Hawk Band does it again

They've done it again... for the 14th consecutive year!

The proud Hawk Band of Iowa Park High School earned a Division One rating Saturday in the Regional University Interscholastic League Marching Contest, held in Wichita Falls.

Emphasis is added to the contest's importance, because it is the first of three categories in which high school bands compete in their quest for the coveted Sweepstakes Award.

The other two categories are sightreading and concert, held in the spring. One ratings are required in all three for the Sweepstakes.

Participating bands do not compete against each other, but rather are given ratings based on performance.

Also receiving One ratings in Class AAA were Graham, Jacksboro and Gainesville. Childress received a

Two and Vernon a Three.

City okays street bid

In an unusually-brief regular meeting Monday evening, the city council approved a contract to extend Valley Drive from Wall to Hawthorn and include a secondary drainage ditch.

The project is designed to relieve flooding which had plagued the area of Wall and Garden since Garden Valley subdivision was built, following rain storms.

Total cost of the project will be approximately \$85,000.

Also approved was a request from Daryl Beals to grant a variance from a city ordinance, which would allow Cub Scouts to distribute handbills door-to-door, soliciting canned and dry foods for the Iowa Park Food Pantry.

The handbills would be distributed on Saturday, Nov. 4, and donated foods picked up the following Saturday.

Topics addressed during the meeting's general discussion period included: possibly adding more police officers; painting of parking lines in the downtown area; concern that additional street surfacing might lead

to flooding of businesses in the 300 block of North Wall, and the city's policy of enforcing ordinances.

During general discussions, no issues can be resolved because they must be on the agenda before action can be taken, according to the state's open meetings law.

The council chamber was filled to capacity, primarily with Boy Scouts who wanted to observe a council meeting.

Hawks still in playoff picture

Things are pretty simple from here on in for Iowa Park. Win the final three games of the season against teams with a combined record of 7-13-1 and the Hawks are in the playoffs regardless of what else happens in the District 3-3A race.

Iowa Park will take the first step tomorrow night at 7:30 when they play host to Bridgeport. The Bulls enter the game 2-0 in district play and 4-2-1 overall. Iowa Park comes in at

1-6 and 1-1.

The air will be filled with excitement and football as the Bulls are averaging 48 pass attempts per game and have picked up 652 yards passing in their two district wins over Bowie and Graham.

Bridgeport opened district play by beating Bowie 29-19 and followed by drilling Graham 34-12 last week.

The Bulls are led by Jacob Allen a 6-1, 160-lb. junior quarterback and tight end Paul Raby a 6-1 165-lb. senior. The tandem has hooked up for four touchdowns and 233 yards in the two district games along with Ryan Reynolds who has added a pair of touchdowns and over 150 yards receiving. Allen has thrown for 652 yards while completing 38-of-63 passes.

"We need to win this one to get back on a roll," said head coach Weldon Nelms. "The good thing is we still control our own destiny. We can win the next three and we're in no matter what else happens, but we have to start Friday night with a good effort against a good football team."

Bridgeport's offensive line that averages over 225-lb. per man provide the pass protection that Allen needs to be successful. And with no starter playing two ways, the Bulls don't wear down as easily as other teams might. Ten of the 11 Bridgeport starters on offense are juniors with Raby being the lone exception.

"Last year they hurt us with the run some," defensive secondary coach Jeff Standard said. "But running isn't their strong suite. They like to read what we are trying to do defensively

with our coverages and react to that.

"If we are in man-to-man, they want to run deep crossing routes," Standard added. "But if they catch us in zone, they will throw underneath. Their quarterback is slippery. He's a pocket type passer but he can hurt you if he gets outside. He throws well on the run and can hurt you deep if you let him."

The Hawks will have to apply pressure up front and get a good game from the secondary if they are to be successful.

"We're going to have to do a good job covering and tackling," Nelms said. "We're also going to have to create turnovers defensively. We need to play keep a way from them and keep their offense on the sideline, and we need to get out to a good start. With them coming in at 2-0, if they jump out early it could set the tone for the whole game."

