Highway speed limit to increase

Motorists on Texas highways may soon be able to legally drive faster than
ing to State Rep. Charles Finnell of Holliday.

When the higher speed limit does take effect soon, it will only be after months of work by the Texas Transportation (Dot)," said Finnell. For months the DOT Finnell. anticipating the lifting of federal re strictions on the national maximum speed limits.

Finnell passed HB 454 in 1991 and HRC 127 in 1995, urging tha state and local governments have sole speed limit authority. With the an ticipated repeal of federal restrictions, states would have the authority to se their own speed limits.
President Bill Clinton signed the federal highway bill Tuesday, which returns speed-setting powers to state governments.
"It's time to get the federal govemment out of the speed limit busi ness," Finnell emphasized, "and to address this in ocal govermmens
"This day means a lot to rura
This day means a lot to rural located off the interstate system such as those in our district. Ourregion has been perceived more remote becaus of the global perception that a 55 mph dotted-line map meant inferior stal highways leading to our region."

In Texas, a 1963 law set the maximum speed limit at 70 mph day 65 mph night for the state highway sycm, and a maximum specd limit ways outside urban areas.

That law was in effect in 197 That law was in effect in 1974 limit kicked in nationwide.

The current state law will allow the Texas Transportation Commis sion to set speed limits lower than 70 mph , but only if the lower speed is justified by an engineering and traffic study for that particular section of highway.

To determine appropriate speed limits, engineers with the DOT have been working since September reviewing the 77,000 -mile state high way system.
he DOT study has been divided into four phases: rural ways of four lanes or more undivided multi-lane highways, other highways on the state and U.S. systems, and other farm-to-market roads. The first phase will be acted on by DOT today.
It is divided four-lane state highways and rural interstates "which they are indeed the safest and are vital to commerce and industrial development of our region," Finnell noted.
"These highways make up only 10 percent of the total state highway system in Texas, but they carry more than 60 percent of the state's vehicu lar traffic," he said.

He was born in a small goto, or cave, which would have been more likely than our present day idea of a stable.

The figures generally included he Holy Family, the shepherds, the Magi, and the traditimal ox and donkey. Sometimes additional figures to represent people from th village were added. Usually the
peop in the creche resembled the people who made them. This is
true in modern day creches.
