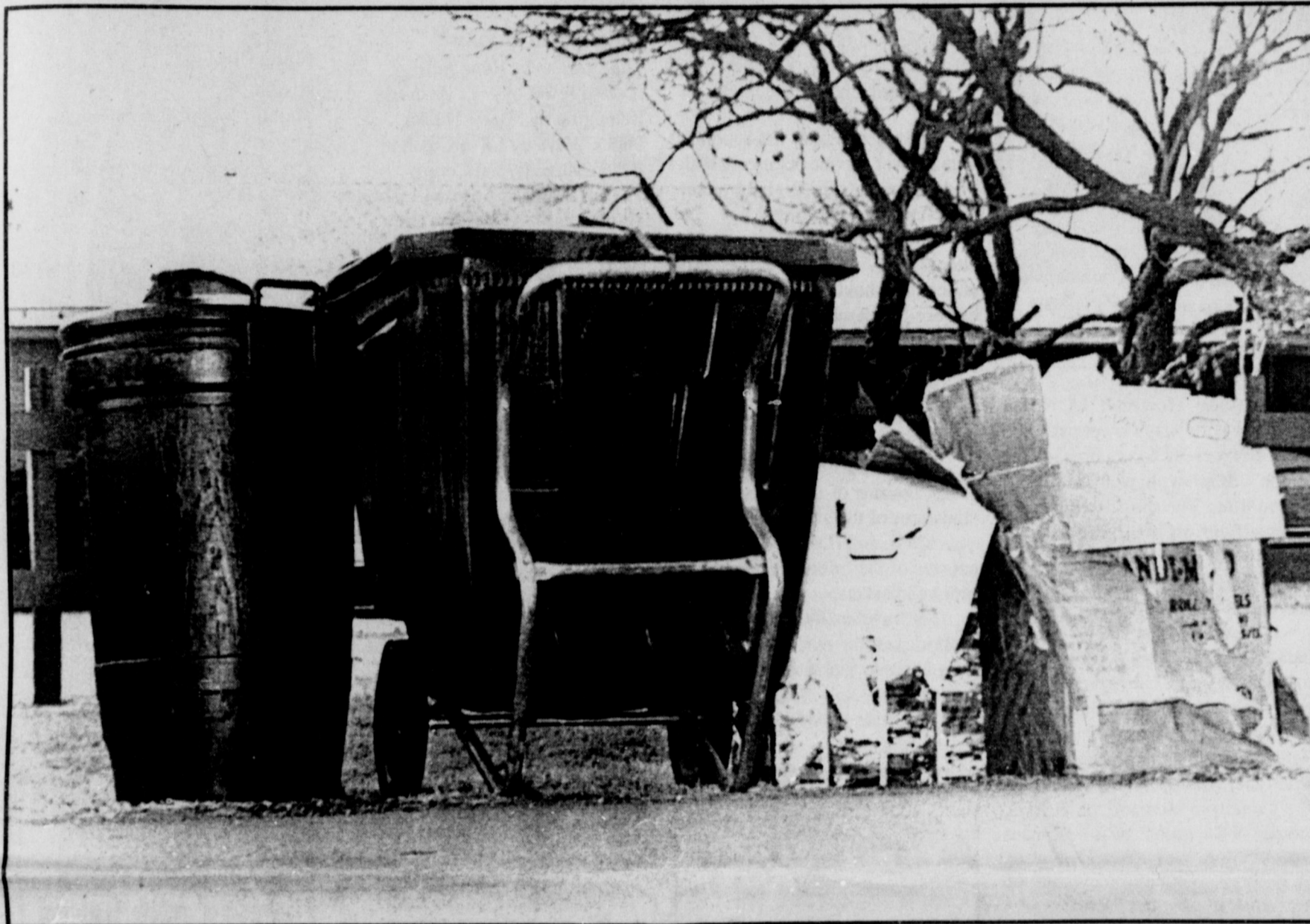

### First holiday weekend is quiet for local police

The past week was unusually quiet for Iowa Park police, considering it was the beginning of the holiday season.

The most common entries on the police blotter was curfew violations, with juveniles being out in public after night time hours provided in the city's ordinance.

