IOWA PARK TX 76367 Hawks to meet Boyd Friday in pi-district

Way back in early August 248 teams hit the field, with the hopes of advancing to the Class 3A playoffs which begin tomorrow night.

All but 64 of those teams are now playing basketball or some other sport as their football seasons ended after last week's games.

Iowa Park will be among the 64 elite teams that will be shooting for the State Title. The Hawks advanced by finishing runner-up to the Vernon Lions in District 3-3A and will open the playoffs in Bowie tomorrow night at 7:30 against the District 4-3A champion Boyd Yellowjackets.

Boyd advanced by beating Springtown 3-0 Friday night and by Decatur upsetting Aledo.

The Yellowjackets, 8-2 overall

and 4-1 in district play, were beaten by Jacksboro and Aledo earlier this season. Boyd is averaging 24.7 points per contest while allowing only 13.3. They are led by Phillip Beyer, a 205lb. junior quarterback who has rushed for over 1,000 yards this year.

Beyer directs the Jackets' veer offense and carried the ball 28 times in the 3-0 win over Springtown. He's joined in the backfield by Kris Taylor, a 200-lb. senior halfback, and Jeremy Brown, a 185-lb. senior halfback. When Boyd goes to the air, slot back Cory Smith and split end Dusty Rawlings are Beyer's favorite targets.

Heading into the final regular season game, things didn't look good for an Iowa Park - Boyd bi-district meeting. For that to happen, take your hat off to Boyd for shutting Springtown, ranked No. 13, had to lose to Boyd and at the same time, Decatur, which had won only three

the Jackets' potential by comparing a common opponent in Jacksboro. Iowa Park opened district play at 0-5 and beat the 5-0 Tigers 27-14 while Jacksboro beat Boyd 14-7 the week before.

"I don't put a lot of faith in common opponents," Nelms said. "The playoffs are a brand new season and a team that is hungry is the type of team that can get on a roll and go a long way. While a team that's just happy to get there doesn't last long. Our defense is playing with a lot of confidence and is improving every week, our offensive line is starting to wear down some teams and we've continued to get big plays from our kicking game."

The Hawk defense, which played

one of its best games against Bowie, will once again be called on to rise to the occasion.

"Boyd runs the veer and they like to pound the football at you," Nelms said. "Their quarterback is the center of their offense. He will run over you or he can run around you. We have to keep him in check. They're a 'three yards in a cloud of dust' type team that drives the ball right at you with their ball control offense, then they try and capitalize with their defense on any mistakes you make."

"This doesn't mean that we've given up," commented Mayor Wayne House. "We intend to keep looking for a while."

In other business, the council approved lists of streets to be improved next summer, approved purchasing a new police cruiser, and approved advertising for a two-year contract for custodial work.

Also approved was a proposal to eliminate the requirement of deposits on city utilities for all active military personnel residing here.

Streets to receive slurry coating include five blocks on Hawthorne, three blocks of Texowa, four blocks on Bank, three blocks on Rebecca, one block on Saratoga, seven blocks on Bond, six blocks on Emerald, five on Jackson, one on Blue Jay, five on Park Plaza, two on Mockingbird and seven blocks on Second Street.

From among a list of seven streets to be resurfaced with asphalt, four were given the highest priorities, with the others to be considered, depending on the cost of the project.

Highest priorities were placed on: 200 and 300 blocks of West Park; 1100 through 1500 blocks of North Third: 300-400 blocks of West Louisa, and 600-700 blocks of West Clara.

The seven projects were estimated to cost \$220,000, and the cost

City receives sales tax rebate

Though Iowa Park businesses showed a slight increase in sales tax collections during September, as compared with the same month in 1994, this year's overall gain is still exceptional.

The City of Iowa Park received a sales tax rebate check from the state comptroller's office for \$30,954.27, which was only 0.87 percent greater than the rebate at this time last year.

However, Iowa Park continues to lead all other cities in Wichita County in gain for the year, with 7.32 percent. Thus far, sales taxes rebated have amounted to \$239,007.05, according to the comptroller's office report.

Electra is experiencing a 2.44 percent increase for the year, over 1994, and Wichita Falls is up 2.22 percent. Burkburnett is minus 3.23.

Holliday is a plus 1.07 percent. having received \$58,455.22 thus far this year.

November's rebates include taxes collected by monthly sales tax filers on September sales, and by quarterly filers for July, August and September.

of the four highest priority projects would be \$140,000.

Aldermen decided to purchase a replacement police cruiser through a cooperative purchasing agreement with the City of Wichita Falls.

Cost of the unit will be \$18,291, which is some \$1,500 higher than projected when the budget was adopted, but less than it would cost to not buy through the cooperative agreement, aldermen were told.

