Four arrested Saturday for public intoxication

Four persons were arrested during the span of less than an hour and a half Saturday night, on charges of public intoxication. Three within 10 minutes.

Police arrested Russell Keith Carpenter, 33, and Sabrina Kaye Aultz, 37, in the same vehicle in the 500 block of West Highway, both for public intoxication.

During a computer check, which was later confirmed, Carpenter had an outstanding warrant for his arrest issued in Dallas County, for probation violation and possession of cocaine.

Carpenter was transported to the county jail at 12:35 a.m., and Aultz was released at 7:30 a.m. after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

Ten minutes after the pair's arrest, Glen Earl Aaron, 30, was arrested in the 500 block of West Highway, also for public intoxication. He was released at 3:40 a.m. after paying a \$130 fine, according to the police blotter.

Andrew Dale Adams, 29, was taken into custody at 9:53 p.m. in the

400 block of West Park, along with a 15-year-old female.

After entering a plea of guilty to public intoxication and paying a fine of \$211.50, Adams was released at 6:15 a.m.

The juvenile's parents were notified and she was turned over to them at the police station.

Friday evening, police arrested Tommy Sims, 29, in the 500 block of Rebecca, on a charge of criminal trespass. After being booked at the police station, Sims was transported to the county jail.

Police responded to a domestic disturbance call at a residence in the 600 block of South Bond at 10:36 p.m. Sunday, where they arrested Jody Ray Southerland on charges of public intoxication and Class C assault to prevent family violence.

Southerland was released at 4:45 a.m. after posting a bond of \$206, according to the blotter entry.

Police and emergency medical

volunteers responded to a residence in the 300 block of West Bank, where a man had reportedly taken an overdose of drugs. Officers were notified at 9:05 p.m. Monday.

The subject was transported to a Wichita Falls hospital, but he refused treatment and returned home, police said.

Investigations continue into three reports received during this week.

Paint on the sides of two automobiles was reportedly scratched by vandals sometime Sunday. The vehicles were parked in the 700 block of West Smith.

A television set was reportedly stolen from a residence in the 200 block of North Bell. The report was filed Tuesday afternoon.

News Briefs

Police carnival is Saturday

The Iowa Park Police Dept. will host its first annual spring carnival from 6 to 9 p.m. Saturday at the Iowa Park Little League football field.

Tickets will be sold for 25 cents a piece and may be used at such activi-

ties as dart throw, duck pond, dime toss, moonwalk, train, space ball and others.

In the event of bad weather, the carnival will be held at the Iowa Park High School gymnasium.

May rain total over 9 inches

Though storms threatened the Iowa Park area last week, no damage resulted -- other than forcing graduation exercises for Iowa Park High seniors indoors.

Rains soaked the area four days, depositing a total of 2.34 inches, and that lofted the total precipitation measured in May to 9.06 inches, according to Virgil Woodfin's measurements.

Woodfin said he measured 1.48 in his gauge Thursday morning, .60 Friday, .18 Monday and .08 Tuesday.

Besides forcing graduation indoors, for only the third time since the annual event has been held in Hawk Stadium, the weather also played havoc with Little League baseball. Only three games were played last week.

City values set record high

For the first time in the city's history, the estimated appraised value of property in Iowa Park has exceeded \$100 million.

The appraised value, released recently by the Wichita Appraisal District, is now \$107,591,875. Last year's certified value was \$99,771,414.

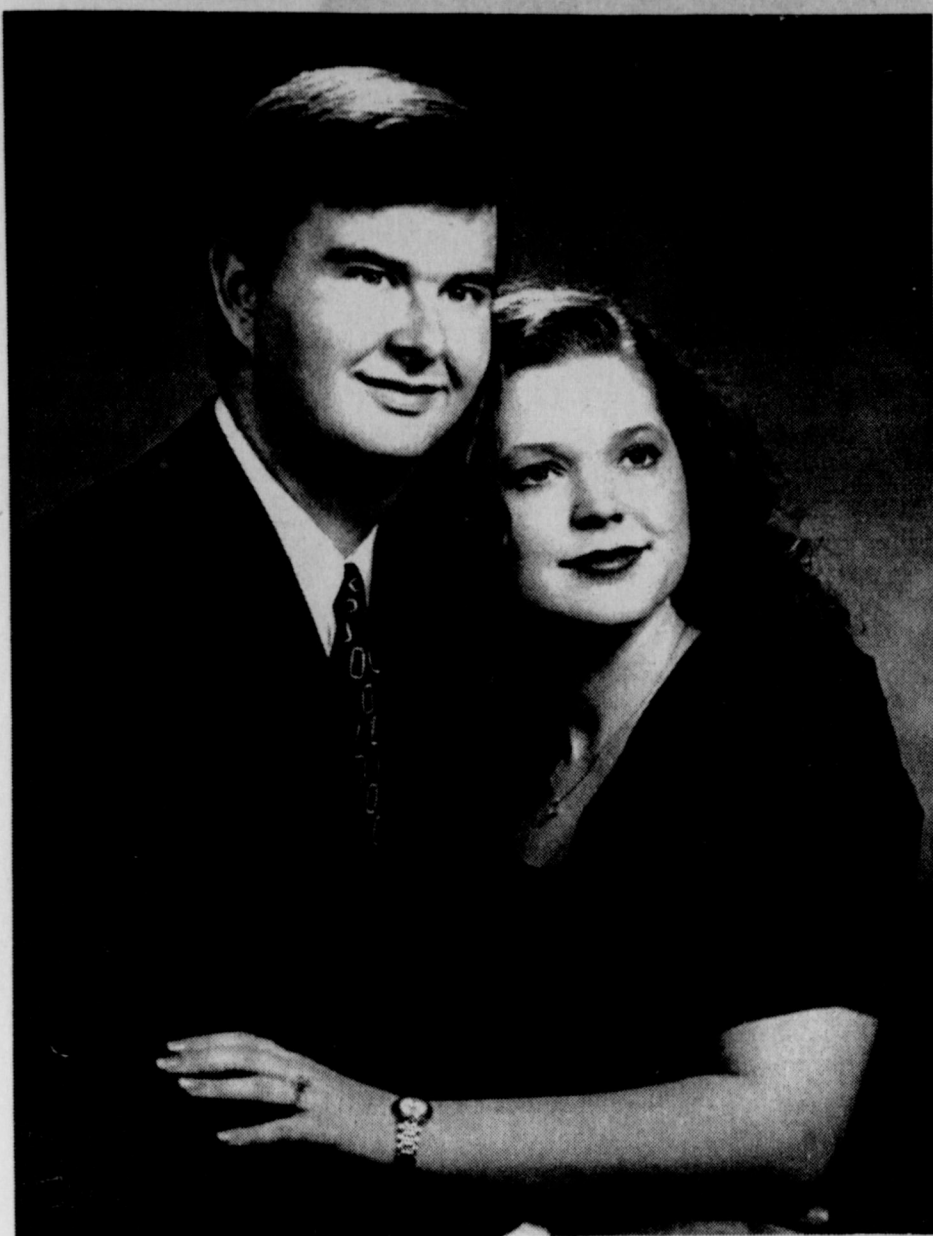
The school district's estimated value was set at \$261,720,763, as compared to \$254,501,658 last year. Increased values apparently are