Four males were arrested for public intoxication and a woman involved in a domestic disturbance. One theft was reported, and a woman found a pig on her back porch.

Shortly after 3 o'clock Saturday morning, Timmy Don Roland, 27, and Jeffrey Scott Duncan, 24, were taken into custody in the 300 block of West Louisa, for public intoxication. Both were released five hours later after paying fines of \$132 apiece.

Saturday afternoon, officers were called to a residence in the 300 block of West Ruby, where a domestic disturbance was reportedly underway.

Amy Rosella Smith, 23, was taken into custody on a Class C assault to prevent family violence

charge. Smith was released slightly more than three hours later after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

Keith A. Garlets, 20, and Michael Lewis Lorenson, 23, were arrested at 3:16 a.m. Monday in the 1100 block of US 287 access road. Both were charged with public intoxication.

They were released at 12-noon after each paid fines of \$132, according to the blotter entry.

A resident in the 1000 block of Mary Drive reported the theft of a spare tire, taken some time during the night of Wednesday of last week.

A resident in the 400 block of West Magnolia called the police station early Tuesday morning to report a black pig was on her back porch.

The potbelly pet was picked up by the city's animal control officer and held in the city pound until it was claimed. The owner, informed the animal violated city ordinance, reportedly gave it to a friend who lives in the country.

### Teams returning to courts

Both the Hawks and Lady Hawks took the week off to enjoy the Christmas break but return to action this week.

The Lady Hawks, coming off an impressive 59-51 win over Hirschi Tuesday of last week, will return Friday night when they play host to Wichita Falls High School at 6:30 p.m. The JV Lady Hawks will get underway at 5 p.m. against the Lady Coyotes.

Iowa Park will host Altus in the final non-district game Tuesday night before opening district play at Bowie next Friday.

The Hawks, 11-2 overall, are playing in the Aledo Tournament this

week which began Wednesday. Iowa Park played Maypearl in its first round game and will play the winner or loser of the F.W. Christian-Mineral Wells game at 3:30 today. The semifinals are scheduled for 8 p.m. Friday with the championship game Saturday at 8 p.m..

Other teams of interest in the tournament are Graham, Krum, W. F. Rider, Southlake and Lake Worth.

The Hawks will return home for only the third time this season Tuesday to host Byers at 7 p.m.

The freshman and JV Hawks will not return to action until Jan. 6 against Springtown.

## Year's top stories reviewed

Reviewing 51 issues of the *Iowa Park Leader* in 1995, the major stories concerned construction, success in athletics and other UIL events at Iowa Park High School, management change at Cryovac, and the impending resignation of the school superintendent.

A brief review of the year's news stories is as follows:

### JANUARY

Extended Local Calling service was begun for residents in the Kamay area, allowing telephone calls to and from Iowa Park, Holliday and Wichita Falls, without a long distance fee. Mr. and Mrs. Jack Lott celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary. Frances George was named a life member of the Iowa Park Garden Club. It was announced that Craig Weise had been promoted to technical manager of Iowa Park's Cryovac plant. Highlighting the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet, at which Cryovac's Jack Powers was guest speaker, were award recipient names, including: Louis Sefcik, Outstanding Citizen of the year; Laverne Owen, Senior Citizen of the Year; Jo Ann Hale, Educator of the Year, and B&R Thriftway, Outstanding Business. Also, new Chamber officers were installed, including Dale Cox, president; Janice Newman, first vice president, and Melinda Gonzales, second vice president. The school board decided to begin a phasing out of student transfers from City View School District, because of current and anticipated crowded conditions at the high school. Cryovac plant manager Ray Youngblood announced a \$10,000 donation to the Friendly Door building fund. D'Lynn Kathleen Monday, IPHS senior, was named recipient of the Good Citizen Award from the Major Francis Grice Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Darin Cash and James Kaspar were named to the All State Band. School officials described the crowd that attended the basketball game between the Hawks and Graham here as a "record," because several dozen fans had to watch it by closed circuit television in the gymnasium (top ranked Graham won, 88-82). Iowa Park's powerlifting team placed second in its own meet.

