## Dealing With The Common Cold

Each winter, millions of people suffer from the unpleasant effects of "colds".
Despite popular opinion, you do not get colds from sitting in a draft, getting wet feet or staying outside too long in bad weather.
The common cold is a viral infection which is found in the respiratory system (the nose, throat and lungs).
Colds can last for just a feim days or as long as a couple of weeks.
Colds are spread through the air or by contact with hands.
You can help keep your cold from spreading to others if you are careful to cover your mouth when you sneeze or cough.
Colds are spread when a healthy person makes hand contact with 2 sick person or touches contaminated objects, such as doorknobs.
One of the best ways to reduce your risk of catching a cold or spreading colds to others is to wash your hands frequently.
There is no "cure" for the common cold. The best way to treat your cold is rest, drink plenty of liquids, and take proper medication to relieve your cold or cough symptoms. Your pharmacist or doctor can recommend the best medicine for you.
If your child has a cough or a cold be sure to ask your doctor or pharmacist about the amount of medicine to give your child.
Remember a cough can be serious. If your cough lasts longer than 10 days or is accompanied by a fever of 102 degrees or higher for 10 days or is aree days, see your doctor.

## Gardening Hinis

Late October through November are key times for planting cool season color in your home landscape. Follow this garden checklist to keep your landscape and garden in prime condition during the fall months.

## Planting:

* Plant cool-season bedding plants including pansies, kale, cab bage, slock, danuus, and mums. plies of these colerful plants.
* Complete overseeding
warm-season lawns with ryegrass for a lush, green lawn all winter! Establish fescue lawns from seed by early November

The majority of wildflowe seed including bluebonnets should be planted now.

Establish cool-season cover crops for wildlife. Winter wheat Austrian Winter Peas, cereal rye, oats, among other crops help deer and othe * Select tulip and hyacinth bulbs Secal nursecries while supplies are at local nurseries while supplies are
good. Refrigerate tulip and hyacinth bulbs for 45 days at 45 degrees prior to planting. The crisper bin of the frigerator works fine.

Sow Elbon rye as a cover crop vegetable gardens. Only Elbon ry is effective for reducing nematode populations.

## Hawks de-horn Bulls

Friday night's game against Bridgeport was the biggest game the Hawks had played since 1987.

A win would bring them one step closer to a playoff spot in District 3-3A while a loss would leave them on the outside looking in.

As head coach Weldon Nelms has said ever since he started, "If you work hard and put forth the effort, winning will take care of itself.

In what Nelms said was "the best effort by far as a team I've seen since I got here," the Hawks moved to within a single win of the playoffs by beating Bridgeport $27-18$ behind a strong ground game that churned out 330 yards.

Iowa Park opened the game with an onside kick recovered by Keith Norris but failed to put points on the board when Brandon Campbell, who was filling in for injured Todd Yeager, failed to connect on a fake punt at the Bulls' 32 .

Three plays later, the Hawks had the ball back after Corky Petty, who was named the Channel Six Athlete Of The Week, stepped in front of a Jacob Allen pass and returned it 17 yards to the Bridgeport 35.

But for the second time Iowa Park failed to score when the Hawks came up short on a fourth and 3 from the 5 .

Seven plays later, Clint Witherspoon recovered a Bulls' fumble giving the ball back to the Hawks with 2:25 left in the opening period. Iowa Park picked up a first down on a 12-yard run by Shane Bagley, who finished with 108 yards rushing for the game, but stalled after that facing a fourth and 2 from the 37. Petty dropped back in punt formation and noticed Bridgeport had left uncovered the two outside Hawk receiv ers. Petty lofted a 37 -yard touchdown pass Michael Fallon with 3 seconds left in the o Michael F first quarter to give lowa Park a 6-0 lead.
John Woods added the point after to boost the lead to 7-0 as the Hawks would never trail in the contest.

Bridgeport answered with a Michael Odom 1-yard run with 8:35 left in the first half but the two-point conversion pass fell incomplete leaving the score 7-6.

Iowa Park scored on a 3-yard plunge by Petty to bring the score to $14-6$ at the half. Petty's score was set up by a 47 -yard dash by Bagley.
