## Trustees employ firm to find superintendent

In a called meeting Monday night, Iowa Park CISD Board of Trustees voted to enter into a contract with TASB Superintendent Search Services to assist in finding a replacement for Supt. Glenn Mitchell who is retiring at the end of the school year.

The service will cost approximately \$5,500 plus expenses.

Hank Wheeler, director of Superintendent Search for the Texas

Association of School Boards, had presented an outline of his firm's procedures in a called meeting Thursday evening.

He said over the past nine years they have placed 150 superintendents in school districts ranging in size from El Paso to the King Ranch. He said their success is built on matching up candidates with the school and the community.

The consultant will work with

school and community groups in building a profile of the new superintendent. Then they send applications and brochures to all persons contacted and those requesting to be a candidate. The firm receives and processes all applications, and selects the most qualified candidates for the board's review and evaluation.

If the process goes according to schedule, the board of trustees should be voting on a new superintendent in May.

When asked by a board member how many candidates there would be to choose from, Wheeler said between 40 and 50. Then the board has the opportunity to select the 10 or 12 individuals they want to interview. The trustees went into a closed session with Mr. Wheeler, but no action was taken when the meeting reopened.

Supt. Mitchell said he had talked with board members and school personnel in several districts that have used TASB, including Azle, Stephenville, Glen Rose, Kaufman and Dimmitt, and they were all highly pleased with the service.

Following Thursday evening's special session, held in the school administration building, board members went across the street to the junior high library for a regular meeting.

During this meeting, trustees voted to have an architect, Don Daugherty, draw up plans and specifications for an elevator at the high school.

They approved a request by the Wichita Falls Southwest Basketball Officials Association to use the junior high gymnasium for a tournament on Feb. 15 and 17. The FFA Booster Club was given permission to use the junior high gym on Jan. 20 for a donkey basketball game.

In the superintendent's report, Glen Mitchell said the schools had gained 20 students over this time last month. This number includes seven at Kidwell, five at Bradford, one at the junior high, and seven new students at the high school. The 2,159 students currently enrolled in Iowa Park schools is a gain of 51 students over January, 1995.

The board again went into a

closed session for the superintendent's evaluation. No action was taken when the meeting was re-opened.

The Monday night meeting included a closed session to "employ personnel." When the meeting reopened, trustees voted to hire Lori Linette Bland to teach seventh grade English and reading, and sixth grade theater arts. Mrs. Bland, received a Bachelor of Science degree from Midwestern State University in December. She replaced Joni Woods who resigned last month.

Prior to this meeting, another called session was held in the junior high library. The Boards of Trustees from Electra, Holliday, City View and Burkburnett joined Iowa Park for training and information about "Compensation Concepts and School Pay Practices in Texas."

## It was an odd week for Iowa Park police

As if the week's work wasn't already unusually busy for Iowa Park police and radio dispatchers -- with routine business and an unusual number of fire reports and people needing assistance to unlock their vehicles -- they were asked if anyone had turned in \$1,100 in small bills.

A man walked into the police station just before 8 a.m. Friday, told them he had lost the money in the area of West Pecan, and asked if anyone had turned it in.

"No," was their response.

However, a short time later, the Wichita Falls resident called the dispatcher with the information he had found his money. He didn't explain how or where, however.

Another unusual event of the week was a report of finding a deer Friday night that had been gutted at the Lake Iowa Park boat ramp. The area game warden was alerted to the find for investigation.

A 15-year-old female filed a

sexual assault complaint Tuesday morning, though the incident reportedly had taken place in September.

That case is under investigation and likely will be referred to the grand jury, police said.

Barry Kent Hatton, 30, was taken into custody Thursday morning on two outstanding warrants that had been issued locally.

Hatton was released Friday morning after paying a \$91.50 fine for driving without a drivers license, and \$8.50 toward his fine for operating a vehicle without insurance. He also signed a personal recognizance bond to appear in court, according to the police blotter.

When an officer stopped a vehicle with an expired license in the 700 block of West Magnolia Friday afternoon, a computer check indicated he was wanted in Bexar County.

Clifford Doyle Morgan, 37, was

## Two given prison terms

Two Iowa Park men have been found guilty in federal court of stealing and cashing a government check, and have been sentenced to terms in prison.