### FEBRUARY

After arresting a man locally, Iowa Park police discovered the subject was, and had for the past four years, been using the name of another man. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held for the new Friendly Door building in the 800 block of Third Street. The quarterback of the 1969 state champion Hawks, Jim Clapp, was guest speaker at the annual football banquet. Formal dedication ceremonies were held for the Everette Boulware Youth Gymnasium, built by the Iowa Park Optimist Club next to the Recreational Activities Center. The Lady Hawks wound up their first season under new coach Ronda Havins with a 12-18 record. The city council approved the closing of parts of five different streets, allowing for the Indian Springs Addition in the northeast part of town. Judges named the winners of the annual Iowa Park Junior Livestock Show. The Hawks returned to the post-season playoffs in basketball for the first time in 10 years, under Coach Tim Clark, but fell 76-65 to Lake Worth in bi-district to end their season with a record of 25-7.

### MARCH

The late Bobby Gilbreath was installed in the Hawk Track Hall of Fame during the annual Hawk Relays. The Hawk Tennis Team was a finalist in the regional tournament and qualified to compete in the state team tournament. Dusti Welch and Jodi Young were All District basketball selections. Clara Cates-Herrin observed her 100th birthday. Crews from Burlington Northern Railroad spent several weeks renovating the lines through the area. Working with shoe prints as their only clue to a series of auto burglaries, local police wound up arresting three males, two 16 and the other 17 years of age. Vandalism caused considerable damage to a railroad engine and some gravel cars attached.

### APRIL

Philip House placed first and Troy Radford second in their respective weight divisions of the state powerlifting tournament. A 33-year-old woman, Dana McDonald, was arrested here after Fort Worth police issued a warrant alleging she had embezzled more than \$100,000 from a business in that city. IPHS horticulture students held their annual plant sale. The first of two outdoor basketball courts was completed at the junior high school campus, financed by the combined efforts of the P-TA, Student Council, National Junior Honor Society and Iowa Park Athletic Booster Club. The Lady Hawks won first place in the Nocona track meet. Vandals inflicted more than \$5,000 in damages to Wichita County equipment that was located northeast of the city. Sixteen years to the day after Wichita Falls was struck by a tornado, the Iowa Park city council approved purchase of equipment to assist in watching approaching bad weather conditions. Dani Goins and Stephen Morris were winners in the Dist. 3-3A tennis singles competition. School trustees approved a proposal to bring Saxon Math into all three grades at the junior high campus the following school year. For the first time ever, the Lady Hawks captured their district championship in track. A spring storm that produced a tornado between here and Kamay broke up the annual Little League parade when warning sirens were sounded.

### MAY

Six persons were injured and transported to hospitals, following a two-vehicle collision at the intersection of Washington and Victoria. For the 12th consecutive year, the Hawk Band earned the coveted Sweepstakes Award. Flooding resulted in parts of the city on the first weekend of the month, when a storm deposited 4.55 inches of rain. An Iowa Park Man, Melvin Lee Koerth, 42, survived after being shot several times at an address on Old Iowa Park Road. Results of city and school elections were: alderman incumbent Virgil Woodfin lost to Tracy Fears, while Mark Raby and Bob Hamilton were re-elected to the city council; and trustee Max Henderson was unseated by Jeff Watts, and incumbents Dennis Yeager, Randy Catlin and Keith Fisher were returned to the school board. Freshman Brandi Butler was the only member of the Lady Hawk track team to

### City shutting down for holidays

Other than on holidays, such as next Monday, convenience center hours are: 12-6 p.m. Fridays and Mondays; 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturdays and 1-5 p.m. Sundays.

Deadline for nominations, which should also be turned in at the office, is Tuesday, Jan. 9.

The awards -- Outstanding Citi-

zen of the Year, Outstanding Senior Citizen, Outstanding Educator and Outstanding Agriculturist -- will be presented at the annual Chamber banquet on Saturday, Jan. 13.

Tickets for the banquet are \$10 in advance and \$12 at the door. The meal will be catered by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners.

Allen and Denise Bernstein, cousins of the bride, presided at the birdseed baskets.