Two of the people up front coach Nelms is counting on to pressure Allen are Jackie Miller and Clancy Lalumia.

Miller, a 5-7 155-lb. senior nose guard, and Lalumia, a 5-9 170-lb. end, are much smaller than their opponents but both think their speed will be a huge advantage.

"Their linemen are big but they can't match up with our speed," Lalumia said. "We have to keep the quarterback in the pocket because when he gets outside, he completes over 80 percent of his passes. He doesn't seem to be as effective from the pocket."

"They may be bigger, but I think we are much faster," Miller added. "If we can contain their quarterback and keep pressure on him, we should be okay. He's dangerous when he gets outside. They don't run the ball much, just enough to keep the linebackers honest."

The Hawks' defensive secondary will have their hands full but are ready for the challenge.

"We're going to play man-to-man, four deep, zone, nickel and all

Tuesday is Halloween

Ask a child what nights they look forward to the most, and they likely will respond with Christmas and Halloween.

Well, it's still a couple of months until Christmas, but Halloween is this coming Tuesday.

At least three organizations have treat stations for the youngsters that night, which will operate to supplement the usual trick-or-treat routes in neighborhoods.

The Iowa Park Police Dept. will hand out candy and halloween bags from the pavilion in city hall park, directly behind the police station.

Between 6 and 9 p.m., members of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept. will have favors to hand out at the Southside Fire Station on South Texowa.

And, as has been their practice over the past several years, residents of I.H.S. on Third Street will be passing out candy and refreshments, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Parents are encouraged by local police to inspect all the candy their

children are given during the evening, before they eat any of it.

DeeDee Alderman, who directs the local D.A.R.E. program, also suggests children should carry a flashlight with them, both to alert drivers and to be able to see where they are walking.

"It is advisable if wearing a mask," Alderman says, "to raise or remove the mask between houses. This reduces the chance of stumbling or of walking in front of a moving car."

Extension Agent Barbara Fangmann suggests using costumes with headpieces, rather than masks, especially for younger children.

"Masks can decrease visibility and make it hard to breathe," she says. "If masks are worn, make sure the eye and mouth holes are big enough to ensure visibility and breathing," she says.

Another alternate to a mask is face painting or makeup.

Safety is encouraged by all authorities.

Chamber elections due in November

Results of this year's Whoop-It-Do and officer elections highlighted Monday's monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce board of directors.

Though this year's annual event was deemed a major success, two problems were discussed. One, alleged violations at food booths reported by the health department, and the other the need for more games for younger people who attend.

Two directors, one of them a vice president, submitted resignations from the board, brought about by changes in business addresses.

Melinda Gonzales, second vice president, and director Doug James both offered resignations, and were accepted.

Gonzales did not recommend a replacement, but James proposed Jackie Beckham, branch manager of Norwest, be elected as his successor. The proposal was approved.

Gonzales' vacancy, as well as a full slate of officers, will be voted on at the Chamber's All-Membership Luncheon, to be held Nov. 20.

A nomination committee consisting of Derrell Monday, Larry Dutton and Cindy Clifton was appointed by president Dale Cox.

Directors whose terms expire this year include Joe Hughes, Beckham, Tommy Key, Monday, Glen Mitchell, Mike Price, Kathy Riggins and Philip Welch.

Those elected at the Nov. 20 meeting will be installed at the Chamber's annual banquet Jan. 13.

Also decided Monday, directors voted to sponsor a Thanksgiving turkey giveaway project again this year, and coordination is already underway, according to Susan Dillard, secretary.

Domestic cases keep cops busy

Domestic cases played a major part of activities during the past week for the Iowa Park Police Dept.

Likely the most unusual among them was a case reported by an Iowa Park man who filed a bigamy report Tuesday evening.

The man alleged his estranged wife, identified as Sandra Kay Leach, 31, had married in 1993 in Wichita County, and again this year in Clay County.

