FRIDAY AGAINST JACKSBORO

Hawks look to end losing streak

Forget about anything that's happened so far this season. As of today every Dist. 3-AAA team is starting from scratch and following last week's effort against Springtown, the Iowa Park Hawks have to be good about where they are heading.

When the Hawks take on Jacksboro Friday night in their homecoming game, the Tigers, winners of their first five games, will be in the same boat as Iowa Park. Both starting at 0-0 and wanting to get a jump in what could be a very close district race.

Despite the Hawk's 0-5 non-conference record, head coach

Weldon Nelms thinks the level of his team's competition will be an advantage in the upcoming district games.

"We've played some pretty tough teams the last three weeks," Nelms said. "Against the likes of Springtown, 4A, Hamlin has lost only once and Springtown was a playoff team with a lot of their kids returning. The effort we showed last week, despite all the injuries we had, was something we needed heading into district. Even though we came up short on the scoreboard, that game showed me a lot about this football team. It takes a lot of character to play like we played last week. We didn't quit and came

from 21 points behind to take a 27-21 lead against a good football team. It was a good outing except for the final score."

Jacksboro comes into the game on a roll after jumping out to a 2-0 start just like they did last year.

In last year's contest, the Tigers benefitted from several questionable calls to defeat Iowa Park 20-14 in the district opener. Even though the Hawks finished with 122 more total yards, it was Jacksboro that came out the winner.

Three of Jacksboro's main offensive starters from last year's squad return to once again lead the team.

Matt Fryar, a 200-lb. senior quarterback, returns to direct the team his team to be back at full strength this week.

"I think this week's game boils down to turnovers and field position," Nelms added. "We've got to stay out of the second and third long situations. If we can move the ball on the ground like we did last week and pick up 300-plus yards we will be alright. Some of the things we looked at last week worked well and it gives us some different looks going into this week's game. We have some different combinations of backs we can put in there and with Brandon Brown back there, we have the big-play threat we haven't had. Dusty Owen and Corky Petty along with Clancy Lalumia and Shane Bagley all have been doing a good job for us."

Nelms doesn't think the kids will get caught up in all the homecoming festivities and will be ready to go when things get underway around 7:30 p.m.

"Coaches think everything is a distraction," said Nelms. "But the kids realize the importance of getting started on the right foot in our first district game and they will keep everything in perspective."

"Offensively, they have some big strong kids up front," Nelms said. "They like to try to get Laake the ball and get him outside and when they throw the ball Fryar usually is a big play."

"I think their defense is their strong suite," Nelms added. "They give you a couple of different looks with a 4-3 and a 5-3 stack. They have a couple of big tackles, (Will Mathis, 285-lb. and Cody Carter 260-lb.) and their linebackers are real good football players. Fryar, Chalmers and Tanner are always around the foot-

Council calls meeting Monday on golf course

During its regularly-scheduled meeting Monday night, the city council approved purchase of a new street sweeper, and also agreed to hold a called meeting next Monday.

Purpose of the called meeting is to hear a presentation by Larry Platt, president of Platt Golf Services, who was engaged to do a feasibility study on a golf course here.

The called meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers, and is open to the general public.

Aldermen approved acceptance of the only bid received on a new street sweeper. With two options, including engine warranty, the machine will cost \$82,000.

The machine is to replace a used sweeper acquired by the city from the highway department, which administrator Mike Price described as being "worm out," and incapable of doing work desired.

Four aldermen approved accepting the sweeper bid, but alderman Bud Mercer voted against it.

The lease-purchase contract calls for payments over a five-year period, and the council had included \$15,000 in this year's budget for the purchase.

Aldermen approved granting a waiver which will allow Mrs. Dorothy Schuman to place a mobile home on a corner lot in the McCluskey addition that does not conform with city code.

The lot shows to be 50 feet wide both on city maps, and on her deed, but is only 41 feet wide, which does not allow the set-back required by code.

A resolution permitting assign-

ment of the ambulance contract from Careline Inc. to Laidlaw Inc. was approved. No changes in fees are involved in the change over.

Also approved was an annual chore of writing off bad debts owed the city for water, sewer and garbage disposal.

The write off amounted to \$2,900.45, which is considerably less than the \$3,810.45 the previous year.

Price told the council the city hall staff works hard to collect the unpaid bills, including continuing to send statements as long as the postal department transfers mail to those who have moved away.

Aldermen encouraged Bob Hamilton, publisher of the *Iowa Park Leader*, to print the names and amounts of those on the list, as was done last year.

