Fun at the water holes

Two of Iowa Park's areas with water are expected to be extremely busy places Tuesday.

That's the July 4th holiday, for those who haven't consulted their calendars.

The two places are Lake Iowa Park and the Bicentennial Swimming Pool.

The City of Iowa Park has an ordinance forbidding the setting off of any type of fireworks.

However, as it has in the past, the city will allow fireworks at the lake on that day, as result of a proclamation issued by Mayor Wayne House.

Pointing out that fireworks often cause problems for the volunteer fire department and property owners, the mayor stated that the lake area could be used only on July 4th for fireworks.

In addition, he encouraged "...all individuals using the site exercise safe judgement and remove any debris associated with their actions."

Additional trash receptacles will be placed at the lake for use of citizens.

The city has improved the lake area considerably over the past couple of years, by paving a parking area at the boat launch site and erecting covered

picnic tables.

In addition, Hammond Park, next to the paved area, now has a covered pavilion with numerous tables, some playground equipment, and also, for the first time, restrooms for the public.

To reach the lake area, residents should turn west off Johnson Road onto the highway access road, then north on Wigley Road, which is near the highway rest area.

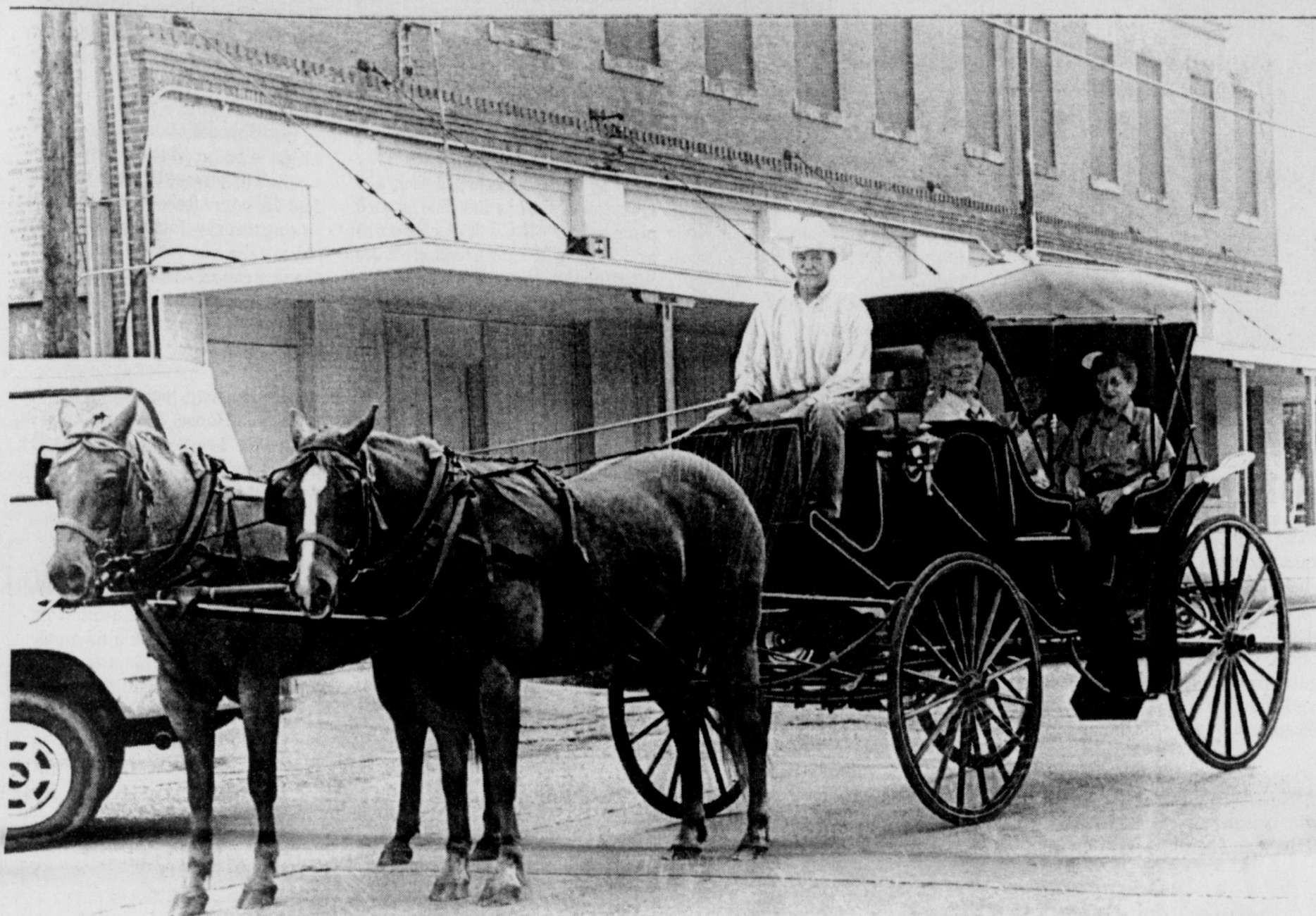
SWIMMING POOL

Paving, golf course in plans

Paving of downtown area streets, possibilities of a golf course, and economic development were the key topics discussed during Monday's regular meeting of the city council.

The first of a series of public hearings relating to economic development included an overview of the program by Shelly Green, a representative of Governmental Service Agency.

Basically, she explained the use of Texas Capitol Funds, which provides grants through the State's Commerce Department for municipal improvements and job creation and retention.

Such a grant is being sought by the city to be used to assist Bell Processing develop a major industry on its property southwest of the city.

Bell intends to construct a facility primarily for recycling plant which would employ several dozen persons.