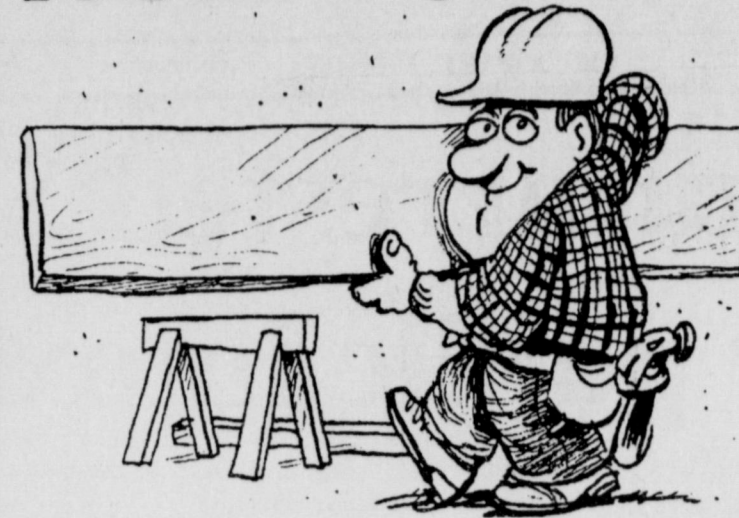

Casey says her recipes are quick and easy, and impossible to mess up. "They are stand-bys," she said, "because we usually eat at the concession stands!"

Chicken Tetrizinni

- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1/2 onion, diced
- 1/2 bell pepper, diced
- 1 small jar pimentos
- 1/2 lb. Velveta cheese, shredded
- 3 or 4 chicken breasts

Spaghetti
Boil chicken and chop into bite-size pieces. Cook the spaghetti. Mix all of the above ingredients together and bake 1/2 hour at 375 degrees.

Enchiladas

- 2 lbs. ground beef
- Seasoning
- 2 cans enchilada sauce
- 2 pkgs. flour tortillas
- 1 lb. grated Cheddar cheese
- 2 chopped onions

Cook seasoned ground beef in large skillet until lightly brown. Stir in 1 and 1/2 cans enchilada sauce and 1 and 1/2 chopped onion. Fill each tortilla with mixture and place close together in a shallow baking pan. Pour the remaining sauce over the top and sprinkle the remaining cheese and onions over the top. Bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees.

Brownie Muffins

- 4 semi-sweet chocolate squares
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 sticks margarine
- 1 cup flour

- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 4 eggs

Melt chocolate and butter slowly. Mix eggs in, one at a time, until thick. Add flour and vanilla and beat until creamy. Place in muffin pans and bake 25 minutes at 325 degrees.

Sunday Morning Coffee Cake

- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 Tbsps. melted shortening
- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 2 tsps. baking powder
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 Tbsp. melted butter
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Combine egg, milk, sugar, and melted shortening. Sift 1 cup of flour, salt, and baking powder together. Add egg mixture and mix well. Pour into an 8-inch square pan.

Combine brown sugar, cinnamon, melted butter and chopped nuts and sprinkle over top of batter. Bake 25 minutes at 375 degrees.

Mexican Casserole

- 2 lbs. hamburger
- 1 cup milk
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 onion, diced
- 2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup picante sauce
- 8-10 tortillas (corn or flour)

Cut tortillas into bite-size pieces. Mix all of the ingredients together and bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees.