Thomas Cecil Sims and David Edward Stevens, both 29, were found guilty of the charge recently in U.S. District court in Dallas and were sentenced by Judge Joe Kendall.

Both are to serve two months in the custody of U.S. Bureau of Prisons, to be followed by three years of supervised release, or parole.

Additionally, Sims was ordered by Judge Kendall to pay \$6,880 in

restitution and a \$500 fine, and Stevens \$4,200 in restitution and also a \$500 fine.

The pair reportedly took a government-issued check for \$11,080.80 in May 1994 when Stevens was manager of Woodbriar Apartments and Sims was a resident there.

The check was forged and deposited into Stevens' personal account in a local bank, and a \$5,000 withdrawal check immediately issued to Sims.

Sims is said to still be under indictments from both Iowa Park and Wichita Falls for other offenses.

## Council may offer help for military

Iowa Park city fathers Monday night will consider an ordinance which would waive meter deposits for all customers on active military duty.

A proposal was made recently by Sheppard AFB officials, pointing out that many young airmen with families are usually low-paid and have little available for expenditures such as meter deposits.

The officials assured the city that the military assists in collecting any debts which may be left unpaid.

Because no on-base housing is available and airmen being transferred to Sheppard as the base's pro-

grams grow, more and more military families are seeking housing in cities of the area.

A public appearance has been requested by Charlie Helms, who is to seek permission to sub-lease the 17 acres he has leased near the city's wastewater treatment plant.

Administrator Mike Price will ask authorization to purchase drainage culverts for the widening of Magnolia between West Highway and Johnson Road.

Price also said he will discuss plans for construction of the west-bound lane of West Park.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

## November sales good here

Iowa Park business community enjoyed a healthy run in November, when compared with the same month in 1994, according to sales taxes collected.

The city received a check this month for \$18,992.25 from the state comptroller's office. It was for sales taxes collected in November that were reported to the Austin office in December.

The check was a 13.95-percent increase over the \$16,666.70 the city received in January of 1995, according to the report.

For the first time in several months, Burkburnett's sales tax collection increase over the previous year was greater than Iowa Park's, percentage-wise.

Burk's increase was 25.86 percent, and Wichita Falls had a gain of 12.84 percent. Electra, however, experienced a drop of 4.79 percent.

Holliday and Archer City were the only two communities in Archer County showing a gain. Holliday's increase was 28.01 percent and Archer City 20.11. The other four communities were all negatives, according to the report.

### City will pick up Christmas trees

Several residents are apparently confused about how to have their old Christmas trees hauled away, according to calls received by city hall.

Many have felt all they had to do was to carry the discarded trees out to their dumpster or roll-out, and they

would be taken care of.

Actually, if you have a tree still sitting out by the dumpster or roll-out, you should call city hall and tell them where the tree is. Then it will be picked up and hauled away to be shredded.