The second public hearing on the project is tentatively scheduled for July 10.

Included in this year's paving program, the city plans to overlay most of the downtown business district streets with asphalt. Some of the preparatory work, such as filling in cracks in the concrete, is already underway.

Mayor Wayne House told the council he would like to separate the

parking area on the east side of the 300 block of North Wall, from the street, with a divider of some sort.

He suggested a series of gas lights on islands, to carry out the gas light theme already in place on West Park.

The purpose of the addition, House explained, is to separate parking area from street, because that area of Wall is so wide. The city's right of way extends all the way to the business walls, he said, and some drivers appear to be either careless or confused as to where the right of way exists.

Plans for various methods of achieving the separation will be drawn for consideration of the council, Mike Price, city administrator, said.

Paving of the business district is to commence within the next three weeks, aldermen were told.

Efforts are being coordinated for the construction of a public golf course northwest of the city, Mayor House said.

An Oklahoma business man, identified as Don Barnes, is negotiating for the purchase of property between US 287 and Lake Iowa Park, from owner Gene Wigley.

At the same time, a 99-year lease agreement for 58 acres of city-owned land, on the west side of the lake, is being drafted. The lease includes language dealing with use of water from

the lake for irrigation purposes.

Wigley, who was in the audience, told the council he and Barnes were very close on a price for his land, but he had not seen nor heard from Barnes in more than a week.

Aldermen approved a resolution which would authorize the contractor currently working on a project in the Quail Valley area to install a sewer line which would serve the new Indian Springs Addition.

Price for the new project will be \$22,040, aldermen were informed.

Aldermen voted to accept the formal audit of the city's finances for the year 1993-94, which was only recently completed.

The mayor said he had talked with a representative of the auditing firm and received a promise that the 1994-

