Collection of good taste

When you step inside the Paul and Marilyn Morris home, a slanted wall gives a clue that the house is circa early 1950s, when that began to be a popular interior architectural design.

But, it is difficult to tell what appeals the most...the way they have redone the house, or the darling figural cookie jars that vj for attention on almost every flat surface in sight.

In May 1994, the couple bought the house that was built in the early 1950s by the late George and Lorene Lewis.

They were eager to update the interior decor, and began to plan what they would do. But, they didn't want to change the architecture. Marilyn said everything had been so well taken care of there was little else to do.

The house has a cozy efficiency apartment above the garage. In September Paul and Marilyn moved into it. They completed the interior work in the house and moved in December 16, 1994. They were ready to serve Christmas dinner to 34 family members.

They succeeded in shaping the character of the rooms and coordinating the patterns to give the house an inviting, unified and updated look.

Marilyn said the former owners "really thought of everything for convenience, and were just a little ahead of their time in some respects". Lewis did most of the inside work himself.

In fact, everything was so well taken care of that Marilyn is using the kitchen gas-fired range she was told is a 1958 model. The only problem there, it had been so long since Marilyn had used a gas range she had to call someone in to tell her why when the pilot light was on the burners or oven wouldn't ignite.

The large living-dining area carpet was taken up and the original hardwood floors there and in the hallway were redone to a beautiful high luster finish.

Walls in the rooms got new paper and paint. The work was all done by Paul and his brother-in-law, Tommy Cantrell. "I just mostly stood around and bossed," Marilyn said jokingly. Their daughter, Rae, who heard her mother's remark, calmly interjected, "That's what she does best".

has a light background with rose colored floral design and a border at chair rail height above the striped paper on the wainscoting.

The large dining table is set with Depression glass, which Marilyn began collecting about 30 years ago. She has three complete sets, the Mayfair, Cherry Blossom and Madrid patterns.

Dark green carpeting was used in the two bedrooms and den. The top half of the master bedroom is papered with a rose colored floral design above a wainscoting of deep navy blue. The dividing border has larger

flowers of rose color. In this room is a heavy, old rotary dial black desk telephone. It belonged to the former owners and still has their telephone number in the center of the dial.

The other bedroom Marilyn claims for her own. It has antique furniture including a white wrought iron bedstead she found in a Jacksboro antique store. A cedar chest in the room features more cookie jars...two new Hallmarks and a Rockin' Horse. "There is no method in my madness," says Marilyn.

Unusually high number of arrests are reported

Police were at a loss to explain why so many arrests were made during the past week.

Eleven persons were arrested, most of them on charges of public intoxication, according to the police blotter.

A woman walked into the police station at 5:54 p.m. Thursday, and told the radio dispatcher that a man was sitting on a porch in the 200 block of West Jefferson, holding a shotgun in his mouth and threatening to kill himself.

Four officers immediately converged at the location, but the only man on the premises wasn't holding a gun, and said there wasn't even one in the house.

After checking through the house to see for themselves, the officers then found Rebecca Betty Hilbus, 41, and took her into custody for public intoxication.

She was released at 10:40 p.m., after signing a promise to appear in

municipal court.

A citizen called the station at 9:21 that same evening to report that a car was in the ditch in the 500 block of West Highway, and the driver was walking away.

Officers later found Jorge Piceno Castro, 26, walking on Johnson Road. He was charged for public intoxication, and released at 7:01 the next morning after posting a bond of \$130.

Peter Paul Putman, 20, was taken into custody in the 800 block of West Highway Thursday evening, on two outstanding warrants that were issued locally.

Though the fines on the two warrants total \$445, Putman was released at 1:35 a.m. Friday when police accepted a partial payment of \$14.

Two men arrested at 11:48 p.m. Thursday were later transported to Wichita General Hospital.

Jason Lyle Hamberger, 17, and Robert Dean Russ, 26, were stopped in the 600 block of South Colorado, and one of the pair became combative.

After subduing the subjects, the two were taken to the police station on charges of public intoxication.

Emergency medical personnel were called, and then the two were transported by ambulance to Wichita Falls, but because of illness and not due to injuries sustained during the arrest.