Initial investigation has indicated the woman may be married to at least two others, and possibly more.

In at least two cases, the woman may have drained joint checking accounts of husbands, according to police.

The investigation continues into the case.

Jeremy Paul Gellner wound up in the county jail, as the result of a domestic disturbance Sunday afternoon, according to the police blotter.

Police were called at 2:19 p.m. to a residence in the 400 block of West Texas, where a man and woman were reportedly fighting in the yard.

When officers responded, they found the woman lying in the yard,

injured.

Gellner, 20, is alleged to have struck her with his pickup, and both the emergency medical personnel and an ambulance was called. She was transported to a Wichita Falls hospital where she was treated and released.

Gellner was charged with aggravated assault with a motor vehicle and taken to the county jail under a \$3,500 bond.

An Iowa Park man turned himself in Tuesday evening at the police station, after learning a county warrant had been issued on him.

Rodney Lewis "Bud" Singleton, 39, was taken into custody on a charge of criminal non-support. He was transported to the jail under a \$3,500 bond, according to the police blotter.

A man and his wife both were jailed Thursday on charges of possession of marijuana, over two ounces and under four.

They were Timmy Ray Clark, 44, and Joanne Clark, 36. Both were transported to the jail after Justice of the Peace Bill Robinson set their

It's about time to change time

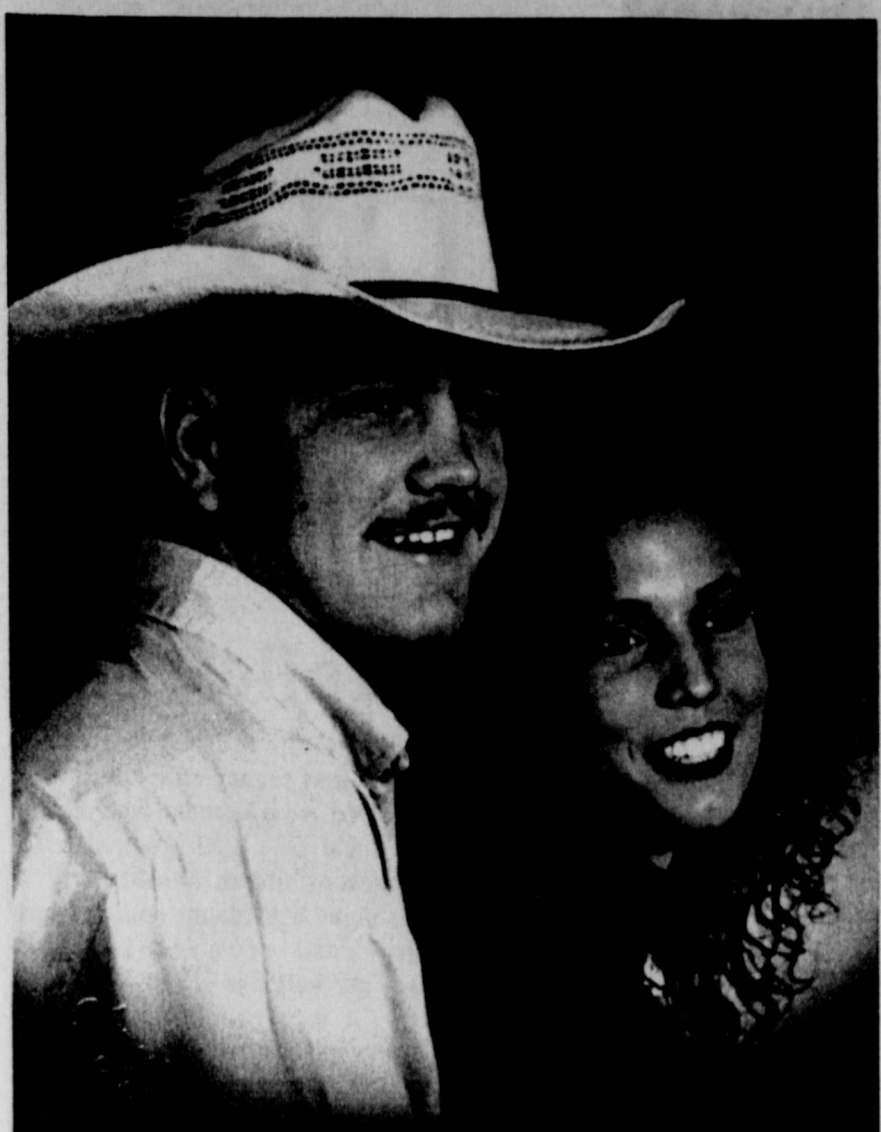
If you couldn't figure out how to change the time last spring on the clocks of your VCR or car dash, you'll be right on time Sunday morning.

