# Hawks to meet Boyd Friday in bi-district

Way back in early August 248 teams hit the field, with the hopes of advancing to the Class 3A playoffs which begin tomorrow night.

All but 64 of those teams are now playing basketball or some other sport as their football seasons ended after last week's games.

Iowa Park will be among the 64 elite teams that will be shooting for the State Title. The Hawks advanced by finishing runner-up to the Vernon Lions in District 3-3A and will open the playoffs in Bowie tomorrow night at 7:30 against the District 4-3A champion Boyd Yellowjackets.

Boyd advanced by beating Springtown 3-0 Friday night and by Decatur upsetting Aledo.

The Yellowjackets, 8-2 overall

and 4-1 in district play, were beaten by Jacksboro and Aledo earlier this season. Boyd is averaging 24.7 points per contest while allowing only 13.3. They are led by Phillip Beyer, a 205-lb. junior quarterback who has rushed for over 1,000 yards this year.

Beyer directs the Jackets' veer offense and carried the ball 28 times in the 3-0 win over Springtown. He's joined in the backfield by Kris Taylor, a 200-lb. senior halfback, and Jeremy Brown, a 185-lb. senior halfback. When Boyd goes to the air, slot back Cory Smith and split end Dusty Rawlings are Beyer's favorite targets.

Heading into the final regular season game, things didn't look good for an Iowa Park - Boyd bi-district

meeting. For that to happen, Springtown, ranked No. 13, had to lose to Boyd and at the same time, Decatur, which had won only three

take your hat off to Boyd for shutting down a team like Springtown. They'd been averaging around 40 points per game.

"I never thought it would happen," said Iowa Park head coach Weldon Nelms. "Every week's a battle and anything can happen and any night can be your night. You've got to

"Even though we didn't really want to play Springtown in the first round of the playoffs, we're not getting an easy team by any means," Nelms added. "They're a playoff proven team that is well coached and doesn't make a lot of mistakes."

The Hawks can't underestimate

the Jackets' potential by comparing a common opponent in Jacksboro. Iowa Park opened district play at 0-5 and beat the 5-0 Tigers 27-14 while Jacksboro beat Boyd 14-7 the week before.

"I don't put a lot of faith in common opponents," Nelms said. "The playoffs are a brand new season and a team that is hungry is the type of team that can get on a roll and go a long way. While a team that's just happy to get there doesn't last long. Our defense is playing with a lot of confidence and is improving every week, our offensive line is starting to wear down some teams and we've continued to get big plays from our kicking game."

The Hawk defense, which played

one of its best games against Bowie, will once again be called on to rise to the occasion.

"Boyd runs the veer and they like to pound the football at you," Nelms said. "Their quarterback is the center of their offense. He will run over you or he can run around you. We have to keep him in check. They're a 'three yards in a cloud of dust' type team that drives the ball right at you with their ball control offense, then they try and capitalize with their defense on any mistakes you make."

A couple of the key players that will be counted on to stop the Jackets are starting middle linebacker Clint Witherspoon and defensive lineman

## 3 teachers resign, replaced

Letters of resignation from three veteran teachers were accepted, and their replacements were hired during last Thursday night's school board meeting.

Following a closed session, board members accepted the resignations of Meredith Long, sixth and seventh grade mathematics; Linda Fleming, sixth grade history; and Jean Johnson, high school computer mathematics, trigonometry, and algebra.

Both Long and Fleming resigned to accept teaching positions with the Windham School System which is associated with the local Allred Prison unit. Johnson, whose resignation is effective Dec. 31, 1995, is planning to retire.

Hired to replace them were Janna May, sixth and seventh grade math; Aaron Smith, sixth grade history; and Richard Cook, high school computer mathematics, trigonometry, and algebra.

May received her B.S. degree at West Texas A&M, and has two years teaching experience at Decatur and Amarillo.

Smith, a 1991 graduate of Iowa Park High School, will receive his B.A. degree from Midwestern State University in December. He did his student teaching at Iowa Park Junior High School and completed all requirements for the degree on Nov. 9.

## Council rejects land plan

If a golf course is to be developed in the Iowa Park area, it likely will not be on the immediate west side of the city.

The city council Monday night voted to reject a proposal for a golf course site.