They were turned over to security personnel at the hospital, according to the police blotter.

Danny Joe Lee, 37, was taken into custody at 12:40 a.m. Friday in the 900 block of East Highway on a charge of Class C assault to prevent family violence. He was released at 5:25 after signing a promise to appear in court.

A traffic stop in the 500 block of

Northwest Access Road at 10:34 p.m. Friday resulted in the arrest of three individuals, two for public intoxication and the third for failing to identify.

Jose Fidel and Hector Gerardo Aleman, ages 34 and 32 respectively, were charged for intoxication and Martin Lenerma, 34, for failure to identify.

They were released five hours later, after the Alemans paid \$130 each and Lenerma \$81.50, according to the police blotter.

Jimmy Charles Morgan, 48, was arrested Saturday morning in the 300 block of Fourth Street for soliciting without a city-required permit.

Morgan was later released after paying a fine of \$81.50, and, according to city hall records, purchased a one-day permit Monday.

The eleventh arrest on the report was noted on the blotter at 12:49 a.m. Monday, when officers took Samra Kate Collier, 35, into custody in the 700 block of West Alameda.

Charged with public intoxication, Collier was released at 7:08 a.m. after paying a fine of \$280.

Police are investigating a reported burglary of the girls' softball concession stand on Bell Road.

After being notified at 6:53 p.m. Friday, police said no indications of forced entry were found, but the stock of candy had been taken.

Four hours after Tammy Wilson turned in a billfold she had found at the laundry in the 300 block of West Bank Friday afternoon, it was returned to its owner.

Tena Brewer Farrington, who according to identification in the billfold, claimed the lost item, and the \$20.76 in cash it contained.

Golf course, paving plan are topics

The tentative agenda for Monday night's regular meeting of the city council includes two topics which are of interest to a great many residents.

They are the possibility of a golf course and overlaying the old concrete pavement in the downtown business area with asphalt.

Details of the two topics were not available at press time, but both were included under the heading of "Administrator's report."

Also on the agenda is a public hearing on development of local housing and community development needs, funded by the Texas Community Development Program.

Monday's meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Members of the council held the second in a series of 1995-96 budget workshops last Monday, and at least one more session is expected before it is finalized.

The map will include all recently-annexed areas, including housing additions which were not on the earlier maps.

Three businesses and one individual placed their memberships in the Chamber during the past month, Dale Cox, president, reported.

They were Gene James Air Conditioning, Park Pharmacy, Texoma Realty and Terri Penaluna.

Though no date was formally set for the city-wide back-to-school garage sale, which is coordinated by the Chamber, directors discussed possibly holding it the first weekend of August.

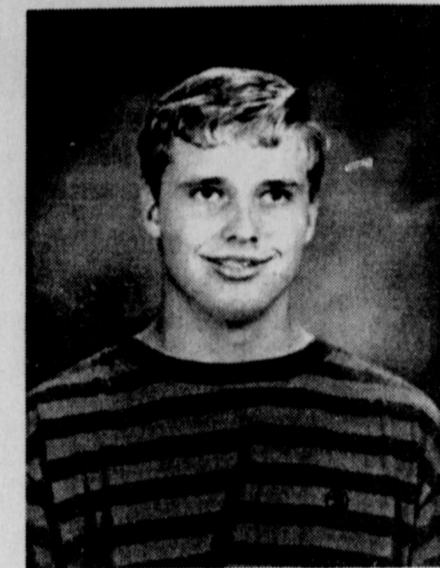

For a little over a year, Cindy (Mrs. Jerry) Clifton has been concentrating on preparing low-fat meals and snacks.

For health reasons, Cindy and Jerry began a program of exercising and watching the fat content in their diet.

Cindy uses a lot of fresh fruits and vegetables, and has cut back on the amount of red meat they eat. She has also learned to cook with chicken broth instead of oil.

Cindy said occasionally they treat themselves to a meal where they are not counting fat grams. But, for the most part, they have stayed on their diet. As a result, in the past year Jerry has lost 40 pounds and Cindy has lost around 30.

Cindy has accumulated quite a few recipes for low-fat cooking, and she is sharing some of those with us this week.

