Stenholm Visits Area Counties Candidate In The 19th District

When U.S. Congressman Charlie Stenhom (Demo.) stopped at the Callahan/ Eastland County Newspapers last Friday afternoon things almost seemed the same. He greeted Publisher H.V. O'Brien and the newspaper staff with his usual optimistic smile - glad to be back in a favorite county.

But all knew that things were different now - the Congressman was running for re-election in a new District - the 19th. This territory included all and part of 29 counties that ran from Eastland to Lubbock and the border of New Mexico.

Stenholm and his aide, Jeff Benson, took a moment to study a map of the Republican-drawn configuration, which included only a part of the District the 17th Congressman represented since 1978.

He said he decided to run in the 19th District instead of the 13th to the north because he lived in Abilene - an area which was in the 19th.

Stenholm said one of his sons lived on the family farm in an adjoining county, which was now in the 13th District.

heard a rumor from Washington that afternoon that the Supreme Court was not going to rule on an emergency appeal from Texas Democrats to halt the redistricting for the Primary Election. So the March 9 Primaries would go forward with the new congressional maps.

"I don't like it." Stenholm said, speaking of the redistricting, "But I know you have to play by the rules.

And those rules stand for now."

He mentioned that he would need to get acquainted with about 400,000 new people. He said he didn't really mind campaigning in Lubbock, the base of the 19th District, although his opponent would be Randy Neugebauer, the freshman Republican Congressman. Neugebauer is in real estate and is a developer.

"I have a lot of friends in Lubbock, including around Texas Tech," Stenholm said. He and his wife, Cindy, both attended the University, and Stenholm obtained his Masters Degree Agriculture there.

Before going to Congress Charlie Stenholm farmed cotton, taught agriculture, and also worked with the Electric Stamford Cooperative.

He said that during his years in Congress he has always worked closely with Texas Tech on Agricultural

Charlie remarked that his opponent, Neugebauer, came with Vice President Dick Chaney to Abilene, in the 17th District, to raise funds before it was even designated as part of the 19th District. They only visited with a Stenholm also said he select crowd in one spot, Stenholm noted.

> Stenholm was asked what he had done for the Eastland County area during his terms.

> "To begin with. I've worked hard for good government," he replied. He then discussed specific matters involved with health care, veteran's affairs, and agriculture. He mentioned the Veteran's Clinic located in Eastland and his work on a bill to reimburse rural hospitals a fair share on

Medicare patients. He mentioned his lifelong interest in agriculture, and work with oil production.

The Congressman was asked what he thought the major issues would be in the 2004 Election

He answered that water, conservation issues, veteran's affairs, education, agriculture, health care, the national debt, Social Security, and of course the War in Iraq were all matters of special concern right now.

Stenholm, top ranking member of the House Agricultural Committee, said that the cattle industry had "weathered the storm" on the mad cow disease matter.

"Cattle are selling at 82 cents a pound - the feeders are almost back where they were. People have confidence in the American cattle industry," he reported.

He was asked what he thought of President Bush's recent proposal on a NASA program to send people back to the moon, and to explore Mars.

"With a \$500 billion deficit, I'm not excited about it," Stenholm answered. "Right now I would vote "No."

He explained that during his early years in office - in 1982, the United States owed 1 trillion, and everyone thought that was terrible. During the 1980's the debt jumped another trillion or so, however.

He told how he had worked for a balanced budget for years, and finally saw one achieved in the '90's But that didn't last long.

Since then the national debt has mushroomed several more trillion to an unprecedented level.

Stenholm was asked what he thought about President Bush's new immigration proposal.

"I'm keeping an open mind on that," he said. "We have to come up with a better system than what we have right now. It is reported that the United States has between 6 to 14 million illegal residents.

"We need to identify who they are, re-establish where they are needed, and have a legal entry system. If we're going to have homeland security, we need that legal ID system."

He mentioned that Mexico wants an open border, but there is no policing on their side of the border. "I hope President Bush and Vicente Fox can work out something on that," he remarked.

On another topic, Stenholm noted that billions were going overseas, but benefits were being cut to veterans here.

"My voting record will

show where I've stood on veterans affairs," He remarked. "Right now I'm working to create a Vet Center in Abilene. We've got to put more resources into veteran's benefits."

As the discussion ended, Stenholm was asked what he thought was the most important characteristic a person needed to be a good Congressman.

He paused for a moment, then answered, "Credibility."

He added, "That takes in a lot of other things, including honesty. Also, you have to use good judgment. Then you need experience.

"I think you know you have credibility when other







Stenholm is a pro life, pay as you go Democrat. He is also co-chairman of the "Blue Dog Democrats". The group was formed in 1995 to push for a balanced budget. There are 36 of them in the 108th Congress. They are pushing for ways to reduce the National Debt and other

I was in Cisco the other day to appear on the Cisco Opry, and while I was there my wife and I drove all over town. I wanted to show Evelyn some of the places I had lived and where I spent many years of my life.

