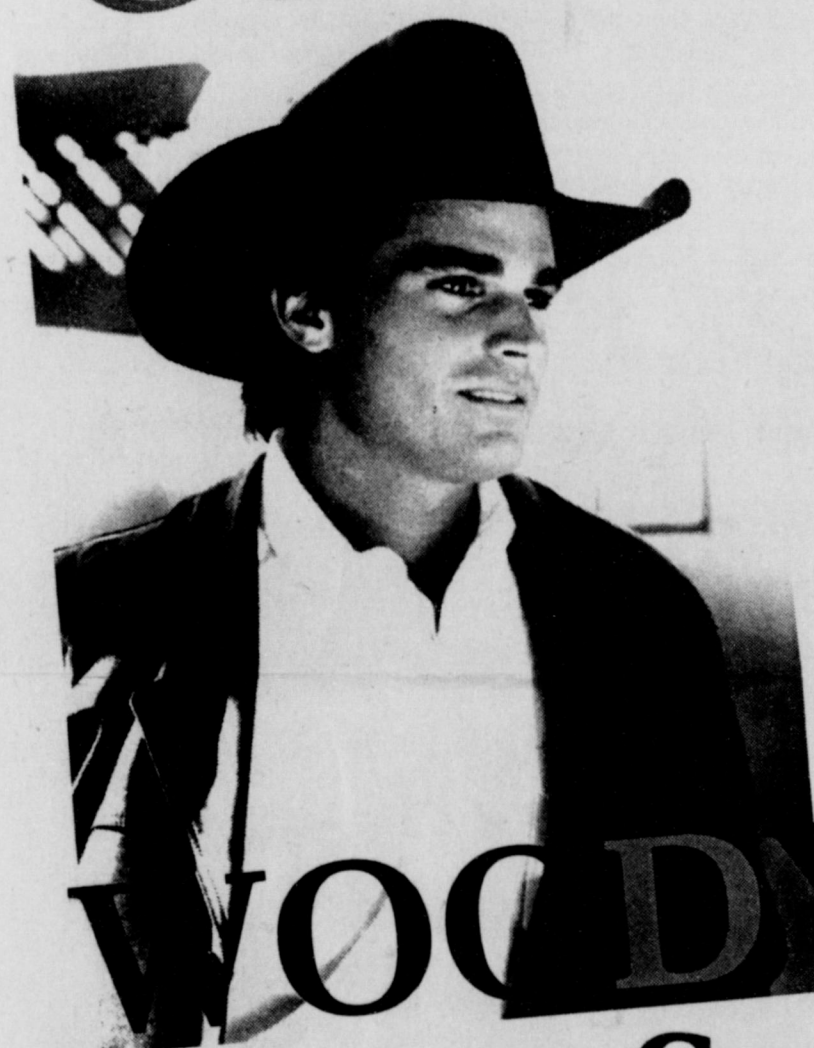

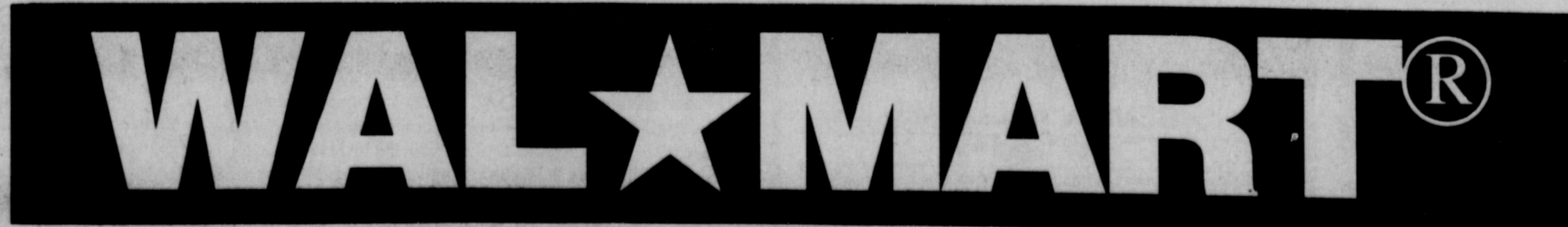