"The people need to know who doesn't pay their bills," one alderman stated.

Trustees to meet tonight

Junior high school students may soon be able to take a course that will earn them high school credit, if the school board approves a proposal at its meeting this evening.

The board is to meet at 7:30 in the junior high library.

If the board approves a proposed waiver, Agriculture Science 101/102 will be offered to eighth grade pupils, and if successfully passed, earn high school credit.

The board is expected to confirm appointment of Michael Bean as

chairman of the districtwide site-based decision making committee.

Also on the meeting's agenda, the board is to recognize the high school tennis team for having competed in the state team tennis tournament.

A proposal will be considered to apply for a waiver for class size in the fourth grade.

Various reports will be presented to the board, and Supt. Glen Mitchell is to discuss a board planning meeting and also discuss the Valley View campus.

Charges continue to mount against young Iowa Park man

A local teen who was arrested and charged with the September burglary of the Iowa Park High School band hall is now facing additional, unrelated felony charges, and is under investigation for other charges.

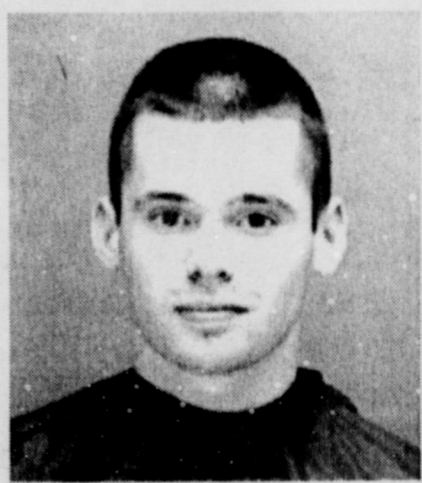
Trevor Pool, 18, is out on bonds in Wichita and Clay counties totaling \$17,500.

According to Sgt. David Duke of the Wichita County Sheriff's Dept., Pool confessed to Duke and a Clay County Sheriff's deputy to setting a mobile home on fire in Clay County.

The fire, set Sept. 27 with an accelerant and a match, destroyed a vacant mobile home with no utilities, located in Petrolia.

During an investigative visit to Pool's home east of Iowa Park, Sgt. Duke recovered several sets of firefighting clothing and equipment from the back of a pickup Pool had been driving. Further investigation showed that the bunker gear had been stolen during a burglary in March from a fire equipment distributor in Sansom Park, near Fort Worth.

During a check of the tags on the pickup, it was determined that the

1993 Ford pickup was displaying license plates from a 1981 Ford pickup. The '93 pickup proved to be one stolen from Ron Roberts Ford in August.

Pool has been charged with theft \$1,500 to \$20,000, carrying a \$5,000 bond; and arson, carrying a \$10,000 bond. He was out on a \$2,500 bond for burglary.

Sgt. Duke said Pool also remains under investigation of the burglary in Sansom Park, as well as other arson cases.

Despite popular opinion, you do not get colds from sitting in a draft, getting wet feet or staying outside too long in bad weather.

The common cold is a viral infection which is found in the respiratory system (the nose, throat and lungs).

Colds can last for just a few days or as long as a couple of weeks.

Colds are spread through the air or by contact with hands.

You can help keep your cold from spreading to others if you are careful to cover your mouth when you sneeze or cough.

Colds are spread when a healthy person makes hand contact with a sick person or touches contaminated objects, such as doorknobs.

One of the best ways to reduce your risk of catching a cold or spreading colds to others is to wash your hands frequently.

There is no "cure" for the common cold. The best way to treat your cold is rest, drink plenty of liquids, and take proper medication to relieve your cold or cough symptoms. Your pharmacist or doctor can recommend the best medicine for you.

If your child has a cough or a cold be sure to ask your doctor or pharmacist about the amount of medicine to give your child.

Remember a cough can be serious. If your cough lasts longer than 10 days or is accompanied by a fever of 102 degrees or higher for more than three days, see your doctor.

We do a pretty good job of producing our own educators, with our fine Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District.

Did you know that almost 20 percent of the professional faculty was graduated from IPHS?

I didn't, until I did some checking this week with the four principals. I had suspected the number was impressive, but until I got the count I really had no idea it was that many.

A total of 24 out of 138 certified teachers in the classrooms are local graduates.

That's 17.4%, according to my little calculator.

Besides those in education, we have a train-load of medical doctors, dentists, lawyers, pharmacists, etc., who all got their basic education here in Iowa Park.