A split vote cast by aldermen defeated a motion to purchase the property. Voting for the proposal were Bob Hamilton and Tracy Fears, while Bud Mercer, Johnny Crawford and Mark Raby voted against it.

"This doesn't mean that we've given up," commented Mayor Wayne House. "We intend to keep looking for a while."

In other business, the council approved lists of streets to be improved next summer, approved purchasing a new police cruiser, and approved advertising for a two-year contract for custodial work.

Also approved was a proposal to eliminate the requirement of deposits on city utilities for all active military personnel residing here.

Streets to receive slurry coating include five blocks on Hawthorne, three blocks of Texowa, four blocks on Bank, three blocks on Rebecca, one block on Saratoga, seven blocks on Bond, six blocks on Emerald, five on Jackson, one on Blue Jay, five on Park Plaza, two on Mockingbird and seven blocks on Second Street.

From among a list of seven streets to be resurfaced with asphalt, four were given the highest priorities, with the others to be considered, depending on the cost of the project.

Highest priorities were placed on: 200 and 300 blocks of West Park; 1100 through 1500 blocks of North Third; 300-400 blocks of West Louisa, and 600-700 blocks of West Clara.

The seven projects were estimated to cost \$220,000, and the cost

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## Stolen travel trailer is recovered

A 30-foot travel trailer that was stolen here Aug. 6 has been recovered, according to this week's police blotter.

Iowa Park police were notified Wednesday evening by the Wichita County Sheriff's office that the trailer had been located in Wichita Falls.

County officers had discovered the well-hidden trailer at 6015 Seymour Highway, which is the site of a now-defunct fish bait business.

But the trailer wasn't all they had found, and in fact, wasn't the subject of the original reason for their investigation.

Also at the location was several thousands of dollars worth of fencing materials from a Wichita Falls business, as well as a trailer and other property allegedly stolen from Preston Giles, a former grocery store owner here.

The travel trailer, which had been hidden from all angles of roadways in the area, had become the home of Freddie Lee Calloway, 45, who was arrested and placed in jail.

Det. Lynn Collins on Thursday went to the county jail and served local warrants to Calloway, for burglary of a habitation and theft over \$1,500 and under \$20,000. Bonds on those charges were \$25,000 and \$5,000, respectively.

The Mallard travel trailer was

taken from a residence in the 100 block of Wood Circle during the early morning hours of Aug. 6, which had been stocked the night before in preparation for the owners' vacation trip.

Police reported all the couple's personal items had been removed from the trailer, as well as the license plate. It was identified by its vehicle identification number.

The couple's insurance company has already been paid for a replacement, and police are holding the trailer in storage to be claimed by the insurance company.

### BOGUS THEFT REPORTED

Five persons were arrested by Iowa Park police Monday, all on charges of making a false report to an officer.

Police were notified Saturday that several thousands of dollars worth of rented stereo equipment had been stolen from a residence in the 700 block of Park Plaza.

When police began investigating the report, the evidence failed to match the report they had been given. They eventually learned the equipment was in storage at two different residences here.

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## City receives sales tax rebate

Though Iowa Park businesses showed a slight increase in sales tax collections during September, as compared with the same month in 1994, this year's overall gain is still exceptional.

The City of Iowa Park received a sales tax rebate check from the state comptroller's office for \$30,954.27, which was only 0.87 percent greater than the rebate at this time last year.

However, Iowa Park continues to lead all other cities in Wichita County in gain for the year, with 7.32

percent. Thus far, sales taxes rebated have amounted to \$239,007.05, according to the comptroller's office report.

Electra is experiencing a 2.44 percent increase for the year, over 1994, and Wichita Falls is up 2.22 percent. Burkburnett is minus 3.23.

Holliday is a plus 1.07 percent, having received \$58,455.22 thus far this year.

November's rebates include taxes collected by monthly sales tax filers on September sales, and by quarterly filers for July, August and September.

