Heart Failure Takes Harvey Joe Eaton, 39

Funeral services for Harvey Joe Eaton, 39, were held Sunday afternoon at the Baptist church with Rev. H. M. Riek, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. Charles E. Ellis of the United Pentecostal church.

Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home.

Mr. Eaton died Thursday evening, May 27, of a heart attack while working as a driller west of Electra. He had been employed for more than two years with the Woods Associates Drilling company and had worked as a driller in this area for many years.

Mr. Eaton was born Feb. 26, 1915 at Aspetraunt, coming to Kamay when a young child. He attended Valley View schools and moved to Iowa Park nine years ago.

He is survived by his widow Bertha; two sons Billy Joe, 18, a member of the spring graduating class here, and Harvey Dean, 6; three daughters: Martha 16, Betty Lou 14, Kathy, 12; one brother T. D. Eaton; three sisters: Mrs. Howard Zimmerman of Henderson, Mrs. Dudley West of Maywood, Calif., Mrs. Florence Haines of Junction, Colo.

Tornado-like winds that hit in and around Iowa Park have left one dead and several injured.

Miss Faye Stowe, 44, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Stowe, died Thursday afternoon from injuries received in Tuesday's storm.

Her parents remain in the hospital where Mrs. Stowe is reported to be in a serious condition.

Miss Stowe had been confined to a wheel chair for 37 years, a victim of polio when she was seven years of age.

Funeral arrangements are being made by Tanner Funeral Home of Iowa Park.

She is survived by her parents and two sisters Mrs. Rex Lehman and Mrs. John D. Harrell, both of Iowa Park, another sister Mrs. Jack Young of Wichita Falls; and a brother Rev. Andy Stowe, also of Wichita Falls.

Andy Stowe said Thursday only a few articles were salvaged from the debris of the home in which his parents and sister have lived since 1941. He said a home freezer, a stove and a few articles of clothing are usable after the windstorm struck about 9:15 p.m. Tuesday.

The twister struck the homes of W. A. Stowe and John D. Harrell 1 1/2 miles northeast of Iowa Park, destroying the homes and injuring the Stowe family, who were in their home.

The wind picked up the Stowe house, moved it about 20 feet and dropped it crashing to the ground. Tanner's ambulance was called to take the victims to Wichita Falls Clinic hospital for treatment.

Mr. and Mrs. Harrell and their daughter Linda, 13, escaped serious injury as their house was demolished. Mrs. Harrell is daughter of the Stowes. The wind also damaged the home of another daughter Mr. and Mrs. Rex Lehman, but neither was injured.

Winds about a half mile east of Iowa Park ripped off part of the roof of the W. F. George home and destroyed a garage at the home of Mrs. Carroll Duke. There was roof damage to the duplex occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Billy Gilmore and the R. O. Teakanders on the Wichita Falls highway east of the Duke home.

The storm also hit Highland cemetery, destroying the tool house, overturning several monuments and blowing down several evergreen trees.

It was reported the wind had gusts up to 100 miles an hour as it swept along the area from Iowa Park to Wichita Falls, ripping up trees, blowing down houses and small buildings, and unroofing chicken houses and other farm outbuildings.

Herald reporters have seen damage inflicted at the homes of Elbert Lemons, L. T. Boren, and Arthur Hughes in the Valley Farms area, at the home of A. L. Hofer, the garage at the Helton hotel and a storage building at the George R. Huckaby home, all in Iowa Park city limits.

The fire alarm was sounded and Volunteer Firemen went to the scene of the Stowe-Harrell disaster, where they gave assistance and directed traffic.

Ted. St. Clair, local Red Cross disaster chairman, Mrs. Gordon G. Clark, local general chairman and vice-chairman of Wichita county chapter, and F. E. Hill, member of the county board, assisted in the Red Cross work and contacted all others where their homes were damaged.

Wednesday morning Mrs. Cliff Deaton of Wichita Falls and Giles M. Boone of Olney, field representative for Red Cross, visited all families to offer assistance in rehabilitation.

In 1951, Iowa Park suffered hail and windstorm damage sufficient to receive Red Cross aid in rebuilding several homes.

Better Connections Offered by FW & D

Travel time will be reduced 8 1/2 to 9 hours on FW&D railway from Texas Panhandle and North Texas stations to Houston and the Gulf Coast country beginning next Sunday.

