## Gilmore

## kept eyes

on goal

 Henry Ford said it, "Obstacles are those frightful things you see whenyou take your eyes off your goal!" Evidently genial Iowa Park native Bill Gilmore has never taken his eyes off the goal. Work has never been a deterrent for him. He got his social security card at age nine when he went to work washing dishes for Metz Cafe.

Before that he mowed yards and took care of flower beds. Two yards in particular he remembers mowing Hills. "I was making 25 or 30 cents an hour," Bill said.
when vividly remembers each fall held here that he and several others about his age would work setting up stands for the carnival. "I still have a lot of trinkets that I got at the fair,"
he said. he said.

Bill also worked for Bud Black's Market and Kelly Ice House, among several other businesses. He recalls the family picked cotton and pulled James. and Claude Starr.
"My dad could pick a bale or cotton a day", Bill reflected, "he worked day and night." His daddy also worked for W. H. Hammond Oil Co. until about 1949. When he was

field work he started nightwatching for Thompson Tool Co. Bill helped his dad there, cleaning up the build-
ing. Gilmore's parents, Jame Emanuel and Erma Mae, had moved to Wichita County in the early 1900s during the oil boom. They bought a block of ground in the 700 block of South Park. All three of their children were borm there and one son,

He is looking forward to their 46th wedding anniversary on Feb. 19. Gilmore voluntarily remarked of their marriage, "I'd do the same thing all over again, I haven't regretted a minute of it."

His willingness to work, have a goal, and overcome obstacles, with his wife at his side, has paid off well for Gilmore.

Gilmore did contract work in South America, Canada, throughout the United States, and the Middle East.

A self-taught welder, he did contract work in Germany a year be fore he started
in 1958. 1958.

When he went on contract jobs family went along.

They had bought a home at 514 W. Washington that was in the coun y at that time.
The embryo of his present usiness, Gilmore Inc., located just north of 287 bypass, actually started in 1958 from the bed of a pickup ruck backed up to his front porch.

He was tired of traveling, so in 959, "I began going to work out my back door instead of my front door Bill said.

He builta shop back of his house out of oil field pipe, except for the that he tore down. Bill didn't buy his first new welding truck until 1965 .
He had bought a barracks building and remodeled it for their home. They still live at the same location, but the house has undergone a lot of changes.

As a healthcare consumer, you have a right to information - in language you can understand - about your prescription drugs and over-the-counter medications.
Being instructed on how to properly use your medications is a basic part of good healthcare provided by your pharmacist.
Many people hate to bother their doctor or pharmacist with
"dumb" questions; but there are no "dumb" questions when it comes to understanding your medications.
Your pharmacist and doctor want you to get well, and answering questions is a part of their job.
Before you take a drug (or any type of treatment) you should know its pros and cons, and what will happen if you don't take it Your doctor or pharmacist wants to know if you like tablets better than liquids, or if you prefer one large tablet rather than four er thaller ones.
You must communicate fully with your healthcare professionals. Tell your pharmacist or physician if you experience side effects while taking a medicine, or if it makes you feel worse.
Tell them exactly how you feel, when side effects occur, and for how long.
Be completely honest. If you have not been following instruc tions exactly, say so. This could have a bearing on how you feel. Know exactly how to follow the directions on the label; the name of the medicine and what it is supposed to do; what foods, drinks and other medicines or activities to avoid while taking it.
You must do your part too. How well your medication works is not just up to your pharmacist or doctor, it's up to you too.

1 disliked the man when I first met him in the late 1950 s, and after a
stunt he pulled on me and others in the mid 1960 s, I despised him. You may remember the name. He was a U.S. senator representing Texas. And he was one of the most liberal Democrats I've ever known. I worried constantly during the three tries he made at being elected govwinn. During the 1960s, we lived in Plainview and published a weekly newspaper, The Plains Farmer, that
concentrated on irrigation farming in a nine-countyarea of the Southing ins. a nine-county area of the South Plains.
It was during that time a fellow named Billy Sol Estes was developing a hold on grain storage elevators and selling anhydrous ammonia fertilizer. His elevator at Plainview was one of my largest advertising customers.

Estes, who lived in Pecos, was working on becoming a common
name among politicians, primarily
because the federal government was controlling everything relating to agriculture, such as acreage allot-
ments and supplimenting grain storment payments.
It was also during that time Estes designed a plan to get major amounts of cash to finance some of his ventures.

What he did was to get farmers to use their good credit and names to finance the building of anhydrous
ammonia trailer tanks. But the major ammonia trailer tanks. But the major
 identificatin a scheme of swapping Estes was lom tank to tank. Estes was later found guilty in court at Plainview and elsewhere on
