# Highway speed limit to increase

Motorists on Texas highways may soon be able to legally drive faster than 55 miles per hour, according to State Rep. Charles Finnell of Holliday.

"When the higher speed limit does take effect soon, it will only be after months of work by the Texas Legislature and the Department of Transportation (Dot)," said Finnell.

For months, the DOT has been anticipating the lifting of federal restrictions on the national maximum speed limits.

Finnell passed HB 454 in 1991 and HRC 127 in 1995, urging that state and local governments have sole speed limit authority. With the anticipated repeal of federal restrictions, states would have the authority to set their own speed limits.

President Bill Clinton signed the federal highway bill Tuesday, which returns speed-setting powers to state governments.

"It's time to get the federal government out of the speed limit business," Finnell emphasized, "and to allow state and local governments to address this issue, once and for all.

"This day means a lot to rural Texas communities, especially those located off the interstate system such as those in our district. Our region has been perceived more remote because of the global perception that a 55 mph dotted-line map meant inferior state highways leading to our region."

In Texas, a 1963 law set the maximum speed limit at 70 mph day/ 65 mph night for the state highway system, and a maximum speed limit of 60 mph for all other public highways outside urban areas.

That law was in effect in 1974 when the federally-mandated 55 mph limit kicked in nationwide.

The current state law will allow the Texas Transportation Commission to set speed limits lower than 70 mph, but only if the lower speed is justified by an engineering and traffic study for that particular section of highway.


To determine appropriate speed limits, engineers with the DOT have been working since September reviewing the 77,000-mile state highway system.

The DOT study has been divided into four phases: rural interstates and divided state highways of four lanes or more, undivided multi-lane highways, other highways on the state and U.S. sys-

tems, and other farm-to-market roads. The first phase will be acted on by DOT today.

It is divided four-lane state highways and rural interstates "which they are indeed the safest and are vital to commerce and industrial development of our region," Finnell

"These highways make up only 10 percent of the total state highway system in Texas, but they carry more than 60 percent of the state's vehicular traffic," he said.

# Council meeting is brief

In an unusually brief meeting of the city council Monday night, aldermen approved a request for water service to a residence outside the city

Also, authorization was given to the city administrator to purchase culverts, and council members voted to hold only one meeting in Decem-

Teresa Fulfer made a public appearance to request permission to tap onto a water line for a residence to be located on Coleman Park Road.

Though the line carrying cityproduced water was privately installed several years ago, it was later turned over to the city to oversee.

The new residence will be located some 300 feet west of FM 368, and on the north side of Coleman Park Road, aldermen were told.

Administrator Mike Price told the council one set of culverts on Smith Road needs to be enlarged, in order to handle rains such as those experienced during the past year.

He explained the smaller culverts were the cause of hard-rushing rainwater washing out part of the road's pavement last fall.

When replaced by larger box culverts, the displaced culverts will be used at other locations, aldermen were informed.

For the past several years, the council has met only once during the month of December. At the suggestion of Price, it was decided to meet Dec. 11.

A called meeting possibly will be held, other than on that date, however. Aldermen were informed of a newly-constructed residence that fails to conform with city code, and does not provide the required setback from the street.

A variance is expected to be granted at the called meeting. Such action could not be taken Monday, because it was not discovered in time to be placed on the meeting agenda.



Daume and Jo Minyard were married Dec. 12, 1945 in Trinity Lutheran Church of Wichita Falls.





Pure, unadulterated hogwash! If \$6.90 will destroy either Medicare or medicaid, then they are further gone than anyone outside of government realizes.

The facts are simple enough. Under current law, beneficiaries pay 31.5% of the program's cost -- and everyone else in the country, taxpayers, pay for the rest of the cost of the program.

The Republicans, in their bill to try and balance the budget in seven years, want to maintain the percentage of the premium at 31.5% which currently is \$46.10.

Because next year, the program is expected to cost up to 10 percent more, the premium would rise to an estimated \$53 for the beneficiaries.

