## **City purchases 6 lots** by south water tower

The City of Iowa Park now owns such contacts prohibitive. six lots in the south part of town.

Council members, during their regularly-scheduled meeting Monday, approved payment of \$1,500 for each of the lots to Mrs. Peggy Blanchard.

It wasn't a need for the property that prompted the purchase, however. When the city relocated a water tower a few years ago on West Emerald, access to the lots was cut off.

Mrs. Blanchard was asking \$2,000 per lot. The city had an independent appraisal made of the tract, and was told their value was \$1,000 each.

The \$1,500 was a compromise worked out with the former owner.

Insurance agent Robert Bosley requested, and was granted, a sixmonth waiver of the city's solicitation permit fee requirement, which will allow him to contact residents at their homes without appointments.

Bosley, who lives here but works out of an office in Wichita Falls, explained his need to contact potential customers, and said the permit fee specified in the ordinance made

A request from Kenneth Shelton for permission to tap a two-inch water line, which is privately-owned on South Bell Road, so he could purchase city water, was approved.

Sheiton will be required to pay a \$300-tap fee and be charged the usual out-of-city rates for the water.

Also approved was an ordinance increasing the amount the city administrator can expend for a purchase, from \$3,000 to \$5,000, without council approval.

Aldermen discussed, but took no action during the meeting, a proposal to extend Jackson Street northward to the 1200 block.

The proposal was made by Kenneth Beall, who said his daughter wishes to build a home there, and two or three other homes also would be constructed.

Because extension of the street would require either altering the size or location of the pavilion in Oscar Park, council members said they wanted to study alternatives before



Without question, the major topic around the coffee shops this week is the weather. Cold weather, that is.


Oh, there's some talk about the campaigns for president of the United States, but most folks apparently are beginning to tire of that, eventhough we still have until November for the general election.

## Former Lady Hawk to be recognized

Erica Knight will become the third person to be inducted into the Hawk Track Hall of Fame, during ceremonies prior to the finals of Saturday's annual Iowa Park Lions Club Hawk Relays.

Despite the fact that she attended high school here only two years, she established herself as one of the most ... if not the most . . . accomplished Lady Hawk track athlete. In addition, she was a starter on the varsity basketball team, and was consistently on the academic honor roll.

As a freshman and sophomore, she earned four medals at the state UIL track meet.

Her freshman year, 1990, she placed third in both the triple jump and 100-meter hurdles. The following year, Erica earned second place in the triple jump and repeated her third

place in the hurdles, and then added a fifth place in the high jump.

Erica's career as a Lady Hawk was cut short when her father, Billy Yarbrough, was transferred by his company to Oklahoma. The family moved to Ardmore, where Erica competed one more year in track. She placed third in the hurdles at the state meet, but Oklahoma does not have competition in the triple jump.

She earned a starting position on Ardmore's basketball team, which competed in the state tournament her junior year. As a senior, she opted to not compete in track, but her team won the state basketball championship, and she was named Most Valuable Player of the tournament.

Her reason for not competing in track her final year in high school was the fact that she was recruited and accepted

a full scholarship to play basketball at Baylor University, which she did through her sophomore year. An injury prohibited her from continuing in the sport, and she is now concentrating on academics, at Midland Junior College.

In earning the third-place medals at Austin her freshman year, her best in the triple jump was a 36-8, and she was clocked in 15.3 in the hurdles. The following year, she placed second in the hurdles with a 15.0, third in the triple jump with a distance of 37-3.3, and cleared 5-2 for fifth in the high jump.

Erica's name will be on a special plaque and permanently mounted at the base of the flag staff on the east end of Hawk Stadium, with the first two recipients of the recognition.

The first to be named to the Hawk Track Hall of Fame was Coach Bill Carter, followed last year by the late Bobby Gilbreath.