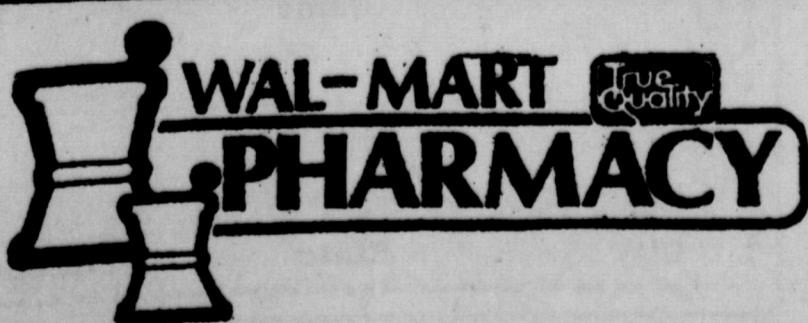

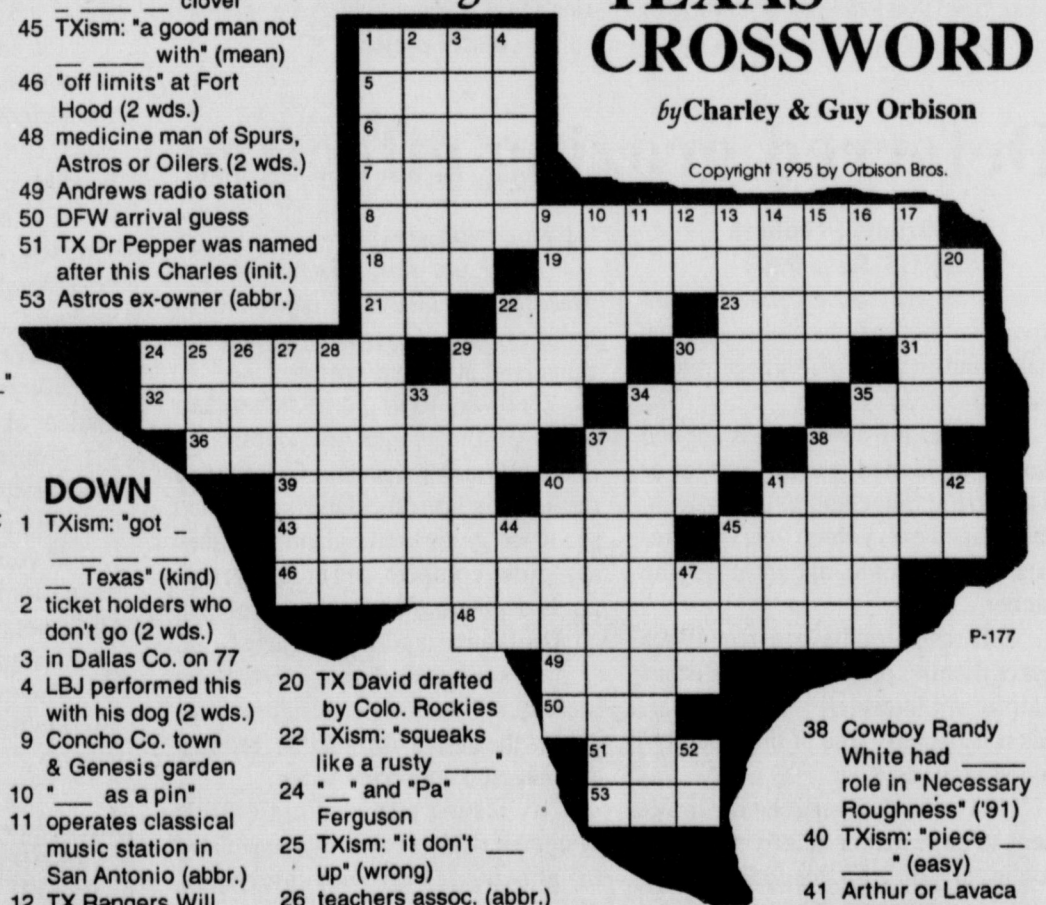

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As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



One of the most stupid situations I've ever heard about is underway.

It's not the snail darter, the owl, the warbler this time. Now it's the striper bass!

There is a movement afoot to possibly cut off the effort to throttle those saltwater springs west of here, because a group is afraid it will affect the striper population in Lake Texoma.

And that bunch has somehow got the federal game people, as well as Texas and Oklahoma departments, throwing a wrench into the project's financing.

A public hearing is to be held at 7 p.m. today at Akin Auditorium, on the campus of Midwestern State Univ., on the subject.

You just might want to attend. Oh, really they're not calling for the project to be eliminated. All they want is several of the million dollars already budget for the project, so they can do a study on the possible effects.

Every cent already budgeted won't complete the project, but any monies taken from that fund will be damaging.

At issue, I understand, is concern

that a reduction of the salt content in Texoma could lead to the elimination of striper bass in that lake.

Hogwash! The same breed is thriving well in area lakes such as Wichita, Arrowhead and Possum Kingdom, where the salt content is virtually nill. So why should those fish in Texoma be any different?

The fish and game departments didn't start seeding Texoma with stripers until after the salt water control project was already well underway. And those concerned department people didn't do any studies before they began their seeding. So why start now?

I had the opportunity to view the first salt spring dam operation when it was completed.

That spring of the clearest water you ever saw produces some 195 tons of salt pollution daily. And now it's cut off from eventually flowing into the Red River.

There are eight identified major saltwater springs, seven in Texas and one in Oklahoma, which are included in the control project.