What the president is screaming about is that he prefers a previously enacted Democratic change which would have dropped the beneficiaries' share to 25% with taxpayers to pay the higher 75%.

All the rest of the hot air coming out of Washington by both sides in the dispute is political -- pure and

To hear the minority Democrats scream and the political pundits of the Beltway, the GOP budget will starve both the elderly and the children of the nation because of the huge cuts in federal entitlement programs.

But you must understand, that inside the Beltway, "cuts" are not what us folks out in the boonies think of as "cuts.

Cuts in Washington are cuts in the amount of money that each agency and bureau asked for in the next fiscal year.

For example, we'll spend 10 percent more on Medicare next year than we're spending this year -- and seven percent more each year after than was spent the previous year -and that's a cut?

For the average American family, if Junior has a \$10 a week allowance and is given a two dollar a week raise when he asked for \$15, it's a cut -- only in Washington.

We hope the Republicans hold firm in their determination to balance the budget in seven years.

We can recall President Bush and his famous "read my lips" campaign promise not to raise taxes. He was pressured by the Democrats into a compromise, later doublecrossed by the House and Senate Democratic leadership and wound up losing the election over the result.




### THE CRECHE

The figures may be made of wood or stone or any material close at hand. They may be elaborate life-sized statues bedecked in jewels or simple paper models made by children.

But whether it is the Italian presepio, the Spanish nacimiento, or the simple Christmas crib, the re-creation of the Nativity scene is one of the oldest and most sacred of all Christmas traditions.

Many Christians of the modern day picture the birth of Christ as having taken place in a stable, behind an inn, but there is no mention of a stable in the Gospels.

Early popular tradition was that



He was born in a small gotto, or cave, which would have been more likely than our present day idea of a

In 326 A.D. the Church of the Nativity was built over the accepted spot of Christ's birth in Bethlehem, by Constantine the Great, the first Christian emperor of Rome

Sometime later a 14-pointed silver star was set in the Jasper floor to mark the birthplace. Today that silver has been almost worn away by pilgrims who have come to touch the spot.

Although there were recreations of the Nativity scene as far back as the fourth century, the popularization of the creche tradition as we know it is attributed to St. Frances of Assisi in the 13th century.

St. Francis said, "I desire to represent the birth of that Child in Bethlehem in such a way that with our bodily eyes we may see all that he suffered for lack of the necessities for a newborn babe, and how He lay in the manger between the ox and the ass".

This creche, at Greccio, in the Umbrian hills, became the model for creches in all the centuries to follow. Families began to make miniature manger scenes for their homes, and the tradition quickly spread from Italy to France and to other parts of Europe.

The figures generally included the Holy Family, the shepherds, the Magi, and the traditional ox and donkey. Sometimes additional figures to represent people from the village were added. Usually the

figures in the creche resembled the people who made them. This is still true in modern day creches.

Dec. 3 Christ the King Ladies Auxiliary will sponsor an exhibition of the nativity scenes and creches for the enjoyment of the people of the community.

Inspired by a similar exhibit held in Palyera, Mo., more than 100 different nativities loaned by parishioners and friends will be attractively displayed in the parish hall Sunday.

The tables will be draped and decorated with greenery and miniature white lights. Christmas music will provide the backgound as visitors view the nativities.

Those on exhibit will range from the smallest of miniatures to the large grouping displayed each year at Christ the King Church. Each exhibit will be identified by a printed card which tells some of the history and special meaning to its owner.



# Agriboard Industry purchasing plan revealed

By DAVID F. ILEY Wichita County Agent

Wheat producers in a 50-mile radius of Electra have an opportunity to own a part of the Agriboard Industry as well as supplying straw for it's operation.

The straw fiber purchasing plan for 1996 and 1997 has been released by Barry Sullivan, president of Agriboard.

It will involve cash payment to the producer for his straw at the time of baling and stacking in the field, along with Class B stock at the time of delivery to the plant site in Electra.

