Terlizzi is named Cryovac manager

Frank M. Terlizzi will officially become the fifth manager of Iowa Park's Cryovac plant this weekend.

Terlizzi, who was appointed manager of bagging operations at the plant in July of 1994, succeeds Ray Youngblood.

Youngblood, who was among the 25 original Cryovac personnel assigned to the local plant 20 years ago, was named vice president of Grace Container and Specialty Polymers in August.

First public notice of Terlizzi's promotion was made early last week during the monthly meeting of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce board of directors.

Terlizzi was elected to replace

Youngblood on the Chamber's board.
Youngblood, who has been with

W.R. Grace more than 30 years, will be located in Lexington, Mass. The effective date of his appointment was announced as Oct. 1.

Terlizzi, a native of Columbia, South Carolina, has held several positions with Cryovac in his 17 years with the company.

He and his wife, Beverly, have two children: a son, Michael, and a daughter, Katie.

Terlizzi holds a bachelor of science dgree in animal science, and a master of science in agriculture from Clemson Univ.

The local Cryovac plant is currently undergoing its 10th major expansion project. More than 750 are

employed at the plant, and employment is projected by the year 2000 to be right at 1,000.

Preceding Terlizzi and Youngblood as managers of the plant were Charlie Lee, Frank Gossett and Sam

City hopes to correct flooding on south side

The city council is undertaking a move designed to eliminate flooding in the Wall and Valley Drive area following heavy rains.

At their meeting Monday night, aldermen heard plans for a concrete street and concrete drainage ditch, and then approved advertising for bids on the project.

Kerry Maroney, city engineer, proposed completion of Valley Drive surfacing from Wall to Texowa.

He said the city already has an easement between two lots on the south side of the street paving project, and a concrete ditch is proposed to carry the runoff water from that point to the earthen ditch on Texowa.

The reason for the concrete ditch, Maroney explained, was because the elevation of the Valley-Texowa intersection was too high to carry water.

In fact, the slope of the concrete

ditch was only one foot, Maroney said in response to an alderman's question.

During a discussion on the proposal, aldermen expressed concern that the earthen ditch along Texowa would be kept in a cleaned condition so it could allow water to flow away from that area.

Alderman Johnny Crawford, who voted against advertising for bids, said he could not support the project until adequate information concerning the flow of water away from the area was available.

Maroney said he estimated the cost to construct a concrete street surface and curbing would be \$75,000, and the drainage ditch would be another \$24,000.

Runoff water has flooded the Wall and Valley intersection since Garden Valley Addition was built, following moderate to heavy rain storms.

Water often rises well over the street curbs and backs up half a block.

Over the years, city councils have studied the problem, but because of costs have never taken action to relieve the situation.

Alderman Bob Hamilton expressed concern that the Texowa ditch, which is outside the city limits, would be kept clean of weeds and growth which would impede water flow and the project not function as hoped.

On another issue, which involved a lot at the corner of Texowa and Pecan that was recently purchased for a mobile home site but does not have the dimentions needed to meet building codes, the council decided

The Hawks, 0-3 and coming off their lowest offensive output of the season, will be up against the Dragons who are 3-0 and coming off a tough 7-2 win over Mesquite Poteet last week.

In last year's meeting between the two teams, the Hawks gave Southlake all they wanted and despite losing 22-7, Iowa Park was in position to possibly tie the score late had it not been for a dropped pass late in the game.

This year, the Dragons are once again going to be the bigger and quicker team on the field.

Southlake opened the season by beating Gainesville, then followed that by edging Bridgeport 17-12 in week two.

Iowa Park head coach Weldon Nelms is looking for a tough game against the state-ranked Dragons. "They're a strong, physical, line-up smash-mouth type football team," Nelms said. "They're big up front and all their kids have good quickness. They don't have the speed burner or the superstar players like they may have had in the past, but overall, they are solid in every position.

"Right now they're still splitting

time with two kids at the quarterback position, still looking for a leader at that spot," Nelms added. Senior Chance Caple and junior Brian Lacroix are both seeing time as signal caller for the Dragons. Sophomore running back H.D. Rodgers leads the team in the rushing department.

Couple beautifies, builds

Enormous energy, a passion for nature, religion, life, and an innate love of children, people, and her roots delineate the persona of Ida Zimmerer. Her husband Ray shares these qualities.

The love of people and nature is noted in the many trees, shrubs and flowers that earned their yard at at 110 W. Washington the "Yard of the Month for September" distinction by the Iowa Park Garden Club.