Before the control measures were begun, they were injecting 3,600 tons of salt into the Red River -- each day.

At 20 tons of salt per 18-wheeler truckload, that equals 180 loads each day.

My question is, which is more important: fishermen and their striper bass, or humanity in need of palatable water?

We all know this country basically depends on surface water as its source.

Those of us who lived in Iowa Park in the very early 1970s had a real lesson about how important water is to our survival.

All three of our city's lakes were dry. We didn't have that pipeline from Wichita Falls as a supplement (that came after the situation).

The city's only available source of water was from the irrigation ditch. That water comes via Lake Diversion, which is fed by Lake Kemp. And the latter lake's water is contaminated by one or more of those salt springs out west.

Oh, most of us were able to carry in cans and bottles of water we got from friends and businesses in Wichita Falls. But that was for drinking purposes only.

The end result, though, was that virtually every piece of household equipment -- clothes washers, dish washers, ice makers, coffee makers, what have you -- had to be replaced.

They were ruined by the high salt content of the polluted water.

I sincerely believe we can live a lot longer without striper fish, than we can without palatable water.

If you agree, you might want to attend tonight's meeting. Or at least, allow your concerns to be shared with your state and federal elected officials.

higher quality grazing.

There are several kinds of rest-graze techniques that are being used by ranchers to manage and improve rangeland at little expense.

One way to improve the productivity of the rangeland is through Planned Grazing Systems. Grazing and resting plants on rangeland in a planned sequence gives better plants a chance to regrow, compete, and multiply, thus gradually increasing the amount of high quality plants available per acre.

This improved range condition increases livestock production, improves the habitat for wildlife, reduces erosion, and conserves water.

By resting pastures in a grazing system or resting pastures once during the growing season every three years, the overgrazed areas are allowed to become productive again.

Additional information and assistance on deferred grazing, planned grazing systems, and other conservation practices can be obtained from the Natural Resources Conservation Service in Iowa Park.

Helpful Hints

The owner of every animal shall be responsible for the removal of any excreta deposited by his animals on public walks, recreation areas or private property.

Helpful Facts

Persons other than the property owner doing work on a residence must be a licensed building contractor, plumber, electrician, or heating and air conditioning contractor with the City of Iowa Park, and carry a performance bond.

Deferred grazing effective

One of the most effective and inexpensive methods for improving the quality and quantity of forage on rangeland is deferred grazing.

Whether the deferment is applied through a planned grazing system or by deferring rangeland a full growing season once every three years, the results will become apparent to the rancher.


Grasses must have a rest if we expect them to provide forage for our wildlife and livestock year after year. This is especially true of the recently-seeded rangeland.

Newly-seeded rangeland always needs to be rested or deferred the first growing season or longer until the stand is well established. This allows the plants to establish and develop sufficient root systems which allow the grass to reach moisture in dry times during the future.

Further deferments during succeeding growing seasons may also be necessary to further establish or thicken the stand. Without deferment, the livestock will graze on the seedlings and pull them out of the ground, thus defeating your sole purpose of seeding the rangeland.

Also grazing the young grass plants too short inhibit the root development. So it's important to defer seeded rangeland for at least the first full growing season and possibly the next, depending on the establishment of the stand.

It has been proven that our range grasses must have at least three to four months of rest at least once every three years following the first growing season. The rest is required to keep the grasses vigorous, allow root establishment, produce seed and thicken as a stand and thus provide more and

Public needs to know

A public hearing will be held Thursday, June 1, 1995 in Akin Auditorium at Midwestern State University at 7:00 p.m. concerning the future of the Red River Chloride Control Project.

In 1957 the U.S. Public Health Service initiated a study that located 10 areas (9 in Texas and 1 in Oklahoma) that emitted chlorides into the Red River.

In 1959 Congress authorized the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to evaluate the cost of benefits of developing measures to control the natural pollution contaminating the Red River system.

After a successful experimental control feature at Estelline Springs controlled 240 tons of the 300 tons of chloride entering the river system each day, the Red River Basin Chloride Control Project was authorized by Congress in 1966. Passage of the 1966 and 1970 Flood Control Acts authorized construction on 8 of the 10 sources.

Through the years Red River Authority of Texas, as local cooperating sponsor of the federal project, has closely monitored the benefits and costs with respect to project effectiveness.

The Red River Authority of Texas is an agency of the state charged by the legislature to reclaim the water resources for beneficial use of the public and protection of the environment from all forms of pollution.

The project has successfully passed numerous evaluations which have proved its importance both ecologically and economically to the citizens of the Red River Valley.

The ultimate goal of the project is to improve the quality of water supplies available for all purposes, including municipal, industrial, agricultural and recreational uses.

The inherent need for good quality water is becoming more and more evident with experienced population growth and industrial development within the basin.

With increasing water use demands, additional water supplies will be necessary to meet the projected water needs within the basin.

Water shortages are already occurring in some areas of the basin.

Basically there are three options available to supply this water: build more reservoirs, which is limited at best; demineralize existing surface and groundwater supplies, which is extremely cost prohibitive; or reclaim the water resources through the CCP to meet the expected future demands.

The latter is by far the most economically feasible and practical alternative available to the taxpayers and rate payers of the basin.

The CCP has complied with every economic and environmental study that has been required in an effort to maintain the necessary balance of the ecosystem and the needs of the people.