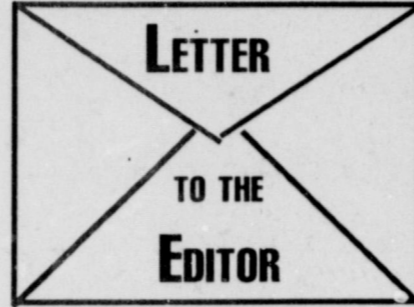
No sir, I never get tired of bragging on Iowa Park schools, and am always ready to point out the dozens upon dozens who have done well in their adult lives.

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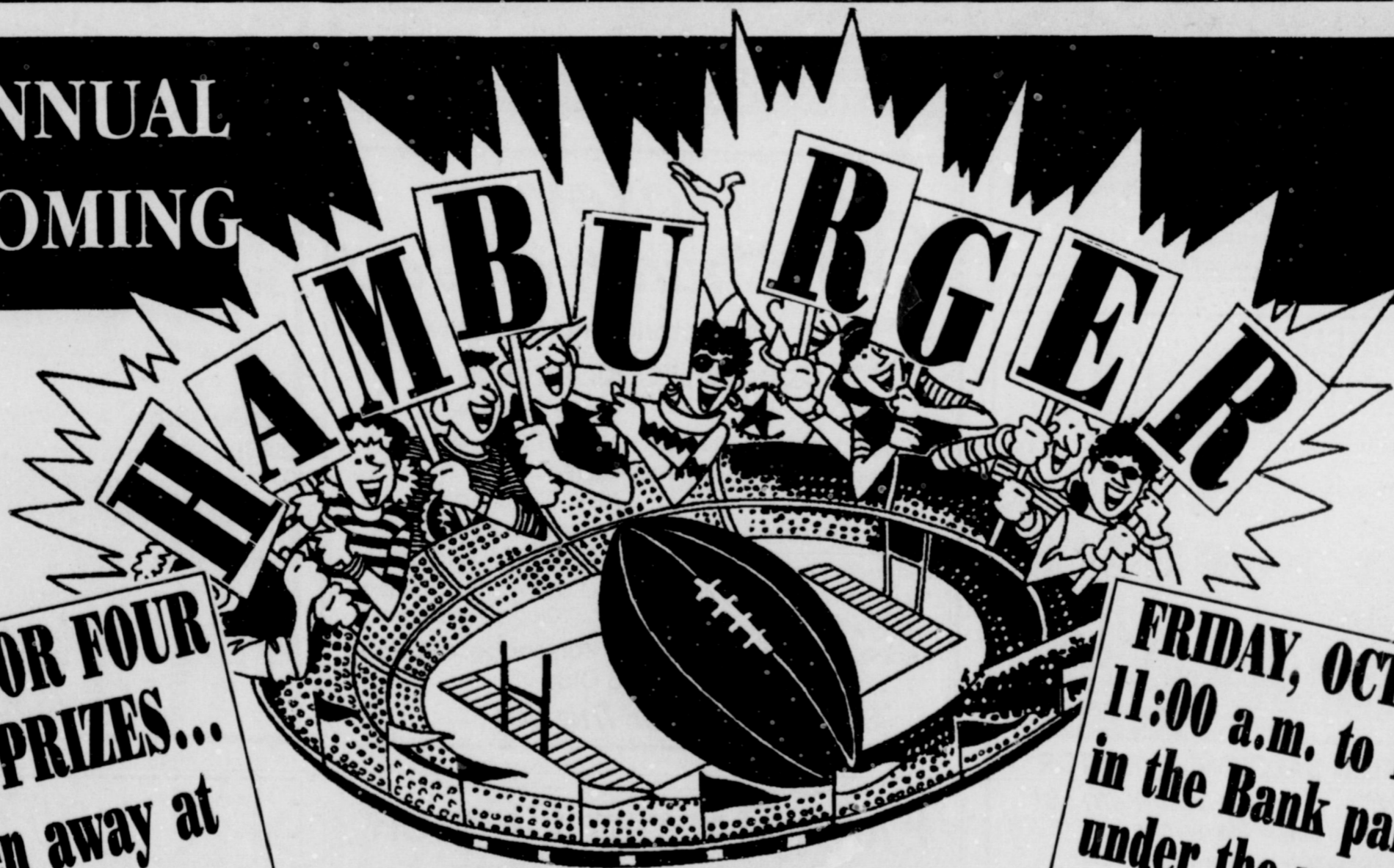
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Cook of the WEEK

Last week, one of our readers came by the *Leader* office and said that area pear trees are overlaid with fruit. She suggested that we use recipes for the preservation or use of pears in cooking.

