No more candidates file here

No additional candidates for either the city council or school board elections filed during the past week.

All five positions, three on the city council and two on the school board, have candidates.

In fact, one has three. Bud Mercer, George Witherspoon and Tim Hunter all filed as candidates for the office of mayor.

And they did it early. In less than one hour after the official starting date of filing, as a matter of fact.

Mercer is currently serving a term as city alderman, which expires this spring. Hunter has served as mayor in the past. Witherspoon has never served in an elective position.

Terry Johnson has filed for the alderman seat being vacated by Mercer, and Tim Rich has filed for the seat held by Johnny Crawford, in a term that expires this spring.

Both school trustee incumbents have filed. They are Keith Fisher, who is chairman of the board, and Randy Catlin.

March 20 is the deadline for candidates in either election to file. Those wishing to file for a city post can do so at city hall, while the school tax office is the filing site for trustee candidates.

Both the city and school elections will be held May 4.

Building permits take jump

Building permits issued during February more than made up for their low total in January.

Permits were issued during the month for four new homes, which accounted for the month's high total of \$463,675. January's was only \$57,740.

Thus, the total for 1996 is now over half a million dollars, at \$521,415.

Altercation case going to grand jury

No charges were filed by Iowa Park police as result of an altercation Sunday morning between two men, but the case is to be turned over to the county grand jury for consideration.

Chief Ray Smock said his department is handling the case, in which a man was treated at a Wichita Falls hospital, as self defense.

Ricky Ralph Gonzales, 39, received two "superficial" wounds in his chest during a brief altercation with Jimmy Don Whitlock, 30. The wounds reportedly were inflicted by a small pocket knife, according to the report.

The incident, which took place in the 1000 block of East Washington, was reported to police at 9:17 a.m.

Whitlock was taken into custody at that location. Emergency medical personnel were called to a residence in the 400 block of South Colorado to tend to Gonzales.

Gonzales was treated and released from the hospital. Whitlock was taken to the police station, interviewed, and then released from custody.

Two separate theft reports were received from Woodbriar Apartments during the past week.

The first case reported was received by the police department Wednesday of last week, by a resident who said a television set had been stolen from an apartment.

Then, the apartment manager reported Monday morning that two surveillance cameras had been removed from their mountings on the office building.

One camera was mounted on the north side and the other on the east side of the building, according to the report, and each was valued at \$100.

Two thefts at school campuses were solved during the week, and almost all the property returned.

A woman who works as a crossing guard at Bradford Elementary Monday afternoon reported money missing from her purse. About two hours later, the money, \$153, was turned over by a student's father and no charges were filed.

Tuesday evening, most of some \$1,500 worth of jewelry taken from the girls' dressing room at the high school a few weeks earlier was recovered.

The jewelry reportedly was recovered from residences in the 1000 block of East Cash and 1100 block of

Comelia. No charges had been filed as of mid-day Wednesday.

Another theft case was reported Monday afternoon. A pair of 150-gallon barrels, valued at \$300 each, were taken from a location in the 400 block of South Jackson.

Five arrests, two for Class C assault, two on outstanding warrants issued locally, and one for public intoxication, were made during the past week.

James Brian Vanhuss, 28, was taken into custody Thursday afternoon in the 100 block of West Lafayette, on an assault charge.

He was released two hours later after paying \$50 toward a \$132 fine, and signing a promise to appear in court.

Police arrested Steve Karl Nunn, 45, Monday evening in the 1100 block of West Louisa, also on an assault charge.

Nunn was released early Tuesday morning after paying a fine of \$132.

Felix Randal Esparza, 34, was taken into custody in the 200 block of South Jackson Monday afternoon, after an officer determined a warrant had been issued for him.

The warrant was for failure to maintain financial responsibility, which carries a fine of \$285, and

failure to appear in court, \$280.

Esparza was transported to the Wichita County jail.

Timothy James Smith, 26, was picked up Tuesday afternoon in the 300 block of West Smith, on an outstanding warrant for driving without a license.

Smith was released two hours later after paying \$16 toward a fine of \$217.

Police arrested Joshua Michael Harlow, 18, in the 400 block of North Jackson at 3:26 a.m. Saturday, and charged with public intoxication.

Harlow was released at 8:26 a.m. after paying a fine of \$282, according to the police blotter entry.

City council resolution to bolster WF project

Action by the city council at its meeting Monday night could have an affect on highway improvements in Wichita Falls.

