Trustees in marathon session

Thursday's meeting of the school board was a virtual marathon that included almost four hours of executive sessions.

Some confusion arose about when the meeting would be held, because the tentative agenda stated it would be held Monday, though the date of the month was correct.

Trustees began their meeting at 6:30 p.m., and concluded shortly before 12:30 a.m.

The first of the closed sessions, which lasted some 40 minutes, was held to discuss student transfer requests for 1995-96, and the other executive meeting dealt with personnel.

Executive sessions are permitted under the Texas Open Meetings Law.

Following the first session, trustees quickly approved a list of 50 students who had requested permission to transfer from other districts next year.

Included were 15 seniors, nine juniors, 14 sophomores, four freshmen

and eight of other classifications.

Most of the transfers are from the City View district. According to a policy recently adopted, only students from that district now enrolled, or their siblings, or those related to school staff, are accepted for transfer.

The board explained when the policy was adopted that increasing enrollment at the high school was the cause of additional City View transfers.

Motions approved following the closed session on personnel involved two resignations, hiring of one teacher, transferring one person and hiring a support person.

Resignations of Molly Phillips,

retiring at Kidwell Elementary, and junior high aide Sandra Lee were approved.

Yeada Gunter, who has been the junior high counselor the past year, was hired to teach second grade at Kidwell.

Brenda Hodges, who has coached at Holliday since 1989, was hired to fill the newly-created girls' volleyball coaching position. She will also serve as an assistant basketball coach and teach social studies.

Also hired was Georgia Moore, who worked as a secretary in the administration building until 1990, was

Council delays action on 4-way stop request

The city council Monday night took under advisement a citizen's request to install four-way stop signs at the intersection of Washington and Victoria.

Pointing out that drivers regularly speed on both streets, and a recent major accident at that location, Mrs. Anita McShan said the four-way stop signs were needed.

She told the council drivers do not always observe the stop signs on the recently-rebuilt Washington, and Victoria has no stop sign from the Access Road to Cash which would slow that traffic.

Mayor Wayne House explained that "rumble strips" and warning flags had been ordered, and would be installed as soon as they arrive.

The rumble strips and flags have already been put into place at various locations on Washington, near intersections where other accidents have occurred.

Thanking Mrs. McShan for her

interest and suggestions, the mayor said the city would observe any results after the additions were installed, before making any final decision on changing the intersection into a four-way stop.

Also approved was a request by the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department to close the 100 block of East Cash Saturday evening, for a benefit street dance.

Chief Danny Skinner explained the street would be closed off between Wall and the Post Office drive-through between 5 p.m. and 2 a.m. Sunday.

The city's surplus equipment auction was rescheduled, after being rained out last week.

Administrator Mike Price proposed holding the sale at 5:30 p.m. Thursday, June 29, and the council approved.

Aldermen agreed to hold their second in a series of budget workshops at 7 p.m. Monday, in council chambers. The meeting is open to the public.

Beavers, Schell are recognized

Two members of Iowa Park Hawk Band were among 160 musicians selected as Outstanding Performers at the 1995 University Interscholastic League Texas State Solo and Ensemble Contest.

They were Brandi Beavers and Kenneth Schell.

Actually, this was the second time Schell had earned the "State Champion" distinction. His earlier achievement was in 1993.

The three-day competition, held the final week of May, was conducted at the University of Texas at Austin and Southwest Texas State Univ. in San Marcos.

Nearly 26,000 high school musicians from throughout the state attended.

It is the largest music festival of its kind in the world.

Richard Floyd, UIL State Director of Music, said, "To be recognized as an Outstanding Performer at the UIL Texas State Solo and Ensemble Contest is one of the highest individual musical achievements that a high school student can attain."

Of Beavers' accomplishment, Floyd said, "The jazz medium ensemble performance presented by Brandi was a credit to her talent, hard work and dedication."

Continuing, Floyd said, "The keyboard percussion solo performance presented by Kenneth was a credit to his talent, hard work and dedication."

