

Pot producer jailed when crop discovered

rested last week when police discovered he was growing a marijuana plant in his apartment.

Larry Daniel Thompson, 26, was taken into custody Thursday afternoon on a charge of possession of marijuana, under two ounces.

Local police received a tip that Thompson was growing the plant in unit 204 at Woodbriar Apartments.

Hawks take on Porkys in pre-conference final

When the season started, the Springtown Porcupines looked like they would take up right where they left off the 1994 season.

After losing in the regional quarter-finals in the State Class 3-A playoffs to Abilene Wylie, the Porcupines had a number of returning starters and were rewarded by being ranked No. 4 in the preseason polls.

But preseason rankings don't win you football games and after starting the season at 0-2, the Springtown offense that was supposed to roll over teams, had managed only 12 points and the team fell from the rankings.

When the Porcupines, 2-2, square off against Iowa Park Friday at 7:30 p.m., the Hawks will be looking to rebound from a 34-7 loss to the 4-A No. 7 ranked Southlake Carroll Dragons that left the team hurting and winless at 0-4 for the season.

Springtown on the other hand has rebounded after starting the season by losing 27-6 to Azle then 13-6 to Alvarado by blasting Breckenridge 51-3. The Porcupines followed that with an impressive 42-7 win over Brewer last week to even their record at 2-2 for the season.

Springtown's option offense racked up 308 yards rushing on 55 carries as the Porcupines finally got their offense on track.

In the Hawks' game against the Dragons, Iowa Park lost much more than the ballgame as several players were hurt with the biggest loss being suffered by junior Kevin Brazile, who left the game at halftime with a broken right arm. Brazile played the final five plays of the first half before telling coaches about his arm.

"We're definitely hurting heading into Friday night's game," head coach Weldon Nelms said. "Besides Brazile, Robert Klinkerman is out with a knee sprain, Todd Cheeseman has torn ligaments in his elbow and is listed as questionable, Jimmy Fallon has a sprained ankle and his brother Michael is playing with a sore knee. Tyson Spruiell re-injured his leg and is doubtful and on top of that, Jason Yeager hurt his arch in practice on

"We still have others playing with some hurts," Nelms added. Keith Hoover is playing with a broken wrist and John Woods is playing banged up. We're also going to hold out Clint Witherspoon this week with no contact to see if his shoulder will heal up before we get into district play next

With the Hawks looking more and more like a MASH unit, Nelms is counting on some of his replacement players to step up and help his team build some confidence in the final tuneup before the district opener against Jacksboro.

"We need a good outing this week," Nelms said. "Right now we have a bitter taste in our mouths and we're tired of losing. Nobody is feeling sorry for anybody around here, we just have to go out there and get better every week."

That could be a tough task with all the injuries to the offensive line for the Hawks as the Porcupines enter the game with a very big defensive line.

Springtown's starting noseguard is 260-lbs. and their defensive tackles are 260 and 245.

Offensively, the Porcupines run the option with Mathis and Gilley handling the ball the majority of the

"We have to do a better job defending the option than we did against Southlake," Nelms added. "Mathis is one of the best option quarterbacks I've seen and we have to contain him. Gilley has some speed and we have to keep him bottled up to stay in the game."

The key to the Porcupines' offense is their huge offensive line that averages over 240 pounds.

"They're extremely big," said Nelms. "They like to line up foot to foot and zone block and drive you off the football. We're going to have to try some stunts and gamble some this week and play the option better. They're a senior-filled ball club and they've got a lot of tradition behind them."

Friday night's contest is scheduled to get underway at 7:30.

Victoria Ann Hack and S. J. McCollum were married Wednesday by the Justice of the Peace in Jacksboro.


The bride was given in marriage by her son and daughter, Perry Dean Hack Jr. and Amanda Virginia Hack.

The Lesters have lived in Iowa Park 44 years. Christine was employed by the City of Iowa Park 21 and a half years.





Until this week, I had felt I had controlled my prejudicial feelings concerning race pretty well.

That is, until the O.J. Simpson trial's conclusion and after reading an article concerning a murder trial in

After Simpson was found not guilty by a jury dominated by blacks, and his attorney, Johnny Cockran, stated emphatically that he had not used race in his defense, I realized I have a major twinge of racism.

No, not because Simpson was accused of killing his former wife, a white, and another man who also was white, but because I listened to Cockran's summation at the end of the trial.

The only thing he failed to





emplore was the resurrection of Abraham Lincoln as a need to free the blacks once more.

The article I read concerning a case in Lubbock was that the NAACP has tiled for a re-trial of a young black who was found guilty of shooting to death a man who was on an early-morning newspaper delivering route.

The organization's reason for

seeking the re-trial? Not one member of the jury was black, and, by golly, blacks make up 10 percent of the population of Lubbock.

Considering that argument, is 90 percent of Los Angeles' population black?

No, I wasn't surprised at the outcome of the Simpson trial. In fact, I expected it once the jury was chosen, and I read of its racial makeup.

"This problem is on the increase because so many landfills have been closed in smaller cities," Dooley said. "Because this is a major health problem in the area, cities can really help by phoning our hotline number -- 761-8899 -- and leaving a message of where the illegally dumped debris is located."