Cindy grew up in Wichita Falls and is a graduate of Rider High School. She said she spent a lot of time in Iowa Park visiting her grandparents during those years. Her grandfather, William Travis Lee, was one of the first blacksmiths in Iowa Park, and built the metal steeple on the First Presbyterian Church. Cindy was working at Wichita General Hospital when she met Jerry.

Jerry was born in Hollister, Okla., and moved to Wichita Falls when he was 15. He is a graduate of Wichita Falls High School. In Iowa Park, he worked 12 years for Shaw Motor Co.,

11 years for Bill Bates Chevrolet, and over five years for Auto Craft Engine Repair. Last September, the Clifton's opened their own business, JC's Automotive, where Cindy works as office manager.

Their daughter Krista Murphy, 24, lives in Wichita Falls and has two children, Leighton, four, and Brianna, two-years-old. Donnie, their 18-year-old son, is a student at Iowa Park High School.

In her spare time, Cindy likes to crochet and read. She is on the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, and Jerry is a member of the Noon Lions Club.

They are active members of First Baptist Church, where Cindy is secretary of the Adult III Sunday School Class, and Jerry is on the church building committee and a bus driver for Chapel Church. They are sponsors of a youth group, and on a team that takes care of Chapel Church.

Low-Cal Chicken

2 1/2 lb. chicken pieces, skinned
1/2 cup water
2 pkgs. instant chicken broth and seasoning mix
1/2 tsp. mustard
2 tsps. Worcestershire sauce
2 or 3 dashes hot sauce
1 clove garlic, minced
2 tsps. curry powder
1 tsp. each of oregano and salt
1/2 tsp. paprika

Arrange chicken pieces in shallow baking dish. Bring water to a boil in sauce pan. Add broth mix; stir until mix is dissolved. Add remaining ingredients; mix well. Pour over chicken. Bake at 350 degrees 1 hour or until chicken is tender.
Yield: 4 servings

Approx. per serving: Cal 194, Prot 36.4 gr, T Fat 3.9 gr, Chol 91.1 mg, Carbo 0.8 gr, Sod 1120.1 mg, Potas 493.2 mg.

Turkey Salad

2 cups chopped cooked turkey
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/4 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped sweet red pepper
1 cup low-fat yogurt
1/4 tsp. curry powder

Combine turkey with celery, onion and red pepper in a bowl; mix well. Add yogurt; mix well. Blend in curry powder. Chill for several hours. Spoon onto lettuce-lined serving plates. Garnish with paprika and sliced ripe olives.

Yield: 4 servings.
Approx per serving: Cal 112, Prot. 16.3 gr, T Fat 2.7 gr, Chol 37.2 mg, Carbo 4.9 gr, Sod 84.8 mg, Potas 343.3 mg.

Mexican Vegetable Dip

1 Tbsp. each olive oil & vinegar
1/4 tsp. garlic salt
1 - 20 oz. can black olives, chopped
2 med. green peppers, chopped
10 green onions, chopped
2 chili peppers, chopped
2 large tomatoes, chopped

Combine olive oil, vinegar, garlic salt and pepper to taste in bowl; mix well. Add chopped vegetables; mix well. Chill overnight; stir to mix. Serve

with tortilla chips. Yield: 96 tablespoons.
Approx per tablespoon: Cal 12, Prot 0.1 gr, T Fat 1.1 gr, Chol 0.0 mg, Carbo 0.5 gr, Sod 43.0 mg, Potas 14.1 mg.

Carrot Dip for Broccoli

3/4 cup cream-style cottage cheese
3 Tbsps. light mayonnaise
2 med. carrots, peeled, grated
3 small dill pickles, finely chopped
1/2 tsp. salt (optional)
1/4 tsp. pepper

Combine cottage cheese and mayonnaise in blender container. Process at high speed until smooth. Mix with remaining ingredients in bowl. Chill. Serve with broccoli flowerets for dipping.

Yield: 48 tablespoons
Approx per tablespoon: Cal 12, Prot 0.6 gr, T Fat 0.9 gr, Chol 1.3 mg, Carbo 0.5 gr, Sod 95.6 mg, Potas 21.9 mg.

