Rev. T. H. Masters, pastor of Bible Baptist church of Wichita Falls, conducted the services. He was assisted by Rev. Guy E. Perdue, pastor of the host church, and Cleo Jones, minister of the Church of Christ, and Rev. Odell Parr, missionary, of Dallas.

Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home of Iowa Park.

Palbearers were Bob Prulett of Iowa Park, Burnise Escue and Willie Stowe of Olney, Marvin Parr of Nocona, O. J. Parr of Dallas and H. A. Stowe of Wichita Falls.

Faye was born Aug. 13, 1910, at New Port and moved with her parents to Iowa Park in 1934. The family moved to their present home northeast of Iowa Park in 1941.

Miss Stowe died Thursday afternoon, June 3, in a Wichita Falls hospital after being treated along with her parents for injuries received Tuesday night.

It is reported Mr. and Mrs. Stowe are recovering nicely. Both are able to walk some.

Another daughter, Mrs. Rex Lehman, who was ill at the time of the storm, was hospitalized on Wednesday following the storm, but will be dismissed within the next few days.

Another daughter and family, Mr. and Mrs. John Herrell and two children escaped injury when their house blew away while they were in it. The Herrells were able to salvage a few articles and are now living in the Cecil Chesser house east of the school house.

Miss Stowe is also survived by another sister Mrs. Jack Young of Wichita Falls and a brother Rev. Andy Stowe, also of Wichita Falls.

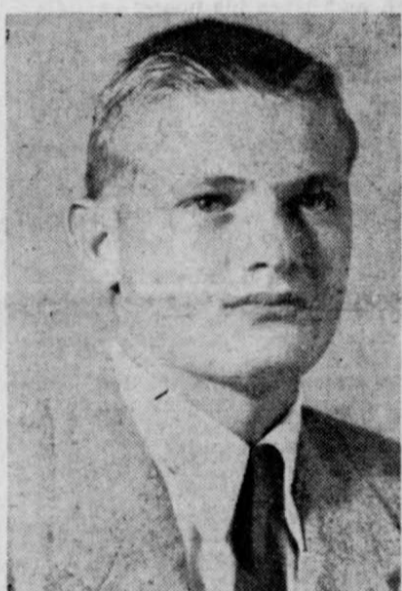

It is given on the following points: initiative, co-operation, leadership, general musicianship, and ability to get along with fellow students and director.

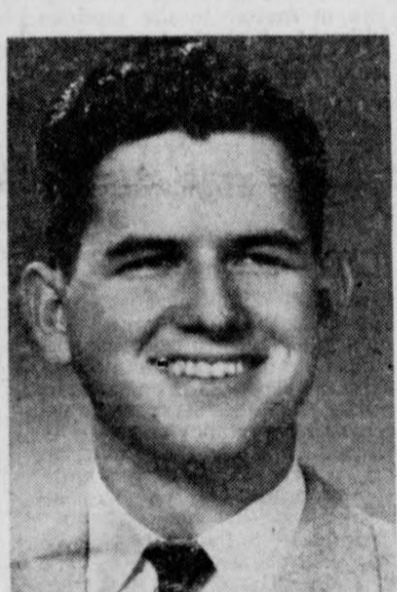
For being a fine bass drummer, a fine person with whom to work, and co-operation plus, Miss Thorn-

A special group of singers from Southwestern Christian college of Terrell will present a special program at the Iowa Park Church of Christ on June 14 at 8:00 p.m., according to Cleo Jones, minister.

This group has been selected from the larger a cappella chorus of the Negro school and consists of quartets, sextets and other special arrangements. The chorus has attracted favorable attention in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Colorado, New Mexico and Louisiana.

The college is fully approved for training of veterans. Founded in 1950, the Terrell school is directed by a board of trustees composed of both White and Negro members. Primarily it seeks to train young people for active church service, while at the same time providing a standard junior college education. Singing is emphasized in all of the activities of the college, and over half of the students of the past year were in the college chorus.

SWCC has a faculty staff of 12 persons and has matriculated more than 300 students in its short history. Many of the graduates of the junior college are now enrolled in standard colleges and universities, and others are receiving a terminal third year of work at Southwestern.

The Perdue family has made many friends not only among their own congregation but also in the community. It is with regret that Iowa Park friends see the family go, for they have indeed added richly to community life.

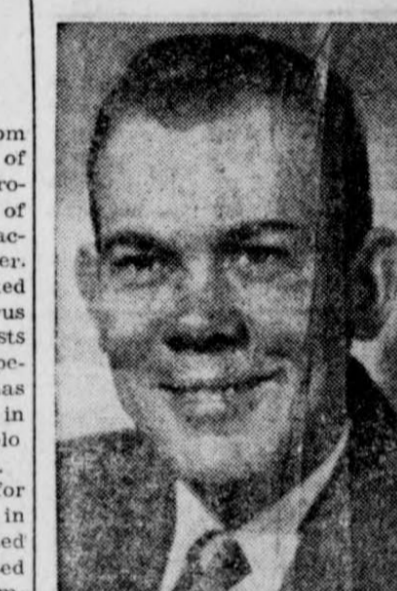
Mr. and Mrs. Anderson are to arrive here on Thursday of this week, and he will preach his first sermon at the morning worship service.

"Searchlight on TB" Program Set for June 29 in Wichita Falls

An invitation labeled "very special" is extended through the Herald by Mrs. W. R. Shirk, regional chairman for Area 3 "Searchlight on TB," to residents of Wichita county to attend a 12 county meeting in Wichita Falls on Tuesday, June 29. The assembly room of Wichita General hospital will be the meeting. Scheduled for 1:30 p.m. the business will be concluded by 4:00.

Emphasizing that this is not a fund raising drive but a fact finding survey on tuberculosis, Mrs. Shirk says delegations will be given instructions and an operation kit to use as a guide in conducting their surveys.

"Because tuberculosis is contagious, plus the fact the victim usually experiences no symptom to warn of the presence of the disease in its early stages, TB control becomes a community responsibility.

"It is time for Texans to band together to fight tuberculosis with co-ordinated efforts, concrete information and a unified plan of action. Of the 48 states, 40 have lower TB death rates than Texas," association officials declare.

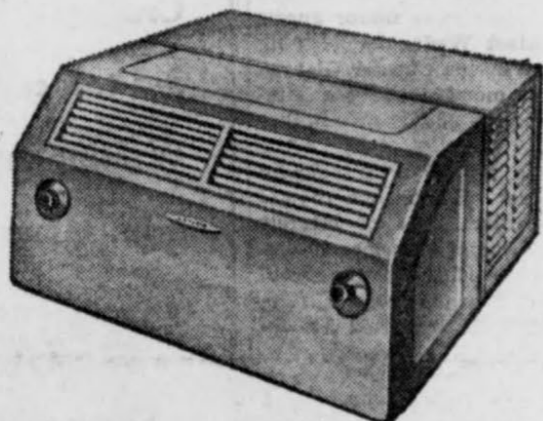

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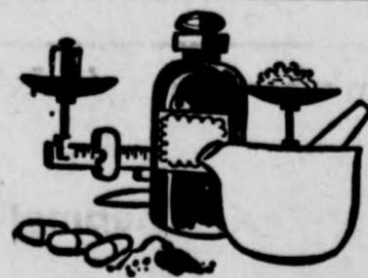
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