She calls it her Memory
Garden because many plants are
from someone dear to her, or have
been given to her by friends and
neighbors.

In the yard Ida has a Rose of Sharon plant she brought from her late mother's home in East Texas.

Pine trees in the yard grew from pine cones that were in mulch she brought from her sister's home in East Texas. They have done well after

They have done well after being moved three times. Once when the Zimmerer's moved to Iowa Park from Wichita Falls 13 years ago, and another move from a rented house on Alameda to the present location in the yard of the home they built.

The crape myrtle holds special meaning because, "It was the size of a match stick when it was given to me," Ida said.

At the time it was given to her

she was a member of Wesley
Methodist Church in Wichita Falls.
The minister, Rev. Braxton Bryant,
had come to the church following
the tornado that destroyed so much
property in Wichita Falls.

He and his wife were moving back to Dallas. "He handed me that stick in a can of dirt and said 'Here, Ida, would you like to have this'? I took it, and look at it today."

The Zimmerers moved to Iowa Park in August. She dug up the crape myrtle and brought it along and put it in the ground.

"It froze three times the following January. I never expected it would live," Ida said. That's why I call it my Miracle Bush."

One of the rose bushes she calls the "Zimmerer Rose". It grew from a cutting from a rose bush Ray's mother had that had come from his great-grandmother's yard.

Many of her plants have come from cuttings from other people. A short time ago one of her neighbors came to her door with a lot of canna bulbs and asked if she would like to have them. He was thinning his plants. "I love the plants that have been given to me by neighbors and friends", Ida said.

"People who love butterflies and like to have them in their yard should plant some penta. They really attract the butterflies."

Ray was raised in Munster. He attended the Subiaco Abbey in Arkansas through high school and college with the thought of entering the priesthood. He was in charge of the greenhouse while he was there.

He became a builder instead.

He was building supervisor for all of the What-a-Burger Restaurants, except the one at Sikes Senter Mall. He builds many of the beautiful country homes.

Ray built their two story, five bedroom, two-bath home at the corner of Washington and Yosemite. He had the help of Ida and her two granddaughters, who made their home with the Zimmerers eight years.

Ida commented, "A lot of love and family memories are in the building of this house. We wanted it simple, because we live a simple life. We try not to let 'things' own us."

The inside of their home attests to the same love of nature, people, religion and her roots.

Ida has many items in her home that have come from other places, but have special meaning for her because of who made them, someone that she knows personally, or has met and visited with the

Many small towns may have records of our ancestors. Fillmore Spangler points out a very useful and free source of information.

He says, "Each state has a department of tourism whose sole purpose in life is attracting you to some area in their state so you can visit. For the price of a postcard you can send them a short note, telling of your intent to visit and they will be more than happy to supply you with maps, books, brochures, travel information and details about points of interest in their state.

"With each request for data, be sure to request a state map that will aid you in that lost or missing landmark in the state your relatives came

Fillmore has compiled a list of addresses of where to write for state travel brochures, and this is available

in the genealogy section in our li-

Some states have maps of counties produced primarily for sportsman's guides. These maps are quite detailed and are usually sold at sporting goods stores, but ask about them and while you probably won't get a freebie, you might get an address and price list.

Another source for maps, is the U.S. Board on Geographic Names, US Geological Survey, 523 National Center, Reston, Va., 22092.

Shirley Banks has used maps from this source in searching for old cemeteries. Also Shirley reminds us not to overlook useful materials in our library. She has used and recommends "The Source" as a useful tool for researching.

Don't forget to register for the Fall Workshop, co-sponsored by SWOGS and the Lawton Public Library. This is an opportunity for "new" genealogists to participate in a learning process with experienced and inexperienced family historians.' Marita Holdsworth

Please obey the law

To the Citizens driving in Our Community:

The law states that a divided highway is one which separates lanes whether it is a cement structure, grassy area or fenced area, the lanes are physically divided which will impede crossing lanes. Inside the Iowa Park city limits going through town from Yosemite to High School, the state considers the highway a 2 lane road with a turning lane only. It is not considered a 3 lane highway according to the law books of the Texas Highway Patrol.

That makes it illegal to drive past a school bus stopped with the red flasher lights on, loading or unloading school children. All traffic must stop. The on-coming vehicles driver is unaware of which side of the street the child walks to. The law says you must stop.

Heaven help you if you hit a child.