The contest is judged by music educators, university professors and professional musicians from throughout the United States. The format of the contest provided both a performance evaluation and specialized musical instruction for each student musician.

Man electrocuted in pasture

A Peterson Road resident was electrocuted Monday morning, when he came into contact with guide wire.

Tommy Joe Tate, 48, died while apparently attempting to pull a cow that had been killed when it contacted the same wire.

His residence is listed as 2919 Peterson Road South.

Emergency personnel were called at 8:35 a.m. to a field in the 2600 area of Peterson Road South, where Tate was found.

A man, who identified himself as Jim Moore, said he saw Tate holding onto the guide wire and apparently unconscious. Moore said he used a rope to pull the victim from the wire.

Emergency personnel from the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept. attempted to revive him until ambulance personnel arrived.

Tate, who was a coach at Barwise Junior High in Wichita Falls, was pronounced dead upon arrival at Bethania Hospital.

The guide wire was attached to an electrical post that provided electricity to a small oil well pump, located about

100 yards east of Peterson Road.

Tate reportedly taught and coached at various Wichita Falls schools 1972-76, and since 1990 has been head football coach and campus coordinator at Barwise. He also was a former coach of the women's swim team at the University of Texas.

During summers, he ran Camp Tejas, a children's day camp that devoted two weeks a year to handicapped and underprivileged children.

Details of his life, family and funeral are printed on page 5 of this issue.

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Storm threatens city

For the second consecutive week, Iowa Park was struck by storms which produced high winds and heavy rains, and even had a tornado warning.

The city sounded a take-cover warning at 8:21 p.m. Friday, when the radio dispatcher was alerted by the National Weather Service that a tornado cloud was detected by radar in the immediate area.

The Weather Service had issued a tornado watch earlier in the day, at 2:41 p.m.

Other than extremely strong winds,

however, no tornadic damage was reported.

The storm produced 1.15 inch rainfall, as measured by Virgil Woodfin, and barricades were erected on Garden, Texowa and Wall later that day, because of street flooding.

The extremely powerful winds blew over trees, but the major problem caused was broken branches knocked onto power lines.

Friday's rain, added to .22 of an inch from the previous day, brought the week's total to 1.37, and 4.01 inches thus far in June.

Business continues good

Sales tax collections are running almost 14 percent more for the first five months of this year, as compared with last year, according to the state comptroller's office.

Iowa Park received a \$15,610.63 check this month, which represented an increase of 12.01 percent over May of last year.

This month's sales tax rebate included taxes collected on April sales and reported in May by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

As has been the case more than a year, Iowa Park leads all cities in Wichita County in increased sales tax collections.

For the year, Wichita Falls is showing a 3.38-percent increase over 1994, and Electra a 2.59-percent gain. Burkburnett, however, is a minus 7.50 percent for the year, according to the comptroller office report.

Holliday is enjoying a 4.42-percent gain for the year, having received \$30,900.71 in tax rebates.

Dinner will be served at the Wichita Club following the group picture session. Men are requested to wear coat and tie.