So, for those of you who are wondering what to do with the abundant pear crop this year, maybe some of the following recipes will be helpful.

Pear Conserve
4 quarts pears, peeled and thinly sliced
1 - 20 oz. can sliced pineapple, cut into bite-size pieces
3 med. oranges, peeled and finely chopped
3/4 cup sugar
1 cup maraschino cherries, cut into pieces
Paraffin (optional)
Mix pears, pineapple and oranges. Add sugar to 1 cup fruit mixture. Let stand until sugar dissolves; stir into remaining fruit mixture. Boil mixture in small amounts until thick. (Large amounts become too dark.) Add maraschino cherries. Ladle into

sterilized pint jars. Seal at once with paraffin or cover and refrigerate to store. Makes 8 pints.

Pear Relish
1 qt. onions
1/2 gal. pears
6 green peppers
3 red bell peppers
1 or 2 hot peppers, to taste
1 Tbsp. flour
4 cups sugar
2 tsps. salt
1 Tbsp. mustard
1 qt. white vinegar (less 2 Tbsps.)
1 Tbsp. tumeric
2 Tbsps. celery seed
Grind first 5 ingredients and mix. Boil 5 minutes. Mix remaining ingredients and add to boiled mixture and boil 5 minutes more. Pour into sterilized jars and seal. Makes 12 pints.

Pear-Apple Mincemeat
15 large pears (about 7 lbs.), peeled and ground
12 apples (about 4 1/2 lbs.) peeled and chopped
2 3/4 cups raisins, ground
1 cup sugar
1 unpeeled orange, seeded and ground
1/2 cup vinegar (5% acidity)
1 Tbsp. salt
2 tsps. ground cinnamon
1 tsp. ground nutmeg
1 tsp. ground cloves
1/2 tsp. ground ginger
Combine all ingredients in a large Dutch oven; bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Spoon hot mixture into hot jars, leaving 1/4 inch headspace. Remove air bubbles; wipe jar rims. Cover at once with metal lids and crew on bands. Process in boiling water bath 25 minutes. Yield: 8 pints.

Pineapple-Honey Pears
4 med. pears, peeled, halved, and cored
3/4 cup pineapple juice
1/3 cup chopped pecans
1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
1/8 tsp. lemon extract
1/4 cup honey

Pear-Apple Mincemeat Pie
4 1/2 cups Pear-Apple Mincemeat
1/4 cup sugar
2 Tbsps. butter or margarine
Pastry for double-crust 9-inch pie
Roll half of pastry to 1/8-inch thickness on a lightly floured surface. Place in a 9-inch pie plate and set aside.
Combine mincemeat and sugar in a heavy saucepan; bring to a boil, stirring frequently. Spoon mincemeat mixture into prepared pastry shell; dot top of mincemeat with butter.
Roll remaining pastry to 1/8-inch thickness and transfer to top of pie. Trim off excess pastry along edges. Fold edges under and flute. Cut slits in top crust for steam to escape. Cover edges of pastry with strips of aluminum foil to prevent excessive browning. Bake 30 to 40 minutes at 375 degrees. Remove foil the last 15 minutes of baking.

Spiced Pears
4 ripe pears, peeled and sliced
2 Tbsps. brown sugar
1/2 to 1 tsp. ground allspice
2 Tbsps. butter or margarine
1/4 cup orange juice
2 Tbsps. honey
Place pear slices in an 8-inch square baking dish. Combine brown sugar and allspice; sprinkle over pears. Dot with butter. Pour orange juice into dish and drizzle honey over pears. Cover tightly with plastic wrap; fold back corner of wrap to allow steam to escape. Microwave at HIGH 6 to 8 minutes or until tender, rotating dish halfway through cooking time.

Spiced Pear Jam
3 lbs. fully ripe pears
3/4 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. allspice
1 3/4 oz. pkg. powdered fruit pectin
3 Tbsps. fresh lemon juice
5 cups sugar
7 cinnamon sticks

Peel, core and chop or mash pears. Measure 4 cups of fruit and place in a 5-6 quart heavy saucepan. Stir in cinnamon, allspice, pectin and lemon juice. Bring to a rolling boil. Add the sugar and return to a rolling boil. Boil 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Skim off foam and stir jam

5 minutes to cool slightly. Place a cinnamon stick in each 1/2-pint sterilized jar. Pour jam into jars leaving 1/2-inch head space. Seal jars and process in boiling water bath 20 minutes. May omit boiling water bath and refrigerate to store. Makes seven 1/2 pints.

