## Ben doesn't garden anymore

Although 91-year-old Ben Steed hasn't gardened in eight or nine years, he is still remembered for the beautiful and prolific gardens he cultivated during more than 50 years.

He denies gardening was a first love of his—it was his late wife's idea that she must have a garden every year. In fact, he says, he still has a pantry full of canned vegetables he harvested and put up.

Steed now prefers to eat beans or chili, or something that doesn't take long to prepare.

Speaking fondly of his wife of 61 years and six months, he said, "She was the best cook in the country. I would have put her cooking up against any body's to be judged the best."

With a grin, Steed recalled when they lived on one of the Wichita Valley Farms that anytime

the late Fred Parkey, who was manager of the Wichita County Water Improvement District, was anywhere near their farm at mealtime he would make a point to get to their house. "He always said my wife was the best cook he knew."

And that launched him on a mental journey back to Oklahoma where he first met his future wife.

Steed was born in Carroll County Georgia, where the family lived in a large home and his daddy ran a sawmill.

When Ben was 11 years old his family decided to move to Mangum, Okla., where his mother had two brothers. They rented a farm from one of his uncles and Ben began helping his daddy on the farm.

In a few years the family moved to Willow where his daddy ran a cotton gin. Ben also helped

his dad there. In the Willow school was where Ben met the future Mrs. Steed. He was 14 and she was 12.

Ben worked for \$3 a day. When he got out of school he began helping a rancher branding cattle for \$2 a day. Being a frugal young man, Ben had been saving his money and as soon as he had saved enough he bought a second hand Ford roadster that was only a year old for \$400.

The car was what just what he had wanted. Until that time he and his date had to go to parties and dances in a horse-drawn buggy.

Ben and his fiancée were married when he was 20 and she was 18.

Before long after their marriage, the country entered the Depression Years. Steed had heard about the experimental Wichita Valley Farms Project south of Iowa Park, started under the Farm Security Administration in 1936.

The 92 tracts of land had been improved with a new wood frame house, a barn with loft, a chicken house, hog house and pump house. Well water was pumped into the house.

The Steeds were approved for a tract and moved first to No. 49 with two mules and a horse. He borrowed \$104 from the bank. He paid \$124.

Steed, a snuff-dipper, reclined in his rocker. He hesitated and picked up his improvised spittoon and meditated briefly. He laughed before he said, "I sent all of the \$124 to the bank. After taking out what I owed them they gave the rest to my daddy, and he kept it."

The resident farmer had to show a profit from the farm before he could purchase it. Steed raised a good cotton crop and paid the government \$1,800. The note on each farm was made out for 40 years with a three percent interest rate.

Steed had opportunity to move to No. 88 which had more acreage than No. 49. So he bought it.

He planted 20 acres of cotton and sowed 20 acres in coastal bermuda grass.

## Busy week for local police

This past week was a busy period for Iowa Park police, with seven arrests posted in the police blotter.

## Iowa Parkan recognized

Dr. William F. "Bill" Mahler recently was the recipient of the prestigious Charles Leonard Weddle Memorial Award at a banquet held in Waco.

Dr. Mahler was presented the highest award given by the Native Plant Society of Texas in recognition "of a lifetime of service and devotion in the field and systematic taxonomy with the native flora of the state of Texas".

Bill taught at Hardin-Simmons University and Southern Methodist University. He was founder of the herbarium at Hardin-Simmons, and for many years was cuator of the Shinners Herbarium at SMU.

He owned and published *Sida, Contributions to Botany* 21 years and was editor seven years while at SMU. When he retired he gave the publication to the Botanical Research Institute of Texas (B.R.I.T.) of which he is Director Emeritus.

Mahler, a native of Iowa Park and a graduate of Iowa Park High School, is the author of many learned and scientific papers, but probably will be remembered most for three books, "Keys to the Vascular Plants of the Blackgap Wildlife Management Area, Brewster County, Texas," "Flora of Taylor County Texas, and "Shinners Manual of the North Central Texas Flora".

Now retired, Mahler maintains an interest in his chosen career. He still gives occasional book reviews for *Sida*.

In addition, he continues to collect and process plants. He has collected and processed approximately 10,250 plant specimens since his retirement. He takes them to B.R.I.T. and from there they are sent to herbariums throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico and elsewhere.