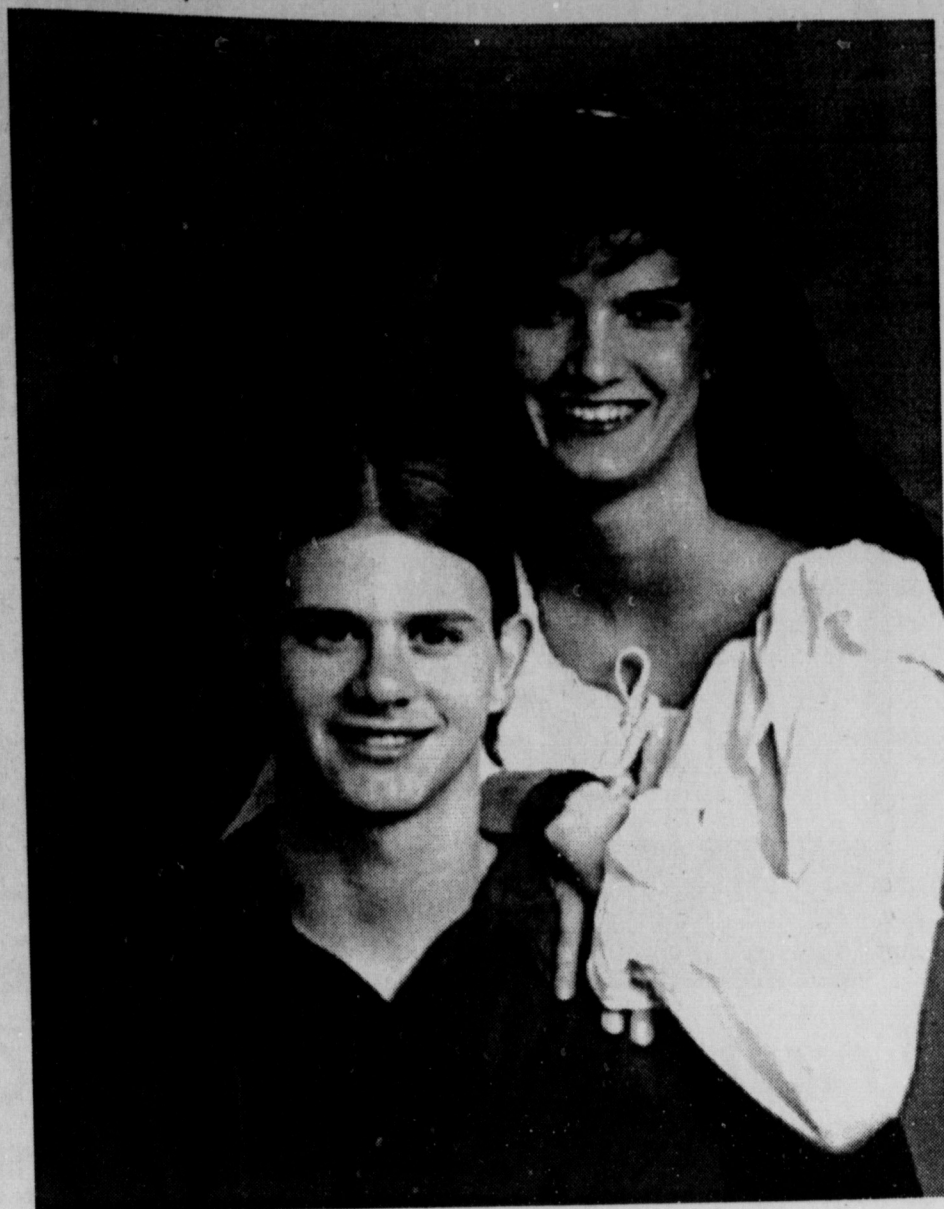
CUB SCOUT NEWS

Tips for the Summer Traveler

- The best way to enjoy your vacation is to plan ahead and be well-prepared. Motion-sickness while traveling by sea, air, train or even by car, is common. 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As I See It. By Bob Hamilton



It's been a while since I knocked the U.S. Postal Service, so I'll take a swipe at my latest complaint.

As in the past, I must point out that our local people have nothing to do with anything I'm going to mention.

You all are fully aware of how the Postal Service was going into the hole, and had to be bailed out by raising the price of a first class stamp from 29 cents to 32.

Well, that wasn't all of it. I just got my bill for my next year's rent on the drawer we have at the post office.

It's up to \$104. This is the same drawer -- # 430 -- we've had since we've been in business here. And my, how it's gained in its value!

I paid \$72 in 1989. Two years before that, the fee was \$53. And, looking farther back in my cancelled

checks, I find that in 1980, our annual rental fee was \$30.

For this fee, I have the privilege of saving the Postal Service gasoline, manpower and shoe leather -- which would cost me nothing if I would just sit back and let them deliver it all to a block and a half west of the post office.

Why continue to pay the rent? Well, first of all, it would cost me a couple of year's rental fees, just to notify everyone of my address change.