I was shocked when I saw the old house we lived in while I was in school from the fifth grade through High School. It is on East 12th. Street, and it is evident the house has not been lived in for a number of years and is about to fall down. The weeds and shrubbery were so high we could not really get a good view of the place.

I remember when John Swindle built that house in 1923. It had no garage, but we didn't need one since we did not have a car. Our only bathroom was a commode and shower in a small building back of the house, next to the alley. That little building had a concrete floor with the shower drain in the center of it. Since there was no bathroom inside the house, my father built one soon after he bought the place.

Back in those days many houses in Cisco had old fashioned outhouses, in fact, that is what we had before we moved into the house on East 12th. Street.

While we were living in that house my mother got her first Electric Refrigerator, and finally, her first Wringer Washing Machine. Mom and Dad purchased our first automobile, my first saxophone, and my first twopiece suit of clothes while we lived there. We also got our first telephone there. I suppose I could write a book about events in our lives while we lived at 603 East 12th. Street in Cisco, Texas.

Arlin Agnew and his wife lived next door to us and the other day I discovered their old house is now almost gone also. It made me very sad to see those places in such disarray.

We drove along East 8th. Street and I remembered the old wooden Viaduct that once spanned the "Katy" Railroad. That Railroad was often called the "MK&T." which stood for Missouri, Kansas and Texas.

I wondered how may people in Cisco remember that Railway. I wondered how many know that it was originally called the Houston and Texas Central. The town of Cisco is named for the man who was responsible for the building of that line, Mr. John A. Cisco.

The MK&T crossed the Texas and Pacific Railroad and the two-story Cisco Train Depot was located at the Southwest corner of the crossing. I spent a lot of time around that old Depot. My father was the Night Baggage Man and had a free pass for him and his family to ride the trains.

My father's cousin, Dan McCrary, was the engineer the Cisco and Northeastern Railroad that from Cisco to ran Throckmorton.

I grew up around railroads and railroad people. As a boy, I learned all the signals, both audible and hand given. I was hired to work for the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe

Energy Update

I've said you can't produce food and fiber without oil and gas, and you can't produce oil and gas without food and fiber. Last year proved to be a time when our country's energy and agricultural industries worked together to help Congress produce a national energy policy.

The 2003 Energy Bill is a example . independent oil and gas

producers joining farmers to Many times over the years accomplish a common goal. Their common goal was to produce more energy domestically-using resources that include fossil fuels and renewable sources of energy.

> Unfortunately, the Senate has yet to finish debate on the bill, and I hope this legislation becomes a top priority when Congress returns to Washington the week of January 19th.

The main problem in West Texas is that too many

pumpjacks are standing idle. The Energy Bill passed by the House of Representatives with my support does a good job providing domestic producers with the right incentives to extract oil and gas from marginal, lowpressure wells in the oil patch. We have access to these resources, and our domestic consumers should enjoy the benefits of this production.

This legislation also helps our West Texas producers by providing common-sense solutions to imposing regulations from the federal government. In addition, believe it is the responsibility of each state to manage its environmental regulations.

The Energy Bill also gives independent producers some leverage on the business tax front, allowing them to continue producing from these marginal wells without incurring a loss when the prices of oil and gas dip low.

Agriculture and energy go hand in hand. You can't have one without the other. The natural gas that heats our homes comes from the same land that produces the small grains used to make the ethanol that we run in our cars.

West Texas ranches will now play host to a new kind of windmill thanks to the 2003 Energy Bill. Instead of pumping water, ranchers can be paid royalty payments from electricity produced from the tall wind generators that dot our landscape.

In West Texas, electricity provided by rural cooperatives is also an important issue addressed in the Energy Bill. We did the best we could to ensure electricity providers in rural America could continue to provide reliable energy at affordable rates.

I admit this isn't a perfect piece of legislation-rarely does Congress produce a perfect bill. There is no doubt that this bill should have come with a lower price tag, but it is still a good bill that America's citizens deserve. West Texas should enjoy abundant economic benefits from the 2003 Energy Bill.







Supreme Court Refuses Emergency Appeal

Late last Friday, Jan. 16, news came that the U.S. Supreme Court had turned down an emergency appeal from Democrats to halt Congressional redistricting for the March 9 Primaries.

That meant that the elections will move forward under the new Republican maps. Friday was also the last day for candidates to file for election in the re-drawn districts. These are designed to give the Republicans as many as six new seats in the U.S. Congress.

Democrats can still appeal on their claim that the maps are unconstitutional and violate the Voting Rights Act. The Supreme Court rejected only the emergency request to block the maps until they could consider the major part of the appeal.

Attorney Gerry Hebert, who represents Texas Congressional Democrats, reportedly said that an appeal would be filed. But he also said that the Court is unlikely to act on it before the November General Election.

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott, whose office represents the state, has repeatedly said that he believes the Republican map can withstand any legal challenges.

The action of the Supreme Court last week has left many wondering if the Judges plan to do anything at all on the matter. Redistricting has continue to be.


