Gilmore kept eyes on goal

Henry Ford said it, "Obstacles are those frightful things you see when you take your eyes off your goal!"

Evidently genial Iowa Park native Bill Gilmore has never taken his eyes off the goal. Work has never been a deterrent for him. He got his social security card at age nine when he went to work washing dishes for Metz Cafe.

Before that he mowed yards and took care of flower beds. Two yards in particular he remembers mowing were the Earle Dennys and Sam Hills. "I was making 25 or 30 cents an hour," Bill said.

He vividly remembers each fall when the Texas-Oklahoma Fair was held here that he and several others about his age would work setting up stands for the carnival. "I still have a lot of trinkets that I got at the fair, " he said.

Bill also worked for Bud Black's Market and Kelly Ice House, among several other businesses. He recalls the family picked cotton and pulled bolls for the Spruiells, Koonce, D.O.

James, and Claude Starr. "My dad could pick a bale of cotton a day", Bill reflected, "he worked day and night." His daddy

also worked for W. H. Hammond Oil Co. until about 1949. When he was injured and could no longer do oil field work he started nightwatching for Thompson Tool Co. Bill helped his dad there, cleaning up the building.

Gilmore's parents, James Emanuel and Erma Mae, had moved to Wichita County in the early 1900s during the oil boom. They bought a block of ground in the 700 block of South Park. All three of their children were born there and one son. James (Bud) still lives on the property, near the site of the original home place. Bill's sister, Veneta Glasgow, lives in Wichita Falls.

Gilmore also worked for Western Pipe Coating during his senior year while the company was coating pipe for Lake Iowa Park . While working for Dowell Chemical Co., of Wichita Falls, "I worked on the first well they sandtracked in Wichita County" he said. And, he also had a stint at rough necking and worked for a time at Sheppard Field.

Bill and his wife, Maryanne are both 1950 graduates of W.F. George High School in Iowa Park. They were married three months shy of graduation. He is looking forward to their 46th wedding anniversary on Feb. 19. Gilmore voluntarily remarked of their marriage, "I'd do the same thing all over again, I haven't regretted a minute of it."

His willingness to work, have a goal, and overcome obstacles, with his wife at his side, has paid off well for Gilmore.

Remembering the early years of their marriage, Bill commented, "The roughest year I've ever experienced was 1954".

That year he lost his dad. While working up north he wrecked his truck and the trailer he was pulling.

He "piled" all their belongings into another pickup (not his). It caught fire and burned, along with all their belongings.

He lost his car because he couldn't get it financed.

Probably the most memorable event of that year was the loss of a son. An identical twin to his son Kenny, the baby, named Kelly Lynn, lived only three days.

Gilmore did contract work in South America, Canada, throughout the United States, and the Middle Fast.

A self-taught welder, he did contract work in Germany a year before he started welding for the public in 1958.

When he went on contract jobs they closed up their house and the family went along.

They had bought a home at 514 W. Washington that was in the country at that time.

The embryo of his present business, Gilmore Inc., located just north of 287 bypass, actually started in 1958 from the bed of a pickup truck backed up to his front porch.

He was tired of traveling, so in 1959, "I began going to work out my back door instead of my front door," Bill said.

He built a shop back of his house out of oil field pipe, except for the roof. That came off the old house that he tore down. Bill didn't buy his first new welding truck until 1965.

He had bought a barracks building and remodeled it for their home. They still live at the same location, but the house has undergone a lot of changes.

The less than sensational beginning of a business has evolved into a hub that provides bumper to bumper service for trucks and trailers.

In December 1969, Gilmore started out with five acres of land on the southwest corner of Bell Road and the access road just north of the 287 bypass.

Gilmore Inc. now utilizes 18 acres of ground. It has grown to include a welding shop, body shop, salvage operation, mechanic shop, office facilities, and yields an income for Gilmore and his four sons. They built all of their own buildings.

The operation is the only one between Amarillo and the Metroplex and Oklahoma City and Abilene that provides full service for trucks and trailers, including buying and hauling wrecked trucks and trailers for individuals and companies.

Gilmore's son, Cecil, operates the body shop, Kenny operates the

welding shop and Billy is in charge of the mechanic shop and helps to run the overall business operation. The fourth son, Jimmy, has the dealership for Harley Davidson Motorcycles.

Gilmore said, "Jimmy worked long and hard for the dealership." He bought the area from his dad where the shop is located. It originally was built for Mrs. Gilmore's art and ceramic shop, which she formerly operated.

The Gilmore operation employs an average of 20 people. At one time, during the third oil boom in the 1980s, they employed 50 people. Gilmore has backhoes and eight welding rigs.

The 18-acre operation is traversed by the use of eight golf carts.

Bill bought one of the first motorcycles Jimmy sold after opening the Red River Harley Davidson business. He bought the first one sold in this area with a side car.

Bill and Maryanne have taken two vacations on the motorcycle, with Maryanne riding behind Bill. On their first vacation their dog rode in the side car on their second they took both their dog and cat with them.

They are members of the National Harley Owners Group (HOG), and attended the National HOG anniversary meeting in Milwaukee three years ago.

The state meeting of HOG will be in Austin this summer and they plan to attend. They are hoping to take their 13-year-old granddaughter, Karlee, who lives with them on the trip. Mrs. Gilmore publishes the State HOG newsletter.

Bill assists with the Red River Harley Davidson April Fool Run each year that is sponsored by Jimmy and his wife, Vicky. He helps with the cooking for the event. Proceeds from the Run go to the Friendly Door

A civic-minded person, Bill has always been interested in helping organizations. He has been a member of MuleSkinners 20 years and served as president two consecutive terms. He served as a volunteer fireman 25 years.


- were there. In fact, the senator was one of those he had flown.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Butter pan. Take crust off of bread and arrange in pan. Pour butter, brown sugar and cinnamon over bread; sprinkle on raisins. Blend eggs, sugar, vanilla and salt. Gradually stir in milk and pour over bread. Place in 1-inch hot water in baking pan. Bake 65-70 minutes or until knife inserted comes out clean. Makes 24 servings.

Grandma's **Orange Carrot Cake** 1 cup Grandma's molasses 1 cup butter

4 eggs 1/2 cup orange juice 1/2 tsp. salt 2 cups shredded carrots 1/2 cup chopped walnuts 1 cup flour (white) 1 cup whole wheat flour 2 tsps. baking soda 1 tsp. cinnamon Frosting: 3 oz. pkg. cream cheese 2 Tbsps. margarine

1 1/2 cups powdered sugar 1 tsp. grated orange peel

In a large bowl, combine molasses, butter, eggs and orange juice; mix well. Stir in both flours, baking soda, cinnamon and salt; mix well. Stir in carrots and walnuts. Pour into 2 greased 8 or 9-inch round cake pans. Bake 30-35 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool 15 minutes; remove from pan and cool completely.

In a small bowl, combine all frosting ingredients. Beat until smooth. Spread one layer with frosting. Top with second layer and frost it. Then top with grated orange peel

Dot's Liver & Onions Salt and pepper the pieces of liver, then roll them in flour and brown in skillet with shortening in it. When liver is browned a little, put in a baking dish and saute onion rings in shortening. Arrange onions on top of liver. Take flour and brown it in the shortening, adding water to make gravy. Pour gravy over top of liver and onions and put in the oven to bake about 1 hour to get done.

> **Creamed Chicken** with Mushrooms Arrange chicken pieces in a

baking dish with water and butter and bake at 350 degrees about 30 minutes.

Pour 1 large can of cream of mushroom soup over chicken with salt and pepper and return to oven about 1 hour to make sure chicken is done.