The other reason is personal. I live primarily by routine. As I drive to the office each morning, my car automatically turns back east on Cash to the post office, rather than left to my office.

Changing old habits are difficult, if not impossible. Well, maybe I could make the mental change, but how can you convince an old stationwagon from its habit?

What adds to the confusion of discouraging box renters with ever-increasing higher fees is the practice the Postal Service is stimulating by wanting to install central box sections in residential areas.

You know, one stop cuts off a dozen or so.

If the postmaster general wants to take my comments personally -- be my guest!

And while I'm on the subject, I'd like the Postal Service to use some of this increased revenue to buy more feed for their Pony Express stock.

From my box Tuesday, June 13, I extracted two copies of the *Bradly Standard*. One was their June 6 issue and the other June 9.

Maybe, with a better feed supply, the paper could be delivered a little more timely.



Worth Quoting

There they were in all their glory ... on the tube ... with mouths going full-tilt.

The AARP lobbyist touting his 45 trillion member support (or some other equally outrageous and untrue number) from the elder citizens and their demand for more in the way of medicare.

The Congressman making statements about the elder citizen insinuating that they are the grasping "me-first" generation who have received 10% increases in services over the last several years when no other group has received such a monumental gift.

The AARP lobbyist making even louder noises about the Congressman's "obvious" lack of concern for the elder.

The Congressman being equally vocal demanding the elder citizen take cuts and be grateful.

I would have kicked my TV but my foot won't reach that high, I can't afford the repair on the set and I can't have a slow-down caused by a cast. So I did the next best thing and left the office.

Point One: Being of the age somewhere between 30 and 80 I know a great many elder citizens and, for the most part, regardless of AARP membership they do not support the AARP stance on medicare and many other subjects as well. To be a member does not automatically translate to support of lobbyists which is a point many tried to make last year; only to be told by AARP that the organization knew more about what was good for the people than the people themselves.

Point Two: Many congressmen (that's the generic term) need to ignore the lobbyists and really find out what their people really believe. There are those "grasping 'me-first' generation" members who do demand more. The same may be said for all age groups. But those elder citizens with whom I

have had contact do not want to leave unbearable burdens on their grandchildren, realize that we have had more thrust on us as "our due" than we even need -- let alone request.

The elder citizens of my experience are not whiners, graspers, thoughtless and lacking in business skills. Remember this is the generation that lived through the last of the depression, World War II (try sugar, butter, meat, tire and gasoline rationing on for several years and see how you manage), women on the production line for the first time, women moving aside to allow the returning servicemen to have those same positions on the production line, careful use of financial income and preparation for the future, and parents who really took part in the job of child rearing. This is not the stupid, or pampered, or have it all, or spendthrift, or me-first generation. Just the opposite.

Write to your congressmen telling them exactly how you stand on each issue as it arises. Short and to the point works better than long. Be factual. Give them your age group. Write often. Two letters per elder citizen per issue is not too much. Who knows, the congressmen may get the message after a while.

Write to the AARP making it perfectly clear where you stand on their lobbying efforts in your name. Don't approve? Tell them over and over to cease and desist. Tell them how you really stand on the issues. Demand that they stop mis-using your membership to push issues with which you totally disagree. Who knows, those in power may get the message after a while.

This is your country. Your life is a long way from over. Take part for the

good of those who follow. Emulate our forefathers. Take a stand. Be heard. Show those who follow behind what a good, involved citizen really looks like. Be a role model for democracy.

I have been putting off the inevitable long enough. It is time to get started on all those projects that I planned over the winter.

At the top of my list is a storage shed for all my lawn and garden tools. They are now haphazardly stacked in one corner of my garage. Most of the winter and spring I have stumbled over shovels, been clubbed by hoes, snared by garden hoses and kicked the lawn mower every time I have entered the garage.

Next on my list is to build a deck in my back yard. That project is planned for two important reasons. The first is that I am tired of wading through the grass each time I want to fire up the barbecue grill. Shifting the entire operation to a nice wooden deck would make the outdoor cooking chores much more enjoyable.