According to the tentative agenda for Monday's 7 p.m. meeting, a resolution will be considered which requests the "... Texas Transportation Commission provide the necessary funding for constructing overhead lanes along U.S. Highway 287 in Wichita Falls."

The state is proposing to construct overhead lanes of traffic on the highway which would not require traffic passing through the city to

Party primaries scheduled Tuesday

Polls for voting in the state's party primaries will be opened Tuesday, and the early voting period will cease Friday afternoon.

As of noon Tuesday, Precinct 32 voters had not swarmed the early voting box at the county annex building at 400 North Wall.

According to Mrs. Leroy Threet, poll judge, only 127 Democrats and 37 Republicans had cast early ballots.

The polls are to open at 7 a.m. Tuesday and close at 7 p.m.

Precinct 32 voters will cast their ballots at the First Baptist Church Annex, 220 West Park (the building was formerly the county's annex building); Precinct 33 at Faith Baptist Church, 411 South Wall; Precinct 34 at the West Wichita Co-Op Building in Valley View, and Precinct 35 at Chaparral Baptist Assembly on Church Camp Road.

Both Democrat and Republican party members will be voting at the same four locations.

Voters will be making decisions on which candidates they want to represent their parties in the November election, which includes county, state and federal positions, including the presidency.

Members of the Wichita County Libertarian Party will hold both their precinct and county conventions here in Iowa Park.

Citizens who have not voted in either Democratic or Republican party primaries are eligible to vote at the Libertarian precinct convention, which will be held at 7 p.m. Tuesday at the Cedar Tree Restaurant, 510 East Highway.

The Libertarian county convention will also be held at the Cedar Tree, beginning at 10 a.m. Saturday, Mar. 16, according to Jim Dunn, acting county chairman.

Those who participate in the Libertarian voting must have voter registration cards to gain admittance.

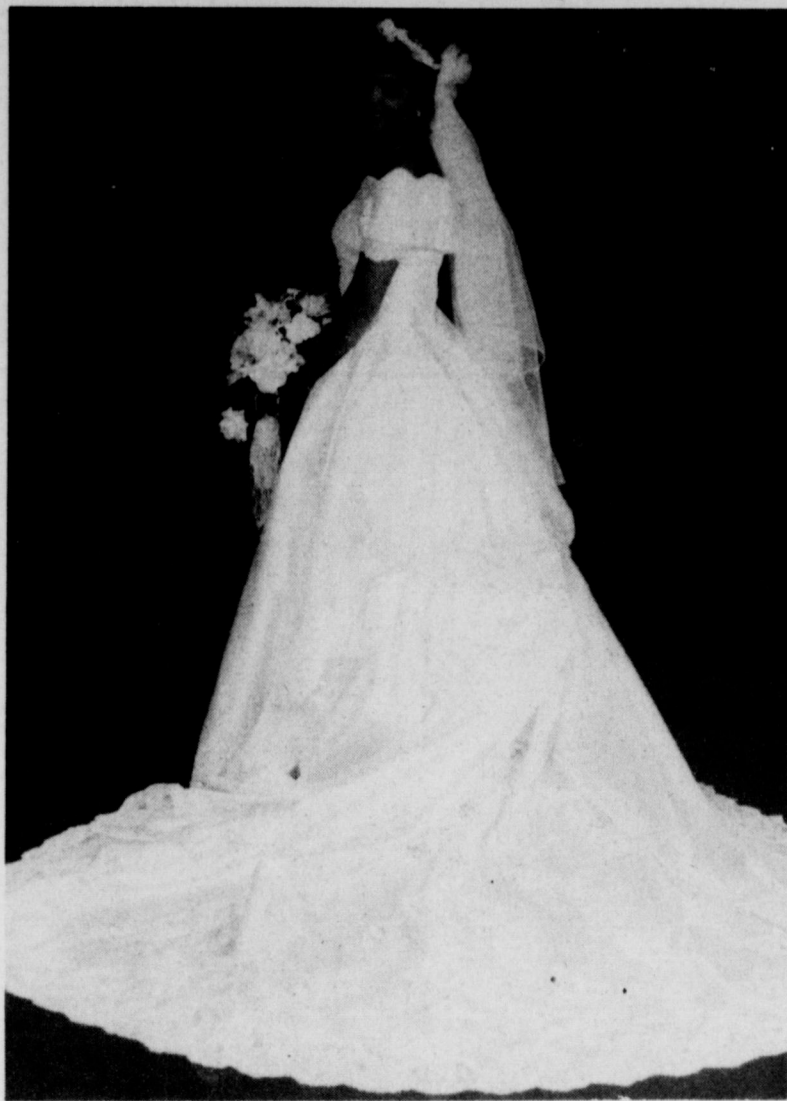

NEWS OF THE
IOWA PARK GENEALOGICAL & HISTORICAL SOCIETY

There are often surprises and mysteries discovered in genealogy. Among these are a people who some English and French explorers are said to have seen in 1654, while in the southern Appalachians.