Lynn Dozier Class of '71

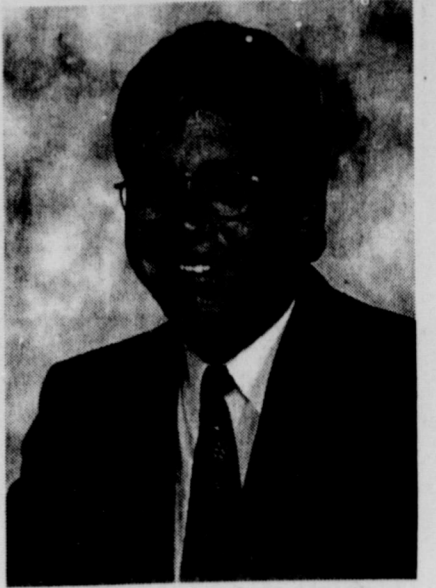
Lynn Dozier was a member of the Class of 1971, and he's now the owner of The Dozier Group Custom Homes and Real Estate.

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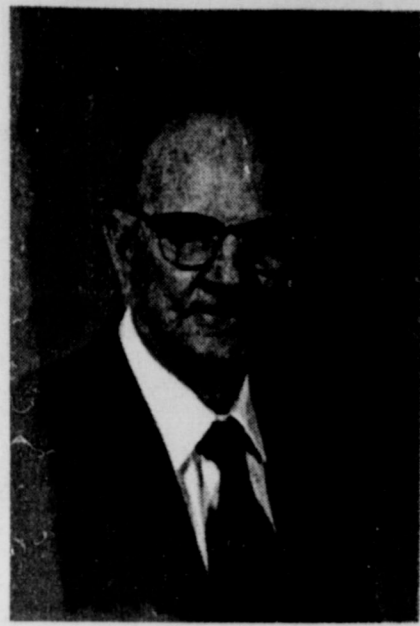

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

The following questions/solutions were common last week at the Wichita County Extension office. Your questions are welcome and may appear in future columns.

Q. My mulberry trees in Wichita Falls are dropping leaves. The leaves are yellowed with noticeable spots on the leaf surface. Enclosed is a sample. What is the problem?

A. Several fungi cause this type of damage on mulberry during wet, cool seasons. Leaves are yellowed with circular spots and will defoliate. Valuable trees should be sprayed with a copper fungicide such as Bordeaux Mix if leaf spots and leaf drop are serious. Make sure you watch the trees carefully next spring. Wet spring seasons can cause this disease to activate again. Treat in the spring if needed also.

Q. Is this a good time of year to plant trees? What is a fast growing tree you would recommend?

A. Fall is for planting. This is the best time of year to plant shade trees and local nurseries have a plentiful supply of trees. Most fast growing trees are not desirable due to weak wood and other related problems. You will not hear knowledgeable horticulturists or nursery professionals recommend trees like silver maple

or mulberry. Trees which have a good rate of growth and are desirable would be any of the ornamental pears such as Bradford pear or aristocrat pear and Chinese pistache. Slower growing trees like red oak may surprise you in terms of growth rate if given proper care. Correct watering, fertilization and planting make a difference in any tree's rate of growth.

High school offers test opportunities

Two exciting testing opportunities, one new and one tried and true, will be offered at Iowa Park High School in the next two weeks.

The first test, called the PLAN, will be given to all sophomores on Wednesday, Oct. 18. This test, published by the ACT testing company, will give students valuable information about aptitudes, careers and colleges. In addition, the test results will give a prediction of how well the students will perform on the TAAS tests in March and on ACT tests when they are closer to college.

"We are excited about the many ways PLAN will help us better prepare our students for TAAS testing, for college testing, and in preparing for life after high school," said LaRae Collins, high school counselor. There is no charge to the students for this test.

The second test, the PSAT, will be offered to interested students on Tuesday, Oct. 24. This preliminary SAT test is an excellent practice for taking a "real" SAT test, and although it is written for 11th graders, any student may take it.

Taking this test entitles a student to be eligible for National Honor Society membership and 11th grade test-takers are eligible to compete in the National Merit Scholarship Competition.

In addition, students may register for college information and be eligible for other scholarship competitions if they take this exam.

The fee is \$8.25, payable in cash on the day of the test. Students may register in Mrs. Young's office.

AUSTIN — State Democratic leaders met in Austin last week and drafted a letter demanding the immediate resignation of party chairman Bob Slagle, who had announced in May he would not seek re-election.