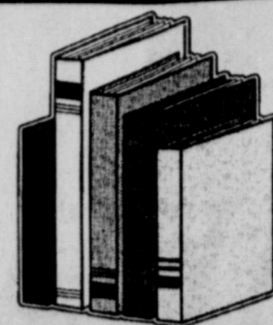
For travel on their wedding trip, the bride wore an ivory two-piece suit with brocade jacket and wide leg crepe pants.

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# 1995 RECIPE REVIEW

In the last Cook of the Week column of the year, we traditionally run a sampling of recipes from the many fine cooks we have featured throughout the year. The recipes are some we feel our readers will want to try - in case they missed them the first time around. Happy New Year!

**Corn Casserole**  
1 cup macaroni (dry)  
1 can Rotel tomatoes  
1/2 cup onions, chopped  
1 can whole kernel corn (use juice)  
1 can cream style corn  
1 cup Velveeta cheese  
1 stick butter, melted

Combine ingredients and pour into greased baking dish. Bake 1 hour at 375 degrees 0 (first 30 minutes covered, last 30 minutes uncovered).

1 cup flour  
1 stick butter or margarine, melted  
1/3 cup sugar

Mix together and pat into 9x13 pan. Bake at 375 degrees 15 minutes.

2 eggs, beaten

1 tsp. vanilla  
1 cup pecans  
2 Tbsps. melted butter  
1/4 tsp. salt  
2 Tbsps. flour

Mix together, then pour over crust. Return to oven and bake 25 minutes at 350 degrees.

ute pre-cooked sausage, pre-cooked scrambled eggs, uncooked hash browns, cheese and picante sauce on top. Cook 15 to 20 minutes or until hash browns are done.

2 Tbsps. tumeric

1 1/2 Tbsps. pickling spice  
2 Tbsps. celery seed  
4 cups sugar

Mix squash, onion, peppers, salt and tumeric together and allow to set overnight. Drain and rinse. Tie pickling spice and celery seed in a cheesecloth bag to be discarded later. Bring vinegar, sugar, pickling spice and celery seed to a boil. Add vegetables and boil about 20 minutes; discard bag. Put into hot sterilized jars with lids. No need for water bath.

Dash of pumpkin pie spice  
Margarine

3 stalks celery, diced  
2 Tbsps. picante sauce (hot or mild to taste)  
1 tsp. red pepper sauce  
3 cloves garlic, minced  
1/2 tsp. dried cilantro  
1/2 cup chili sauce  
1 Tbsp. cornstarch  
1 Tbsp. hot water  
Green onions, chopped

Combine vegetables and sauces in large saucepan; cook over medium heat for 30 minutes. Dissolve cornstarch in water and add to vegetable

mixture. If additional liquid is needed, add drained juice from the peas or more picante sauce. Cook until slightly thickened. Chill overnight. Add chopped green onions just before serving. Makes 5 cups.

Some of the more prominent factors contributing to juvenile crime in this country today are the child labor laws and other restrictive wage and hour laws.

These laws have accumulated over the past several decades, and were passed by do-gooders in a liberal Congress. They masqueraded as laws that would protect our youngsters from abuses in the workplace.

What they actually turned out to be are laws that make it virtually impossible for many young people to get meaningful on-the-job training that would prepare them for a more productive life.

When you make it illegal for a 14 or 15 year old boy or girl to take a job with a company to learn something about a profession they're interested in you thwart their natural desire for success.

I think most of the young criminals in jail today would have preferred a respectable job with a chance to earn a little spending money and prepare themselves for a more satisfying future.

You cannot pass laws that will prevent young teenagers from doing anything and everything.

Show me a 14 or 15 year old boy who's not permitted to do something constructive, and I'll show you a boy who is going to something else.

Children should not be protected from work. They should be taught to work. And they should be taught at an early age.

Young children want to work. And they want to learn how to do things.

It will not hurt a young teenager to sweat. It is good for him. It is good for him both physically and emotionally.

I keep thinking of something the late Cal Farley said when he established the very successful boys ranch near Amarillo.

"Run a boy till he's out of wind," Cal said, "and he'll lie down instead of throwing rocks."