Monkey Milk

1 banana, frozen
1 cup low-fat milk
1 tsp. vanilla extract
1 pkt. Equal artificial sweetener
4 ice cubes

Cut banana into fourths. Combine with remaining ingredients in blender container. Process until smooth. Pour into glasses to serve.

Approx per serving: Cal 92, Prot 4.5 gr, T Fat 1.4 gr, Chol 4.9 mg, Carbo 16.4 gr, Sod 61.5 mg, Potas 366.4 mg.

Orange Shake

2 cups vanilla ice cream
1/2 cup frozen orange juice concentrate
2 Tbsps. honey
3 cups milk

Place ice cream in blender container. Add remaining ingredients; process until smooth. Pour into glasses.
Yield: 6 servings

Heidrich gives craft program


Sheryl Heidrich was in charge of the program for the meeting of the Iowa Park Arts and Crafts Association.

Living with Allergies

•Each year, more than 40 millions Americans suffer from allergies. Millions suffer from allergic seasonal rhinitis, also known as hay fever.

•Symptoms of a stuffy head and watery eyes can occur one or more times a year, or they may last all year around.

•Normally harmless substances can cause allergic reactions in sensitive people. These substances, called allergens, can include; pollen from plants, dust mold, foods, and dander (skin particles) from animals.

•Allergens affect different parts of the body. Some of the most common allergy symptoms are:

eyes - itching, tearing, reddening or swelling.

nose - sneezing, itching, congestion or runniness

skin - a rash develops that is almost always itchy and consists of spots that are raised, flat, red or white or hive-like.

digestive tract - nausea, vomiting, cramps or diarrhea from eating a particular food.

•Americans spend an estimated \$500 million each year on allergy treatments. Although there is no cure, there are a number of ways to fight allergies.

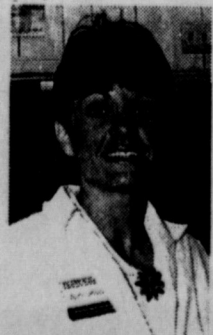
•Over-the-counter medications and prescription medicines can provide temporary relief and are the most common forms of treatment. Immunotherapy (allergy shots) is both expensive and time-consuming, so it is generally used only in severe or chronic situations.

•Avoidance is the simplest therapy. Once an allergen has been identified, the sufferer can try to avoid it.

Also, I've been intending to pay compliment to the vast majority of homeowners who live on Washington Street.