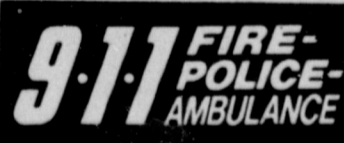
### Junior High Dance

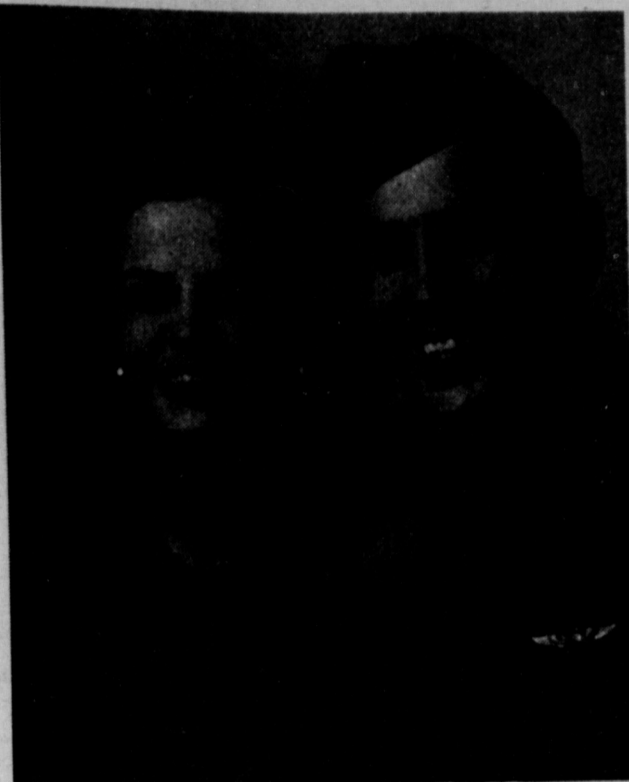

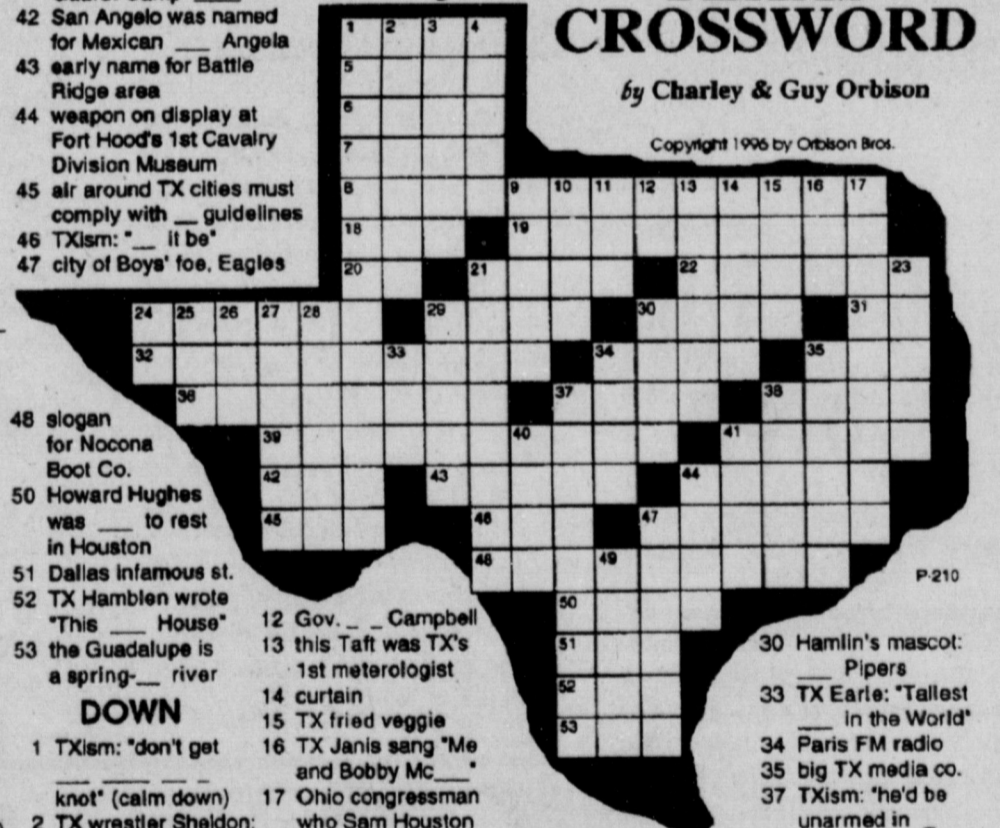

# COOK of the WEEK

The three younger boys, who live at home, are Luke, 11, Zac, nine, and Colter, five-years-old.

Dean is a mechanic, and Teri is working toward an associate degree in nursing at Vernon Regional Junior College, where she is a member of Phi Theta Kappa honor society.

Teri said probably because of the influence of her father, who is an antique dealer, she likes to browse through yard sales looking for antiques and furniture to refinish. She also likes to cook, sew, work in the garden, and spend quality time with her husband and children.

Referring to her recipes, Teri said that her husband prefers the "Fried Turkey" over the traditional way of preparing it, and the "Sweet Potato Fluff" is also a favorite of his. She said her boys are especially fond of the "Puppy Chow."

### Cheese Cake

**Crust:**  
20 square graham crackers  
1/4 cup soft butter  
3 Tbsps. sugar

**Filling:**  
4 - 3 oz. pkgs. cream cheese  
2 beaten eggs  
3/4 cup sugar  
2 tsps. lemon juice

**Topping:**  
1 cup sour cream  
3 1/2 Tbsps. sugar  
1 tsp. vanilla

Soften cream cheese. Add remaining filling ingredients. Beat until frothy. Pour into crust and bake 15

minutes at 350 degrees. Remove and cool 10 minutes.