Traffic does not even slow down on the highway. The bus drivers honk their horns, wave their arms out the window and in some instances, stop traffic and walk the child across the street. Some of the newer buses even have a stop sign that pops out to the left side of the bus when the door is opened. Most drivers just go right on past the bus, but a few exceptionally good drivers stop like the law says.

Most of the teenagers just drive on past like they didn't cover this particular law in Drivers Education. I wonder if they covered vehicular manslaughter in Drivers Education.

Also it is very important that unless the sun is up, early morning drivers should have their headlights on so that children crossing the street can see the vehicle approaching. This is true for both city and county roads. If a child doesn't see the car on a dark morning, he may run out in front of the vehicle as he crosses the road to the bus. It's also important in avoiding an accident. Turn on the car lights. It is as important to be seen as it is to

creator of them.

A hearth broom hangs on her wall made by people who live near Ashville, N.C. and grow their own broom com. Ida commented that both the husband and wife have doctorates, and had wonderful positions, but they decided that was not all there was to life. They quit their jobs and are taking life at a slower pace and enjoying all they can. Ida admires them for doing that.

On another wall in the dining room is a copy of a portrait of the Methodist preacher who gave her the crape myrtle. He has a long white beard and is sitting at a dining table praying. On the table is a loaf of homemade bread. The portrait is similar in composition to that of "The Old Man Praying", a painting familiar to many people.

While Bryant was pastor of Wesley Methodist Church he helped organize InterFaith Ministries. They now own and live on a mountain outside Ashville that once was a church camp.

Ida remarked, "Art speaks to me," as she pointed to two paintings on her wall that were executed by a well-known American Indian artist in Oklahoma. She said she gets a special feeling while studying the paintings. She has met and visited with the artist.

Ida sketches, paints and does crewel embroidery. One of her favorite things hangs on one wall in the living room. It is a framed poem, surrounded by colorful crewel work flowers that she made for her mother a few years ago. After her mother's death she brought it to her home and because it had hung in her mother's house it is very special to her.

She said her mother always had something growing and had many house plants. "We had a big vegetable gardens and could share it with oth-

In fact, Ida credits the many things she loves and appreciates mother taught her in childhood. It also is a reason she is so proud of her roots.

She remarked, "My mother was a very selfless person. She didn't have a lot of education, but she had a lot of common sense. She could always find a way to extend the food a little to give someone else a meal.

"My enthusiasm for helping others is because of her teaching us to be kind and helpful to others. She was a wise woman. She taught

more by example than by instruction and always taught us to have respect for the faith of other people."

Ida grew up in the Baptist Church, spent some years as a Methodist and is now a convert to catholicism

She was born during World War II in the middle of a Texas desert, near Sierra Blanca, the youngest daughter of five sisters and two brothers.

She grew up in the Houston area and graduated high school in Pasadena. She attended Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene.

She lived in Hawaii four years and all but one of her four children were born there.

"Ray and I are like so many modern familes today, this is our second marriage," Ida remarked. They have been married 13 years. "My philosophy is you can't get where you are today without having been where you were yesterday," she added.

She said they used to take their foster children some. It is something new for them to get next to nature, sit around the campfire, climb hills, watch the different animals and make memories children do not forget.

They are members of Foster Parents Association. She has served the organization as president. And also has served on the Regional Adisory Committee for Foster Care and Adoption.

She was a foster parent trainer. Foster parents must have a specific number of hours of training before they can be foster parents, Ida explained..

She worked for Mental Health and Mental Retardation in Abilene and at the State Hospital in Wichita Falls 12 years as staff supervisor in the Adolescent Unit.

After that she was on the Rural Outreach Network for First Step, traveiling to Baylor, Archer, Wilbarger, Montague and Wichita Counties. She was informing people of the help they can receive through First Step.

Ida speaks to various groups and has counseled persons who need help from First Step, such as those for domestic violence, sexual assault and in other areas. Her

husband also is a volunteer for First

"So many people are unwilling to take responsibility for their own acts," she said.

They both work at the Service Center for foster children, helping to sort clothes. "When you are keeping foster children, you may not have any clothing for them except what they have on their backs. You can go to the Service Center and get enough needed items for the children until you have time to do some shopping," Ida said.

"We love Iowa Park and the people. That is why we are here," Ida said.

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

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

The following questions/answers were common at the Wichita County Agricultural Extension Service office over the past week.

Q. I have several Euonymus shrubs with an unusual growth on the stem. The growth is the size of a baseball. A sample is enclosed. Is this a disease?