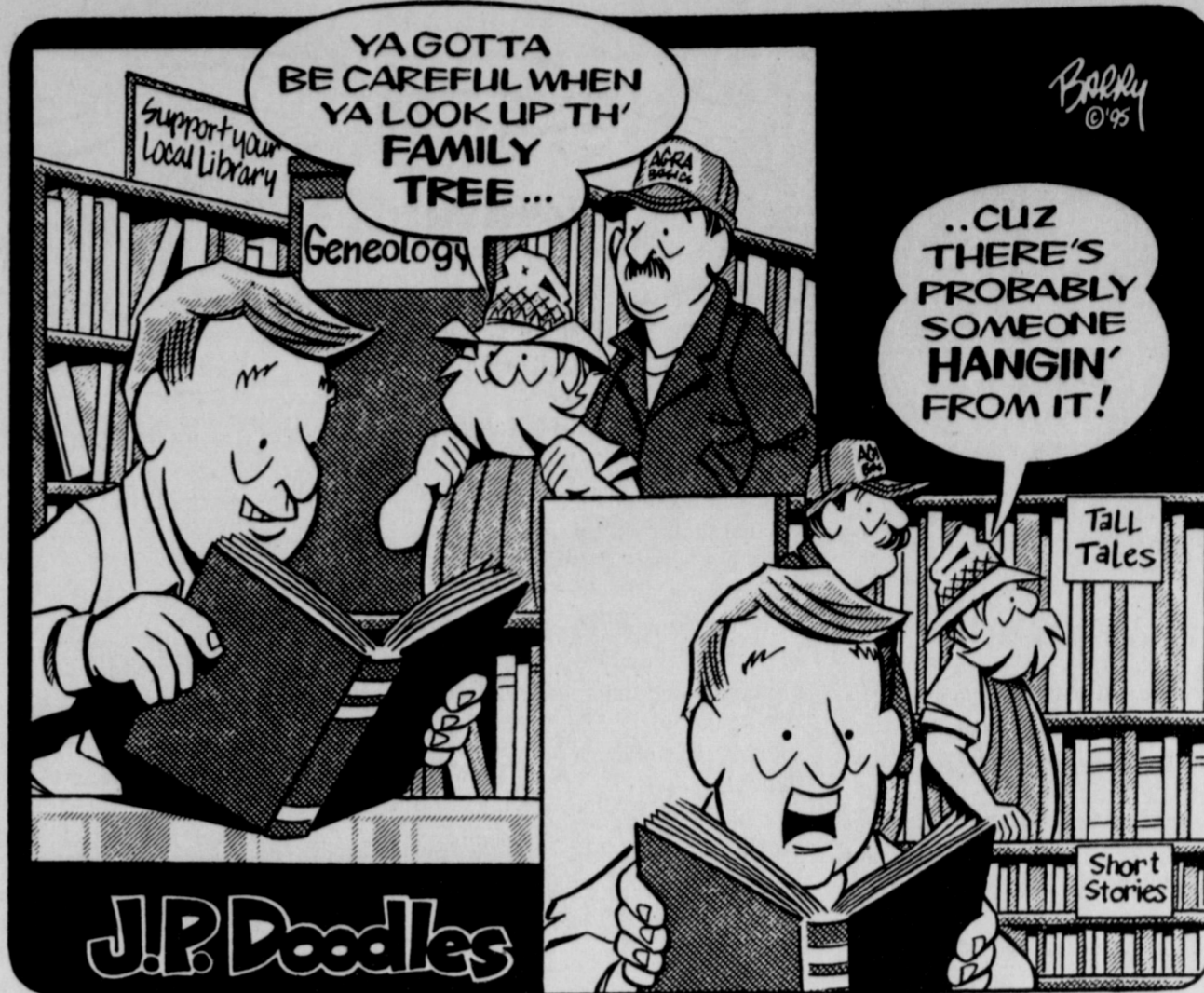
It has become very obvious that the city's rebuilding of that street has prompted a great number of residents to improve their homesteads.

There is a new software program available and you can print top quality blank genealogy forms from a computer program, if you have the equipment.

Genealogy Charts and Forms (called C&F) will print almost any blank genealogy form you could need in your research.

To name a few:
Federal census forms 1790-1920, including 1885 and 1890,
City directory forms,
Family group sheets,
Indian census schedules,
Muster roll forms,
Four-generation ancestral charts,
Five-generation ancestral charts,
Picture ancestral charts,
Cemetery records forms,
And many more aids to keep your records straight.

There are other features, a soundex code generator, a birth data calculator, and a list of state archives, plus other helps.

C&F is available, \$39.99 post-paid, from Design Software, 220 Stella, Burleson, Tx., 76028; (817)-295-8929.

This software requires, IBM or compatible computer with hard drive and 640K of conventional memory; a dot matrix printer capable of emulating an IBM or Epson, or a laser (or inkjet) printer with Hewlett-Packard emulation.

No computer? There is still help in getting some good-looking forms and charts.

The Skeleton Closet, P.O. Box 91392, Louisville, Ky. 40291, offers a catalogue for \$2.50 postpaid. There is a complete line of forms and charts offered plus organizer notebooks and packets. All designed to aid the researcher.

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING

Heavy rains across the Texoma region have created numerous plant problems for both home gardeners and agricultural producers.

Some of the more common landscape and gardening questions we have received at the county extension office and the answers are listed:

Q. My red oak is dropping an abnormal amount of leaves which have unusual blotches on the leaf surface. The tree is 20 years old and I don't want to lose it.

A. Recent rains have resulted in a disease problem on red oak and live oak called Anthracnose. This disease causes some defoliation and tree stress, however, no effective fungicide application can be made at this time. Rake and remove all fallen leaves. Maintain the tree with regular fertilization and irrigation during the dry mid-summer months. Rarely will this problem completely kill a tree unless heavy rainfall persists and heavy defoliation results. Oaks which are heavily defoliated should be treated with a fungicide such as Daconil 2787 at budbreak next spring.