Mix together topping ingredients while cooling and pour on top. Return to oven 5 minutes.

### Fried Turkey

Cook outdoors.  
Put thawed turkey in large cast aluminum or iron kettle. Cover completely with canola or peanut oil. Remove turkey and heat oil to 450 degrees.

Inject turkey with mixture of 1 squeeze bottle Parkay margarine and 1 small bottle tobasco sauce (melted together). Cook turkey 3 minutes per pound.

### Sweet Potato Fluff

2 cups mashed sweet potatoes  
3/4 cup sugar  
1 tsp. vanilla  
2 eggs

Mix together and top with:  
1/2 cup flour  
1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
1/2 stick margarine (frozen or firm)  
1/2 cup nuts, chopped  
1 cup brown sugar

Mix until crumbled mixture. Pat on top of sweet potato mixture and bake 30 minutes at 325 degrees.

### Fruit Cocktail Cake

2 eggs  
1 1/2 cup sugar  
Can of fruit cocktail and juice

Mix with a spoon (mixer mashes fruit).  
2 cups flour  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 tsps. soda  
1 tsp. cinnamon

Mix together and add to first ingredients. Pour into baking pan and sprinkle 1/2 cup brown sugar and 1/2 cup nuts on top. Bake 1 hour at 300 degrees or 30-45 minutes at 350 degrees.

### Sauce

1/2 cup evaporated milk  
1/2 cup margarine  
3/4 cup sugar

Boil 2 minutes and pour over cake while still hot. Can add the nuts to sauce instead of brown sugar.

### Puppy Chow

1 box Crispix cereal (12.3 oz.)  
1 - 12 oz. pkg. chocolate chips  
1 stick margarine  
1 cup plain peanut butter  
1 lb. powdered sugar

In 2-quart saucepan, melt the chocolate chips, margarine and peanut butter. Pour cereal in large bowl. Pour melted mixture over cereal to completely coat. Put the powdered sugar in another large bowl, with a lid, and pour in the chocolate-coated cereal. Place the lid on bowl and shake until completely coated. Store in air-tight container.

### Turkey Enchiladas

10 - 6-inch flour tortillas  
1 - 16 oz. can tomatoes, cut up  
1 - 15 oz. can tomato sauce  
1 cup finely chopped green pepper  
1/2 cup sliced green onions  
1/4 cup snipped parsley or cilantro  
1 tsp. chili powder  
1/2 tsp. crushed red pepper  
1/4 tsp. ground cumin  
2 cups chopped cooked turkey  
1 - 3 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened  
1 cup shredded sharp Cheddar cheese

Lightly grease roasting pan. Wrap the stack of tortillas tightly in foil and heat 10 minutes in 350 degree oven.

In a saucepan, combine undrained tomatoes, tomato sauce, green pepper, onions, parsley, chili powder, red pepper and cumin. Bring to a boil; reduce heat; simmer uncovered 5 minutes.

In a medium mixing bowl, combine half the sauce, the turkey, cream cheese, and half the shredded cheese. Spoon about 1/4 cup of the turkey mixture onto each tortilla; roll tortilla. Place tortillas, seam side down, in prepared pan. Bake, covered in a 350 degree oven 20 minutes. Pour remaining tomato sauce over tortillas. Sprinkle with remaining shredded cheese and bake uncovered 8 to 10 minutes more or until the sauce is hot.

### Mexican Round Steak

1 steak cut in 1/4-1/2" strips, browned  
1 lb. bulk sausage, browned  
Put in Dutch oven and add:  
Onion and green pepper  
Worcestershire sauce to taste  
2 - 4 oz. cans tomato sauce  
1 jar salsa

Simmer 1 1/2 - 2 hours. Serve over rice.

### Zucchini Soup

1 lb. zucchini, chopped  
1 onion, chopped  
Cook in 2 cups water with 3 chicken bouillon cubes.

### Blend with:

Fresh parsley  
1/4 tsp. celery salt  
1/4 tsp. garlic powder  
1 1/2 tsp. curry powder  
Process in quarts 40 minutes at 15 lb. pressure.