With the encouragement from the commanding officer of Sheppard AFB, council members agreed to adopt a policy of not requiring active military personnel who decide to reside here to make a deposit on city utilities.

The council was assured military personnel must pay debts owed, therefore no utility bills would go unpaid should any such personnel move away.

Mrs. Peggy Blanchard approached the council with a proposal that the city pay her the value of four lots which were rendered "useless" after the water tower was built on West Emerald.

She explained she was given the property as part of a divorce settlement, and they had been appraised at \$2,000 each.

However, Emerald can no longer be used to reach the lots, because the water tower covers virtually all of the dedicated street, though the street was never officially opened.

The council decided to have an independent appraisal made of the property, and make a settlement offer based on that appraisal, and Mrs. Blanchard agreed.

In an effort to achieve an emergency fund, which earns interest in long-term investments, the council approved applying \$160,000 from surplus carried over from the 1994-95 budget to reach the desired \$1million amount.

Mayor House explained the carryover surplus from last year's budget included \$325,368 from the general fund and \$372,622 from the water and sewer fund.



The 911 telephone number should only be used in the event of an emergency. The police department regards 911 as a high priority call and an officer responds to each one received.

It should not be used as an information line and <u>never</u> used for prank calls.

It is recommended that you not program 911 into your phone as this accounts for about one fourth of all the "Whoops, I hit the worng button" 911 calls we receive.

Remember, 911 is there for you as a way of getting a fast response when faced with an emergency. So, use it if you need it, but make sure you need it before you use it! AUSTIN - Two years ago, Dallas billionaire H. Ross Perot warned of the "giant sucking sound" of the North American Free Trade Agreement. As December 1995 approaches, Texas Attorney General Dan Morales predicts another sound: the rumble of overloaded Mexican trucks.

The state's top lawyer seeks presidential action on the issue before Dec. 18, the date on which trucks from Mexico will have complete access to Texas roadways.

"We asked (President Clinton) to issue an executive order that would allow Texas law enforcement entities access to all bordercrossing facilities, so that they can work with U.S. customs officials to keep unsafe Mexican trucks off Texas highways. We think this is a necessary step that must be taken between now and Dec. 18," Morales said in a prepared statement.

Mexican trucks, Morales said, often weigh up to 170,000 pounds - more than twice the lawful U.S. weight of 80,000 pounds. And, he pointed out, Mexican truck drivers receive less training and operate under lower safety standards. For example, U.S. drivers are limited to 10 hours a day behind the wheel; Canadian drivers are limited to 13 hours; but Mexican drivers aren't limited at all.

Also of concern to the attorney general is that trucks from Mexico may carry corrosives, chemicals, explosives, jet fuel, poisons, toxic waste, pesticides and perhaps, illegal drugs.

Voters OK 11 Amendments Less than 8 percent of Texas' registered voters went to the polls Nov. 7 and approved 11 of the 14 proposed constitutional amendments.

Almost 84 percent of the voters approved an amendment to extend the homestead exemption to surviving spouses at least 55 years old. And 69 percent OK'd increasing the property tax exemptions for disabled veterans.

Voters defeated measures that would:

 Allow local governments to exempt commercial fishing boats from property taxes; and

 Exempt Masonic lodges and other benevolent organizations from property taxes.

Saves State \$7.42 Million

Treasurer Martha Whitehead, a Democrat and former Longview mayor who urged abolition of her own office, said Texans are sick of big government bureaucracy. She announced her commitment to abolish the treasury in November 1993, four months after she was appointed to the post by then-Gov. Ann Richards.

While phasing out the treasury will take four years, Whitehead's job and 42 administrative support positions will be eliminated Sept. 1, 1996, with a first year net savings to the state of \$160,000.

Bigger savings will come as more jobs are eliminated, Whitehead said. By September 1998, 164 positions will be eliminated, saving the state \$7.42 million.

Other Highlights Now that she has convinced voters to abolish the Treasury Department, Whitehead said last week she may run for the Texas Railroad Commission and work toward closing it down too. The three-member commission has 870 full-time employees and an annual budget of \$47 million. The treasury has 200 full-time employees and a \$20 million budget.

 Texas insurance companies have proposed an 11.3 percent increase in standard rates for auto insurance to cover their escalating losses. But Texas' consumer advocate for insurance said companies are making enough money, and rates should remain where they are. State Insurance Commissioner E!ton Bomer will decide where to set the benchmark auto rates after he receives a recommendation from state administrative law judges.

The Texas Supreme Court has formed the Commission on Judicial Efficiency, a task force to improve judicial selection, effici- ency and staffing of the courts and to work on campaign finance reform. The bipartisan 16-member commission, headed by Dallas lawyer Tom Luce, will make its recommendations to the state Legislature in the 1997 session.