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, Attorney General Dan Morales, Comptroller John Sharp, Land Commissioner Garry Mauro and Treasurer Martha Whitehead signed the letter, which was hand-delivered to Slagle by Mauro.

Slagle, who has served as "top donkey" for 15 years, refused to comply. In a written reply, Slagle said party consensus on the next chairman "cannot be imposed from Austin."

Slagle told the *Houston Chronicle* he would not leave office until he was satisfied that a new chairman would have the support of party activists.

The leaders, at the Austin meeting, also agreed to recommend that the State Executive Committee elect Bill White of Houston as Slagle's replacement.

The *Chronicle* reported that the Democratic officials were anxious about possible Republicans in the 1996 elections.

Bullock said, "All one has to do is look at the gains that have been made in our state by what appears today to be the majority party in the state, the Republican Party."

White, a former member of the Clinton administration, said he was surprised by the call for Slagle to resign, and that he was not involved in the decision.

Bullock said White had the support of statewide officeholders and that he had been effective at raising political funds.

Still there will be an open race for party chairman at the Democratic state convention in 1996.

Victims to Witness Executions
Texas prison officials last week said they will move quickly to implement an attorney general's opinion that allows families of crime victims to witness executions in the Huntsville death chamber.

Texas Board of Criminal Justice chairman Allan B. Polunsky of San Antonio said the board "welcomes this authority as a due and just right for those close relatives who have lost loved ones in violent crimes."

The nine-member Criminal Justice board in September voiced support for permitting victims' families to view executions and asked for the Texas Attorney General's clearance as a guard against any possible legal challenge to a future execution.

Attorney General Dan Morales' opinion pointed out that the board must go through the legal formalities of proposing and adopting rules permitting the viewing. Polunsky said those legal mechanics could be accomplished at the board's meetings in November and January and the system could be implemented in February.

Polunsky said the prison agency is working with victims groups to develop rules for viewing executions.

Perot Eyes Third Party
Dallas billionaire H. Ross Perot told the nation last week he wanted a viable third party as an alternative to the Democratic and Republican presidential candidates in 1996.

Bill Walker, state director of United We Stand America, said he will get the 44,000 signatures to establish Perot's Independent Party in Texas, the *Houston Chronicle* reported.

Ann McGeehan, elections administrator for the Texas Secretary of State said Perot's supporters must first meet the Jan. 1 deadline for the filing of party rules, and furthermore, that to get on the November 1996 ballot, the Independent Party must:

- Hold precinct conventions on primary day, March 12; and
- By mid-May, collect 43,962 signatures from people who did not vote in either the Democratic or Republican primaries.

Other Highlights
■ Former Gov. Ann Richards was released from an Austin hospital last week after surgery to repair broken bones in her left hand. Richards, 62, broke the bones when she fell while walking on an Austin hiking trail.

■ In the first major reorganization in the agency's 104-year history, the Texas Railroad Commission approved plans to create an external affairs division, a policy and research branch and a Natural Gas Services Division that will work to expand markets for gas produced in Texas.

■ The Texas Lottery Commission reports that Texas has sold more lottery tickets than any other state for the second year in a row. Since the lotto debuted in May 1992, it has deposited an estimated \$2.8 billion into the General Revenue Fund, said Nora Linares, executive director of the commission.

■ U.S. Rep. Jim Chapman, D-Sulphur Springs, announced he would not seek re-election in 1996. He won his 1st Congressional District seat in a 1995 special election. Chapman said he would announce in the near future whether he will join the field of candidates challenging incumbent Republican U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, who is running for president.

Porkys edge Hawks, 40-33

Friday night's game against Springtown might have been just what the doctor ordered even though the Hawks came out on the wrong end of a 40-33 decision.

And believe me, several of the Hawks have been under doctor's orders for the last couple of weeks.

Iowa Park entered the game without a number of offensive and defensive starters and had to bring up players from the JV team to fill in for the missing players.

So when Springtown jumped out to a 21-0 lead, some figured that was the way it was supposed to be. After all the Harris ratings had Iowa Park listed as a 29-point underdog to the Porcupines.

That shows just how much stock you can put in the ratings.

Springtown scored on its first possession of the game when Mark Mathis hit Cory Gilley with a 41-yard touchdown pass with 8:01 left in the first quarter to give the Porcupines a 7-0 lead. They later added a second touchdown in the first quarter on a one-yard run by Gilley to take a 14-0 lead. The lead grew to 21-0 with 10:25 left in the half when Donnie Hamilton scored from 56 yards out.