## 44 turkeys for Thanksgiving

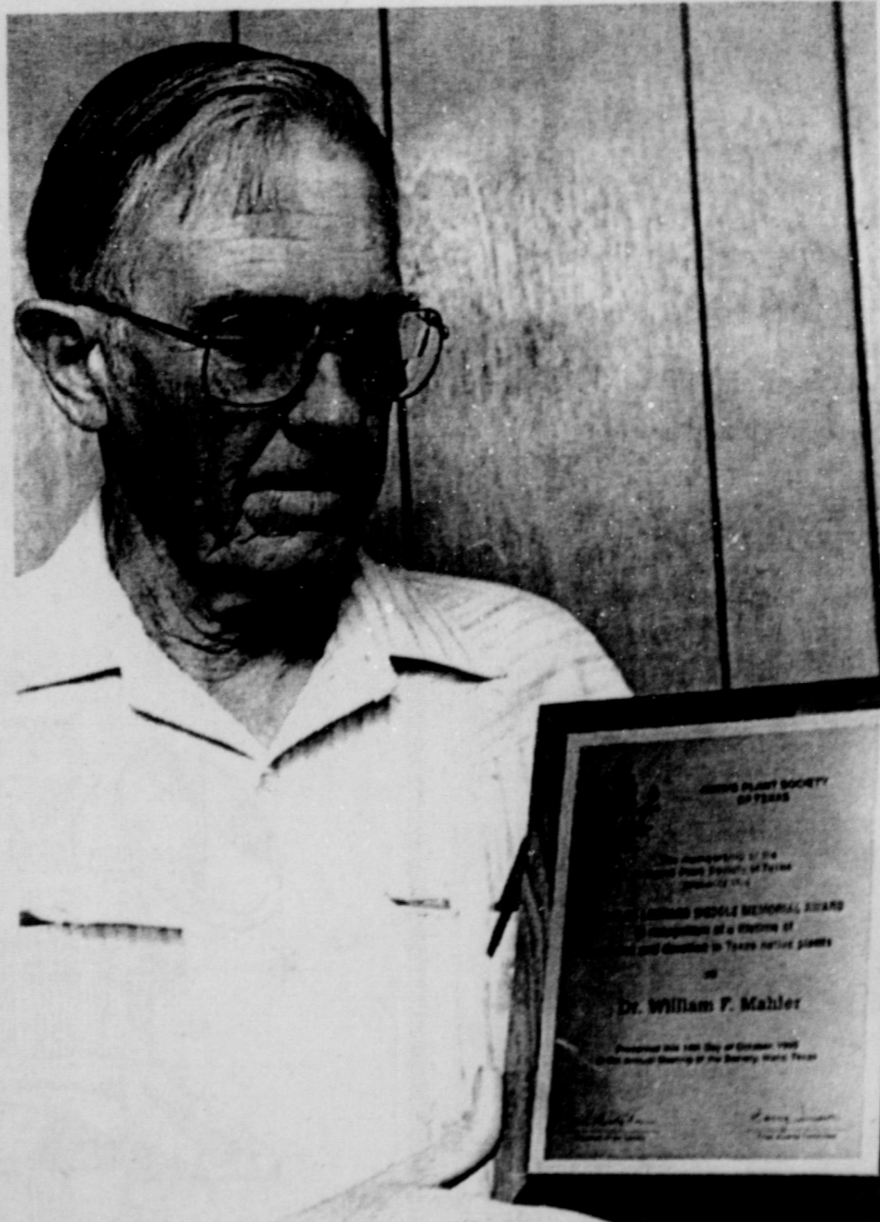
At least 44 households in Iowa Park will be having turkey during the holiday season.

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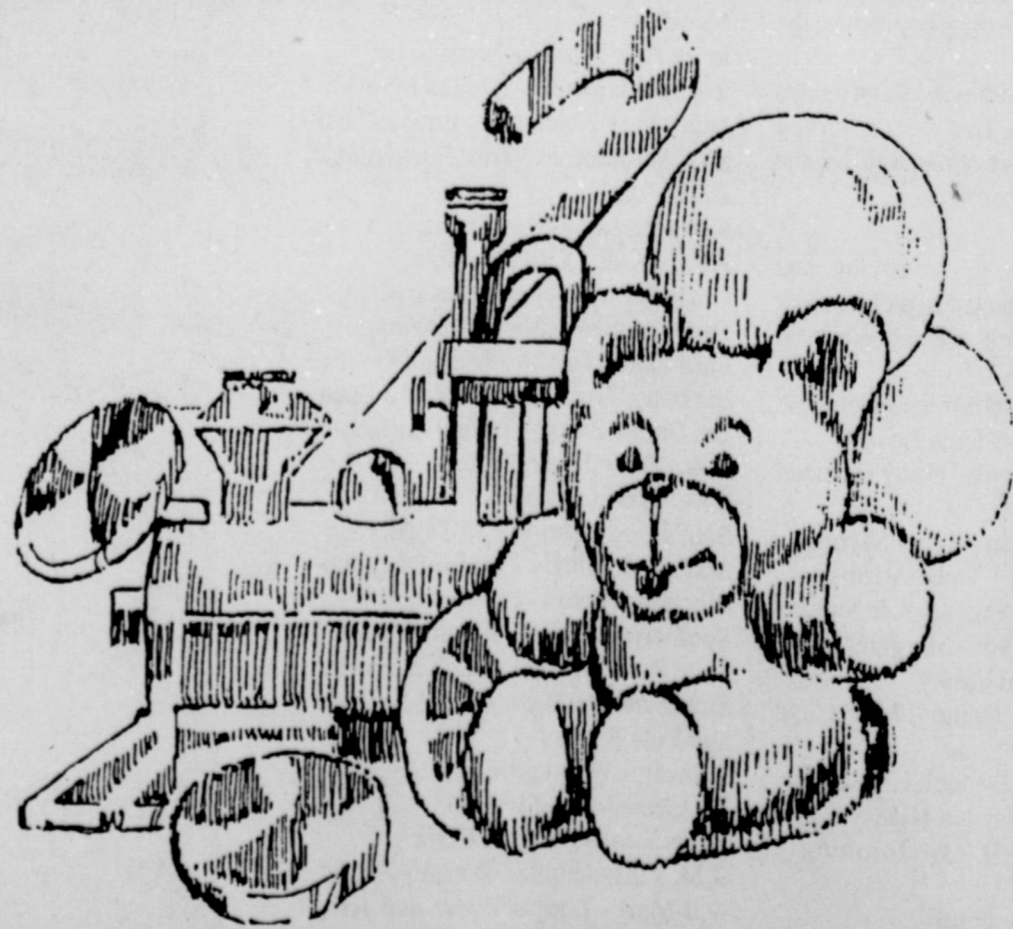
## The Spirit of Christmas