- 2 cans crescent rolls
- 1 - 16 oz. ctn. sour cream

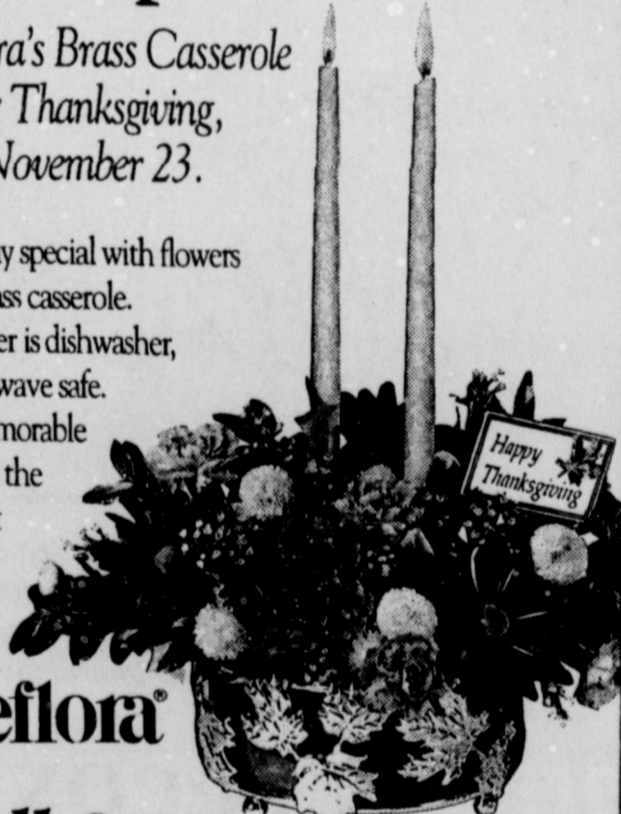

Cook will receive a Bachelor of Arts and Sciences degree from MSU in December. His will begin teaching at the high school on Jan. 8, 1996.

Following an earlier closed session in which student discipline and personnel matters were listed as topics, no action was taken by the board.

Trustees recognized Ray Youngblood and Cryovac for support of Iowa Park CISD during his tenure as plant manager and agreed to send him a letter of appreciation.

In other business, the board approved the district committees for the 1995-96 school year, nominated Keith Fisher as a candidate to fill a position on the TASB Board of Trustees, approved the Teacher Appraisal Local Performance Criteria, and authorized having Valley View school buildings checked for asbestos.

The board members also voted to implement the Alternative Education Program at the high school and junior high school.

In his report, Supt. Glen Mitchell said that enrollment has shown an increase of 42 students over this time last year. There were 2142 students enrolled on Nov. 9, 1995, compared with 2100 students on Nov. 10, 1994.

of the four highest priority projects would be \$140,000.

Aldermen decided to purchase a replacement police cruiser through a cooperative purchasing agreement with the City of Wichita Falls.

Cost of the unit will be \$18,291, which is some \$1,500 higher than projected when the budget was adopted, but less than it would cost to not buy through the cooperative agreement, aldermen were told.

With the encouragement from the commanding officer of Sheppard AFB, council members agreed to adopt a policy of not requiring active military personnel who decide to reside here to make a deposit on city utilities.

The council was assured military personnel must pay debts owed, therefore no utility bills would go unpaid should any such personnel move away.

Mrs. Peggy Blanchard approached the council with a proposal that the city pay her the value of four lots which were rendered "useless" after the water tower was built on West Emerald.

She explained she was given the property as part of a divorce settlement, and they had been appraised at \$2,000 each.

However, Emerald can no longer be used to reach the lots, because the water tower covers virtually all of the dedicated street, though the street was never officially opened.

The council decided to have an independent appraisal made of the property, and make a settlement offer based on that appraisal, and Mrs. Blanchard agreed.

In an effort to achieve an emergency fund, which earns interest in long-term investments, the council approved applying \$160,000 from surplus carried over from the 1994-95 budget to reach the desired \$1-million amount.

Mayor House explained the carryover surplus from last year's budget included \$325,368 from the general fund and \$372,622 from the water and sewer fund.

But after the lengthy layoff, it may take some of you newcomers a little time to catch on to how crazy you need to be, so you can get into the swing of things.