Q. If it time to spray for control of casebearer on pecan trees?

A. A wet and cool spring resulted in later egg findings on area pecan trees. This week and weekend are really the first dry periods which offered a window for control spray applications. Apply malathion or Dipel (an organic control) to pecan trees with a crop of young developing nutlets. Remember to retreat in 42 days for the second generation of this pecan pest.

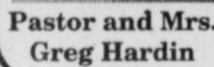

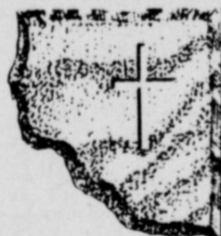

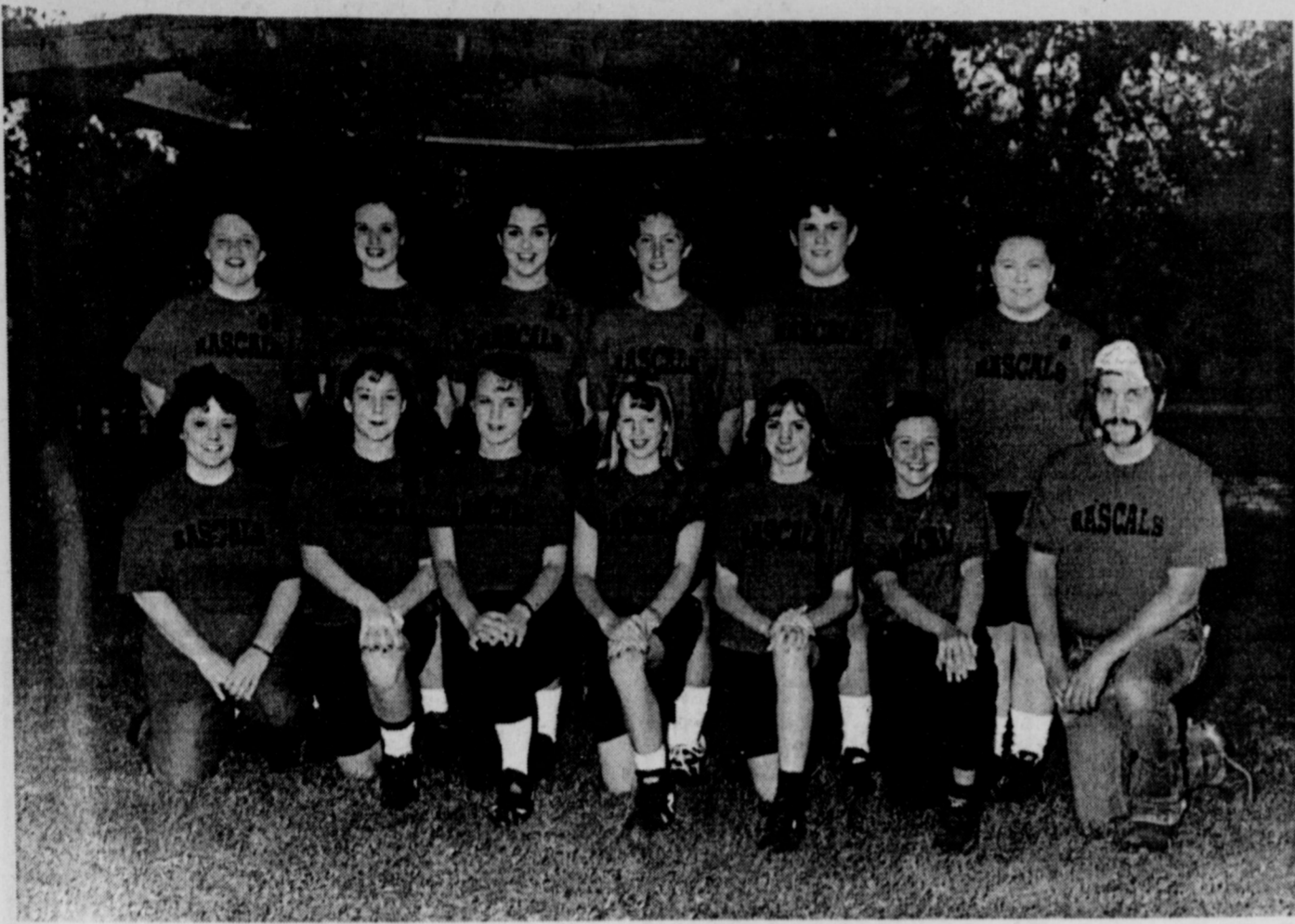

Cookie jar collector

and airy, the cabinetry is painted white and the appliances are all white.

The 1950s battleship green linoleum was replaced with black and white checkerboard tile. "But the covering that was on the floor was still in good shape," Marilyn said.

The cabinet has the same two-inch solid oak top and the same white cast iron sink, both in mint condition. "Look at this sink, not a chip in it," Marilyn exclaimed. They did replace the faucets with more modern ones.

A shelf above the kitchen window and above the door that leads into the hall provide other places for the display of cookie jars.

There is a shelf divider between the breakfast area and the den. And yes, these shelves are filled with figural cookie jars, as is the shelf above the double windows in the breakfast area.

Wallpaper in this area has a white background with a tiny red apple print and a larger apple print border.

A white cotton valance over the double windows, matching the curtains on the kitchen door that leads into the utility room, and the valance on the window above the kitchen sink have stenciled red apples marching across the lower edge. They are replicas of those on the wallpaper border.

The current owners are not strangers to Iowa Park. Mrs. Morris is the former Marilyn White. Her mother, Pauline still lives in the same house she and her husband, the late Ruben White, bought in 1946 and where Marilyn and her siblings spent their childhood.

Marilyn would have graduated Iowa Park High School with the class of 1962, had not cupid (in the form of Paul Morris) intervened. They were married in December 1959 and moved from Iowa Park.

Paul lived in Graham until the mid-1950s when his dad, the late Fred Morris, moved his family here. Paul's mother, Dovie, is a resident of IHS of Iowa Park.