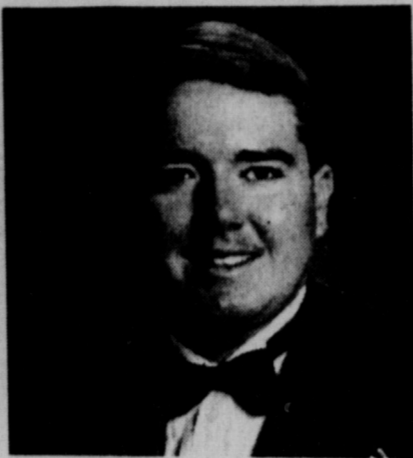
Orender's new assignment is an example of how Navy and Marine Corps men and women are assigned to ships, squadrons and shore commands around the world.

A finance charge will be assessed on cash advances from the date of the cash advance, or the first day of the billing cycle in which the cash advance is posted, whichever is later, and will continue to accrue until payment in full is made.

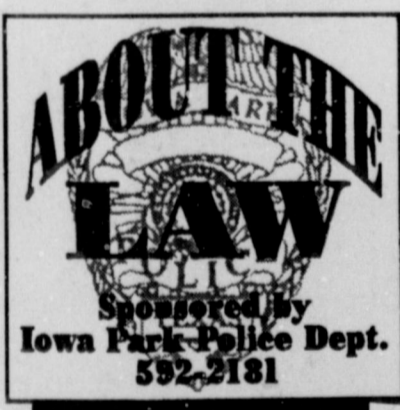

Separating fact from legend is part of researching our family genealogy and no matter what we learn favorable or unfavorable we are supposed to keep our family records accurate.

However, it seems this isn't always the way it is. Take for example the story of the first Thanksgiving, the legend obscures fact, and this is a good time to return to the history of that time.

We picture the Pilgrims as costumed in grey gowns and the dour men wearing black suits and hats. The Pilgrims, the passengers of the Mayflower, were not stern, strait-laced and middle aged zealots.

The stuffy ones were the Puritans, they had remained in Britain, protesting what they considered to be the liberal ways of the Church of England.

The Pilgrims were mostly young Elizabethans in their twenties and thirties. They wore colorful clothes and they enjoyed good times, including imbibing in strong spirits and the telling of bawdy stories.

Not only did they believe in a simple form of worship, but they believed in individual freedom, and

actually became devoted capitalists about two years after their arrival at Plymouth Rock.

The Pilgrims sat down together after the Mayflower anchored and drafted the Mayflower Compact, the forerunner of our Constitution.

To pay for their passage the Pilgrims more or less indentured themselves for seven years to London merchants, who financed the venture.

The freedom loving Pilgrims didn't thrive under this plan and it was soon decided after two years of poor crops and hunger, to allow each household to plant extra corn for its own use.

The people became more industrious and much more corn was planted, harvested and ground, and the American free enterprise system was on its way to making this the most successful and prosperous nation on earth.

This is what genealogy and history is all about—ancestors, histories, remembering, continuing and the making of our family traditions.

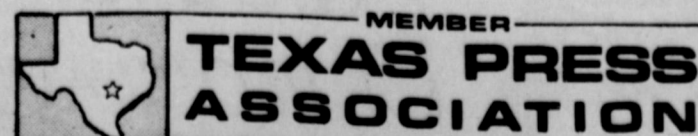

## New ways to keep roads clear

The Wichita Falls district of the Department of Transportation will be trying two new ways to keep ice and snow off the highways this winter.

One involves a spray process while the other utilizes a product called "red salt."

District operations engineer Rodger Clements says the district checked with other states and believes the two methods are definitely worth a try.

One is applied before bad weather, the other after snow or ice is on the road.

Clements says the spray will be applied to roadways shortly before storms arrive if there is any warning or a good probability of snow or ice.

The spray is effective before frost forms on cold mornings. He said spraying the overpasses and bridges before frost forms should be very beneficial compared to older methods of spreading sand mixed with a small amount of salt.

In addition, the effectiveness of the spray lasts for several days. Spraying is effective below 20 degrees and salt is not.

The salt is not a sodium product, but contains magnesium chloride. It takes about 30 gallons per lane mile to effectively keep the road surface in good condition.

Instead of chat, the district will be using a substance known as red salt. It comes from Utah, does not contain sodium and is water soluble.

It doesn't harm vehicles or road surfaces and is a fertilizer when it gets off the roadway into the right of

way.

Clements says the red salt is spread much like chat and is put on the roadways after snow and ice have started making the surface slick.

Motorists probably won't be able to see it, he says, so it may not look like it's been treated.

And when the storms are over, no sweeping is required to clear the roadway of chat and dust.

Some of his best crop years he made two and a half bales of cotton to the acre. The last year he farmed he made just a bale and a half, primarily because the insects were so bad.

He had two cows and the government loaned him money to purchase more. "We sold two 20-gallon cans of milk a day," he said. He bought a separator and they sold cream and some butter.

They also had 250 hens. "Every Friday night we candled eggs to examine them for freshness, fertilization, etc.," Steed related. On Saturdays Mrs. Steed would take the eggs into town and sell them. "She made enough from her eggs to buy her gas and help with the payment to the government."

After they moved to No. 88 Steed sowed some of the acreage in wheat and started raising calves.