Trailing 21-0 to a team you're supposed to lose to by 29, missing several of your starting players and possibly looking ahead to the district opener, left the Hawks looking for answers.

Iowa Park took the ensuing kickoff and marched 66 yards with Chris Norris covering the final 23 on a touchdown pass from quarterback Todd Yeager with 6:54 left in the half to start. John Woods tacked on the point-after to make the score 21-7.

Just 54 seconds later, Clancy Lalumia scooped up a Springtown fumble and raced 49 yards to pull Iowa Park to within 7, at 21-14.

The Porcupines were unable to move the ball on their next possession and were forced to punt to Iowa Park with the Hawks taking over at their own 5 following an excellent kick.

After a first down moved the ball to the 18, with 1:35 left in the half, sophomore running back Brandon Brown, playing in his first varsity game, took a pitch to his right, cut back to his left, broke a tackle and went 82 yards to tie the game at 21-21. Brown finished the game with 102 yards rushing on only 6 carries.

The Hawks lined up to kick off to start the second half and once again, Brown's speed played a big role when he ran under Wood's "pooch" kick to catch the ball at the Springtown 35.

Six plays later, facing a fourth and three from the five, Shane Bagley gave his team its first lead of the night when he scored to make it 27-21. Bagley also had a good night rushing finishing with 102 yards on 8 tries.

Springtown answered with a 10-play 73-yard drive capped by Mathis' 3-yard run with 5:18 left in the third quarter to make the score 27-27.

Just 37 seconds into the final quarter, the Porcupines recaptured the lead at 34-27

when Mathis scored from 6 yards out.

But once again back came the Hawks. After taking the kickoff at their own 24, Bagley rambled 38 yards on the first play from scrimmage moving the ball to the Hawk 38. Corky Petty followed with a 13-yard run and two plays later, Bagley scored from 27 yards out to cut the lead to 34-33. The point after run failed leaving the Hawks trailing by one with 9:52 left to play.

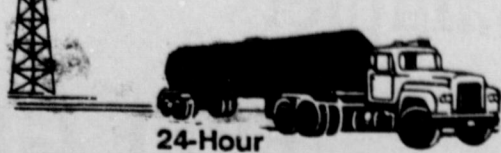
Springtown added another touchdown late on Gilley's 5-yard run to make the final 40-33.

* going to the state track meet with Bob and Kevin Hamilton;

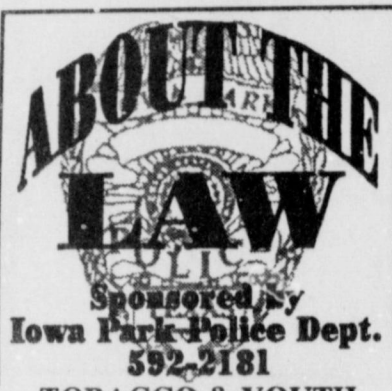
* and, "kicking Rocky Griffith's butt after a baseball game at W.F. George field - he was a bully who always picked on me."