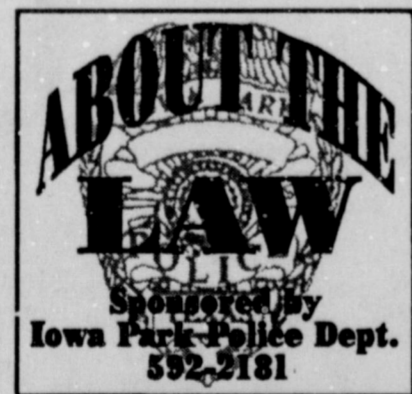

Remember, 911 is there for you as a way of getting a fast response when faced with an emergency. So, use it if you need it, but make sure you need it before you use it!

I'll not attempt to argue with my fellow council members, or any local taxpayer, who do not want the city to take the leadership in building such a facility.

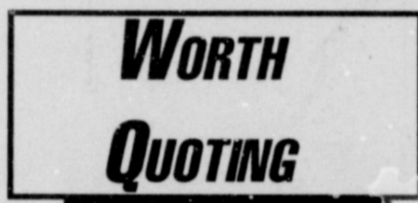
They have their reasons, and I respect that.

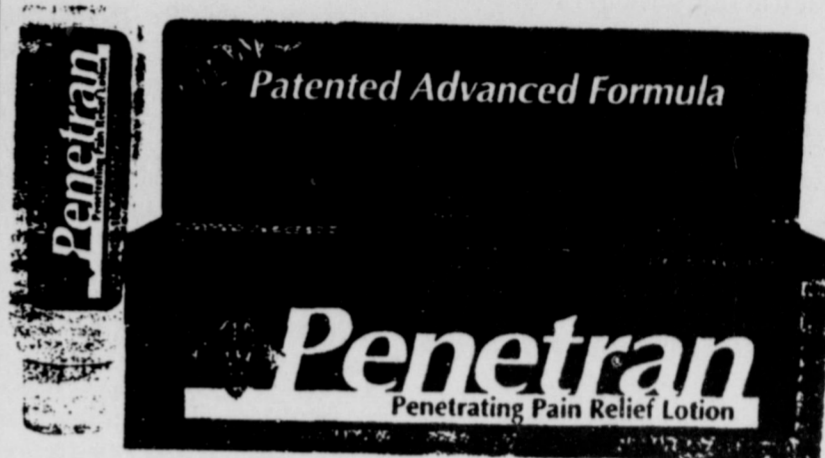

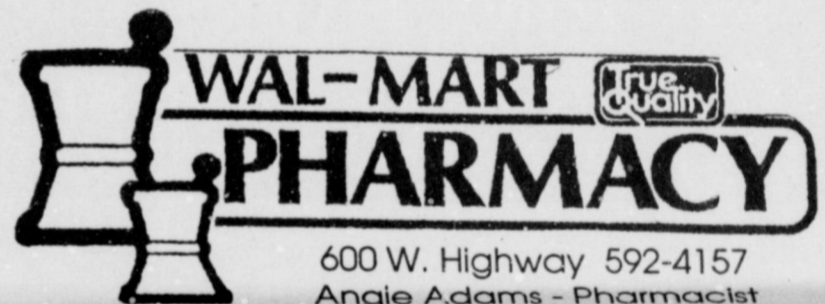

Two of the younger players Clark felt had solid games were Dillard and Campbell.

"Dillard proved he can handle big time pressure tonight," Clark added, "because he had a ton of it put on him. They triple teamed him at times and he handled himself well. Campbell did a great job for us on the boards and on their big 6-6 post player. He kept him off the boards and shut him down offensively."

Peaster was led in scoring by Jeremy Canafax who finished with 36 followed by Jeremy Moon who finished with 16. Troy Keller added 15 while Travis Hull tossed in 12.

The Hawks will look to go 2-0 Saturday night when they play host to Childress at 7:30 p.m. following the girls game that is scheduled to get underway at 6 p.m..