Light week for police

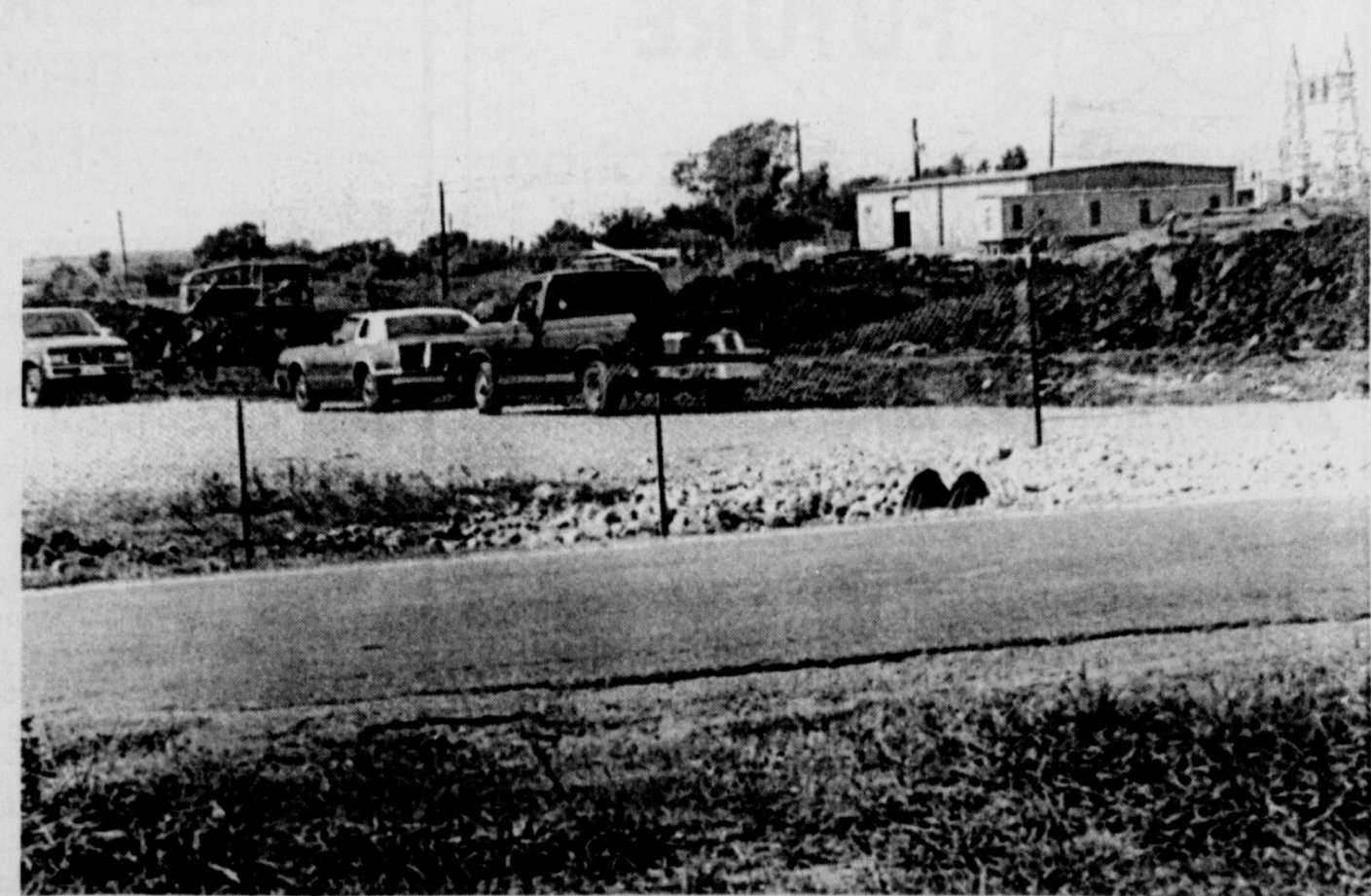
Only one arrest was made by Iowa Park police during the past week, a drastic departure from the two previous weeks, according to the police blotter.

Poppy Seed Chicken

- 6-8 boneless chicken breasts
- 8 oz. sour cream
- 2 cans cream of chicken soup
- 2 cups crushed Ritz crackers
- 3 Tbsps. poppy seed
- 1 1/2 sticks butter

Bake chicken and cut up. Place chicken pieces in buttered casserole dish. Mix soup and sour cream, then heat in a saucepan and pour over chicken. Mix poppy seeds and crackers. Place on top. Melt butter and pour over top. Bake 30-40 minutes at 350 degrees. This recipe can easily be halved.

more cherry chewbiles

Spread cherry pie filling over cheese layer. Combine reserved coarsely chopped nuts and reserved crumbs. Sprinkle evenly over cherries. Return to oven. Bake 15 minutes longer. Cool. Refrigerate several hours. Cut into bars, about 2x1 1/2 inches.

Onion-Roasted Potatoes

- 1 envelope dry onion or onion-mushroom soup mix
 - 2 lbs. all-purpose potatoes, cut into large chunks
 - 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- Pre-heat oven to 450 degrees. In large plastic bag or bowl, add all ingredients. Close bag and shake, or toss in bowl, until potatoes are evenly coated. Empty potatoes into shallow baking or roasting pan; discard bag. Bake, stirring occasionally, 40 minutes or until potatoes are tender and golden brown. Garnish, if desired, with chopped fresh parsley. Makes 8 servings.