Paul worked in the metroplex for Coca-Cola Company of Dallas 20 years and they lived in Hurst. They moved to Bowie while he was still working for the company and lived there nine years. Marilyn worked for the Bowie newspaper.

After 30 years away Marilyn was ready to return to Iowa Park. They moved back in 1989 and Paul is now an independent trucker.

This information gives insight to the unique decor in the utility room and the special interests they have in their den.

An old Coca-Cola dispensing machine dominates the decor in the utility room. Coca-Cola bottles parade across the wallpaper border.

Just above the washing machine is a "clothes line" of heavy string and on it hang wooden cut-outs of shirts, dresses, pants and other wearables.

There is an old wooden ironing board in the room. But, about the first

thing one notices on entry to the utility is an old sign that reads "Sam Hill's 5 and 10 cent Store."

When Marilyn was growing up her family lived across the street from the late Sam and Jesse Hill and always thought they were so special. She remembers the great times she and other kids had going to Sam Hill's 5 and 10 cent Store in those days. They could find so many things to buy and so many things they wanted and Sam always made their visit something special.

She also remembers when that sign that now hangs in her utility room hung from the awning in front of the store and how all the kids would jump up and try to hit the sign as they walked along the sidewalk.

The ironing board belonged to Mrs. Hill and when Marilyn took the bed sheets from around the board that was used for padding, she also found an old Iowa Park newspaper that had a Hill store ad featuring the Depression glass pattern she had on her table for \$1.99 a place setting.

When the Hill Estate sale was held Marilyn and Paul purchased several pieces. Above the windows in the den is a shelf that holds, in addition to more cookie jars, Sam Hill's mess kit that he carried while serving in World War I.

Also on the shelf is a sailor cookie jar sent to her by her sister in California. Her sister bought one and thought Marilyn needed one because their dad was a sailor and served overseas during the war. Also a Little Red Riding Hood cookie jar is there.

In the den is a White sewing machine frame and she has an antique White sewing machine in the master bedroom, because of the name White.