A people described as being dark-skinned, brown and blue eyed with European features and they spoke a broken Elizabethan English. They practiced Christianity, lived in cabins, tilled the soil and claimed to be "Portygee".

Later they were called Mulungeons (maybe from the Portuguese word meaning shipmate). One of the popular conclusions is that this is a group of people of mixed Indian, white and Africa-American ancestry

in southern Appalachia, especially eastern Tennessee, and there are possibly hundreds of thousands of descendants.

Recently N. Brent Kennedy has a new book called "The Mulungeons: The Resurrection of the proud people. An Untold Story of Ethnic Cleansing in America".

He tells of some interesting family history discovered in his own lines and offers some more theories of the origin of these interesting people.

If you are tracing ancestors in Hawkins County, Tennessee and suspect a Mulungeon connection, you will find Kennedy has included many surnames that are Mulungeon related.

Genealogist Myra Vanderpool

Gormley tells us that N. Brent Kennedy is the founder of the Mulungeon Research Committee, co-sponsored by the University of Tennessee in Knoxville and VanderKloot Film and Television in Atlanta, working together to learn more about the cultural and ethnic history of the Mulungeons.

Another interesting example of a people resulting from mixtures of ethnic groups are the Shinnecock Indians of Long Island, New York.

The Shinnecock Tribe were of the Algonquin language and when the Algonquins went to Wisconsin, some of the Shinnecocks went with them and some remained on Long Island.

One day they noticed a ship in distress and sinking in the sound near land. Many of the Indian men went out to help rescue the people on the ship.

The weather was foul and many of the Indians lost their lives. The ship was manned by black men. Many

of them were saved and made it to shore where they lived among the Indians. Now the so-called Black-Shinnecock Tribe still live at the Hamptons on Long Island.

There are so many interesting connections found in genealogy. It is a fascinating hobby.

Don't forget the regular meeting of the Genealogy & Historical Society Saturday at 2 p.m. at Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

Baseball Hawks extend season record to 7-0

The Iowa Park Hawks are starting to get some people's attention.

Head coach David Fuhrman's squad has already knocked off two state-ranked teams in Holliday, which was ranked No. 2 in Class 2A and Canyon Randall, which was the No. 3-ranked team in Class 4A, en route to their perfect 7-0 record. Iowa Park won five games in five days this week and picked up the first place trophy in the Childress Tournament to add to the list of their accomplishments.

Besides knocking off the two ranked teams, the Hawks have also beaten two other 4A schools in Burk Burnett and Wichita Falls High School along the way.

The Hawks started the week winning a pair of games Thursday in the Childress Tournament. Iowa Park

beat host Childress in the opener 10-4, led by Clancy Lalumia who picked up the win and had a solid day at the plate going 2 for 2, scoring a run and driving in 3 runners. Chad Wright went 1 for 1 scoring two runs and picking up an RBI, while Shaun Campbell and Robert Klinkerman each went 1 for 2 with 2 runs scored.

In game two, Iowa Park beat Canyon Randall's JV squad 10-6 with Corky Petty picking up the win. Klinkerman led the Hawks at the plate going 2 for 3 with 2 runs scored and 2 RBIs. Kevin Brazier went 3 for 5 and scored a run and Dusty Owen hit a solo home run to help pace Iowa Park.

The Hawks shut out Tula 5-0 in game three behind another strong outing by Chris Norris. Iowa Park was led at the plate by David Water-

bury who went 2 for 4 with 2 runs scored and an RBI and by Klinkerman who finished 1 for 3 with an RBI. The win, Norris' second of the season, put his team in the championship game against Canyon Randall.

The title game was a classic with the Hawks coming up with a run in the bottom of the seventh with two outs to take the crown. Petty, 3-0, did a stellar job on the mound for the Hawks scattering 5 hits, striking out 4 while allowing only 2 walks. The two runs Randall scored were unearned and both came in the top of the second inning.