Now, after 38 years the U.S. Fish and Wildlife, Texas Parks and Wildlife and Oklahoma Department of Wildlife have decided that the project is going to adversely impact the environment in the Red River Valley.

These agencies have been recipients of all studies made during the years and have given their stamp of approval on all of them (including Environmental Impact Statements).

Surprisingly they have abruptly decided that this project will be detrimental to the ecosystem, should be stopped, and more studies conducted.

Even though the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and Red River Authority of Texas tried to work with the wildlife agencies through an Adaptive Management Plan, their single purpose was to stop the project and study it more at the taxpayers' expense.

The Corps and Authority provided copies of all studies completed on the project and volunteered to institute a study of the wildlife agencies' concerns without losing the momentum of the project.

The wildlife agencies need to realize that the water needs of people are equally important to the ecosystem.

In an effort to achieve their goal the wildlife agencies have initiated several campaigns using misrepresentation and speculation to enrage the striped bass fishing industry at Lake Texoma.

When in reality the project is not going to have an adverse effect on that industry, nor is it going to dry up Lake Texoma!

Interestingly too, these agencies stocked Lake Texoma with 1.56 mil-

lion fingerling striped bass from 1965 through 1974 without conducting an Environmental Impact Statement (striped bass are not indigenous to Lake Texoma and are actually voracious predators).

Also, record-making striped bass have recently been caught in less salty lakes such as Lake Wichita and Lake Arrowhead.

The citizens of the Red River Valley need to be aware that there is a group of people who have decided that clean water is not necessary in the Red River Basin, and that salt is more desirable to prevent people from utilizing it for anything but recreation.

* 6. To uphold and maintain quality genealogical standards.

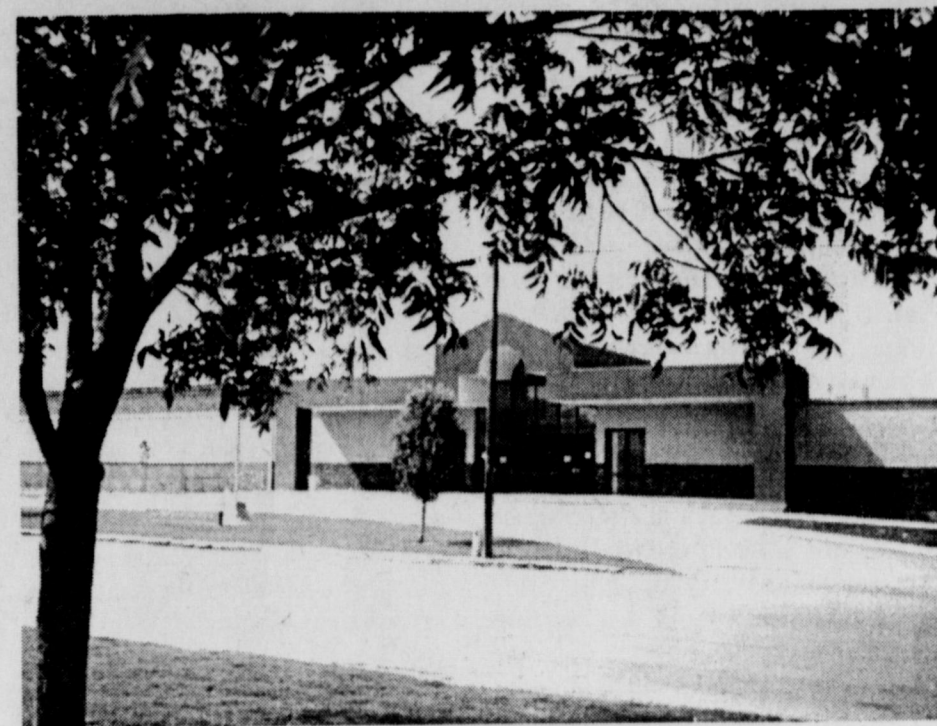
* 7. To encourage the youth of today in learning the importance of genealogical research and documentation by offering educational classes to the schools.

Worth Quoting

(EDITOR'S NOTE: subject of the following article is the grandson of retired Iowa Park High School principal Bob Dawson, and son of former Hawk quarterback Robert Dawson.)

Phil Dawson was showering in the locker room a few months ago when his coach, Texas football taskmaster John Mackovic, barged in.

"When Coach Mackovic comes in the showers, that's a rarity," Dawson said. "I thought I was in trouble."

Mackovic summoned his kicker to his office. Dawson hesitated only long enough to cover up.

"He asked me what I was doing the second weekend in May," Dawson recalled. "I said studying, I guess. He said, 'You're going to Phoenix.' I'd been selected to the *Playboy* All-American team."

Dawson said he was as estatic as he was disbelieving. He had just finished his first season of college ball, and already was being honored as the best.

"It was a tremendous honor," said Dawson, who made All-American as a high school kicker at Lake Highlands.

He couldn't wait to announce to family and friends how his hard work had paid off so soon. He was going to be on the well-known annual pre-season All-America football team chosen by one of the world's most-recognizable magazines. He was headed to the magazine's weekend bash at a desert hotel resort for the selected few.

The weekend would end with a photo session, he was told. A portrait of the magazine's 39th annual All-America football team would appear in the magazine's October edition -- right next to Miss October and other picture layouts of beautiful women in various stages of undress for which *Playboy* was most famous.

That, said Dawson, was when he realized his coach's unusual visit to the shower was trouble indeed. The invitation that Mackovic delivered was great temptation.