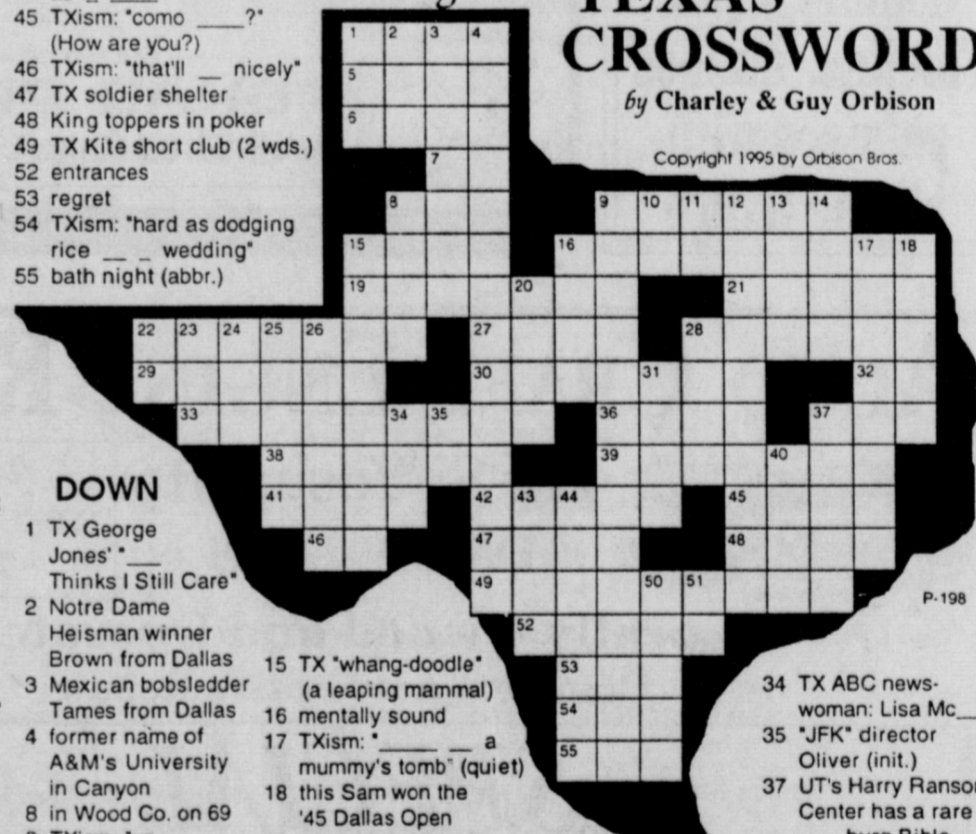

Maybe the character who came up with the idea of moving the clock up in the spring and then setting it back in the fall liked all those additional daylight hours during summer.

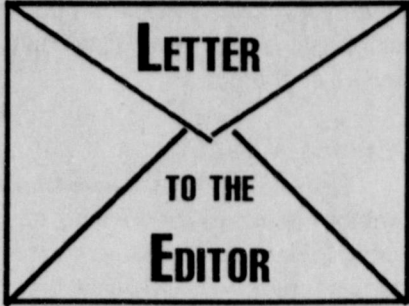
But I just can't imagine he ever gave consideration to one's mental alarm clock.