The Steeds paid the \$3,800 for their farm in eight years. They stayed on the farm from 1942 until

his wife's death in 1987.

In a more pensive mood, Steed said, "I'll never know how she did it, but she told me when she was going to die. She had not been well, but she had not had any more trouble than usual. She had already talked to me and told me what she wanted me to do when she died."

She wanted me to move into town and didn't want me to be by myself. She was afraid I would fall or get sick and no one would be around. She wanted me to find a woman who would marry me. I told her I was not interested in that.

"She always liked to sit up and watch the Johnny Carson show. Although she had told me earlier that she was going to die that night, I didn't think that much about it because I didn't know how she could know that. She wanted to stay up to watch the show and I told her I was going on to bed."

"When I woke up the next morning I found her on the floor in the doorway. I asked her what she was doing sleeping on the floor.

When she didn't answer me I touched her and realized she was dead."

Since his wife died Steed has suffered a stroke and had to spend some time in the nursing home. But he is now able to stay at home.

His eyesight is failing and he can't read the newspapers anymore. He watches television, but is disgusted with some of the programs, as well as some of the news of today.

He commented, "My granddaddy fought in the Civil War. He told me never to vote for a Republican for president and so far I haven't." He didn't comment on future possibilities.

Steed worked as Iowa Park schools custodian 17 years and drove a school bus 12 of those years.

He had always worn overalls to work on the farm. When he started working for the school he began wearing trousers to work. "I had a lot of trouble keeping them pulled up so my shirt tail wouldn't come

out. One day Miss Ethyle Kidwell, the principal, asked me what I usually wore. I told her overalls and she asked, 'Well, why don't you wear them now and you wouldn't have so much trouble' So, I began wearing overalls and she told me how much better I looked."

Steed is a member of First Baptist Church but has been unable to attend services for a while.

The Steeds had three children, Pat Walters of Dallas, Mary Helen of North Carolina and the late Benny Steed.







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## Rep. Finnell addresses commission

Rep. Charles Finnell recently addressed the first meeting of the Red River Boundary Commission, created by legislation he passed in the 74th Legislature.

With the goal of establishing a more permanent state line boundary than the ever-moving south bank of the Red River, the Finnell resolution provided that the Texas and Oklahoma governors each appoint a citizen commission to focus on the subject, which has been a source of dispute since the Louisiana Purchase in 1803.

Gov. George W. Bush appointed six Texas citizens, including three from Finnell's 68th District: Don Malone of Vernon, Tom Henderson of Byers and Mildred Nunneley of Nocona.

All six participated in the initial meeting, held in Austin.

"The south bank of the Red River is not a permanent location, but rather is constantly changing," Finnell said.

"Solution of the Red River boundary dilemma would improve enforcement of state laws, better establish property ownership, assist in the collection of taxes, and lead to greater economic development of our region.

"I commend each of you that have been appointed, together with your very able chairman Bill Abney," Finnell continued, "for your experi-

ence, unselfish nature, and professional expertise you bring and for your dedication to serve your state in this capacity without compensation."

Public hearings will likely be held at Texas locations along the Red River at a later date, Abney said.

Sen. Tom Haywood of Wichita Falls sponsored the senate's concurrent resolution to Finnell's bill.

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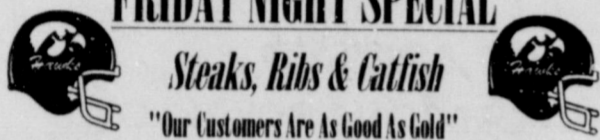
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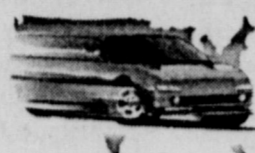
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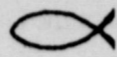

# Loss ends Hawks' season

Iowa Park probably had the best team on the field in Bowie Friday night in the Bi-District game between the Hawks and Boyd. But it was the Yellowjackets that had the best player.

Quarterback Phillip Beyer led Boyd to a 23-13 win over Iowa Park by scoring a pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns and rushing for a game-high 136 yards on 25 carries.

The Hawks opened the contest with a no-huddle offense that caught the Jackets off balance and moved the ball from their own 27 to the Boyd 33 before coming up short on a fourth-and-two with the big play of the drive being a 25-yard pass to David Waterbury from Brandon Campbell. The pair hooked up for five completions for 84 yards on the night as the Hawks had their best passing game of the season.

