Four youths are suspects in window-shooting spree

Vandals went on a BB gun shooting spree over the weekend, targeting windows of at least seven vehicles and causing at least \$1,600 in damages.

Police have identified and interviewed four suspects, two adult and two juvenile males, concerning the spree.

Charges are pending, and negotiations are underway for restitution to the owners.

The four suspects were stopped in a vehicle that contained two air rifles and one pistol, all of which were confiscated.

Reports of the random shootings began reaching the police department late Saturday night.

Locations of the vehicles were from 510 N. Jackson, 506 E. Bank, 910 E. Bank, 510 N. Wall, 311 W. Magnolia, 100 W. Cash and 904 W.

The vehicle on West Cash was the Friendly Door's van. Replacement on that vehicle's window alone was said to be \$533.

Actually, there was an eighth vehicle's window attacked, but not by BB shot.

Two men reportedly knocked out a pickup window Sunday while it was parked in the 100 block of West Cash. They reportedly used a baseball bat.

The pair, arrested in the 300 block of East Cash, were identified as William Harvey Holloway, 23, and Joshua Jacob Lambert, 20.

Both were placed under arrest by Iowa Park police at 8:42 p.m., and shortly after midnight they were transported to the county jail, according to the police blotter.

Three other arrests were made during the past week, unrelated to the criminal mischief cases, and another was ordered by the municipal court judge to go to jail for outstanding offenses.

Pamela Yvonne Hilliard, 45, was taken into custody at 7:05 p.m. Thursday in the 900 block of South Wall, on a charge of public intoxication. She was released five hours later after signing a personal recognizance bond.

Another public intoxication arrest was made at 1:26 p.m. Saturday, in the 200 block of Northwest Access


Barbara Burnham Mayo, 54, was released at 5:32 a.m. after paying a fine of \$282, according to the blotter

She was released at 2:26 a.m. Tuesday after signing a personal recognizance bond.


In municipal court Tuesday morning, David Chris Wilson, 36, was ordered to be committed to the county jail. He was transported there some two hours later.

School trustees are busy

Iowa Park school trustees will have little time for themselves in the near future, with three meetings having been posted, two of them for this evening and the third on Monday

The first meeting this evening is to begin at 6:00 in the administration building. Trustees are to hear from Hank Wheeler, director of Superintendent Search for the Texas Association of School Boards.

Most of the meeting is to be held in executive session, under the topic of personnel. Members will later open the meeting to the public, allowing for action to be taken.

The evident reason for the meeting was brought about by the announcement last month that Supt. Glen Mitchell is resigning at the end of this school year, and a search for his replacement is about to get un-

The board's regularly-scheduled monthly meeting is to begin at 7:30 p.m. in the junior high library. However, according to the agenda which was posted, the latter portion of the meeting will again be closed to the public, and moved back into the administration building.

That executive session is to be held for the superintendent's evaulation, according to the agenda.

Other topics on the agenda, besides the regular tax and department reports, include:

* consider employing architect Don Daughterity to draft plans and specifications for an elevator at the high school;

* consider a request from the Wichita Falls Southwest Basketball Association to use the junior high gymnasium for a basketball tourna-

* consider use of the junior high gym for a donkey basketball game Jan. 20, sponsored by the FFA Booster

A called special session at 7 p.m. Monday will be held at the junior high library, and will include boards from the Electra, Holliday, City View and Burkburnett boards of trustees.

The purpose of that joint meeting is to "Provide training and information to trustees about Compensation Concepts and School Pay Practices in Texas," according to the posted agenda notice.

Council overrides veto

A split vote by the city council was used Monday night to override a veto issued last month by Mayor Wayne House.

The council, in its only meeting during December, had voted to accept a bid submitted by Happy House to contract janitorial work at city facilities.

However, following the meeting, House issued a letter that he was vetoing their action.

Monday, Alderman Bob Hamilton made a motion to "Override the mayor's veto and sustain council's decision to accept janitorial bid submitted by Happy House."

During discussion of the issue,

the mayor said he felt it was wrong to not accept the lowest bid received. Happy House was the second-lowest of four bids received.

Some discussion concerned whether the city should have given ProClean, the firm which has held the contract the past two years, the contract again because its bid had been the lowest.

ProClean had bid \$250 per week and Happy House \$290. The other two bids were \$410 and \$477.

However, various department heads had complained about the work of ProClean, which was one of the reasons for its option year not being recognized by the council.