A. Your Euonymus plants are plagued with Crown Gall. Euonymus is a common host plant for this bacterium. Both roots and stems can bear large galls.

Interestingly, Crown Gall behaves much like cancer. As a matter of fact Crown Gall is used in laboratories to test certain cancer treatments. If a treatment works against Crown Gall on a plant it may have possible uses on humans.

As far as your plants are concerned, you must prune out the stems where these galls appear. Disinfect your pruning shears in a 10 percent bleach/ water solution between cuts to avoid infecting healthy tissues. Heavily infected plans should be removed.

Q. Is it recommended to fertilize our shade trees this fall?

A. Shade trees which have received regular applications of lawn fertilizer through the spring and summer months should be fine. Fertilizing with high nitrogen plant foods late in the fall could actually increase chances of freeze damage from an early freeze. Using a slow-release nitrogen turf food with a 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio from spring to early fall

(Sept. 1) is a good nutritional program for shade trees as well as warmseason lawns.

Q. Our Red Oaks are dropping leaves and the leaves have circular spots. Is this a little early for leaf drop? A sample is enclosed.

A. Your sample certainly indicates a disease problem. The disease Anthracnose will occur during wet, cool weather and causes defoliation of Red Oaks. This disease was seen last spring on Red Oaks in some Wichita Falls landscapes. The best time to control this problem is at budswell early next spring. Apply Daconil 2787 at budswell and again for two to three applications at 14day intervals. Trees which are totally defoliated in the spring can be killed.

Pecan trees are prevalent in this area, and it looks like they will be producing a bumper crop this year.

This week's recipes were selected in order to provide a variety of ways in which pecans can be used in food preparation.

Snooty Popcorn

1 1/2 lbs. white chocolate 17 cups popped, unsalted popcorn 2 cups pecans

Spray a large cookie sheet with non-stick pan coating. In a large turkey browning bag, place white chocolate in microwave 2-3 minutes until melted, mashing with hands at 1 minute intervals. Remove unpopped popcorn kernels and pour popcorn and nuts into bag with chocolate and toss to coat well. Spread onto cookie sheet. Cool thoroughly. Break apart and store in tightly covered container. Makes 22 cups.

Pecan Turtles

Arrange 72 pecan halves on buttered cookie sheets. (One for the head and two for the legs.) Caramel:

1 cup granulated sugar 1/2 cup light-brown sugar (firmly

packed) 1/2 cup corn syrup

1/2 cup heavy cream 1 cup milk

1 tsp. vanilla extract In medium saucepan combine all

ingredients except vanilla. Cook,

stirring over low heat, until sugars are dissolved. Over medium heat, cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, to 248 degrees on candy thermometer, or until a little cold waater forms a

Remove from heat; stir in vanilla and two more tablespoons heavy cream. Pour a little over each turtle (enough to cover). Put cookie sheets in refrigerator to harden caramel.

While they are cooling, melt a package of milk chocolate chips in double boiler.

Take turtles out of refrigerator and pour melted chocolate over them to cover. Use spoon to pour chocolate on turtles. Let chocolate harden and the turtles are ready to eat.

Keep them refrigerated and take them out about 30 minutes before eating. They're much chewier when they are not cold.

Spiced Pecans

3 Tbsps. butter 1/4 tsp. cayenne 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon 2 tsps. salt

3 Tbsps. Worcestershire sauce Dash of Tabasco 4 cups pecans

Melt butter and add seasonings. Mix thoroughly. Add pecans and toss gently until all nuts are coated. Place in shallow baking pan. Bake at 300 degrees 30 minutes. Turn at least once.

Old Fashioned Nutbread

2 cups dark brown sugar 2 eggs

1/2 tsp. salt

1 tsp. baking powder

Stir together, or blend in mixer. Add 3/4 tsp. baking soda dissolved in a little warm water and alternately add 1 cup sour milk and 3 1/2 cups

Stir in 1 cup chopped pecans. Pour into 2 medium or 3 small loaf pans which have been greased and floured. Bake in a slow oven (350 degrees) about 1 hour. After baking, remove from pans, cool and wrap in foil a day or two, allowing the crust to soften. Slice as thin as possible, but tering two sices for sandwiches.