Dooley said he had located several areas of trash at two Iowa Park lakes, Lake Iowa Park and Lake Buffalo. Some were household, brush and construction debris, and others were areas trashed by fishermen and party-goers.

County Commissioner Gordon Griffith commented that some dumping had been found on Riley, Bacon Switch, Old Electra and City View roads.

Both the commissioner and officer agreed that wooded and creek crossing areas, any place not easily observed, are common dump sites.

If an illegal dumper is observed, citizens should note (if possible) the license number, color and make of the vehicle, a description of the driver, and the kind of debris being depos-

Citations may also be written for transporting trash or debris in a truck that is not covered, or for pitching debris out of a moving vehicle, Dooley sais.

Prior to assuming the newlycreated position, Dooley served with the Sheppard AFB fire department and was on the Burkburnett reserve police force.

Trees, bushes, benches, birdbaths or any upright items that will impede mowing are not allowed. Items placed on lots without approval of the board of directors will be removed. This does not apply to items already in place.

Also, weekend and evening construction without a permit is subject to removal.

Covering lots with gravel is no longer allowed. The plastic crumbles after a few seasons and weeds emerge. In addition is the problem of graves sinking.

Those whose lots are covered with gravel should let the board of directors of the cemetery know who to contact when growth comes through or graves sink.

Those who want gravel removed from their lots should go by the cemetery office and sign a request for the removal of the gravel in order that the caretaker can do the work during the winter months while the work load is not so heavy.

Iowa Park GENEALOGICAL & HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Myra Vanderpool Gormley, a well-known genealogist, has some tips on learning how to find and use maps and gazetteers when researching for records of ancestors.

The best detailed maps for genealogists, Ms. Gormley points out, are topographic ones that enlarge small areas and show buildings, cemeteries, churches and roads. In addition, mountains, rivers and valleys are shown.

Call the United States Geological Survey at 800-872-6277, and ask for a free booklet titled "Maps Can Help You Trace Your Family Tree".

The booklet, according to Gormley, tells about the types of maps available from USGS. Also available is "Index to Map Coverage". This is a booklet for each state or a single sheet map for each state with the information you need to order for the proper quadrangle of the topographic maps. You can order one or for all 50 states and they are free.

Maps of county boundaries as they exist now and as they were on each census year can be found in "Map Guide to the U.S. Federal Censuses, 1790-1920", by William Thorndale and William Dollarhide, and available from Genealogical Publishing Co., 1001 N. Calvert St., Baltimore, Md. 21202-3897; 800-296-6687.

Thank you to Myra Vanderpool Gormley for all her helpful tips on researching our family trees. She also reminds us that large public libraries and academic libraries nearby may have the 10-volume "Omni Gazetteers of the United States".

Gazetteers are lists and discriptions of places, usually in alphabetical order according to states, a source in some detail to help find small places.

"Atlas of American History" is one of several historical atlases that show the growth and development of the nation and details of migration routes, boundaries, settlement patterns, military campaigns and Indian reservations.

Leta Watson, a member of Iowa Park Genealogical and Historical Society, is a very authorative genealogist and teacher.

Leta is active in continuing education at Midwestern State University and will be presenting "Beginning Genealogy" Saturday, Nov. 4. The fee is \$25 for the all-day

To register, please call the continuing education department at MSU. This will be a wonderful opportunity to "get started" and learn more of genealogy and history available in this area.

Hawks drop 4th to Dragons

The Iowa Park Hawks ran into a steam roller Friday night in Class 4-A No. 7 ranked Southlake as the Dragons handed the Hawks their fourth loss in a row, as Iowa Park fell 34-7.

Southlake, 4-0, took the opening kickoff and ran off nine plays in only 2:58 to score the game's first touchdown. James Miller, a senior running back, scored the first of his three touchdowns on a 2-yard run with 9:02 left in the first quarter and following Austin Cranford's point after, the Dragons led 7-0.


Iowa Park took the ensuing kickoff at it's own 21 yard line and marched down the field to the Southlake 29 by running off 13 plays and chewing up 6:32 off the clock before the Hawks' drive stalled. Shane Bagley picked up 13 yards on a pair of carries and Clancy Lalumia added nine yards to fuel the Iowa Park drive.

But when the drive stalled at the Dragon 29 yard line, Iowa Park's John Woods miss-fired on a long 47-yard field goal attempt to nullify the Hawks scoring opportunity.

The Hawks held the Dragons on their next posession as the first quarter ended 7-0.

On Iowa Park's next possession, the Hawks once again moved into Dragon territory as Owen picked up 18 more yards and Bagley added seven leaving the Hawks facing a fourth-and-one from the Southlake 44 with 9:04 left in the first half. But the Dragon defense stiffened and held Owen short of the yardage needed to keep the drive alive.

"I felt a lot better about our performance offensively," head coach Weldon

Nelms said. "We really stepped it up from last week's outing against Hamlin even though we came up short on those first couple of drives. I thought we did a good job moving the ball against a very good Southlake football team."

The Dragons took over at their own 44 and marched 56 yards in eight plays to take a 14-0 lead with 5:42 left in the first half when Miller scored his second touchdown of the game, this one coming from five yards out.

New Officers