The second reason is more practical. I figure that more of the back yard I cover up with a deck, the less there will be to mow.

This will be the third deck that I have constructed. The first was at a patio home I owned in Houston. It was a very elaborate four-level monster that covered most of my yard.

It had built-in benches, a hot tub, planter boxes, steps between levels and roof over a portion of the deck. It had more angles to cut than a crooked used car salesman.

I leaned a lot about deck building on that project. I coined the phrase, "one-hour board," building that deck. It was so complicated that some of the boards took an hour or more to cut to the proper shape.

The second deck I built was at another house in Houston. Learning from my first project, it was a simple square with hand rails.

My first deck took about six months to complete, but the second only took a couple of weekends. There is much to be said for simplicity.

Plans for this new deck are the model of simple. Hopefully there will be no "one-hour boards" on this project.

Before embarking on this set of projects, I decided to check my calendar. Last summer, I had similar ambitions, but I spent six of the 12 weeks of the season on the road to various meetings. It was hard to get anything started, much less completed, when I was gone every other weekend.

A quick count revealed the bad news. Starting this week, there are only nine more weeks left before school and football season starts in August. Gee, I had better just construct everything from quick-drying cement. That may be all I have time for this summer.

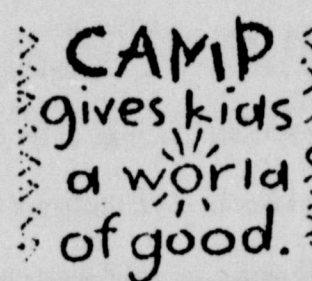



During that time, she was a member of the Gold Mining Assoc.

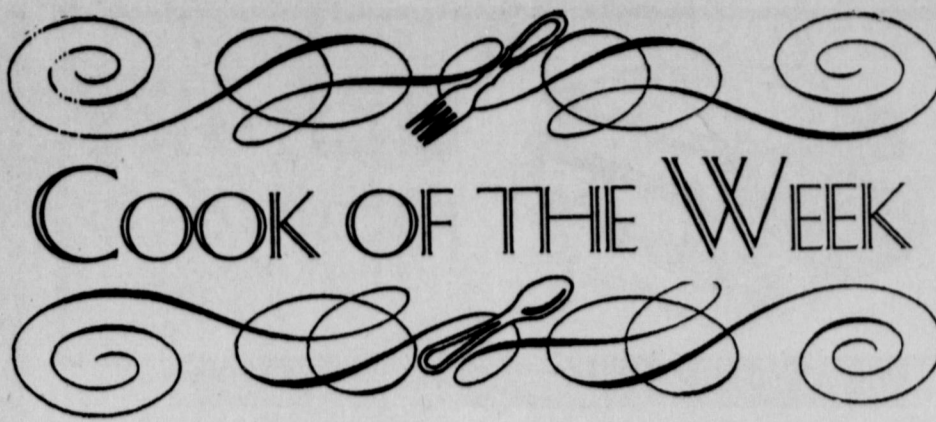

Southern Gumbo

- 1 lb. chicken breasts, diced in large cubes
- 1/4 cup unsifted all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup butter or oleo
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 12 oz. frozen okra (or use 1 qt. fresh okra, washed and cut into 1-inch pieces)
- 1 (1lb., 12 oz.) can undrained tomatoes



COOK OF THE WEEK

- 1 cup finely chopped green pepper
- 1/2 tsp. dried thyme leaves
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 4 tsps. salt
- 1 tsp. fine herbs

Coat chicken cubes with flour. Slowly heat oleo in 8-quart kettle. Brown chicken cubes well, turning on all sides. Add onion, okra and tomatoes. Cover and cook 15 minutes.

Add 2 quarts water and remaining ingredients, cover and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer 2 hours, stirring occasionally.

Makes 5 quarts - 20 servings.