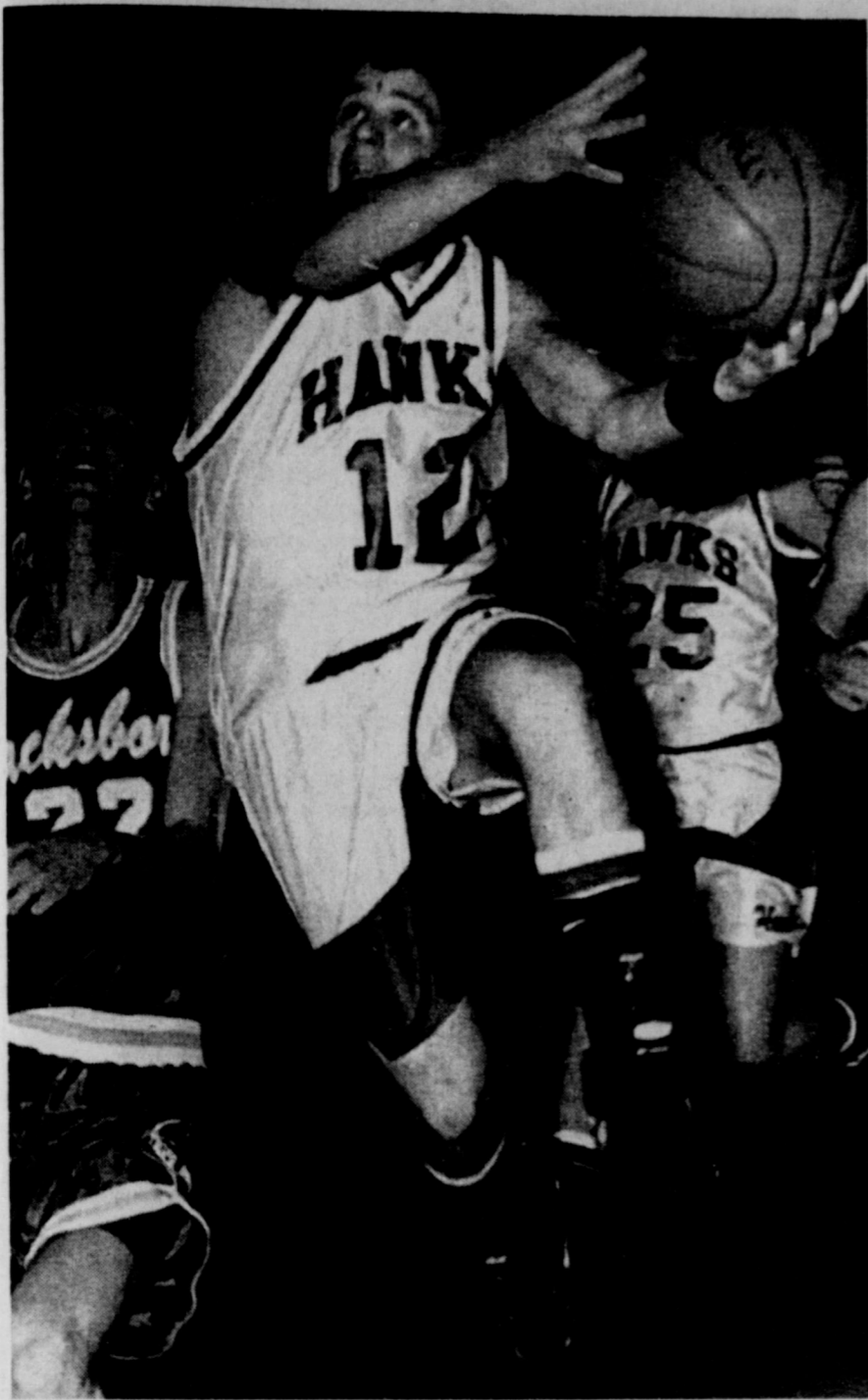

## Lady Hawks 2-2 in league play

The Lady Hawks split a pair of district games this week and now stand at 2-2 in league play and 13-9 overall.

In Friday night's game against the Tigeretts, Iowa Park could do no right and that reflected on the scoreboard as Iowa Park scored only 29 points in the game and fell 59-29 to Jacksboro which was ranked No. 6 in the latest TABC poll.