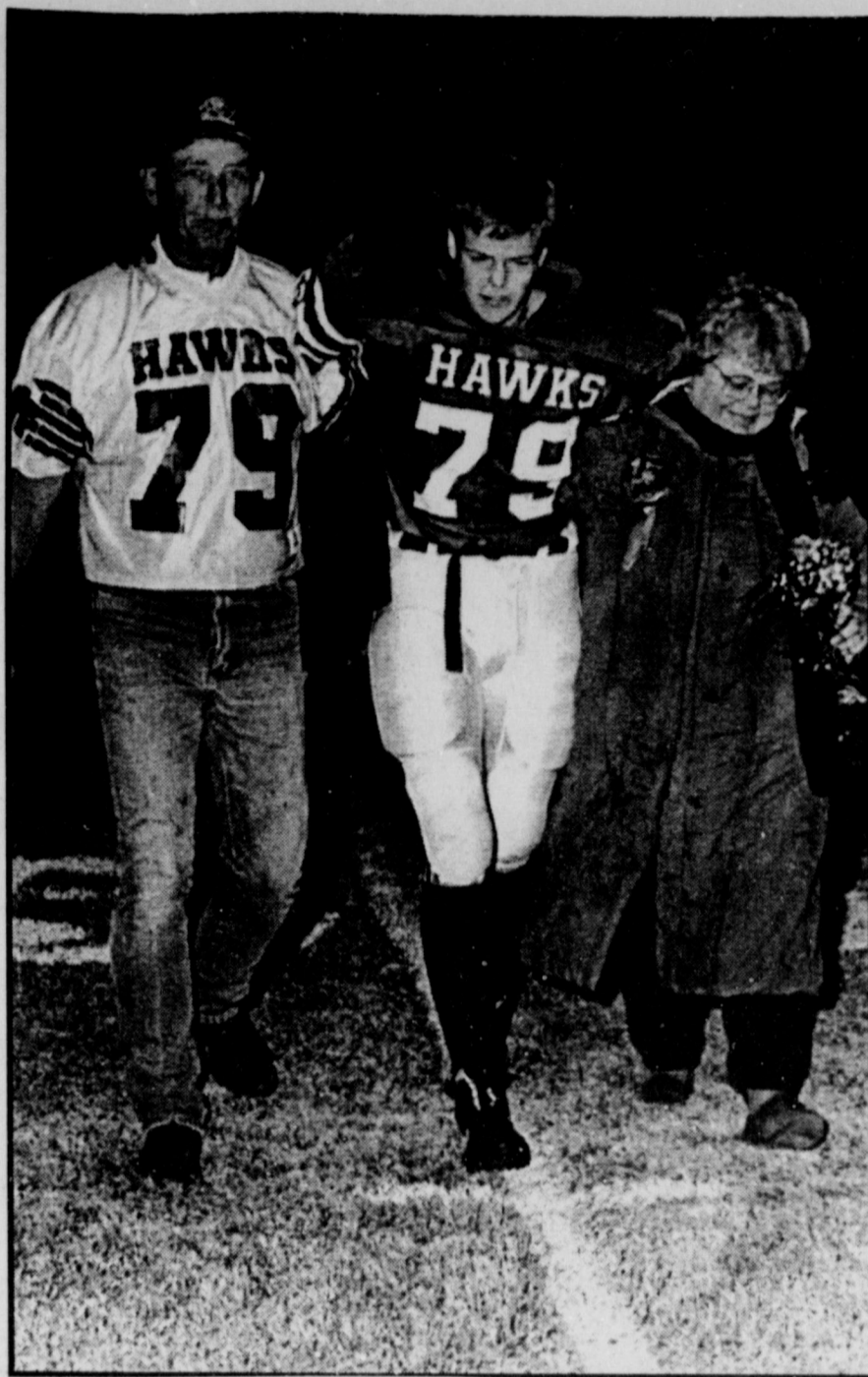

# Hawks dominate Bowie in finale

The Iowa Park Hawks, not the Eagles, knew going into Friday's regular season finale against Bowie that they were assured a spot in the playoffs win or lose and despite a sluggish first half and the bitter cold conditions, the Hawks prevailed over the Jackrabbits 19-3.

The Hawks' defense was the key to the victory for Iowa Park as they held the Rabbits on downs on Bowie's first possession. Iowa Park took over at the Bowie 44. Five plays later, Shane Bagley ran a sweep to his left on fourth-and-three from the 37, then cut back to his right and wound up in the end zone giving Iowa Park a 6-0 lead with 6:35 left in the opening quarter.

On Bowie's first possession of the second quarter, the Rabbits were forced to punt but Shawn Fulfer mis-played the ball for the Hawks giving Bowie the ball first-and-goal at the 8. But once again the defense stiffened and held Bowie on downs when David Hardison's fourth down pass sailed over the head of his intended receiver.