Yeasty Biscuits

- 1 pkg. yeast
- 1/2 cup warm water
- 1/2 cup oil
- 2 cups buttermilk
- 5 cups flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 4 tsps. baking powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/3 tsp. soda

Mix yeast and warm water. Sift flour and mix with other dry ingredients. Mix yeast and water with oil and buttermilk. Add flour mixture to the liquid - mixture will be sticky. Store in refrigerator in greased bowl. Use as needed.

To bake, roll dough 1/2-inch thick on well-floured board, cut biscuits and place in greased pan. Bake 20-25 minutes at 400 degrees.

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Green Enchilada Casserole

- 1 doz. corn tortillas
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup finely chopped onion
- 2 cups grated Cheddar cheese
- 1 cup milk
- 1 (10 3/4 oz.) can cream of chicken soup
- 1/4 can chopped green chilies or jalapeno peppers

Fry tortillas in hot fat until they bubble. Drain and place a layer of tortillas in shallow 3-quart casserole dish. Top each tortilla with cheese and onion. Continue process until all tortillas are used. Combine milk, soup and green chilies; pour over tortillas. Bake in 350 degree oven 30 minutes. 4 to 6 servings.

Easy Swiss Steak

- 2 med. cans tomatoes
- 1/2 pkg. onion soup mix
- 1 bell pepper
- 1 onion
- 2 lbs. Swiss steak

In slow cooker, mix together tomatoes, soup mix, onion and bell pepper. Salt and pepper the steak and put in cooker with tomato mixture.

Cook 8 hours on low heat. Thicken the gravy after the meat is tender.

Banana Nut Bread

- Sift together:
- 2 cups sifted flour
 - 1 tsp. baking powder
 - 1/2 tsp. soda
 - 1/2 tsp. salt

- Combine, beating well:
- 2/3 cup sugar
 - 1/3 cup shortening
 - 2 eggs

Add to dry ingredients, stirring just until moistened. Stir in 1/2 cup chopped nuts and pour into greased 9x5x3-in pan. Let stand 20 minutes before baking to reduce cracking on top of loaf. Bake in 350 degree oven 50 to 60 minutes. Remove from oven and let cool 5 minutes before removing from pan.

Mexican Casserole

- 1 pkg. soft corn tortillas
- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 med. onion, chopped
- 1 can ranch style beans
- 1 can green chilies
- 1 lb. grated cheese
- 1 can Ro-Tel tomatoes
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup

Mix tomatoes and soup; set aside. Brown hamburger and drain. Wet tortillas with soup mixture and lay wet side down. Then layer tortillas, beef, onion, beans, green chilies, cheese, and tomato and soup mixture. Bake 45 minutes at 300 degrees.

Continuing Family Research.
Establishing chronological dates will give a general time span in which to work and can eliminate search over many records outside an estimated time period.

Old obituaries were quite expansive, often including dates, migratory patterns, family history and other family names and locations. Sometimes date of death and age, sometimes age in years, months and days, was published.

Also tombstones were inscribed with date of death and age and then the approximate date of birth is easy to figure. While a helpful clue, it isn't always that simple. Generations for practical purposes are calculated to be 30 years apart.

Other ways to "guesstimate" dates for research purposes--if you know the date of birth, look for the marriage record 15 to 35 years later. If you know the date of marriage, then figure the couple was born 15-35 years before that date.

Date of death can be estimated from date of marriage to 50-75 years later. When the date of birth of a child is known you can assume the father was 15-70 years older than the child

and the mother 15-50 years older. This narrows down the years to be researched.

Arranging what you know about your ancestors in chronological order along with localities is helpful as you will be able to see where family members lived at a particular time and this will aid in searching records for the appropriate time period in that area.

It is well to know the county as well as the town. Some small towns no longer exist but can be found in old county records. Counties also may have some changes.

The Iowa Park Genealogical and Historical Society met Saturday, June 10 as announced, and final plans were made for the trip with Fillmore Spangler June 13 to the Fort Worth Branch of the Federal Archives.

Another trip for research will be to the Dallas Public Library one day during the week of July 9, watch this column for the date.