"Who would not want to go to a weekend where they wine and dine you?" said Dawson. "But, after about a week, I thought I wasn't going to do it."

Dawson said he knew the invitation would be tough to turn down. Most any other player would RSVP immediately.

"The toughest thing," Dawson said, "was explaining the reason I didn't want to do it. It would change my walk with the Lord."

Dawson, 20, is a devout Chris-

tian. He is a member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. He speaks to kids in Austin and Dallas regularly each year about moral values -- saying no to drugs, irresponsible drinking and pre-marital sex.

"I don't want some kid saying, 'Well, he's just up there talking. The other night he was at the *Playboy* mansion,'" explained Dawson, who Tuesday was honored for his decision at a Dallas Association for Decency banquet.

Dawson didn't want to wind up like Detroit running back Barry Sanders, a devout Christian and spokesman for abstinence who last year was found to have fathered a child out of wedlock.

"It was just a credibility issue with me," Dawson said. "I don't agree with what they (*Playboy*) are doing. I think it's degrading to women."

Dawson sought the counsel of friends, family, fellow football players and the Longhorns' chaplain before informing the athletic department he would decline *Playboy's* invitation. He wanted to be absolutely sure his decision was right.

"I'm not trying to say the people who do it are wrong. I know people of my same convictions have done that," Dawson said. "The last thing I wanted to do was come across as arrogant. It's just the kind of role model I want to be."

Playboy sports editor Gary Cole, who for nine years has selected the magazine's All-America football and basketball teams, said Dawson wasn't the first to turn him down. Dawson's reasoning echoed coach Ken Hatfield's when he backed away while coaching Arkansas. Some North Carolina basketball players refused the magazine out of deference to coach Dean Smith's wife, who has expressed concerns about *Playboy* college teams. A Brigham Young player once turned down *Playboy's* invitation, Cole said, because he was a newlywed and his bride was worried about what would happen at the team party.

For the record, said Cole, no *Playboy* centerfolds attended the party Dawson missed. He added the magazine would honor Dawson's refusal as it had the few others before.

"We would not put someone in a position where they are uncomfortable," Cole assured. "But, he's a very good kicker and someone we think is only going to get better."

If Phil Dawson becomes as strong a kicker as he appears a person, he may

become the best ever.

With a deep interest in communication, the newspaper bug bit me on that first go-around (which was still going the last time I checked). I love this business, and am ready to pour my heart into it.