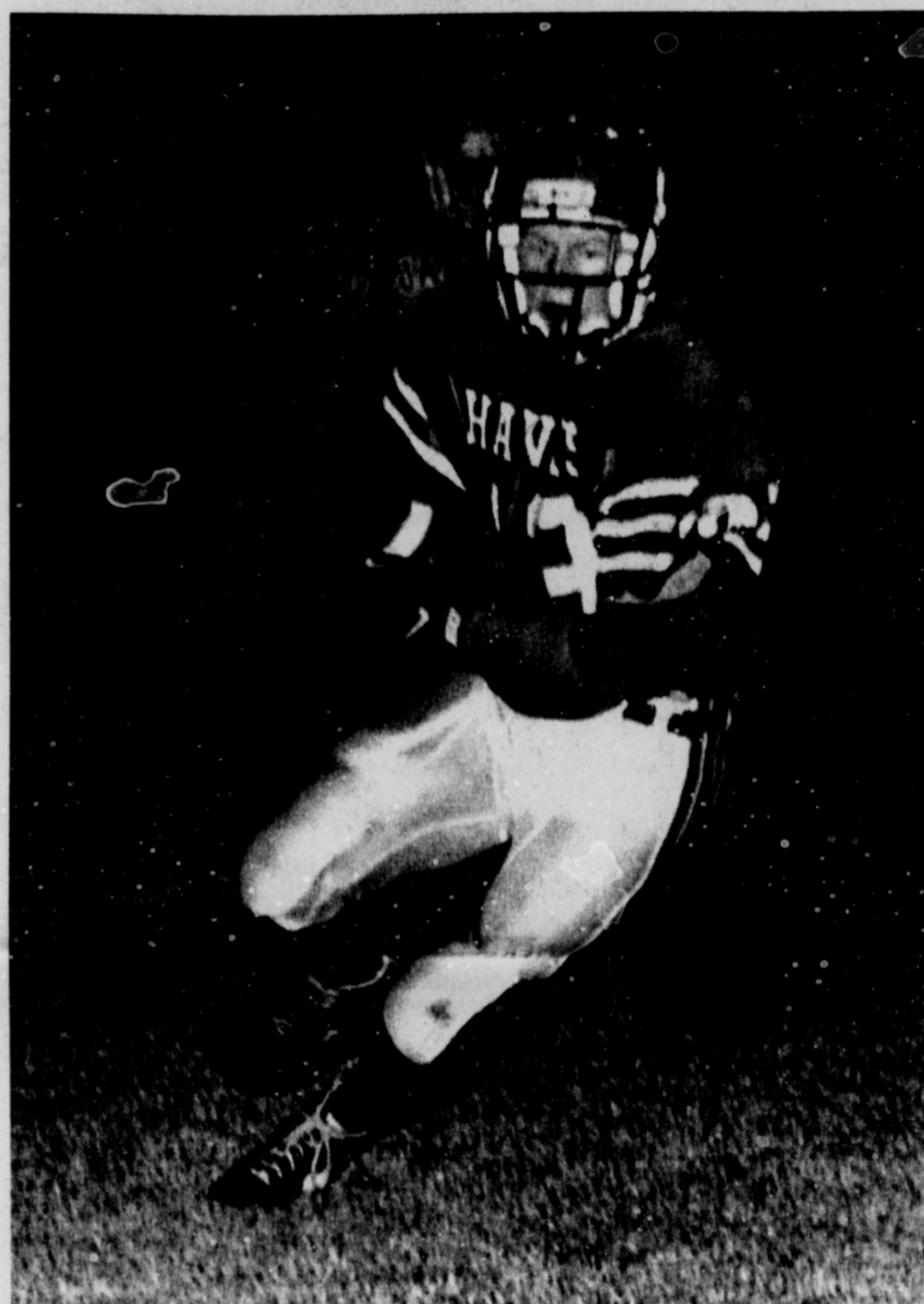
Boyd scored on their first possession going 67 yards on nine plays capped by Kris Taylor's 5-yard run with 5:27 left in the opening period. Wayne Hicks' point-after gave the Jackets a 7-0 lead.

The Hawks moved to their own 49 on their next possession but once again stalled and were forced to punt. The snap sailed over the head of Corky Petty who raced after the loose ball and tried to get off a hurried kick but instead, Boyd recovered the ball at the Iowa Park 27.

But like it has done all season long, the Hawk defense rose to the occasion stopping Boyd on four downs and taking over at the 31 as the Jackets lost four yards in the series.

Sparked by the defensive effort, Iowa Park took the ball and marched 69 yards in 10 plays to tie the game at 7-7 with 9:56 left in the first half. The drive was highlighted by a 31-yard pass from Campbell to Waterbury and was capped by Dusty Owen's 1-yard plunge. Keith Trammell added the point after to knot the score. In the drive Campbell was 3-for-3 for 52 yards with the other two completions going to Petty and Owen.

On Iowa Park's next possession, the Hawks picked up a first down on a 19-yard pass to Robert Klinkerman from Campbell but stalled when they were stopped short on a fourth-and-one from the 38. Boyd took over and moved to the Hawk 8 where they had to settle for a 24-yard field goal by Hicks with 1:19 left in the half to take a 10-7 lead.

The two teams traded punts in the third quarter with Iowa Park winning the battle of field position when Petty pinned the Jackets at their own 7 with a perfect punt.

But Boyd, answered the challenge and drove 93 yards in 10 plays to take a 17-7 lead with Beyer leading the way. The 205-lb. junior quarterback had a hand in nine of the ten plays and capped the drive with a 1-yard sneak with 10:10 left in the game.

"He's a hoss," said head coach Weldon Nelms. "You miss a tackle on him and boom, he's gone. There were three plays where we had him for losses and he breaks it for a big play."

Iowa Park appeared to have cut the Boyd lead to 17-13 with 5:12 left in the game when Toby King picked up a fumble and raced 23 yards for a touchdown. But the

play was called back as the referee's ruled a muff and that the ball could not be advanced. The Hawks took over at the Jackets 20 and scored four plays later when Brandon Brown dove over from the 3 to make the score 17-13. With Iowa Park trailing 5-3 in penetrations, the Hawks were forced to go for two, but Campbell's pass fell incomplete leaving Iowa Park behind by four. Beyer added his second touchdown of the game with 2:11 remaining to make the final 23-13.

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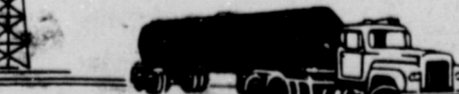

to end the quarter with a 15-9 lead.