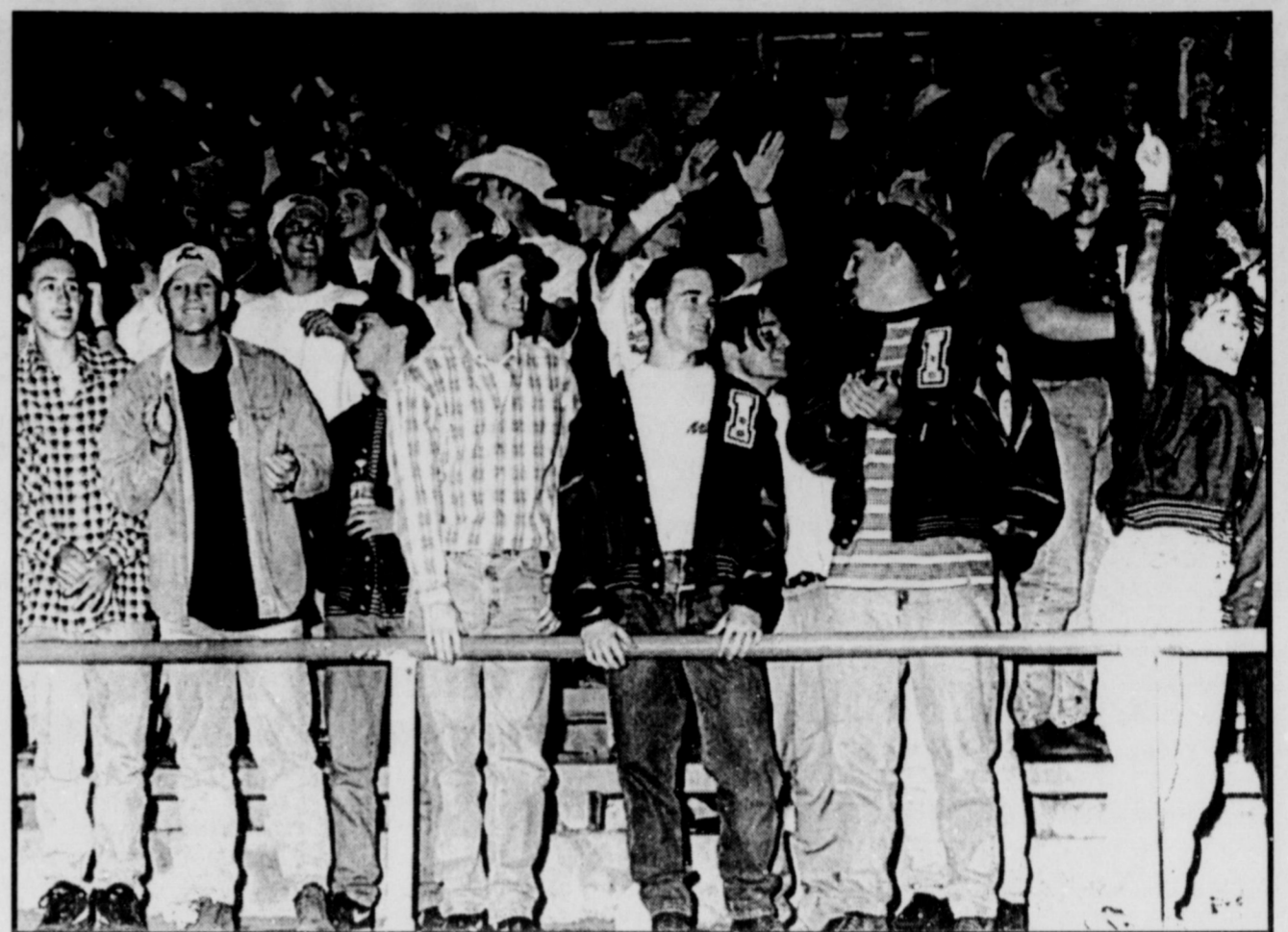

Lake Gordon has unique fish breed

The Wichita Falls Inland Fisheries office recently completed its fall electrofishing survey at Lake Gordon. Gordon is an 18-acre lake located off Highway 287 in Iowa Park that provides good fishing access for anglers in the Wichita Falls area. Gordon is an unique lake in Texas because it is one of only five lakes that contains saugeye, a hybrid of

sauger and walleye. These fish were stocked as part of a statewide research project to see if TPWD could create an additional sport fishery and to improve the fish community balance. In particular, TPWD biologists want to see if saugeye can help reduce the number of overcrowded small crappie and increase growth rates. The Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation has success-

fully used saugeye to increase crappie growth rates in Oklahoma. Saugeye were first stocked into Lake Gordon in May 1993 and again in May 1995 and have grown quickly. Fish stocked last spring averaged 1.4 inches in length and the five recaptured this fall averaged 8.8 inches. Although no larger saugeye were recaptured this year fish stocked in 1993 should now range between 17 and 20 inches. Saugeye can be identified by their long cylindrical shape and four dark "saddles" along the back. In addition, the dorsal fins are separated and have small black spots. The lower edge of the tail fin has a white tip.

JV scores on Porkys

When the JV Hawks took on the Springtown Porcupines Thursday night they were trying to do something no team had done in 10 games. Not only have the Porcupines won their last 10 games, they haven't allowed a single point to be scored on their defense during that streak. Iowa Park managed to score 14 points but fell 21-14 to drop to 2-2 overall for the season. With Springtown leading 8-0, Iowa Park's Jacob Robertson scored from 3 yards out to pull his team to within two at 8-6. Robertson later scored from 65 yards out in the fourth quarter and then added the two point

conversion to make the final score 21-14. Iowa Park controlled the ball for over 14 minutes of the second half but came up shy on a couple of short conversions. Offensively, Mike Noel, Brandon McLemore, Bodie Yarbrough and Richard McCann all played well along the line for the Hawks. Defensively, Iowa Park limited the Porcupines to only 3 first downs