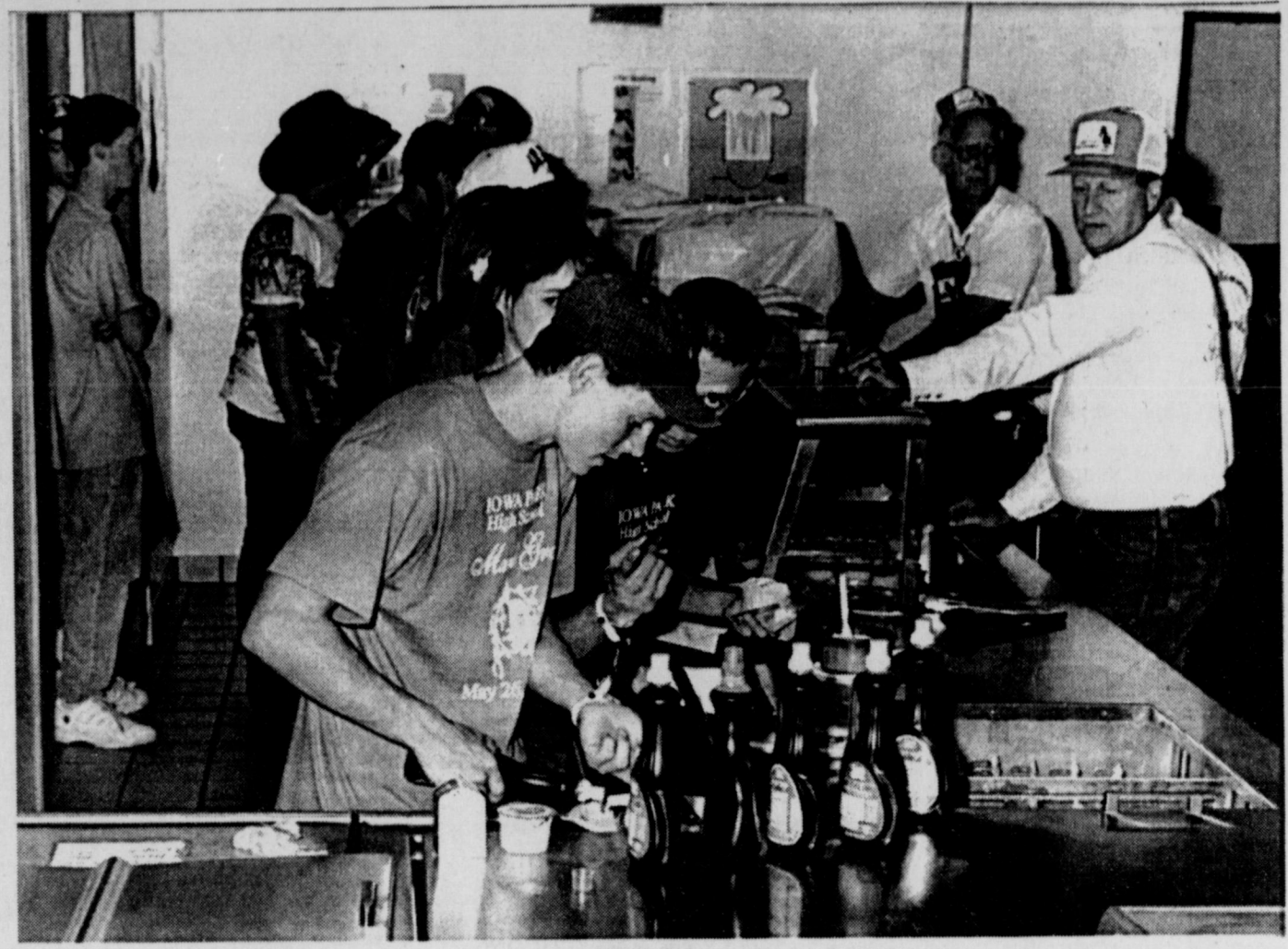

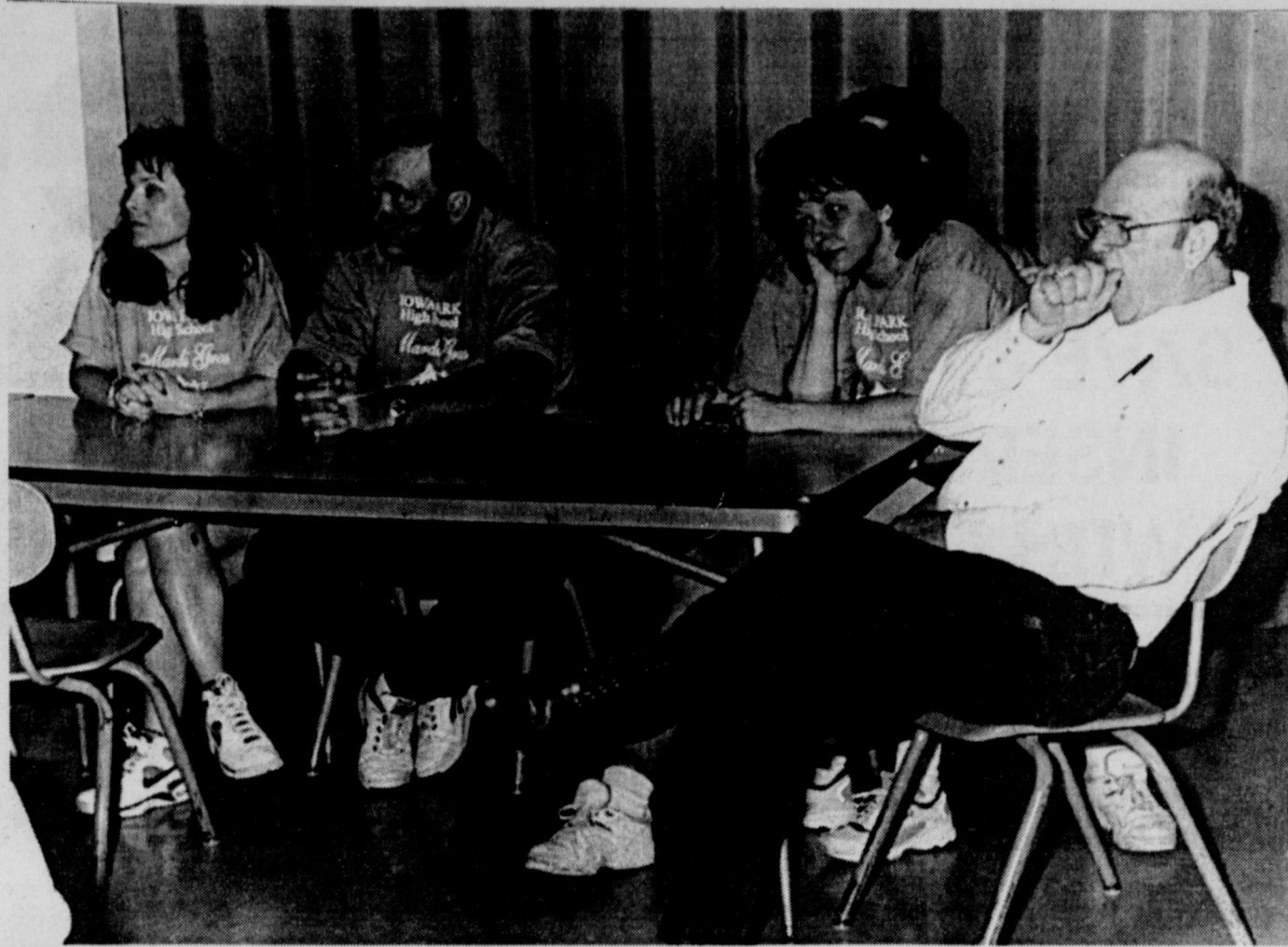

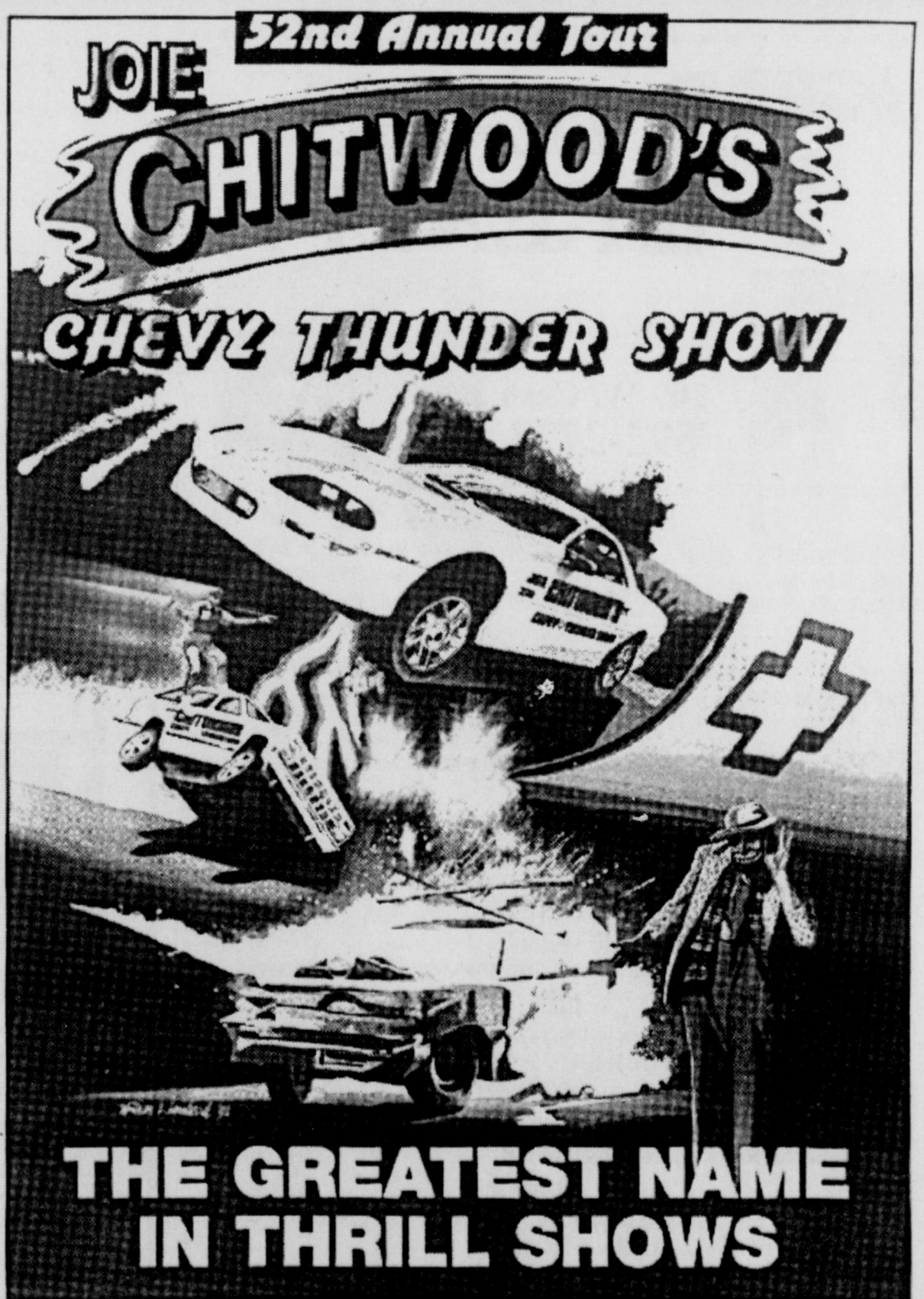

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Pecan crops require special protect during late May to early June in the local area.

Pecan nut casebearer, the most damaging pest of pecans, can destroy your developing pecans if not controlled. The first generation of this pecan pest is the most detrimental to young nuts.

Based on predictions of first significant nut entry, orchard monitoring and weather data during the time frame of May 25 to June 5 will be the period for applying control measures in the Rolling Plains region.

Homeowners can use malathion for control sprays. Commercial growers can utilize Guthion, Sevin, Asana, Malathion, Lorsban or Javelin.

Check with pest control product distributors for these materials and others which can be utilized for pecan nut casebearer control. Follow all label directions and rates when applying pesticides.