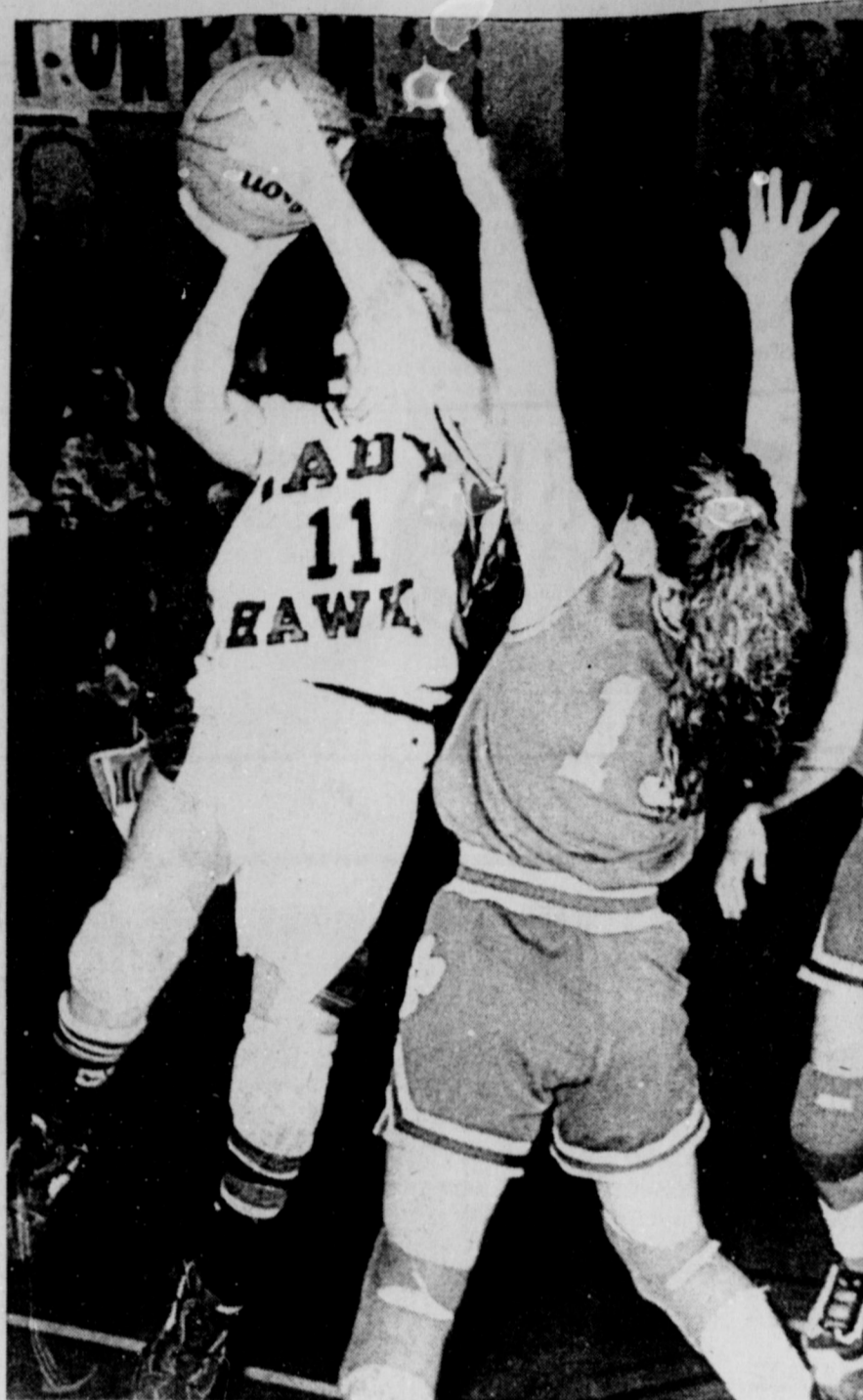

Welch scored 8 of her game-high 21 points in the final period but it wasn't enough to pull the upset as Childress went on to win 66-56 for the Lady Bobcats' first win of the season.

"I would have liked to see us execute a little better offensively", said head coach Ronda Havins. "And that will come with time. Overall I'm real pleased with the way we played."

**GARDENING HINTS**

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

The following questions were fielded at the Wichita County Extension office over the past week. Your gardening questions are welcome.

**Q.** Our Saint Augustine lawn has a very unusual white growth in an area where a tree was cut down several years ago. It looks like it is foaming. What could this be? It looks like something out of a Sci-fi movie.

**A.** It may look like a blob, but it is actually what is called a root rot fungi. The tree which was cut down is decomposing and this fungus is feeding on the decaying roots. This fungus will not harm your lawn, however, it does not look very presentable. You can scrape it off with a shovel and remove it from the lawn.

**Q.** We have an established fescue lawn in Wichita Falls. When do we fertilize and what should we use?

**A.** Fescue is a cool-season turf which is just the opposite of bermuda or St. Augustine. The key times for applying fertilizer are March 1, September 15, and November 15. Notice we are recommending that you fertilize during the cooler parts of the year. This is just the opposite of our fertility recommendations for warm season lawns. The use of 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio plant foods are recommended for fescue. Fertilizer such as 21-7-14 or 16-4-8 fall into these categories.

**Q.** We live in Iowa Park and have planted numerous pansies. The problem is that rabbits are eating our pansies at a rapid rate. What can we do to stop the rabbits?