Christine Baka was Valedictorian and Stephanie Morris Salutatorian of the Eighth Grade class. Friday, May 25, was declared Virgil I. Woodfin Day in Iowa Park by the city council, in recognition of his eight years as an alderman. The Wal-Mart parking lot was covered with thousands of people who attended the firm's Country Music Across America Tour '95. The Kidwell P-TA honored second grade teacher Gayle Cleghorn, who retired after 26 years in education. The Hawks captured the Dist. 3-3A baseball championship, but lost in bi-district to Aledo, in a best-of-three playoff.

## JUNE

Iowa Park's school district was notified it was the year's beautification winner in the Texas Urban and Community Forestry Awards Program. Louise Berry's retirement after almost 50 years association in the pharmacy business was observed by a reception at Hughes Pharmacy. Preliminary work, mainly involving dirt movement, was begun for the latest major expansion of the Cryovac plant. IPHS's Jazz Ensemble once again received state honors by being selected as one of the outstanding groups at the Texas State and Ensemble Contest. 1993 IPHS graduate John Travland received a four-year appointment to West Point. Tommy Joe Tate, 48, was electrocuted when he contacted an electrical pole guide wire on Peterson Road. Brandi Beavers and Kenneth Schell were among 160 musicians selected as Outstanding Performers at the UIL state solo and ensemble contest, Schell for the second time. The Jeff Ratliff home was named Iowa Park Garden Club's Yard of the Year. Thousands attended the open house tours of the newly-constructed Allred Prison Unit on FM 369. Chris Norris was named Dist. 3-3A baseball's Most Valuable Player. Earl Bennett was the scratch winner of the All-Iowa Park Golf Tournament, and Ron Needham the handicap champ.

## JULY

A new business in Iowa Park, Edward D. Jones & Co., managed by Bo Watson, held open house. In part of their on-going facility needs study, members of the school board heard recommendations from consultant Gary Keep of SHW Group Inc. Members of W.F. George High School Class of 1956 held a reunion in Galveston. Angie Adams succeeded Tammi Tucker as pharmacist of Wal-Mart Pharmacy. A large turnout was counted for the W.F. George High Class of '62 reunion, held here. Building permits were issued for seven new homes.

## AUGUST

Remains of tropical storm Dean moved over here from the Gulf Coast, depositing 3.55 inches of rain. A \$5,000 check from the Levi Strauss foundation was presented to the Friendly Door building fund. Wendy Bridwell, playing basketball with a summer league team in the Ft. Worth/Dallas area, was named most valuable player in the national championship tournament held in Winter Haven, Fla. IPHS senior John Woods won the Tom Moore Jr. Classic held at Olney Country Club. A couple's vacation was postponed when someone stole their travel trailer the night they had completely stocked it for their trip. More than 100 athletes reported for the first day of football workouts. The city council voted to drop the tax rate from 79 cents to 76 per \$100 valuation for the 1995-96 year. Burglars completely emptied a temporarily unoccupied home located across the street from the high school vocational building. Cryovac plant manager Ray Youngblood was promoted to vice president of manufacturing and engineering for Grace Container and Specialty Polymers and moved to Lexington, Mass. Iowa Park schools began classes Aug. 17, believed to be the earliest start in the district's history. First-day enrollment of 2,094 was the district's fourth-highest ever. The city council paid \$5,000 down on the purchase of more than 300 acres on the west edge of town, primarily as a site for a golf course. Business and traffic on Old Iowa Park Road was brought to a halt about two hours, for the annual Hotter 'N Hell Bike Ride. A 72-year-old Wichita Falls woman died in an accident some 300 yards on Old Iowa Park Road on FM 369. School trustees set a tax rate of \$1.16 per \$100 valuation for the 1995-96 budget.

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## SEPTEMBER

City street workers began preparations to overlay the downtown area concrete streets with asphalt. Organized girls volleyball returned to IPHS with a schedule for only freshman and junior varsity competition. Long-time superintendent of the city's public utilities department, Bural Yoder, retired. An 18-year-old Iowa Park High School student was arrested on a charge of stealing some \$2,800 worth of band equipment from the music department, and later was charged in other thefts not related to the campus. The city council rejected by a split vote to proceed on plans to develop a golf course on the Van Horn property. Brandon Negri, senior at Midwestern State Univ., was named recipient of two scholarships in criminal justice. Outstanding teacher awards for the year were presented by the school board to Ruby Black, secondary, and Michael Bean, elementary. The Culpepper and Merriweather Great Combined Circus was engaged for shows here by the Iowa Park Lions Club. IPHS graduate in 1970, Craig French, was named a vice president at State National Bank. Frank M. Terlizzi was named fifth manager of Iowa Park's Cryovac plant, replacing Ray Youngblood. Iowa Park Masonic Lodge presented the Community Builder's Award to Larry Dutton.