The best time to control the pecan nut casebearer on a specific tree or in a commercial orchard should be determined based on inspection of the developing pecans.

Trees should be inspected beginning now. Eggs should be tagged so

hatch can be monitored. When a nut entry is found for every 100 clusters inspected, insecticidal control measures should be applied.

A single carefully timed application will often provide adequate control of first-generation casebearers.

However, a second application may be needed if unhatched eggs are found seven to 10 days after the first application.

The greenish-white eggs are deposited on the tips and just below the bracts of the small developing nuts. Eggs become reddish before hatching in four to five days. The newly hatched larvae feed on buds for two days before they enter the nuts.

Second-generation casebearer eggs will be deposited in the grooves on the nut tip or bases, or on the buds, about 42 days after the first-generation eggs are observed.

Treatment for the second-generation is suggested if two percent of the pecans are infested with eggs.

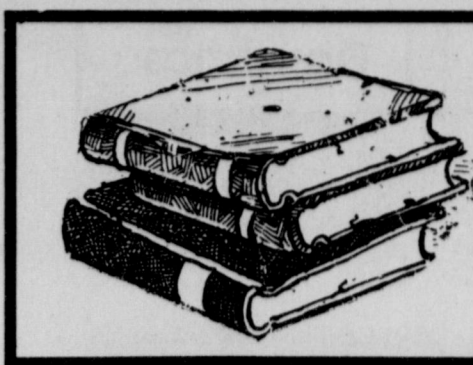