**A.** Rabbits can do a great deal of damage in a short period of time. Rabbits are herbivores feeding only on vegetation. Plants are simply a

meal to these critters. Control is difficult at best. You may want to try one of the repellents designed to discourage rabbits and other animals. Check with a local nursery and/or a nursery professional.

**Q.** We are having problems with our pansy plantings turning yellow and the whole plant seems to be stunted. Enclosed is a sample of one of the sick plants. Please help!

**A.** The problem appears to be a root rot disease. There are numerous crown and root rot problems for pansies. Your first line of defense is to ensure that your pansy plantings have excellent drainage (i.e. plant in a raised bed using a quality growing media). Some fungicide treatments are beneficial if applied when the disease first appears or better yet on a preventative basis. The fungicides necessary may have to be ordered from your local nursery or obtained from a chemical distributor or applied by a pest control applicator. Cleary's 3336 among other newer and more effective fungicides can help reduce the damage of certain pansy diseases. Make sure you address the drainage problem as well as applying a fungicidal treatment.

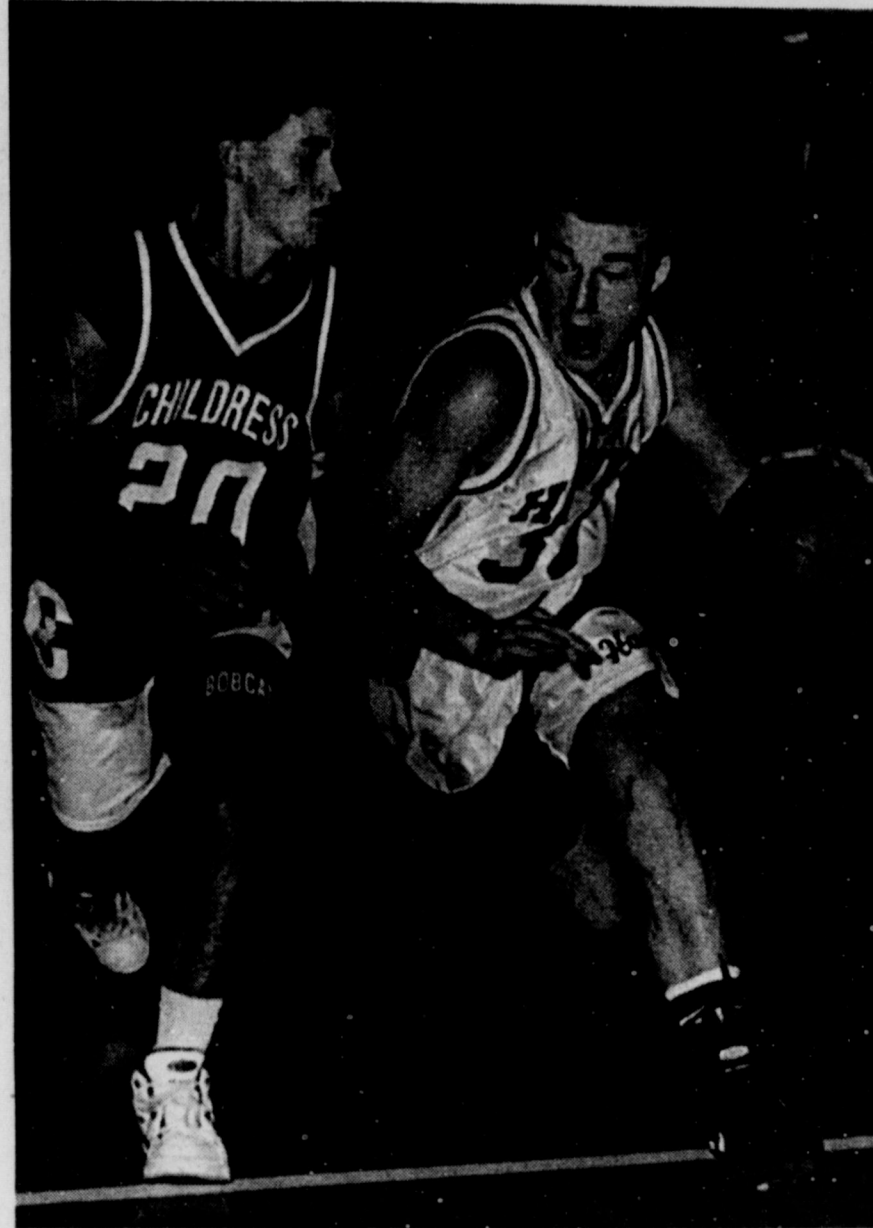

# Hawks beat Bobcats, 71-55

The Iowa Park Hawks got off to a slow start Saturday but even that wasn't enough for Childress as the Hawks won for the second time in a week, downing the Bobcats 71-55.

Childress opened the game with a 10-2 run and finished the quarter shooting a blistering 67 percent from the floor, hitting 6-of-9 shots. The Bobcats went on to win the opening period 15-11 while Iowa Park shot only 5-of-17 from the floor for 29 percent.

But when Iowa Park got on track to start the second quarter, the Hawks went on a 7-2 run to take an 18-17 lead. Iowa Park built its lead to 28-19 with a three-point bomb by Nick Black who finished as the game's leading scorer with 21 points. Iowa Park won the second quarter 22-11 and took a 33-26 lead into the locker room at the half.

Iowa Park stretched its lead to 22 at 69-47 with 3:51 left in the game on a 6-foot jumper by Black and went on to win 71-55.