Twenty dollars will be paid at baling and stacking time and \$10 per ton will be paid upon delivery to the plant site.

In addition to the \$30 cash for each ton of straw delivered, they will

also receive \$25 of stock that can be redeemed in 24 months from the date of issue at the farmer's option of 140% of the initial value.

The stock can also be alternately converted to common ownership

Each \$25 ownership certificate will have a redeemable value of \$35. With this program, the total purchase price per ton for the wheat straw will

As has always been the case, the straw must be baled in the large square bales. These must also meet the moisture requirements of 13% to 17% moisture content to be used.

By September of 1996, the plant will have 3,000 tons of on-site storage capacity. Requirements of the plant will be 6,780 tons of straw for production year 1996 and 12,500 tons

Gardening projects and landscape care are important during the month of December.

Follow this special garden check list to keep your Christmas tree safe and attractive and your landscape in top condition for the winter months ahead.

### Planting:

\* Still time to plant cool-season color using pansies, ornamental kale and cabbage, snaps, and even dianthus. Check with your local nursery or garden center for excellent selections.

\* Plant bulbs such as tulips or hyacinth after cooling in the refrigerator for 40 days. Mass plantings of single colors will provide the best visual impact.

\* Do some armchair gardening. Plan landscape improvements and corrections for next spring. Check out seed sources and new varieties for use in your garden in 1996. Make notes about what did and didn't work in your landscape or garden this year.

\* Select Christmas trees in December. Cut trees, living trees and artificial trees will be available in December. Choose fresh cut trees (needles on a fresh tree will bend, not break). A top choice for a living tree is Afghan Pine, also called Eldarica pine or Mondell pine. This pine is well adapted to Texoma conditions. Check with your local nursery.

\* Begin transplanting established trees and shrubs once we have had our first hard freeze.

### Fertilization:

\* Fertilize fescue lawns if you missed the mid-November application. A 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio lawn food is fine.

\* Feed cool-season bedding plants (pansies) with a complete, balanced, water soluble plant food.

\* If it has been more than two years, have a garden or landscape soil tested for fertility recommendations. Your local county extension office has instructions and sample sending Watch out for phosphorus accumu-

# Pruning:

\* Prune shade trees after our first genuine freeze. Remove limbs which might be broken by ice, wind, etc., or consider having limbs cabled for support. Never allow your trees to be

### topped!!!

\* Mistletoe in hackberry and other magnet trees for this parasite will require pruning at least six inches behind where it is attached on a limb. Growth regulator treatments for mistletoe suppression will work for about two years. Contact a licensed pest control operator for this option. January and February are prime treatment months.

### Pest Control and Odd Jobs:

\* Winterize and store lawn equipment in a protected location. Have repair work done now to beat the spring rush.

\* Tomato plants and okra which were stunted and showed unusual galls on the root-system were probably attacked by root knot nematodes. Sow Elbon rye in your garden to reduce this problem and enrich the garden soil.

\* Pests which have moved into the home with cooler weather can be controlled with a registered indoor use insecticide or by calling a professional pest control company.

\* Protect your plants from the winter ahead by using mulch around plantings and irrigating before a drastic cold front. Established trees, shrubs and lawns should receive a deep watering once a month in the absence of rainfall even in the winter.

### Christmas tree care tips:

\* Make a fresh cut on tree trunks when at home and place the tree in a sturdy stand capable of holding water. Keep the water level above the cut area. Cut Christmas trees can consume up to a gallon of water a day when fresh.

\* It is a good idea to clean the tree stand before bringing the tree home. Use one cupful of bleach in a cup of water to kill microorganisms which can block the tree's ability to absorb

\* Check all light sets for cracked or trayed wires and broken sockets before placing on the tree. Smaller lights produce less heat and reduce tree drying when compared to large

\* Locate the tree away from any heat source such as heaters, vents, fireplaces, televisions, or sunny windows.


The win moved the Lady Hawks' record to 4-2 while Bowie fell to 3-3.