Schedule of the daytime train from Iowa Park to Dallas will be stepped up to make it reach there at 4:40 p.m. to connect with the zephyr scheduled out of Dallas at 9:00 p.m. arriving in Houston at 9:00 p.m.

The new schedule will provide a daylight departure from all stations north of Fort Worth, with a 9:00 p.m. arrival in Houston the same day, contrasted with the present 6:30 a.m. arrival the following day.

Also included in the new schedule beginning June 6 is an earlier arrival in Denver, with trains reaching there at 7:00 p.m. and connecting with trans-continental trains for the Pacific Coast, shortening travel time as much as 12 hours to destinations in the Pacific Northwest.

The Texas zephyrs and other passenger services of Burlington lines in Texas will continue as heretofore.

Persons planning trips are cautioned to inquire about local departure schedules.

In a twilight ceremony in the garden of the T. J. Pace home, Miss Lou Ann Duke and William Ben Huckaby were married Saturday evening, May 29, in the presence of a large company of friends and relatives.

The double ring ceremony was performed by Rev. H. M. Riek, pastor of the Baptist church, assisted by Rev. Chester Gleason, pastor of the Christian church. Lochridge, who also played procession and recessional music for the bridal party, and quiet music during the exchange of vows.

A double row of hurricane lamps in Swedish steel standards linked together with white satin ribbon lighted the aisle leading to the nuptial space. Potted pink calladiums placed between the standards further outlined the aisle. A living wall of tall dark-green hedge made a background for the ceremony which took place in front of a white wrought-iron arch entwined with salal foliage. White wicker baskets filled with white majestic daisies and Commadore fern together with low arrangements of white calladium plants flanked the arch.

The bride approached the arch on the arm of her uncle H. Grady England of Wichita Falls, who gave her in marriage. Her ballerina-length dress of white organza was made with a closely fitted shirred bodice over which were placed wide pleated bands of the organza, covering the shoulders, and crossing in front to form a V-neck. The extremely full skirt was hand-painted with trailing vines of olive green upon which were placed at intervals wild roses of pink velvet. At the waist the bride wore an olive green velvet sash tied in the back with a large bow and streamers. Her elbow-length gloves of white nylon were fingerless, ending in a point over the wrist. The fingertip veil of illusion was gathered into a coronet made of alternating bands of white satin and pearls.

She carried an arm bouquet of pink Briarcliff roses, white daisies and white calladium leaves. To observe tradition the bride carried for "something old" a white linen handkerchief with border of delicate drawnwork, made by the groom's grandmother when she was a girl. 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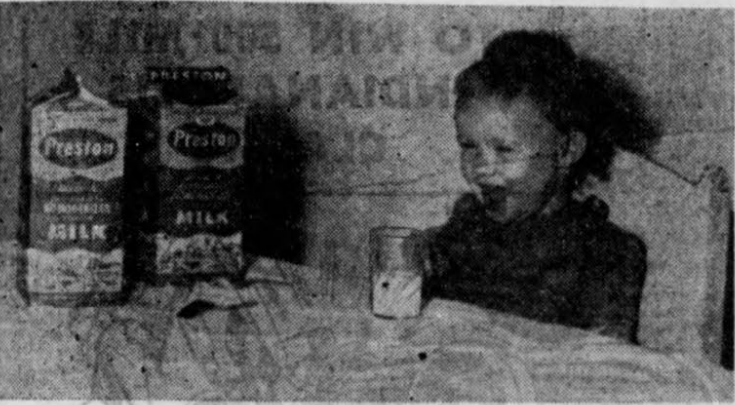

To follow the fire trucks can be overcome with just a little serious thinking. We do not recommend this; but it was reported that ever after, when the siren sounded, the firemen were given plenty of time to do their work before the public closed in on the scene.

Mrs. Lochridge presented a program of organ music with assistance of Mrs. J. H. Barton, president of the Holiday club.

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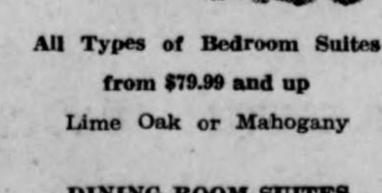
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
