Enrollment on first day 4th-highest

First-day enrollment in Iowa Park schools produced no surprises to administrators, who had predicted more students than last year.

Thursday's enrollment of 2,094 was the fourth-highest ever recorded here on the first day of classes, and surprassed last year's mark of 2,088 by six pupils.

The 1970 first-day record of 2,292 still remains the highest-ever mark here, followed by 2,188 in 1971 and 2,110 in 1973.

The largest student enrollment reported was at the high school campus, which had 610. The count at the junior high was 529, and 468 at Bradford and 487 at Kidwell.

Traditionally, enrollment continues to grow until just after the Labor Day holiday, as some families do not time their home moving until then.

BIKE RIDERS COMING Traffic interruptions here Saturday morning

Iowa Park residents may have to alter their traveling routes somewhat Saturday morning, because of the new routing of the Hotter'n Hell Hundred bicycle race.

The 100-mile race route this year will exit Wichita Falls on Scott Street, and head west on Old Iowa Park

Highway, causing both west-bound lanes to be closed to vehicular traffic until the riders pass through.

Upon entry in Iowa Park, their route has caused the closing of the streets east, north and west of the block on which the city hall, post office and fire department are located.

Those streets, which will be blocked off from about 6:30 a.m. until shortly before 12-noon, include 100 North Bond, 100 East Cash and 100 North Wall.

Residents wishing to do business at the post office Saturday morning will have to park in the block north, and walk to their destination.

Purpose of that routing is to utilize the city hall park as an official rest stop, according to organizers of the race.

Once riders return to the old highway from Wall, they will turn south on Yosemite, and follow FM 368 to FM 367, and continue westward to SH 25.

Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept. personnel have organized a plan of action, should an emergency be called in during the riders' stay in the city.

Some of the personnel will be in the south part of town, and will use equipment at the south station, if called to a location in that area.

All equipment in the main station, which is located in the city hall block, will be moved to a location two blocks north, on East Park, according to Chief Danny Skinner.

In addition to Saturday's race through here, an additional event has been scheduled Friday which can affect traffic between here and Electra.

The new event, called a time trial, will commence on Business 287 just east of Electra, and end at Harmony Road. The outside lane of US 287 will be closed while that race is underway.

The Harmony Road exit will be closed to all south-bound traffic until the race is finished and riders cleared from the area.

The time trial is scheduled to begin at 10 a.m., and continue until all the riders, expected to be at least 200 men and an undertermined number of women, are started at varying intervals.

within a 100 mile radius of her birthplace, except when she lived in Elgin. Her family moved into Ardmore


when she was in the seventh grade . When she was a freshman, she and Cecil were in a class together. Soon they began dating, and the rest is history.

Gay Campbell Williams, alumni president has selected "Texas, Our Texas" for the celebration theme.



That takes him up to \$57,264. How in the world did our county judge, back in 1985, ever get along on


only \$35,912?

AUSTIN - School districts can now raise their property taxes to pay for enrollment increases and make up for losses in state aid before they are subject to an 8-cent limit on tax rate hike - without requiring a tax rollback election under a ruling last week by State District Judge Scott McCown.

In revising the education reform law passed by the state Legislature in May, McCown said, "The notion that anything I am doing today is going to make it easier to raise

for taxpayers to have a rollback election of dramatically increased tax rates.

"We will look at the final judgement on this, but it appears school districts can raise their rates a lot higher than they did before," Hartman said.

McCown's ruling will benefit 200 to 300 school districts that were concerned about facing rollback elections because they had large enrollment increases or lost state aid.



I was coaching baseball.

What possessed a 65-year-old man to take a punch at a 35-year-old man is beyond me. What could I do? Besides, his wife had slipped up behind me and grabbed my shirttail so that when I went for him, I strangled myself at the same time.

I had not yet learned that just because a 14-year-old kid can't run, hit, catch or throw he's supposed to be a starter on a team that's 10-2 and on the verge of winning its first league title ever.

That season finished my coaching career, but, like my military service, it was a time I wouldn't trade for. Years later young men, some with their wives and children, would see Cue and I at a store and come up to smile and ask if we remembered when they played ball for us.

I don't think I ever worked as hard for no money as I did when I was involved with the community baseball program. Preparing the field before every game, picking up trash when it was over, haggling with umpires and other coaches, going through tons of paper trying to work out schedules for games, concession stand crews, umpires, late-night phone calls to and from other league officials and parents, holding practices, throwing BP till my arm gave out, and all the other things required.