Iowa Park was forced to punt six

plays later with Bowie taking over at the Hawks' 46. The Rabbits moved the ball down to the Iowa Park 3 with 41 seconds left in the first half thanks to two big completions from Hardison to Thor Thornhill. On third-and-goal from the 3, Jackie Miller broke through the line and sacked Hardison for a 3-yard loss setting up Keith Carey's 22-yard field goal which pulled his team to within 3 at 6-3 as the first half ended.

The third quarter was a defensive battle as both teams traded punts on their first possessions. Iowa Park took over on its second possession of the third quarter at its own 3 and moved to their 16 but on third-and long, Brandon Campbell's pass was picked off by Thornhill giving the Rabbits the ball at the Hawk 22.

Two first downs later, Bowie had the ball first-and-goal from the 2. Twice Bowie tried Keith Richey off tackle and moved the ball inside the one. On third down the Rabbits looked to their big fullback Carey but he too was held short of the goal line.

On fourth, Clint Witherspoon and Dusty Owen nailed Richey, who once again tried off tackle, and forced a fumble that Keith Hoover recovered just outside the goal line.

From that point on the game belonged to Iowa Park as Bowie managed only four offensive plays the entire fourth quarter.

The Hawks took over at the one and went 99 yards in 15 plays capped by Owen's one yard plunge with 6:47 left in the game to make the score 12-3. Bowie took the ensuing kickoff and on its second play, Richey fumbled again, this one recovered by Clancy Lalumia at the Rabbit 28. Corky Petty, who finished with a game-high 106 yards rushing on 15 carries, covered all but three of the 28 yards and scored on a 7-yard run with 4:28 to go and when Keith Trammell tacked on the point-after the Hawks were on top 19-3.

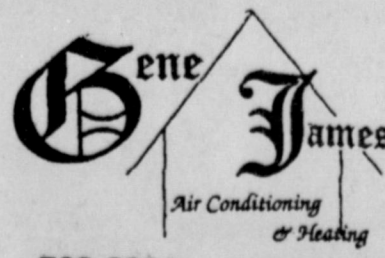

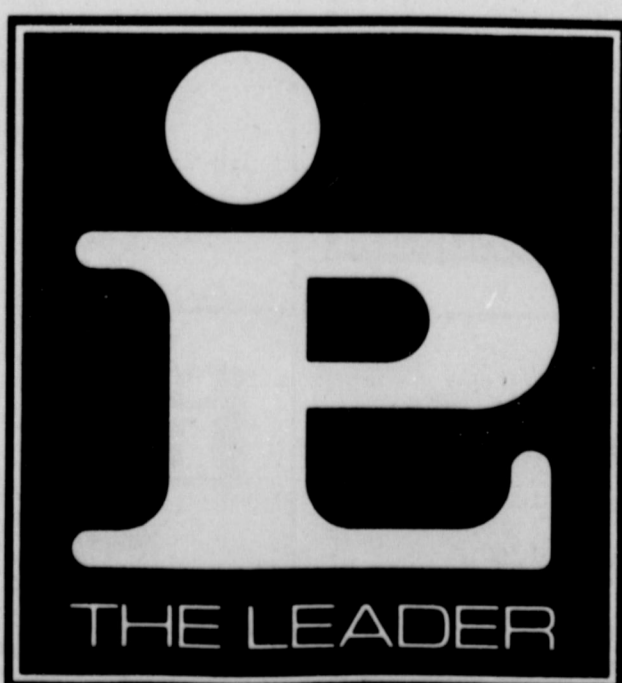

AUSTIN — Two years ago, Dallas billionaire H. Ross Perot warned of the "giant sucking sound" of the North American Free Trade Agreement. As December 1995 approaches, Texas Attorney General Dan Morales predicts another sound: the rumble of overloaded Mexican trucks.

The state's top lawyer seeks presidential action on the issue before Dec. 18, the date on which trucks from Mexico will have complete access to Texas roadways.

"We asked (President Clinton) to issue an executive order that would allow Texas law enforcement entities access to all border-crossing facilities, so that they can work with U.S. customs officials to keep unsafe Mexican trucks off Texas highways. We think this is a necessary step that must be taken between now and Dec. 18," Morales said in a prepared statement.