## OCTOBER

A 26-year-old Iowa Park man was arrested after police discovered he was producing marijuana in a 24-hour growing machine. Construction was begun on the first-ever city hall for Pleasant Valley community. Readers declared the Leader's homecoming edition a hit, because of a series of short articles on former IPHS graduates entitled "Where are they now." An area man died of an apparent self-induced overdose after holding lawmen and medics away from his home on Coleman Park Road some two hours. Hundreds of area youths participated in a KidFish event at Gordon Lake. Three persons, two men and a woman, were arrested by sheriff's deputies following an attempted kidnapping of a woman in the Valley View area. Crews of inmates from the Allred Unit prison began work to clean up the area around Gordon Lake, and intention to continue later at lakes Buffalo and Iowa Park. The Hawk Band earned another Division One rating in the annual marching contest. The city council approved advertising for bids to extend Valley Drive to Hawthorn, with the intent of finally easing flooding problems at the Wall intersection following heavy rainfall. James Kaspar achieved the rank of Eagle Scout.

## NOVEMBER

A scant few voters turned out to cast their ballots on 14 changes in the state constitution. A travel trailer stolen from here earlier in the year was recovered from a location less than 10 miles away, in the western edge of Wichita Falls. Three teachers submitted their resignations, as two of them had accepted education positions at the Allred Prison. Despite being shorthanded with several players still playing football, the Hawks opened their basketball season with a 96-88 win over Peaster. After losing their first five games of the season, extending their streak to 0-15, the football Hawks caught fire to win four of their five Dist. 3-3A contests to earn a birth in the playoffs as runners up to Vernon, but lost 23-13 to Boyd in bi-district. Dr. Bill Mahler of Iowa Park was the recipient of the prestigious Charles Leonard Weddle Memorial Award, in recognition "of a lifetime of service and devotion in the field and systematic taxonomy with the native flora of the state of Texas." A quartet of IPHS students, Louis Booth, Patrick Robertson, Brandon Herder and Lance Largent, won first place in the annual Red River Area Talent Search, in competition with adult groups from five states. The Lady Hawks defeated Bowie, the defending state 3-A champions. Dr. Derrell Monday was elected Chamber of Commerce president.

## DECEMBER

Iowa Park police solved a home burglary case in less than one hour after it was reported. Sales tax revenue for 1995 set an all-time record locally, totaling \$257,042.74. Construction of new homes -- estimated to be as many in 1995 as the total over the past five or six years -- helped elevate the 11-month total for building permits over \$4-million. Superin-

tendent Glen Mitchell informed the school board of his intention to retire at the end of this school year, ending 10 years at the post. Speed limit signs on US 287 in the area were replaced to read 70 mph. The Friendly Door building fund received a grant of \$14,284 from the Meadows Foundation of Dallas. Winners in the annual Christmas Lighting Contest were announced: Most Original - 703 W. Texas, Mr. and Mrs. Rick Carlton; Religious - 900 Dosa, Mr. and Mrs. Michael Gaitan; Most Effective Use of Lights - 201 Hope Lane, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Gaston; and Neighborhood - Westview Lane.

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# Former Iowa Parkan to tour Bangladesh

Donna Chandler, daughter of Roy and Marvella Childers of Iowa Park, left Tuesday for a four-week tour and study in the country of Bangladesh.

Chandler, who lives in Mineral Wells, was selected as a member of the 1996 Group Study Exchange team from Rotary Club district 5790.

Each year, the Rotary Club sends a team of professionals from different fields to visit another country for four to six weeks to study its institutions and culture. The members observe their own professions as practiced in

the host country. The Rotary Foundation provides funding for round-trip transportation. Host Rotarians abroad pay other expenses directly associated with the visiting team's study tour.

