in different directions as the Steers enter the contest 3-5 overall and 1-2 in District 3-3A play while Iowa Park is coming off an impressive win over Bridgeport leaving the Hawks (2-1 in district), in the drivers seat for the second playoff spot.

In Graham's last two games can't let that happen." against Bridgeport and Jacksboro, the Steers are averaging 255 yards rushing and 86 yards passing while giving up only 50 yards rushing and 175 yards passing. "Last week's game was a huge win for us," Nelms said. "It was a game that had a lot of meaning and I thought our kids played exceptionally well in all facets of the game. I thought it was the best effort by far as a team since I've been here. Graham has been down a bit but last week was a big win for them to keep them alive. They feel like they can get right back in the race by knocking us off and we

Nelms has said all along that if you work hard and give it all you've got, good things will happen and that was the case Monday when senior running back Corky Petty was named as the Channel 6 Athlete Of The Week for his preformance in the Bridgeport

Petty had an interception, threw a 37-yard touchdown pass off a fake punt and scored another touchdown on a 3-yard run to pick up the honor. honor by himself.

"It's an individual award but it

says a lot about the whole team," Petty said. "This couldn't have happened without the entire team's effort. I don't know why they picked me, they said I was everywhere on the

Some of the help Petty was talking about came from the offensive line that opened holes that led to a 330-yard rushing preformance by the Hawks, as Dusty Owen and Shane Bagley each rushed for over 100

Owen finished with 129 yards on 26 carries that included a 78-yard touchdown romp with 5:54 left to seal the win over the Bulls. Bagley added 108 yards on only 9 carries.

"Our offensive line opened some huge holes," Bagley said. "The lead reverse worked real well with Tyson Spruiell and Keith Hoover throwing some key blocks."

Graham has a big strong defensive line," Bagley added. " But they get discouraged easily if you keep pounding on them."

If Texans are staying away from the polls in this year's state constitutional amendment election the way Iowa Parkans are, a scant portion of citizens will be making the decisions on the 14 proposed changes.

Early voting was begun Wednesday, Oct. 18, and as of noon Monday, only 34 ballots had been cast at the local poll.

However, there's still time to

Election day is Tuesday, Nov. 7, when voting hours will be 7 a.m. to 7

The early voting poll, which is located in the Wichita County annex building at 400 N. Wall, will remain open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. today.

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
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

Arkansas Deer Camp Barbecue Sauce

The original recipe makes 8 qts. This reduced recipe makes 2 qts. This is a no-fat sauce to put on meat during the cooking process. 2 cups water

1/3 cup brown sugar

1,3 cup Worchestershire sauce 1/3 cup yellow mustard

1 cup ketsup 3 cups red wine vinegar

1 cup apple juice

1/4 cup salt

2 Tbsps. cracked black pepper 2 Tbsps. dried red pepper flakes

Mix in large non-aluminum saucepan. Bring to boil and simmer covered about 30 minutes. Keeps for weeks in the frig.

Spead out on pizza pan or cookie sheet with hands. cover with tomato or spaghetti sauce. Add toppings and cheese to taste. Bake 15-20 minutes at 425 degrees.


Opelousas Sunday Pot Roast

1 Tbsp. brown sugar

2 tsps. Tony Chachere's Creole Seasoning

2 garlic cloves, sliced 1 tsp. olive oil Hot water

Peeled potatoes 2 small or 1 large onion Peeled carrots



Sirloin, Ribeye or T-Bone steak, served with baked potato, green salad and Texas toast.

Cut 2 or 3 1/2-inch slits on top and bottom of roast. Fill each slit with Creole seasoning (or red pepper) and a garlic slice. (This step is optional but good if you like hot flavors.) Rub brown sugar and Creole seasoning thoroughly on all surfaces of the roast. Sear on all sides in hot oil in non-stick pan. Cover with hot water. Cook at low boil for about 1 hour. Add whole vegetables around sides and on top of roast. Simmer on low 2 to 3 hours until fork tender.

Crazy Chocolate Cola Cake 1 stick margarine, soft

1/2 cup applesauce

1 cup water

4 Tbsps. cocoa 2 cups sugar

2 cups flour

1 tsp. cinnamon

1 tsp. baking soda 1 cup cola (any flavor soda)

2 eggs 1 tsp. vanilla

Bring first 4 ingredients to a boil in a small saucepan. Set aside. Mix dry ingredients in large bowl and add boiled mixture. Addcola, well-beaten eggs and vanilla. Mix well. Pour into a greased and floured 11x16 pan. Bake 20 to 30 minutes at 400 degrees. While cake is still hot, cover with

Combine vegetables and sauces in large saucepan; cook over n.edium heat for 30 minutes. Dissolve comstarch in water and add to vegetable mixture. If additional liquid is needed, add drained juice from the peas or more picante sauce. Cook until slightly thickened. Chill overnight. Add chopped green onions just before serving. Makes 5 cups.