Jacksboro scored 11 points in each of the first two periods while Iowa Park managed only six points in the first and only two in the second to trail 22-8 at the half.

The third quarter didn't get any better for the Lady Hawks as Jacksboro outscored Iowa Park 25-12 in the third and went on to win the fourth quarter 12-9 to post the lopsided victory.

Randi Tigrett led Iowa Park in scoring with 8 points followed by Wendy Bridwell who finished with 6 points. The Tigeretts were led in scoring by Stacy Lowrance with 20 and by Kaci Duke who finished with 13. Jacksboro's overall record moved to 19-4 and 2-1 in district play.

In Tuesday's game against Vernon, Iowa Park took care of business down the stretch to post a 79-77 win that wasn't as close as the score indicated.

The Lady Hawks scored the game's first seven points to go on top 7-0 before the Lady Lions fought back to tie the game at 9-9. Iowa Park finished the quarter leading 22-17 as

six different Lady Hawks scored.

Iowa Park maintained the five-point cushion at the half leading 35-30. The Lady Hawks stretched the lead to 10 at 53-43 heading into the final eight minutes of play.

The lead went to 11 at 73-62 when Monica Merrell hit a layup with 2:12 left on the clock but Vernon fought back to outscore Iowa Park 12-2 over the next 1:26 to pull to within one at 75-74 with 36 seconds remaining. Dusti Welch, who finished with a game high 29 points, converted on three of four free throws to put her team on top 78-74 with 19 ticks left on the clock.

A three pointer by the Lady Li-

ons trimmed the lead to one at 78-77 with six seconds and Tigrett's free throw with one second left made the final score 79-77.

The win raises Iowa Park's record to 13-9 overall and 2-2 in district play while Vernon falls to 9-14 and 0-4 in league play.

Iowa Park will play host to Bridgeport Friday night to finish the first half of district and will travel to Graham to open the second half on Tuesday night.

## Hawks sweep district openers

The Iowa Park Hawks got off on the right foot this week winning their first pair of District 3-3A games and claiming a share of the top spot with Graham.

The Hawks opened the week with an impressive 84-59 win over Jacksboro at home Friday night. Iowa Park took advantage of 13 Tiger turnovers in the first quarter to grab a 20-13 lead after the first eight minutes of play. The Iowa Park lead grew to 16 at 40-24 with 2:28 left in the first half before Jacksboro scored a pair of baskets to pull to within 11 at the half.

The Hawks extended their lead to 13 heading into the final period, winning the third quarter 16-14 before blowing the game wide open in the fourth.

Iowa Park opened the fourth quarter with a 15-4 run to go on top by 73-49 with 4:17 left to play then coasted to the 84-59 win with everyone getting plenty of playing time.

The Hawks were led in scoring by Michael Fallon with a game-high 24 points followed by David Waterbury and Nick Black who each scored 18. Levi Scholl just missed double figures with 9 points. Jacksboro was led by Stewart Chalmers with 23 and Ryan Greer with 11. The win moved Iowa Park's overall record to 15-5 and 1-0 in district while Jacksboro falls to 14-8 and 0-1.

Iowa Park traveled to Vernon Tuesday night and once again showed it could win on the road as the Hawks dropped the Lions 60-48. The loss leaves Vernon with a 3-17 overall record and at 0-2 in district play while Iowa Park moves to 16-5 and 2-0 and tied for first place with Graham which is also at 2-0 after beating Bridgeport Tuesday night by the score of 89-86.

The Hawks turned up the pressure on the Lions and raced out to a

21-13 first quarter lead with Fallon and Waterbury each scoring six points in the period. Waterbury finished the game with 26 while Fallon finished with 14 to lead the Hawks.

Vernon pulled to within six at 36-30 heading into the second half and went into the final eight minutes of play trailing by the same margin as both teams managed to score only 10 points in the third quarter.

Iowa Park turned up the defense in the final period holding the Lions to only 8 points while the Hawks scored 14, six of those coming from Waterbury.

Edward Hall led Vernon in scoring with 14 followed by Eric Johnston who finished with 10.

Iowa Park will play host to Bridgeport Friday night, then travel to Graham on Tuesday for a showdown with the Steers to finish out the first half of the district schedule.