COOK OF THE WEEK

Nutty Broccoli

- 1 large bunch broccoli, tough ends removed
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 2 Tbsps. all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 cups chicken broth
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- Dash pepper
- 2 Tbsps. shortening
- 1/3 cup coarsely chopped walnuts
- 2 Tbsps. fine bread crumbs

Cut tops off broccoli, leaving 2-inch flowerettes. Peel remaining stalks; cut in 2-inch pieces. (Cut large pieces in halves or quarters length-wise.) There should be about 3 cups stalk pieces and 6 cups flowerettes.

Heat 1 quart of water to boiling in a 3-quart saucepan. All stalk pieces; boil gently for 5 to 7 minutes until crisp-tender. Drain; rinse under cold water. Melt 1/4 cup shortening in a medium skillet over moderate heat. Stir in flour. Cook for 1 minute. Gradually stir in chicken broth; bring to boiling. Cook and stir until sauce is slightly thickened and smooth. Add stalk pieces, flowerettes, salt, and pepper. Partly cover and simmer 10 minutes or until tender.

Melt remaining 2 tablespoons shortening in a small skillet over moderate heat. Stir in walnuts and bread crumbs; cook 3 to 4 minutes or until browned. Put vegetable mixture into a serving bowl. Sprinkle with walnut mixture.

Easy Mixer Rolls

- 2 pkgs. active dry yeast
- 2 cups warm water (110-115 degrees)
- 1/2 cup instant nonfat dry milk
- 3 Tbsps. sugar
- 1 Tbsp. salt
- 1/3 cup shortening, melted
- 5 1/2 to 6 cups all-purpose flour

Sprinkle yeast over warm water in a large mixer bowl. Add dry milk, sugar, salt, melted shortening, and 3 cups flour. Blend at low speed until moistened. Then beat for 3-4 minutes at medium speed. Using a spoon, stir in enough remaining flour to make a soft dough. Turn dough onto a lightly floured surface and knead until smooth and elastic. Roll out dough and shape into crescents. Arrange crescents and twists on ungreased cookie sheets. Cover. Let rise in a warm place until doubled (about 45 minutes).

(Crescent: roll dough into two 12-inch circles. Brush with melted butter. Cut each into 16 wedges. Roll up wedge toward point. Place point down on cookie sheet; curve ends.

Cherry Chewbiles

- Crust:**
- 1 cup walnut pieces, divided
- 1 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup butter-flavored shortening
- 1/2 cup flake coconut
- Filling:**
- 2 - 8 oz. pkgs. cream cheese, softened
- 2/3 cup granulated sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 tsps. vanilla
- 1 - 21 oz. can cherry pie filling

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease 13x9x2-inch pan with butter-flavored shortening. Set aside. Chop 1/2 cup nuts coarsely for topping. Set aside. Chop remaining 1/2 cup nuts finely. For crust, combine flour and brown sugar. Cut in butter-flavored shortening until fine crumbs form. Add 1/2 cup finely chopped nuts and coconut. Mix well. Remove 1/2 cup and set aside. Press remaining crumbs in bottom of pan. Bake at 350 degrees 12 to 15 minutes, until edges are lightly browned.

For filling, beat cream cheese, granulated sugar, eggs and vanilla in small bowl at medium speed of electric mixer until smooth. Spread over hot baked crust. Return to oven and bake 15 minutes longer.