Colds are spread when a healthy person makes hand contact with a sick person or touches contaminated objects, such as doorknobs.


One of the best ways to reduce your risk of catching a cold or spreading colds to others is to wash your hands frequently.

Late October through November are key times for planting coolseason color in your home landscape.

Follow this garden checklist to keep your landscape and garden in prime condition during the fall months.

Planting:

* Plant cool-season bedding plants including pansies, kale, cabbage, stock, dianthus, and mums. Local nurseries have plentiful supplies of these colorful plants.

* Complete overseeding and warm-season lawns with ryegrass for a lush, green lawn all winter! Establish fescue lawns from seed by early November.

* The majority of wildflower seed including bluebonnets should

be planted now. Establish cool-season cover crops for wildlife. Winter wheat, Austrian Winter Peas, cereal rye, oats, among other crops help deer and other

animals survive the winter months. * Select tulip and hyacinth bulbs at local nurseries while supplies are good. Refrigerate tulip and hyacinth bulbs for 45 days at 45 degrees prior to planting. The crisper bin of the refrigerator works fine.

* Sow Elbon rye as a cover crop in vegetable gardens. Only Elbon rye is effective for reducing nematode populations.

Fertilization:

* Fescue lawns can be fertilized with 3-1-2 or a 4-1-2 ratio lawn food.

* Use a water-soluble plant food for newly-planted pansies and other cool-season bedding plants. Pruning:

*Cut caladium foliage back once

temperatures fall into the 50 degree zone. Store tubers in a cool, dry area for replanting late next spring. * Remove dead tree limbs while

they can still be identified before leaf * Remove freeze-damaged tissue on perennials after the first hard

Insect. Disease & Weed Control:

* Treat brown patch in St. Augustine with Bayleton. Circular brown areas with leaves which separate easily from the runner are indicative of this disease.

* Broadleaf weeds such as henbit or chickweed in warm season lawns can be controlled with a broadleaf herbicide such as Wipeout or Weed-Be-Gone.

* Check houseplants for insects before moving indoors. Treat as needed prior to moving in the home.

* Apply a copper fungicide to peach trees to prevent peach leaf curl.

* Utilize Fall leaves in compost piles.



The freshmen will take on Graham tonight at 5 p.m..



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
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

Hawks de-horn Bulls

Friday night's game against Bridgeport was the biggest game the Hawks had played since 1987.

A win would bring them one step closer to a playoff spot in District 3-3A while a loss would leave them on the outside looking in.

As head coach Weldon Nelms has said ever since he started, "If you work hard and put forth the effort, winning will take care of itself."

In what Nelms said was "the best effort by far as a team I've seen since I got here," the Hawks moved to within a single win of the playoffs by beating Bridgeport 27-18 behind a strong ground game that churned out 330 yards.

Iowa Park opened the game with an onside kick recovered by Keith Norris but failed to put points on the board when Brandon Campbell, who was filling in for injured Todd Yeager, failed to connect on a fake punt at the Bulls' 32.

Three plays later, the Hawks had the ball back after Corky Petty, who was named the Channel Six Athlete Of The Week, stepped in front of a Jacob Allen pass and returned it 17 yards to the Bridgeport 35.

But for the second time Iowa Park failed to score when the Hawks came up short on a fourth and 3 from the 5.

Seven plays later, Clint Witherspoon recovered a Bulls' fumble giving the ball back to the Hawks with 2:25 left in the opening period. Iowa Park picked up a first down on a 12-yard run by Shane Bagley, who finished with 108 yards rushing for the game, but stalled after that facing a fourth and 2 from the 37. Petty dropped back in punt formation and noticed Bridgeport had left uncovered the two outside Hawk receivers. Petty lofted a 37-yard touchdown pass to Michael Fallon with 3 seconds left in the first quarter to give Iowa Park a 6-0 lead. John Woods added the point after to boost the lead to 7-0 as the Hawks would never trail in the contest.

Bridgeport answered with a Michael Odom 1-yard run with 8:35 left in the first half but the two-point conversion pass fell incomplete leaving the score 7-6.

Iowa Park scored on a 3-yard plunge by Petty to bring the score to 14-6 at the half. Petty's score was set up by a 47-yard dash by Bagley.

Following a scoreless third quarter,

The Hawks took the ensuing kickoff at their own 22 yard line and on the first play from scrimmage, Dusty Owen, who finished the night with 129 yards rushing, broke up the middle for a 78-yard run, breaking two tackles along the way, to give Iowa Park a 26-18 lead with 5:54 remaining. Woods' extra point gave the Hawks some breathing room as the lead grew to 27-18.