Pecan Pie

1 9-inch pie shell 3 eggs

3 Tbsps. melted butter 1/2 cup brown sugar 1/4 cup granulated sugar 1/2 cup light corn syrup

1 tsp. vanilla 1/4 tsp. salt 1 1/4 cup pecans

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. List a 9-inch pie pan with pastry and chil while preparing filling. Stir togethd beaten eggs, butter, sugars, syn vanilla, salt and pecans. Pour into prepared pie shell. Bake 45 minutes. Serve warm with a scoop of vanilla

Zucchini Pecan Cake

1 1/2 cups vegetable oil 3 cups grated, unpeeled zucchini

2 tsps. vanilla 3 cups sugar

- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 tsps. baking powder
- 2 tsps. baking soda 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon

1/4 tsp. each allspice and cloves 1 cup chopped pecans

Place eggs, oil, zucchini, vanilla and sugar in large mixing bowl. Beat two to three minutes. Sift together dry ingredients. Add to egg mixture. Beat until blended. Stir in nuts. Pour into greased and floured pans. Bake at 350 degrees 1 hour and 20 minutes for Bundt pan, or until cake tests done. Serve with whipped cream, Cool Whip or cream cheese frosting if desired.

Orange Glazed Pecans (for the microwave)

1/4 cup orange juice 1/2 tsp. orange flavoring cup sugar

2 cups pecan halves Combine orange juice, flavoring and sugar in a 2-quart glass baking dish. Stir in pecans. Microwave on roast for six minutes. Stir and continue on roast for 8 to 10 minutes or until syrup crystalizes. Spread and separate glazed nuts on a buttered cookie sheet to cool.

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
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
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
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Pipers romp over short-handed Hawks

You rarely see their names in the paper and it seems the only time they get singled out is when they jump off sides or get called for holding.

It's always "so and so scored three touchdowns and rushed for 139 yards or so and so threw for 216 yards and two touchdowns." You sometimes take for granted the people up front who are opening the holes or allowing the quarterback the time he needs to complete all those passes.

That was the case Friday night when Iowa Park, who entered the game averaging 267 yards per game rushing, were playing without two of their offensive linemen. The Hawks managed only 12 yards rushing and 45 yards passing as they fell to 0-3 on the season losing 31-7 to the Hamlin Pied Pipers.

The Hawks were without the services of Tyson Spruiell, a 255-lb. senior guard who missed the game with a severly bruised thigh. lowa Park's other missing starter was 285-lb. senior tackle Keith Hoover who saw limited action but was slowed tremendously by his broken left hand he suffered in the Electra game.

Matt Strange and Brad Phipps filled in for the pair but when you take out 540-lbs of blocking and senior leadership, you definitely notice it both on the stat sheet and on the scoreboard.

"Our offense seemed out of sync all night," head coach Weldon Nelms said. "We tried to simplify things and at the same time we tried to add some different formations. Hamlin came out and played us man-to-man and at times they just out athleted us in some areas."

The losses were also felt on the defensive side of the ball as the Hawks gave up 349 total yards and 31 points, both season highs.

Hamlin sophomore quarterback Chas Shira completed only four passes against the Iowa Park secondary, but three of those ended up in the endzone. Shira finished four-of-nine for 157 yards and three TD's with two of those going to James Clawson.

Following a scoreless first quarter, Shira appeared to have put the Pipers on the board when he hit his tight end with a 15yard TD pass, but a holding call nullified the score. On the next play, Shira hit Darryl Cooper, who out-jumped a Hawk defender in the endzone for the game's first score. Scotty Nichols added the first of his four extra points to make the score 7-0. Six

minutes later Shira and Clawson hooked up for a 79-yard scoring strike to boost the Hamlin lead to 14-0. The Pipers ended the first half scoring with Nichols' 24-yard field

The Hawks cut the lead to 17-7 late in the third when they took advantage of a Piper turnover. Michael Fallon stepped in front of a Shira pass and returned it 22 yards to the Hamlin 18. Four plays later, Dusty Owen scored from 7 yards out to pull Iowa Park within striking distance. John Woods tacked on the extra point.

On the ensuing kickoff, Wood hit the ball high in the air and Iowa Park's Shane Bagley raced under it at the Pipers' 37 giving his team excellent field position. But the Hawks were unable to take advantage of the break and four plays later punted the ball

back to Hamlin to end the third quarter.

Seven plays later, Clawson hauled in his second TD pass from Shira, this one a 25-yarder, to boost the Hamlin lead to 24-7 with 9:05 left in the contest. The Pipers' final score came with 6:27 left to play when Timmy Davis scored on a 4-yard run to make the final 31-7.