Iowa Park scored single runs in it's half of the second and fourth innings to tie the game at 2-2. The game remained tied until the bottom of the second when Klinkerman walked and advanced to second on a passed ball

with two outs setting the stage for the game-winning hit.

Petty laced a double just inside the third base bag to easily score Klinkerman from second for the winning run.

"You're always blessed to win," said Fuhrman. "It was nice to see Petty pitch well in the championship game and I thought Norris did a super job in the semi-finals to get us to that point."

The Hawks returned home, but got little rest as they traveled to Hoskins Field Monday afternoon to take on the Coyotes with sophomore Jonathan Clubb getting the call for Iowa Park.

Clubb, a left-hander in his first varsity start, pitched 5 2/3 strong innings allowing 7 hits, 4 walks while striking out 4 in the Hawks 9-5 win over WFHS.

Iowa Park pounded out 10 hits and committed only one error while the Coyotes picked up 8 hits but committed nearly as many errors finishing with 7 miscues.

"They broke down defensively and we took advantage of their mistakes and scored some runs off of them," Fuhrman said. "I thought Clubb did a good job. He got behind in the count some but he battled back real well. Norris came on to pitch the rest of the way and didn't mess around and went right at them to close the

door." The Hawks were led at the plate by Wright, who went 3 for 4 with a run scored and by Waterbury who finished 2 for 4 with 3 RBIs. Shaun Campbell finished 1 for 4 with a solo homer to left center.

Iowa Park will not get much time to set back and admire it's record as the Hawks will get back on the field today at 4:30 p.m. in the opener of the Wichita Falls Classic Tournament being held at Hoskins Field. The Hawks will get another shot at the Coyotes in their first round game.

"I'm impressed with our record to this point," Fuhrman added. "Even though we're 7-0, I know we're not playing as well as we are capable of playing. We're still not as consistent at the plate as I would like for us to be. I think we have a better eye at the plate than we've had in the last couple of years because we're getting more bases on balls and those guys are coming around to score more and more. Our pitching and our defense are probably ahead of schedule and those two things are bailing us out in some games."



Both the Hawks and Lady Hawks will be taking part in the Regional Power Lifting Meet that will be held in the High School Gym starting Saturday at 8:30 a.m. with the weigh-in getting underway from 6:30 until 7:45.

Steve Stewart is the Regional

Director and is expecting 26 teams in the boys and 10 teams in the girls with about 150 total lifters.

To qualify for the Regional Meet, in the boys division, you must have one of the top 10 totals in your weight class. The totals are from previous meets with only the top 10 from

through the season making it to Saturday's meet. For the girls, things are a bit different. All lifters qualify for the Regional Meet.

To advance to the State Meet, being held at the University of Houston Campus on March 30, the

boys must finish first or second in the Regionals to move on while the girls, who will hold their State Meet in Beaumont on March 23, will send the top three finishers in each weight class and any other lifter who has a qualifying total as established by the Texas Women's Power Lifting Association.

Stewart will be giving medals to the top five finishers in each weight class and trophies to the top five teams. Awards will also be given for the Outstanding Bench, the Outstanding Squat and the Outstanding Dead Lift in two different groups of weight classes. There will also be an Out-

standing Lifter in each of the two groups.

Both the Hawks and Lady Hawks could be sending lifters to their respective state meets.

In the boys' division, Jeremy Tatom is setting third in the 114's, Shane Bagley is fifth, Jackie Miller is ninth and Cody Russell is tenth in the 148's with only 35 pounds separating first from fifth. Danny Payton is sixth in the 165's with Jimmy Fallon and Brandon McLemore as the first and second alternates.

Richard McCann is seventh in the 220's while Tyson Spruiell is in first by 40 pounds in the 242's.

Joining Spruiell in the 242's are Calvin Galliton who is fourth and Brian Casey who is ninth. Keith Hoover is second in the 275's with Wally Wahl listed as the second alternate.

In the girls division, Stewart has high hopes for Amanda Stevens in the 97's, Carmen Tidwell, Misty Beavers and Jessie Boyd all in the 132's. Summer Fortner in the 148's and for Melinda Bradshaw, who has already lifted enough to qualify for a trip to the state meet, in the 198's.

Admission for the meet will be \$2 for adults and \$1 for children and students.