Actually playing the game was like a holiday. In six years, I had butterflies before every game started -and I can't remember a final score of even one of those contests.

Now my fastball is a consistent 55 mph, the 90 feet between the bases may as well be 90 miles and there's no way I'll ever again play catcher and peg a throw from the plate to second base from my knees.

Heck, I can't even see second base from home plate now.

But the pay for those years was worth more than I can describe. That's why I have so much admiration for the men and women here who devote their time and effort to the children of the area who come out in the dust and heat every summer to learn to play the greatest game ever invented.

So, coach, in case the thank-yous have been far fewer than the gripes, here's a genuine thanks from someone who's been where you are. **DAVE LEWIS** Little Elm Journal

My legs were like jello and as much as I wanted to run down to be by his side at that time I just couldn't. His dad had already made it down there and I watched him intensely as I believe everyone else for indication of how bad was Brandon's condition.

CITY OF IOWA PARK, 103 North Wall Street, Iowa Park, Texas 76367 has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (Commission) for renewal of Permit No. 10691-02 which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic wastewater effluent at a final volume not to exceed an average flow of 1,000,000 gallons per day. The wastewater treatment plant is southwest of the City of Iowa Park, approximately 0.25 mile west of Farm-to-Market Road 368 and 1 mile north of Farm-to-Market Road 367 in Wichita County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into an unnamed tributary; thence to Buffalo Creek; thence to the Wichita River Below Diversion Lake in Segment No. 0214 of the Red River Basin.

In accordance with the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards, the Commission staff must determine the existing uses for the receiving water in the area of the proposed discharge. The unclassified receiving waters of the unnamed tributary and Buffalo Creek have no significant aquatic life uses. The designated uses for Segment No. 0214 are contact recreation and high aquatic life uses. The effluent limitations in the draft permit will maintain and protect the existing instream uses. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revision.

The Executive Director of the Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved, will enforce more stringent effluent limitations in order to meet existing applicable rules and regulations. It is proposed that the expiration date of the renewed permit be specified as midnight, April 1, 1998 in accordance with 30 TAC 305.71, Basin Permitting.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code and 30 TAC Chapter 305 of the Rules of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission.

This application is subject to a Commission resolution adopted August 18, 1993, which directs the Commission's Executive Director to act on behalf of the Commission and issue final approval of certain permit matters. The Executive Director will issue this permit unless one or more persons file written protests and/or a request for a hearing within 30 days after publication of this notice. If you wish to request a public hearing, you must submit your request in writing. You must state (1) your name, mailing address and daytime phone number; (2) the permit number or other recognizable reference to this application; (3) the statement "I/we request a public hearing;" (4) a brief description of how you, or the persons you represent, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application; (5) a description of the location of your property relative to the applicant's operations; and (6) your proposed adjustment to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns and cause you to withdraw your request for hearing. 

Common questions the past week at the Wichita County Extension Office have centered around disease and insect problems.

Q. Stinging scorpions have invaded my home in Wichita Falls. What can I use outdoors and inside my home to control scorpions?

A. Clean up areas outside such as accumulations of lumber, boxes etc. Dursban can be used as an outdoor spray. Make a band treatment around the foundation wall and into the lawn. If a treatment is needed under a pier and beam home you should probably hire a pest control operator. Inside the home you can use FICAM to treat baseboards, cracks and crevices where scorpions will hide. Scorpions are tough to control and re-treatments may be necessary.

Q. I have an elm tree which is leaking sap from a wet, dark colored area about four feet up on the main trunk. Is this borer damage? What should we treat the tree with?

A. Borers may not be your problem in this situation. Dark colored areas and wet, odorous wood indicate a canker or wetwood bacterial infection. Elm trees happen to be susceptible to these type of problems. There is no treatment which has consistently shown positive results. The installation of drainpipes in the trunk to help remove

toxic gases and sap will offer some relief against fluid leakage. A professional tree care company may be able to help with a drainage system. Maintain the tree with proper watering and fertilization and avoid wounding the tree with any lawn equipment.

Q. I want to transplant several established Crape Myrtles and Nandinas before construction begins on a local property. It's now or never on these plants. What should I do to transplant these plants? I am tired of spending money on smaller plants at the nursery.