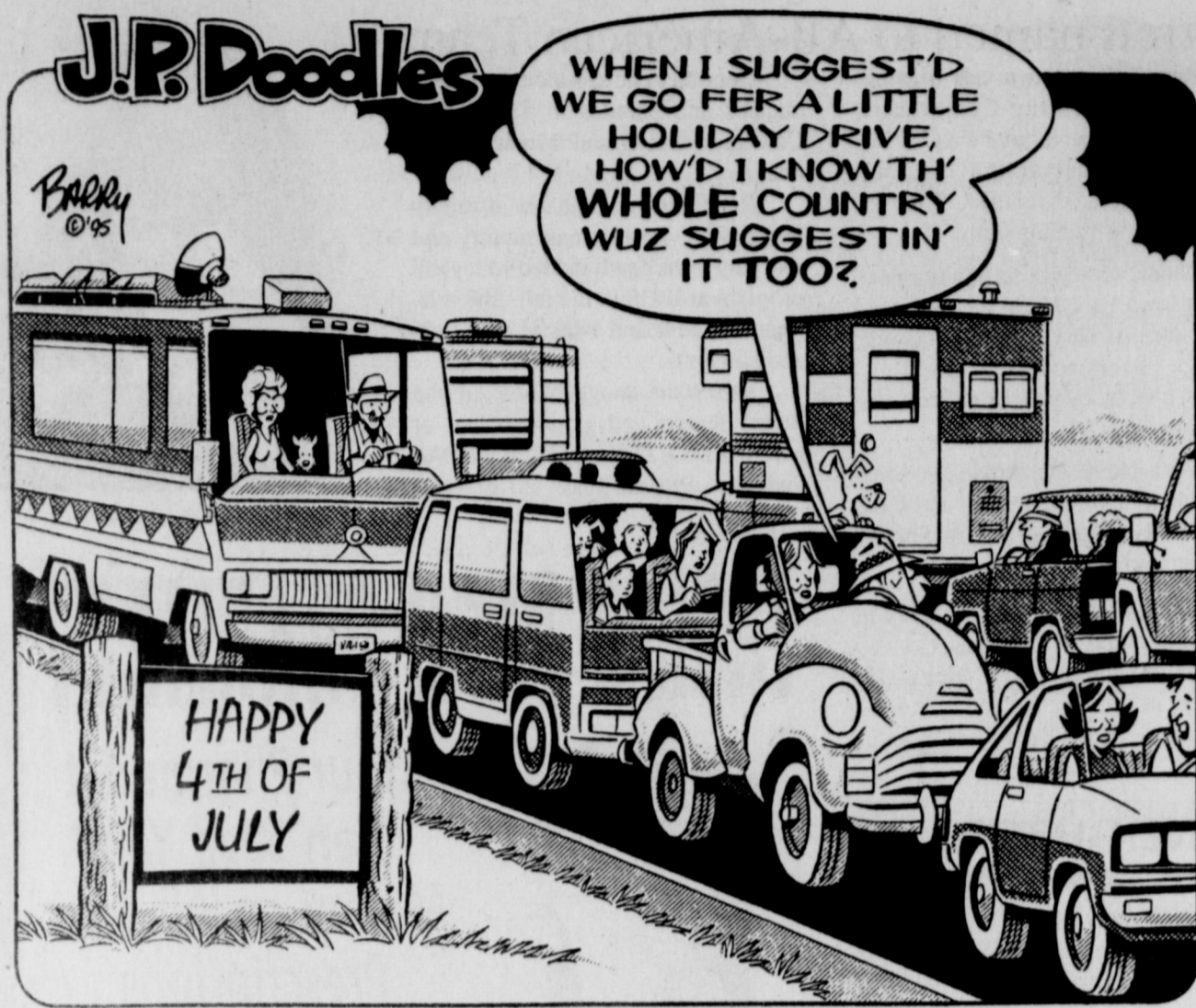

As I See It...



Finally, some level-headed politicians have been making their voices heard in Washington, D.C.

The Senate has approved legislation which, if supported by the House, allow individual states to establish their speed limits on highways.

Oh, the big-city, bleeding-heart liberals who know only the congestion of the northeast and west coast areas are crying foul. But, hopefully, their control will give way to more common sense, realistic thinking.

Like most folks, I didn't complain too loudly when the feds reduced the speed limits on all highways to 55 mph some 20 years ago, primarily the affect of the oil embargo which led to a shortage of gasoline.

Nor did I whine when congress enacted considerable legislation which demanded the automobile manufacturers develop more fuel-efficient vehicles.

But I got on my horse when the bureaucrats decided to raise the speed limit to 65 mph, but on federal highways only.

States were forced to maintain their 55 mph limits on their own roads, or their share of monies they send to Washington wouldn't be returned for funding of roadways, which all depend on. We're talking billions of bucks!

That seemed to me very pompous. It implied that federal highways were better, and safer, than state highways.

To imply to me that US 287, with its divided four-lane roadway was not as good as I-35, with portions literally falling apart, was a better, safer road just wasn't convincing enough.

My first real taste of the 55 mph speed limit came early on after the legislation took affect.

I attended a regional press meeting at Fort Stockton, and had to make the trip by myself. That's a long, long way from Iowa Park.

Wanting to obey the law, I stuck with the new speed limit. By the time I had passed through Abilene, I was already fighting boredom by singing to myself, and even slapping my face in an effort to stay awake.

Anyone who does any traveling knows that few, if any, drivers stay at the speed limits of 55 or even 65. That is, unless there's a DPS trooper visible.