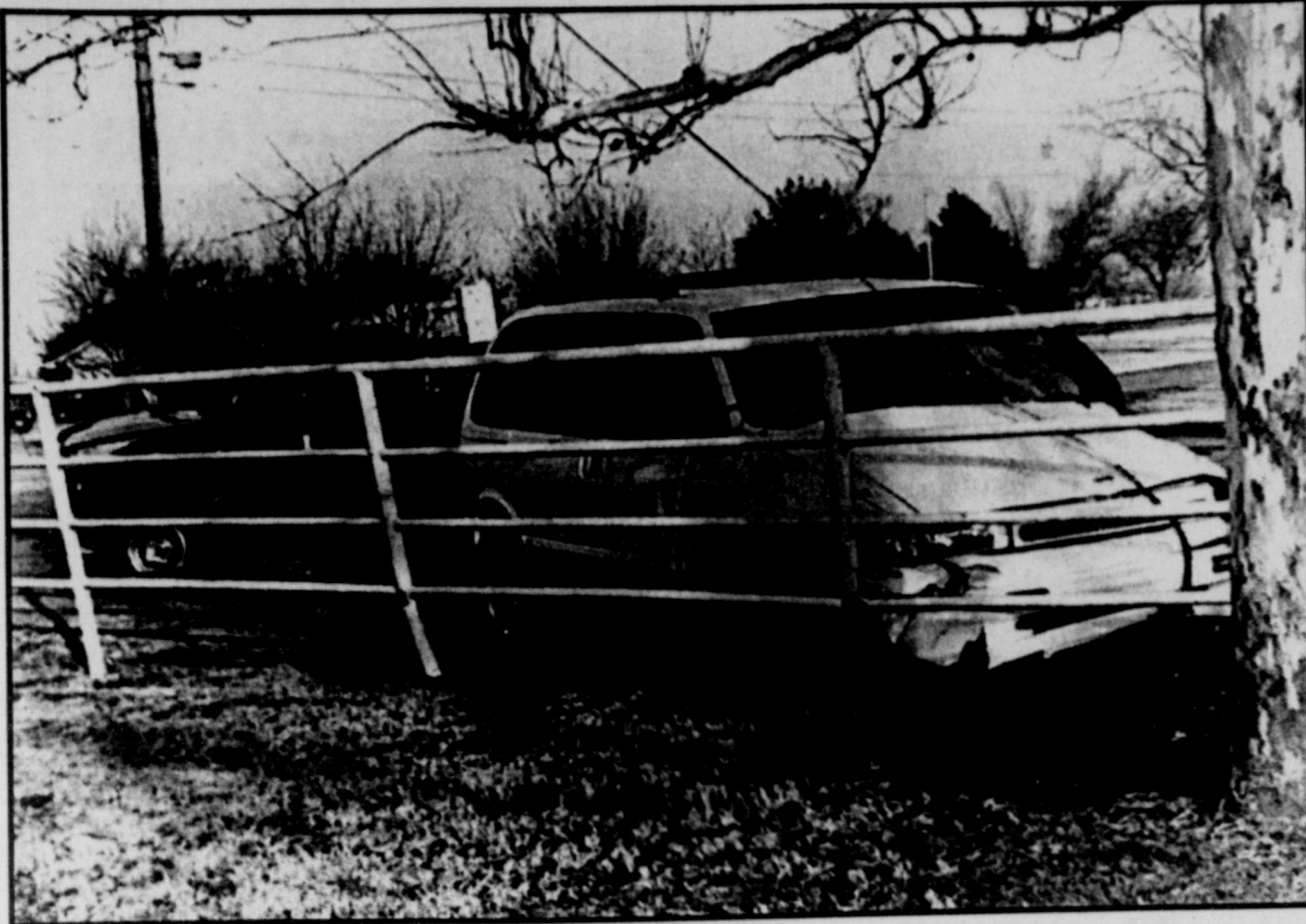

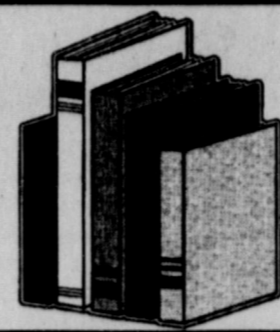