Mexican trucks, Morales said, often weigh up to 170,000 pounds — more than twice the lawful U.S. weight of 80,000 pounds. And, he pointed out, Mexican truck drivers receive less training and operate under lower safety standards. For example, U.S. drivers are limited to 10 hours a day behind the wheel; Canadian drivers are limited to 13 hours; but Mexican drivers aren't limited at all.

Also of concern to the attorney general is that trucks from Mexico may carry corrosives, chemicals, explosives, jet fuel, poisons, toxic waste, pesticides and perhaps, illegal drugs.

Voters OK 11 Amendments

Less than 8 percent of Texas' registered voters went to the polls Nov. 7 and approved 11 of the 14 proposed constitutional amendments.

Voters approved abolishing the office of state treasurer and merging its duties with those of the state comptroller.

Three bond issues were among the amendments that passed: \$300 million for an existing state-run college student loan program; \$500 million for a 50-year-old housing loan program for veterans; and \$200 million to assist agriculture-related businesses.

A proposal to permit home equity loans to divide property at the time of a divorce or death or to satisfy federal tax liens barely passed with 51.5 percent of the vote.

Almost 84 percent of the voters approved an amendment to extend the homestead exemption to surviving spouses at least 55 years old. And 69 percent OK'd increasing the property tax exemptions for disabled veterans.

Voters defeated measures that would:

- Allow local governments to exempt commercial fishing boats from property taxes; and
- Exempt Masonic lodges and other benevolent organizations from property taxes.

Saves State \$7.42 Million

Treasurer Martha Whitehead, a Democrat and former Longview mayor who urged abolition of her own office, said Texans are sick of big government bureaucracy. She announced her commitment to abolish the treasury in November 1993, four months after she was appointed to the post by then-Gov. Ann Richards.

While phasing out the treasury will take four years, Whitehead's job and 42 administrative support positions will be eliminated Sept. 1, 1996, with a first year net savings to the state of \$160,000.

Bigger savings will come as more jobs are eliminated, Whitehead said. By September 1998, 164 positions will be eliminated, saving the state \$7.42 million.

Other Highlights

■ Now that she has convinced voters to abolish the Treasury Department, Whitehead said last week she may run for the Texas Railroad Commission and work toward closing it down too. The three-member commission has 870 full-time employees and an annual budget of \$47 million. The treasury has 200 full-time employees and a \$20 million budget.

■ Texas insurance companies have proposed an 11.3 percent increase in standard rates for auto insurance to cover their escalating losses. But Texas' consumer advocate for insurance said companies are making enough money, and rates should remain where they are. State Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer will decide where to set the benchmark auto rates after he receives a recommendation from state administrative law judges.

■ The Texas Supreme Court has formed the Commission on Judicial Efficiency, a task force to improve judicial selection, efficiency and staffing of the courts and to work on campaign finance reform. The bipartisan 16-member commission, headed by Dallas lawyer Tom Luce, will make its recommendations to the state Legislature in the 1997 session.

■ Bandit activity on the Texas-Mexico border has prompted the U.S. Border Patrol to plan the construction of a second fence west of downtown El Paso. The three-quarter mile long, seven-foot chain-link fence should make it harder for bandits to elude authorities by running back and forth across the border.

The weekend theme will be "It's About Life".

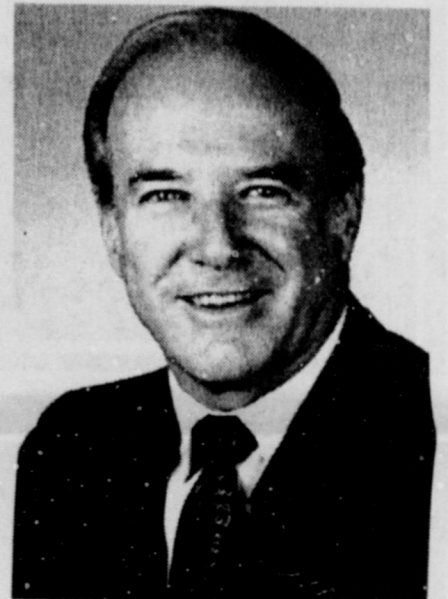