And it's rare to ever see a truck on the highway obeying the speed limit.

A realization of how boring it is, to drive at 55, is to have been traveling at a legal 65, and then shut it down to the state's limited allowance.

That's what we experienced Saturday, when returning from a meeting in Austin.

After driving all the way from Austin to north of I-35, we were supposed to shut it down to 55 mph.

Right! Do that, and you'll be run over from behind.

In all truthfulness, I fudge on the speed limit. I set my cruise control three to four miles an hour over whatever the posted speed limit is when I'm on a highway.

And I'm usually passed by every motorist headed in the same direction.

Politicians who represent more congested states just have no idea about how expansive the western states are.

And I loved a comment by an Oklahoma senator who pointed out, during a flood debate, that people in this part of the country do care about safety and are sensitive to the dangers of wrecks.

Gov. Bush has said he will welcome a change in the federal laws pertaining to speed limits on state highways.

Like Bo. Bush knows!

Worth Quoting

Congress' budget debate would be much more honest, and perhaps more fruitful, if we cleaned up some of our thinking about what is a right and what isn't.

People say they have rights to medical care, decent housing and food, even if they can't pay for them. If those goodies aren't forthcoming, somehow their rights have been violated.

Let's discuss rights some more.

Imagine I met an attractive young lady. I ask her to marry me. Suppose she says no. Have my rights been violated?

Or suppose I ask to live in your house, and you say no. Have you violated my rights to decent housing?

Finally, suppose I ask you for a job, and you say, "No! I refuse to hire you because you are too tall, and I don't like tall people." Have you violated my rights?

In any meaningful sense of the term "rights," none of those acts constitutes a violation of my rights.

True rights, such as those in the Constitution, exist simultaneously among people. The exercise of a right by one person doesn't diminish those held by another and imposes no obligations on others except those of non-interference.

To say people have rights to housing, medical care and jobs is absurd.

Those "rights can be realized only by the government imposing burdens on others. For the government to guarantee a "right" to housing, it must diminish other people's rights to their earnings.

Now, let's call these newfangled rights to housing, medical care and jobs "wishes." What do you suppose would happen?

No doubt, the average American would cringe at the thought of the government punishing one person because he refused to make someone else's wish come true.

For example, if I had a wish for a five-bedroom house, and Congress told its agents at the Internal Revenue Service to take other people's money to make my wish come true, you wouldn't think much of Congress.

Americans would find it easier to live with their consciences, and would find Congress' actions more palatable, if it were said I had a "right" to a five-bedroom house. After all, it is Congress' job to protect rights.

We can compare rights and wishes another way. Suppose someone used force to prevent another from speaking, and I stepped in to protect that person's right to speak.

Then suppose I saw a homeless person and did privately exactly what government does -- take someone's money to guarantee that homeless person's "right" to housing.

In the first case, most people probably would call me a hero; in the second, I would be called a despicable thief.

Separating wishes from rights has great relevance to today's federal budget debate. After all, Congress' making wishes come true constitutes two-thirds of federal spending.

Kids say the damdest things... and they write the damdest things, too.

Now a lot of kids would probably experience a punishment just short of death for spray painting a message on their house.

But Becky said she can't decide if she should get too annoyed.

In big white letters on the back of their red brick house he painted two messages: "I love you mommy" and "God rules."

I think he's going to get away with it.

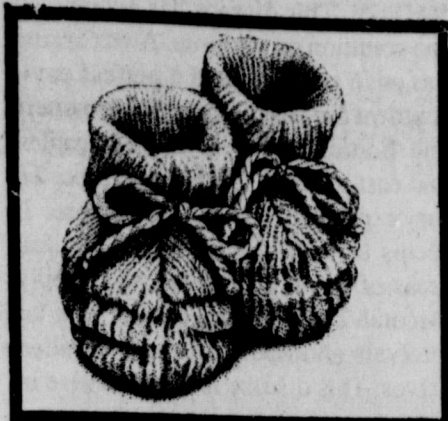

Corey Britt graduated from the Oklahoma City Fire Training Academy Friday, June 23.