Focal point in the den is the rugged rock and stone fireplace giving character to the room and serves as a tribute to the first owner, George Lewis. He built it from stones, fossils, petrified wood, and shells of all sizes and shapes collected by him and his wife on vacations, and some their son in Alaska brought to them when he came to visit.

Matching circular designs of fossils are on either side of the fireplace and two matching smaller ones are in the stone above the mantel. They each have a circular niche where Marilyn has placed small ceramic objects. On the mantel are four crock canning jars, vintage 1899, that belonged to Paul's grandmother, and an old glass coal oil lamp, along with other memorabilia.

Underneath the mantel is an 1897 12-gauge Winchester. And on the hearth sits cookie jars of Snoopy and his house.

At one end of the fireplace is a large baker's rack filled with cookie jars. One here is special to Marilyn because it is rare and because it brings memories of when she could buy boxes

of Cracker Jacks with flashers in them. The jar is called a Flasher Clown, as it is moved the eyes flash. Marilyn found it in an antique store in Jacksboro.

Marilyn is almost a collect-a-holic, and Paul isn't far behind. They share a special interest in cookie jars. He likes the western ones and cars best. And he is fond of a Homer Simpson jar they have, but she doesn't care for Homer Simpson.

"I have always liked cookie jars," Marilyn said. "I remember when I was growing up mother had a wooden cookie jar that set on the cabinet and I loved it, but my nephew has already beat me to that one."

"I have been collecting cookie jars about 15 years," Marilyn said. She started out getting one once in a while. In fact when she began seriously collecting them she had only four.

She and her sister, Carolyn Powell, formerly of Iowa Park, now living in Uplands, Ca., were talking on the telephone one time and her sister said, "Guess what I've started collecting". She had two or three more than Marilyn.

Marilyn now has more than 300 and Carolyn has more than 1000. "She has a lot larger house and more places to display them than I do," Marilyn said. She has her holiday cookie jars stored in their basement.

Paul and Marilyn collect the jars while on vacation, or in antique stores and at flea markets. Friends and family see one they think Marilyn should have and bring it to her.

She keeps "my most favorite ones in the china closet in the dining room", she said. These include the first one that started her collection, a Shawnee Mugsy, the puppy with the toothache, and matching salt and pepper shakers. Others in the cabinet are Goldilocks, a majorette, which she says looks just like a niece and that will eventually be hers, an owl, Popeye, Olive Oyl and Sweet Pea, pigs, a cow and several others.

Her newest one is a Harley Davidson gas tank that their son Scott gave her for Mother's Day. Two more of her newer ones are a Betty Boop and a Rio Rita.

There has been an increased interest in collecting cookie jars in the last few years and there are many publications now concerning cookie jar collecting.

There are many companies dedicated to producing unique, high quality limited edition collectible cookie jars.

There are cylinder jars that are shaped like a crock and has a decal in front. The figural jars are the most popular and are actually in the shape of a character such as nursery rhyme characters, or of major personalities like movie stars and characters, or the Walt Disney and Looney Tune characters.

Cookie jar collecting has escalated in the last five years, Marilyn said, and explained "It is becoming

hard to find some of them now".

Many of their jars are Disney characters. Mickey and Minnie Mouse were brought to them in April when her sister and brother-in-law came to visit them. Tweety Bird, the Coca-Cola polar bear, Winnie the Pooh and her tree house. There are clowns, elephants, The Bulldog Cafe, Bugs Bunny, Genie from the Aladdin movie, Little Red Riding Hood, a Fritz and Floyd pirate, to name a few.

Marilyn thinks if anyone wants to start collecting that it would be

good to collect advertising jars, such as M & Ms, or Nestle's Castle, because they are limited. She has those.

Marilyn has another sister and a brother who were raised in Iowa Park, Andrea Cantrell of Iowa Park and Eddie of Wichita Falls.

Paul and Marilyn have three children, two daughters, Rae who works at Bethania Regional Health

Care Center, Carla Herron who lives in Bowie, and a son, Scott who lives in Iowa Park and works in Wichita Falls as a electrician. They also have eight grandchildren.

Marilyn also works at Bethania Regional Health Care Center. She has been employed there five and one-half years.