Voting to override the mayor's veto were Hamilton, Mark Raby and Tracy Fears. Aldermen Johnny Crawford and Bud Mercer voted against it. An ordinance reducing the areas

The year of their marriage, 1946, the McDonalds had a lot for which to be thankful.

Following graduation from W.F. George High School in Iowa Park, McDonald served in the United States Navy Seabees from 1943-1946. The Japanese army had surrendered to General Douglas MacArthur just months earlier and World War II had finally come to an end.

After graduation, the former Maxine Phillips had gone to Denton to further her education. She soon returned to Iowa Park to prepare for her marriage to Bud, and a brief honeymoon in Florida.

On January 15, 1946, Bud and Maxine Phillips were given in marriage by Emma Phillips and Myrtice McDonald at First Baptist Church in Iowa Park.

Members of Amity Study Club met at Dooley's Family Fitness Center on Monday evening for a program on exercise and fitness.


Owner, Jim Dooley, explained and demonstrated the types of exercise, and the purpose behind exercising.




Dolores and I acquired the Kress News in 1960. The school's coach at that time was Leo Fields. He and his wife Jo had two sons, Alton and Larry.





Migraine - Not Just Another Headache

Migraine is a debilitating disease that affects an estimated one in eleven Americans.

People ages 30-45 are most likely to suffer from migraine. It tends to affect about three times more women than men.

Migraine is different from other types of headache. Severe pain occurs on just one side of the head and is accompanied by nausea and vomiting as well as extreme sensitivity to bright light

Migraine attacks last from 4 to 72 hours. Typically migraine sufferers experience an average of one attack per month

There are two types of migraine: migraine with aura and migraine without aura.

Between 10-20% of migraine sufferers experience auras before pain begins. An aura may last 15-45 minutes. The person may see colors, flashes of light or bright spots, and may experience other symptoms: loss of vision, numbness or tingling, weakness in limbs, mental confusion and occasional hallucinations.

The exact cause of migraine is not understood. There may be a number of "triggers", including: emotional stress, certain foods and drinks (such as cheese, red wine, and chocolate), the menstrual cycle and changes in sleep or eating patterns.

Genetics may play a role, too - people with a family history of migraine are at greater risk.

If you suffer from migraine, or think that your headaches are migraine, it is important to see your doctor.

The first step in treatment is to determine the migraine trigger and try to avoid it.

If it is not possible to avoid the trigger, there are prescription medicines available that will help reduce the likelihood of an attack and others to help reduce the pain.



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

Library observes 10th anniversary

Monday, Jan 15, marks the 10th anniversary of the Tom Burnett Memorial Library. That was the first day in 1986, that the library officially opened for business.

Prior to that, the library was located at the former home economics cottage, across from the Junior High School (now a parking lot).

The donation of the library building to the city began in 1981, when Mrs. Ann W. Phillips, granddaughter of Tom Burnett, decided to give her grandfather's home to the city for the sole purpose of using it as a library, stipulating that it be named in honor of her grandfather.

Mrs. Phillips, who was president of the Burnett ranches, Inc., and principal director of the Ann Burnett and Charles D. Tandy Foundation, gave an additional gift of \$240,000 from the Tandy Foundation to help pay for necessary structural changes.

Friends of the Library worked very hard during the next few years to raise the rest of the money needed to further the reconstruction, an estimated cost of \$500,000.

They received a matching federal grant from the Texas State Library, along with a donation from the Hardin Foundation of Wichita Falls.

Mrs. Phillips' grandfather, Tom Burnett, was the son of Burk Burnett for whom the town of Burkburnett is named.


Tom Burnett built the house in 1924 and lived there until his death in 1938. Will Burnett, a cousin of Tom, purchased the house in 1941, and after his death in 1964, it remained the home of Will's wife, Maggie (Denny), until her death in 1980. The house was then willed to Mrs. Marie Callon, Maggie's sister.

Mrs. Phillips purchased the home from Mrs. Callon for the purpose of donating it to the city for a library.

The library became a reality in January 1986 and the formal dedication took place Saturday, March 15,


The Texas Historical Commission designated the home as a "Texas Historical Landmark" with a bronze marker located at the right of the entrance. This marker bears the title, "Tom Loyd Burnett Home."

Another bronze marker stands on the front of the lawn and tells of Tom's life as a prominent rancher, a friend to the Indians, and a supporter of rodeos. The Texas Historical Commission placed this marker in 1981.



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

All fifth graders will receive a certificate for completing the program, which was taught by Iowa Park Police Dept. D.A.R.E. officer DeDe Alderman.