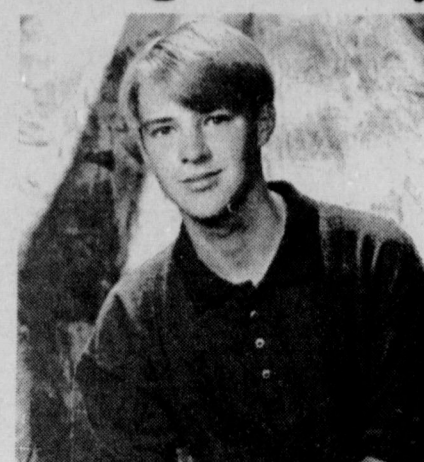
There were 2257 applicants for the positions. Only 30 young men were taken from this list after completing testing qualifications.

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

A rainy spring has created numerous disease problems.

The following questions/answers should help Texas gardeners control some of the most prevalent problems.

Q. My roses have black colored spots on the foliage. How can I control this?

A. This very common problem of roses is called black spot. A wet spring has really caused an outbreak of this disease. Apply Funginex fungicide every 10-14 days as a control. Also rake and remove any fallen leaves below the roses. Rose research is heavily focused on identifying varieties with greater black spot resistance. I have lists of some survivable-with-little-fungicides roses available at the Wichita County Extension Office.

Q. I have a very large pecan tree in my backyard where my St. Augustine lawn is thinning out. I was told that this was Take-All Patch. What can I apply or have applied to save my lawn?

A. Don't jump to conclusions too fast. Take-All Patch has been identified in some warm-season lawns, however, a great deal of incorrect diagnosis has been made. A laboratory test should be used to determine if you really have Take-All Patch. Fall is the ideal time frame for a control application if your test is positive. The more likely cause of your lawn decline is an

excessive amount of shade. St. Augustine prefers full-sun and will only tolerate shade up to a certain limit. If your back yard receives very little sunlight then consider using a shade tolerant groundcover or removing the lower limbs of your pecan tree to increase the amount of sunlight.

Q. My Red Tip Photinia is developing circular spots and dropping leaves. I have noticed several other plantings in Wichita Falls which are also doing the same thing.

A. The problem is a fungal leaf spot which is called Entomosporium

leaf spot. This disease has become all too common on photinia. A wet spring has once again created a perfect environment for this disease. Homeowners and horticulturists in the Metroplex and east to south Texas have reported major problems with this disease. It seems to be worse in higher rainfall areas of Texas and Oklahoma. Apply Daconil 2787 or Funginex at regular intervals and rake and remove fallen leaves. This disease is not as severe in Texas as in other areas, however, pay attention to your plants and treat as needed.

Attend Church Sunday

Concealed handgun requirements outlined

Texans interested in obtaining a license to carry a concealed handgun will be able to start the required firearms training program as soon as the law goes into effect on Sept. 1, DPS Director James R. Wilson announced.

"We have an internal task force up and running to do what needs to be done to make this new law work," Wilson said.

"We anticipate that we will start training firearms instructors this summer and our goal is to have these instructors licensed and able to start training interested citizens after Sept. 1."

Wilson said the Department is currently developing forms, procedures, and rules in order to begin accepting applications for concealed handgun licenses on Sept. 1.

"Texans need to remember that the current weapons laws remain in effect until Jan. 1, 1996," Wilson emphasized.

"In the meantime, we ask the public's patience as we get this program set up. We will make an announcement to the public when our training classes have been set, with instructions on how to enroll. But the Department is not currently accepting fees or application requests for instructors or licenses."

The director cautioned that no firearms instructors or training facilities have been approved by the department at this time.

"When instructors and training facilities have been approved, this information will be released to the public. We will be issuing periodic up-

dates to keep the public informed on policies and procedures as they are developed," he said.

When application request cards for licenses are available, which is expected to be mid-August, they will be distributed to all areas of the state, Wilson said. Applicants who meet the basic qualifications will be able to submit these request forms to the DPS at that time.

The director also stressed that under the new concealed handgun law, a private or public employer has the right to prohibit those with concealed handgun licenses from carrying a concealed weapon on the premises of the business.

Insect Bites

The best protection against insect bites is prevention. Following these steps will reduce your risk of getting bitten:

- Wear shoes outdoors.
- Don't wear perfume, or bright flowery prints outdoors.
- Don't eat sweet foods like watermelon or ice cream outdoors.
- Be aware that gardens, orchards and garbage areas attract insects.
- Always have an insect sting kit available.
- If you are allergic to insect stings, wear a "Medi-Alert" tag.
- If fleas are a problem, vacuum infested rooms and spray with a flea killer.

Treat animals according to instructions from your vet.

