Today's rudeness seems be a hit-andrun act, and certainly people in service positions take a lot of it, full-force, without the buffer of authority. It almost marks a social pecking order at
times: Why else would otherwise-respectable people smile while spiting out an insult as if it were their right? Maybe our world has become so ressful that people have dropped their guard and have worked up the resolve to say things they would only have thought 10 years ago.
But what communication is achieved, and what's lost? What do any of us gain when civility becomes optional?

We will hold this program at the Ellis Orchard at 808 Pecanway Rd. in Wichita Falls at 6:30 p.m. T.D.A. pesticide license holders will receive two CEU's for attending. Bill Ree, pecan entomologist, wilr ers on the statewide crop. Everyone with an interest in pecans is invited. Q. Why are all of my periwinkle flowers dying? Enclosed is a sample. A. Unfortunately, there are numerous cases of periwinkle and even

petunia death similar to your problem. A soil-borne water mold fungus which is called Phytopthora has taken its toll on perwinkles. A good friend of mine in Tulsa, Oklahoma is a landscape contractor. His company used to plant
125,000 periwinkles each year. They 125,000 periwinkles each year. They now plant zero due to this disease. Fungicide applications have not offered a great deal of control. Planuing raised beds with drip-irrigation will help. Do not try to replant periwinkles in an area that has had past problems with this disease.

## Measure your catches

## Starting September 1, Texas an-

 glers will have to be aware of changes in the fishing regulations, according bo Major changes for Wichita Falls rea anglers are limited to catfish. Channel and blue catfish minimum length limits are being raised from nine to 21 inches, meaning that those measuring less than 12 inches must be released.The daily bag limit remains at a total of 25 channel and blue catfish per day.
An exception tothe daily bag limit occurs in lakes that Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has designated Community Fishing Lakes.

These are small impoundments localed in urban areas that TPWD annually stocks with advanced fin
gerling catfish ( $8-10$ inches). Thes lakes have a 12 -inch minimum lengt limit and a daily bag limit of five
sexually mature at older ages. Largemouth bass regulations remain the same with all lakes near Wichita Falls having a 14 -inch minimum length limit and a daily bag of five fish.

The only exception is Lost Creek Reservoir near Jacksboro, with a 16 inch minimum length limit and a five fish daily bag on largemouth bass.