Cook of the Week

The daughter of Gladys and the late Bill Ryan, Kitty Lou was born and grew up near Iowa Park. She is a 1975 graduate of Iowa Park High School, and received an Associate of Business degree from North Central College in Gainesville (formerly Cooke County Junior College). Ed is a 1973 graduate of IPHS.

Presently she is a junior student at Midwestern State University, majoring in psychology, and works as a merchandiser for three companies.

The Howards have a son and a daughter. Dub, 14, is a freshman at IPHS and plays football and soccer. Beth, 12, is in the seventh grade. She plays volleyball, and is a member of the junior high band.

Since Kitty Lou's father bred and raised race horses, it's not surprising that she has five horses. She also has 17 cats, plus occasional visits by the wild animals that wander across the property.

Kitty Lou said she use to crochet and cross stitch, but now she doesn't have time, and just reads for relaxation. She is a member of Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Wichita Falls.

Although she prefers recipes that are easy to prepare, Kitty Lou is also economical when it comes to cooking. For instance, she buys chicken breasts with the bone in and uses the bones to make chicken soup.

She got the "Blonde Brownies" recipe from her mother-in-law because her husband likes them so well, and "Pepper Steak" is a favorite of everyone in her family.

Blonde Brownies

1/2 cup butter
2 cups brown sugar
2 eggs
1 1/2 cup flour
2 tsps. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla
1 - 12 oz. pkg. chocolate chips
Melt butter over low heat. Blend in sugar and cool. Stir in egg. Blend in flour, baking powder and salt. Stir in. Mix in vanilla and chips. Spread in greased pan. Bake 25 minutes.

Mexican Chicken

1 chicken, boned
1 onion, diced
2 cans cream of chicken soup
1 can Rotel tomatoes
1/2 lb. Cheddar cheese, grated
1 tsp. garlic salt
3 tsps. chili powder
1 pkg. corn tortillas
Mix first 7 ingredients. Soften tortillas in chicken broth and line 8 1/2 x 11 pan. Place chicken mixture over tortillas. Bake 35 minutes at 350 degrees.

Hearty Tuna Salad

1 - 9 1/4 oz. can tuna
1 - 10 oz. pkg. green peas
1 cup thinly sliced celery
1/2 cup chopped green onions
3/4 cup mayonnaise
2 Tbsps. lemon juice
1 tsp. curry powder
1/8 tsp. garlic salt
1 tsp. soy sauce
1/4 cup toasted slivered almonds
1 cup chow mein noodles

Drain tuna; break into large pieces. Cook peas by package directions. Cool. Add peas, celery and onions to tuna.

Combine mayonnaise, lemon juice, curry powder, garlic salt and soy sauce. Add to tuna mixture and chill. At serving time add noodles and almonds; toss lightly.

Too Easy Cherry Dessert

2 cans cherry pie filling
1 white cake mix
2 sticks margarine
1 cup chopped pecans, optional
Pour pie filling in a 9x13 cake pan. Put dry cake mix on top. Slice margarine in pieces over cake mix so that it is completely covered. Bake at 350 degrees 30 minutes or until golden brown.

Chicken Kiev

4 chicken breasts, no bones or skin
Mix together:
2 beaten eggs
2 Tbsps. Parmesan cheese
2 Tbsps. minced chives
Dip chicken in batter then roll in flour. Fry over medium to high heat for 5 minutes on each side.
Make gravy with 2 cans of cream of chicken soup.
Serve over rice.

Green Pepper Steak

1 lb. beef chuck or round, fat trimmed
1/4 cup soy sauce
1 clove garlic
1 1/2 tsp. grated fresh ginger or
1/2 tsp. ground
1/4 cup salad oil
1 cup green onion, thinly sliced
1 cup red or green peppers, cut into 1-inch squares
2 stalks celery, thinly sliced
1 Tbsp. cornstarch
1 cup water
2 tomatoes, cut into wedges

With a very sharp knife, cut beef across grain into thin strips, 1/8-inch thick.