"It wasn't a pretty win," said head coach Tim Clark. "We didn't play very good defense but we did get

another chance to look at a lot of kids."

Iowa Park were to try to go 3-0 Tuesday night when the Hawks travel to Eastland before entering the Fantasy Of Lights Tournament at D.L.

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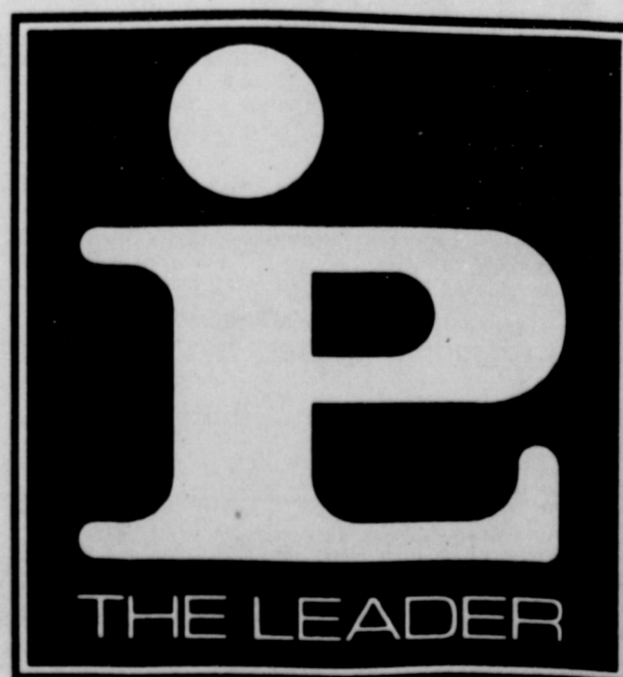

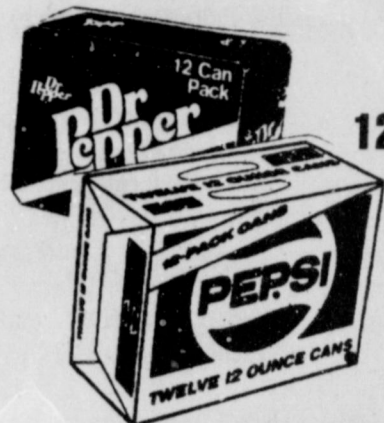

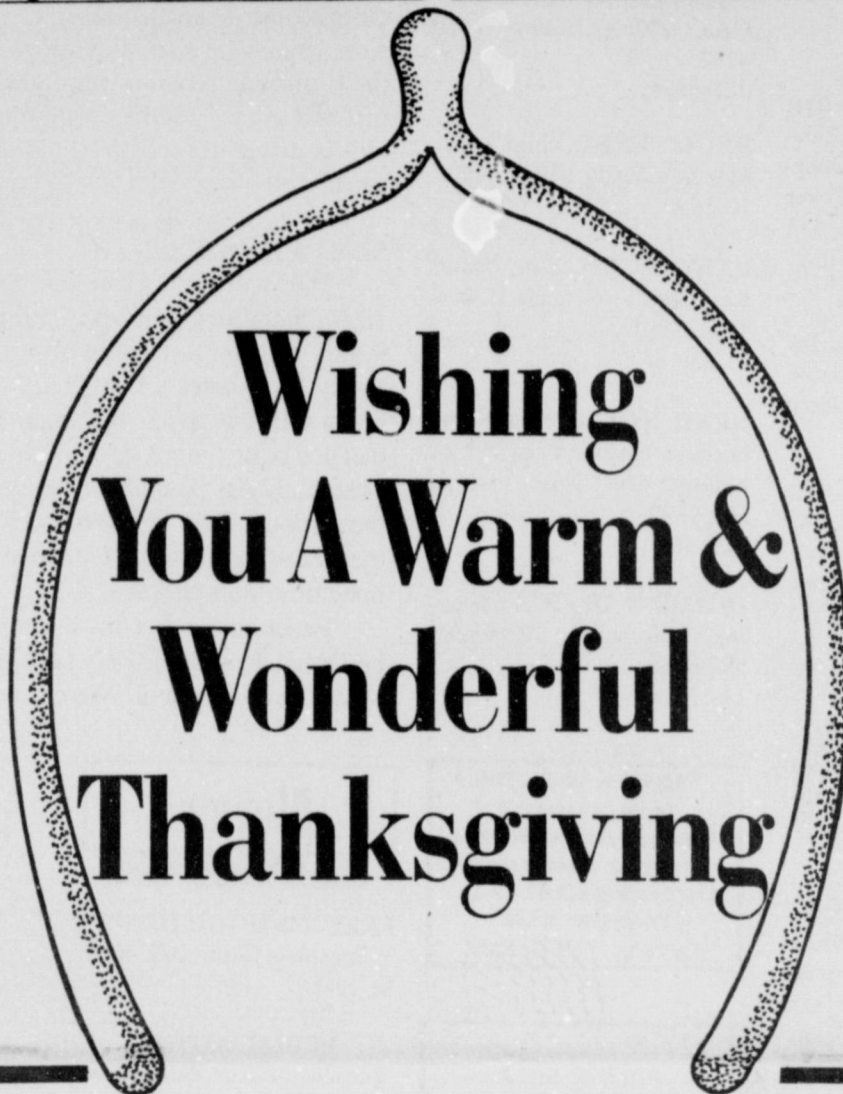