A. You may have a change of attitude on purchasing plants after you dig a few established plants. Summer is a tough time to transplant also. The fall to winter months are more ideal for moving plants, however, you do not have that option in this case. Try to get as much of the root system as possible when digging and immediately move the plants to their new location. Cut the top growth back by a third to compensate for root loss in digging. Water regularly during the heat of late sumRabies, fire ants pose threat

During the past seven years 216 dogs, 270 coyotes, 15 cats, 15 raccoons, seven cows, three bobcats, three horses, one goat and one skunk have been confirmed positive for canine rabies.

An epizootic of gray fox rabies which began in Sutton County in 1988, rapidly spread to 22 counties with 260 cases confirmed through 1993. There was a dramatic upsurge in 1994, with 13 additional counties becoming involved and 264 rabies cases being recorded.

Clark advised that more domestic animals should be vaccinated to help provide a barrier between rabid wild animals and humans.

The seemingly unstoppable spread of the imported fire ant is another major concern for cattle raisers, who were told that not only is eradication of imported fire ants "highly unlikely, if not impossible," but that effective chemical control is "not likely in the near future."

Dr. Lloyd W. Morrison with the "Fire Ant Lab" at Breckenridge Field Laboratory at the University of Texas at Austin said that they are looking instead for "highly species-specific biological control agents (i.e. other organisms which are natural enemies of the imported fire ant."

Morrison said that since the introduction into the United States from South America some six decades ago, the imported fire ant has spread across approximately 250 million acres in the southeastern and south central United States, and now occupies approximately half of Texas.

"Despite millions of dollars spent on the development and application of chemicals, the imported fire ants persists and continues to spread westward over the state," Morrison said.

"Although pesticides can effectively control the imported fire ant over small areas (i.e. one's back yard), it is not cost-effective to apply pesticides over larger areas (i.e. range lands and wild lands)," he explained. "And once pesticide application is discontinued, imported fire ants usually return in greater numbers than before."

The Brackenridge Lab is currently studying the phorid fly (flies of the genus Pseudacteon, family Phoridae) which are natural predators of fire ants in South America.

"Ultimately, if our research on phoride reveals them to be as effective biological control agents as they currently appear to be, we intend to massrear selected species in our greenhouse and release them over large areas for the purposes of controlling the imported fire ant." Morrison explained.


Red Cross seeks help






Sisters place in Angus show

Slow down in school zones

We've all heard the saying, "Kids say the damedest things!"

Well kids do the darnedest things, especially around school zones. With school starting up Aug. 17, there's sure to be trouble afoot. Now is the time for drivers to start thinking about the dangers this presents.

Whether you drive in school zones once a year or work there every day. you can never forget certain lessons. One is that you have to use better judgement than the seven-year-olds who surround you, according to DPS Trooper Joe Clement, public information officer.

"It's important to remember that kids aren't small adults, and they don't think like adults. They lack experience with traffic, and they don't always act logically. When you sound your horn, for instance, a child may think its okay to cross the street in front of your

vehicle," Clement said.

Children also have limited perceptual skills. Sometimes they can't even tell if your vehicle is in motion or stopped. They can't accurately judge the speed and distance of vehicles or detect safe gaps in traffic.

"Elementary school aged children often aren't tall enough to be seen on the other side of a parked car, or as they move between vehicles to cross the street when they're being picked up. School zones are not the time to light a cigarette or call the office on your car phone," Clement added.

The key is to see children in time to avoid a collision. Search from curb to curb for kids who could enter your path. Everyone who enters the roadway is vulnerable to injury, but children on foot are even more at risk.

Many times the kids probably have their minds on school or friends, not on

the vehicles moving toward them. That means it's your job to be even more aware of what's going on around you.

Since it's hard to predict kids action near schools, try to avoid these areas. Reroute your trip, if possible, to avoid peak drop-off and pick-up times and getting stuck behind a school bus.

However, if you can't avoid a drive through a school zone, the best strategy is to just slow down (to the required 20 MPH, as posted) and stay alert.

It's up to us to take precautionary steps to keep kids alive and safe.

All of us, except those directly descended from the original Americans, had ancestors who immigrated to this country.

Knowing the religion of our ancestors will sometimes help to establish the country of their origin. Most Colonial Dutch families belonged to the Dutch Reformed or the Antibaptists. Those from the Scandinavian countries were Lutheran or Reformed, Swiss and German from the