Combine soy sauce, garlic, ginger. Add beef. Toss and set aside while preparing vegetables.

Heat oil in large frying pan or wok. Add beef and toss over high heat until browned. Taste meat. If it is not tender, cover and simmer 30 to 40 minutes over low heat.

Turn heat up and add vegetables. Toss until vegetables are tender crisp, about 10 minutes.

Mix cornstarch with water. Add to pan; stir and cook until thickened. Add tomatoes and heat through.

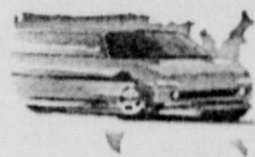

DUSTY OWEN SCORES HAWKS' FIRST TOUCHDOWN AGAINST VERNON

Hawks lose more than score

The Iowa Park Hawks lost more than a game Friday night when they fell to the Vernon Lions 40-12 in their second district game of the season. They also lost the services of starting quarterback Todd Yeager.

Yeager, a sophomore who had started all seven games, suffered a broken collar bone when he was sacked by Sydney Gaines on the Hawks' second possession of the third quarter and will be sidelined for the remainder of the regular season.

The Lions scored on their second possession of the night when Marcus Montez capped a four-play 59-yard drive when he scored from 34 yards out with 5:54 left in the first quarter. Justin Hutchins added the point after to give the Lions a 7-0 lead.

Iowa Park missed a golden opportunity to tie the game when Montez misplayed a punt from Corky Petty at the Hawk 33 yard line. David Waterbury recovered the ball for Iowa Park with less than a minute left in the opening period.

The Hawks picked up 16 yards on a Brandon Brown sweep but bogged down after that and had to settle for a 32-yard field goal attempt from John Woods which Vernon's Clint Kieschnick broke free and blocked to keep the score at 7-0.

The Lions made it 10-0 when Philip Bell connected on a 25-yard field goal with

8:51 left in the second quarter. Vernon's lead grew to 16-0 just 2:37 later when Si Schur hooked up with Jason Mitschke on a 33-yard touchdown pass with 6:14 remaining in the second.

Iowa Park got on the board with 2:38 left in the first half when Dusty Owen scored from 2 yards out to cap an 8-play, 63-yard drive highlighted by a 38-yard pass completion from Yeager to Waterbury that moved the ball to the Vernon 13. The pass for two failed leaving the score 16-6.

Vernon followed with a 46-yard touchdown by Terrance Gaines with only 26 seconds left in the half off a fake reverse to boost the score to 22-6.

After allowing a play that would have broken the spirits of most teams with only seconds remaining in the half, Iowa Park showed its true colors by not just packing it in and heading for the locker room.

Clancy Lalumia took the ensuing kickoff at his own 6-yard line, broke a couple of tackles and outraced the entire Vernon team 94 yards for a touchdown with 11 seconds showing on the clock to pull Iowa park to within 10 at 22-12.

But that proved to be the last bright spot for the Hawks as Vernon scored on all three of its third quarter drives to pull away to the 40-12 victory.

"You would have thought the kickoff return would have given us a big lift," head coach Weldon Nelms said. "But we came out flat and went three and out on our first possession and didn't play with the emotion or intensity that you have to play with when you play a good team like Vernon. They may be the best team we've played all year, but at the same time I thought we may have played our poorest game fundamentally and that's something you can't afford to do against Vernon."

The Lions scored their 18 third quarter points on a 61-yard run by Gaines, a 29-yard field goal by Bell and a 3-yard pass to Mitschke from Schur.

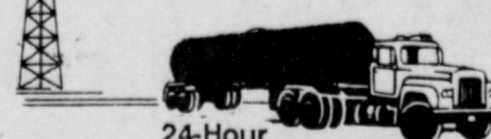