- When at home, or on the road, make sure you have plenty of insect repellent available.
- For ticks: avoid brush areas and check skin and clothing thoroughly. If a tick bites, put a drop of kerosene, benzene, or gasoline on the head of the tick. Wait 20 minutes. Then, with tweezers gently pull the tick off.
- If you will be travelling overseas, check with your pharmacist, doctor, or local U.S. Public Health Service. Some insect bites can cause serious or even fatal reactions, and you need to be informed and prepared.

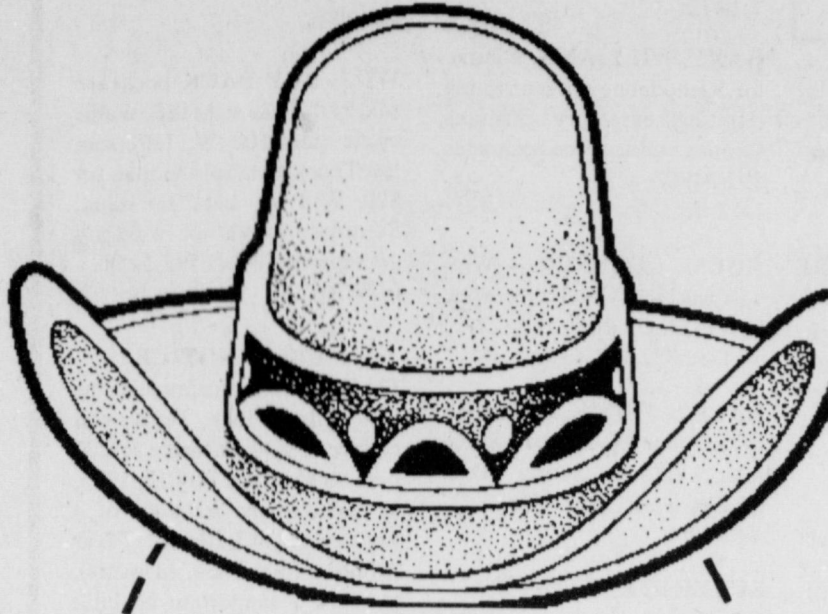
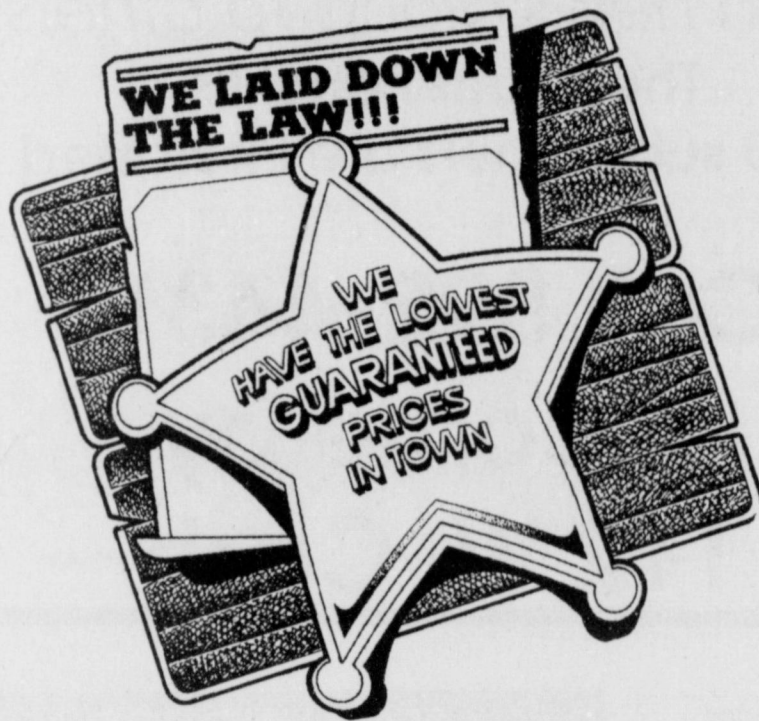

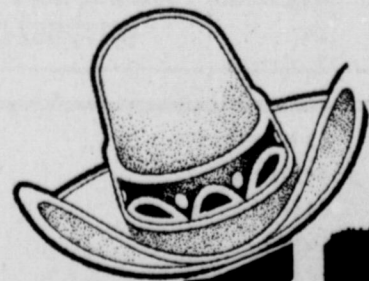