Chandler is an eligibility specialist with the Texas Department of Human Services in Mineral Wells. A graduate of Iowa Park High School, she received her Bachelor of Science in Home Economics from Texas Women's University in Denton. She has been active in 4-H and Camp Fire

Youth Groups and presently serves as "volunteer" church hostess and wedding coordinator at First United Methodist Church in Mineral Wells, where she lives with her husband Rex. They have three grown daughters and one son.

In May, Rev. Gary Lindley, pastor of First United Methodist Church in Mineral Wells was selected as a team leader and selected Chandler as one of his team's members. The other members include Jim L. Finley, an assistant attorney for the City of Wichita Falls; Mark T. Lowry, a clerical worker in the Emergency Department at Dallas Presbyterian Hospital; and Willima M. Norton, a civil engineer with the City of Arlington.

Situated in the northeastern portion of the Indian subcontinent, Bangladesh is the eighth most populous country in the world, and about the size of Wisconsin. Formerly known as East Pakistan, the country won its independence from Pakistan in 1971, and was admitted to the United Nations in 1974.

A mostly Muslim country, Bangladesh is traversed by numerous rivers, all running into the Indian Ocean.

Quoting from an article in the *Mineral Wells Index*, Lindley said that team members will live in the homes of Bengalis, eating meals with their hosts and visiting throughout the country. They will visit churches, mosques, government facilities, medical facilities and schools.

In addition, during one week of their tour, each team member will be paired with someone in their corresponding profession, watching how they work and discussing their respective work roles.

Chandler said she expects to learn about their welfare department, which constitutes mostly medical care. "It's not structured at all," she said, "it's just provided on an emergency basis from what I can gather. It's a very poverty-stricken country. Their hospitals are state-operated."

During the tour, team members will speak at Rotary Club meetings

throughout the country and give slide presentations on Texas and their district's Rotarian activities. They will distribute Texas-style gifts to the groups.

To prepare for the trip, the team has met every other Saturday since August to make plans and learn more about Bengali culture. They are learning a few phrases in the Bengali language, and because Bangladesh is predominately a Muslim country, the team has studied that faith's beliefs and customs.

The group left DFW on Dec. 26 and will arrive at Dhaka, the capital of Bangladesh, on Dec. 29. This city will serve as the central point of the trip, and they will stay until Jan. 26 when they fly to London for a four day tour.

According to the story in the *Mineral Wells Index*, Chandler will be celebrating her 50th birthday while in London. "We'll plan something when we get there," she said. "I'm not

sitting in a hotel room on my birthday. I want to see the traditional tourist attractions - the changing of the guard and all that."

Chandler said her husband has

been quite supportive of the trip. When she told him she wanted to apply, he told her to "go for it," she said. "My kids think it's neat and my parents are excited for me too."

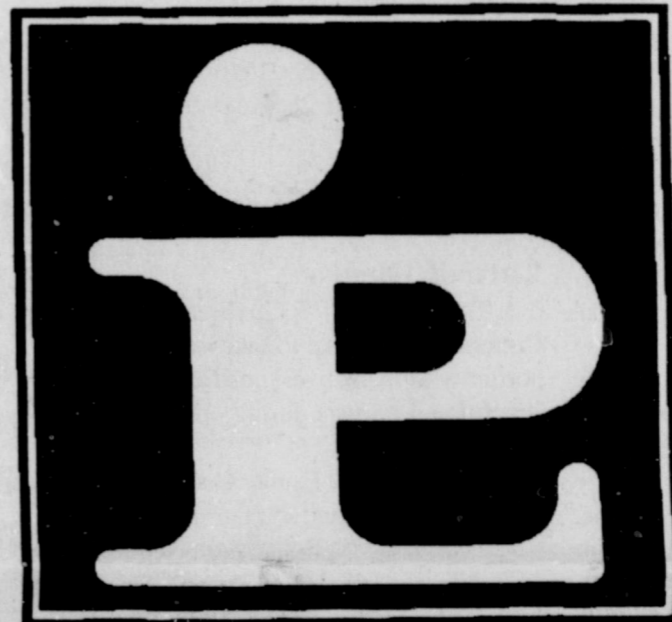
