

City seeking grant funds

The city council Monday night formally requested a grant from the state which would provide a major improvement of water service as well as fire protection to an area in the south part of town.

The application for a \$103,500 grant from the Texas Community Development Program was approved in a resolution aldermen adopted.

If the grant is approved, the fourinch water line which extends from Bond to Bell would be replaced with a six-inch line. The larger line is necessary to service a series of fire hydrants which are planned.

No fire hydrants now exist to protect property in that area.

A second resolution adopted by the council requests the state to fund the proposed overhead highway routing through Wichita Falls.

Mayor Wayne House explained the Wichita Falls city council has asked area cities to take such action.

No action was taken, however, salaries of city employees who would on a proposal to extend North Jack- do the work.

The extension is necessary in response to calls to purchase a felt cently. order to provide access to now-undeveloped lots, which is being sought by Kenneth Beall.

Beall has said earlier his daughter plans to build a new residence on one or more of the lots in that area.

However, action was delayed on the proposal until a plat of the development is presented.

In order to extend the street, Administrator Mike Price told the council the pavilion would have to be moved, as well as five mature trees.

He said the pavilion could be relocated, the street extended and other related work, at a cost of \$38,600, of which Beall's part would be \$5,400.

Primaries turnout low

Local, as well as state, political observers have expressed disappointment about the turnout at the polls for Tuesday's party primaries.

Fewer than 13,500 votes were cast in Wichita County. That is approximately 19 percent of the registered voters. But the percentage is similar to the state's turnout.

The four precincts in the Iowa Park area -- 32, 33, 34 and 35 -- had a total of 1,077 votes cast.

Likely the race which captured the most interest in Iowa Park was that of Precinct Three constable, between incumbent Sam Fairchild and challenger Billy McNeely.

Fairchild was the winner, garnering a total of 529 votes to Mc-Neely's 352.

and 35 were carried by Fairchild 401-

Precinct Three commissioner Gordon Griffith also was returned to office, out-drawing challenger Stan Horton 1,284-683.

As was the case of Fairchild's race, incumbent Griffith also carried the three area boxes, 430-238.

All four area Republican voting precincts supported Bob Dole, as was the case over all of Texas.

Dole drew 190 votes in the local boxes, while Pat Buchannan had 99 and Steve Forbes followed with 35.

Though Wichita County and local Democrats supported Aaron Alejandro of Wichita Falls, in his bid to represent the party as the U.S.

The boxes of precincts 32, 33 Representative of Dist. 13 in November's general election, he reportedly failed over the district.

> Alejandro received 373 votes from the four local boxes, while his opponent, Samuel Brown Silverman of Amarillo, received 220.

The candidates for Commissioner of Precinct One were all Republicans, including incumbent Woody Gossom, Larry Lewis and Larry Godwin.

Gossom was the winner, attracting 1,750 votes to Lewis' 586 and Godwin's 361.

At the only area box in the local area, which was at Valley View, Gossom was the leader with 22, Godwin drew 19 and Lewis six.

Trustees adopt proposals to improve student scores

Iowa Park students were given extra motivation to achieve higher scores on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) tests due to action taken by school trustees re-

In a called meeting, school board members approved the funding of individual and group incentives for making high marks on the state-required tests. The vote came after hearing presentations by Michael Bean, chairman of the Iowa Park Site Based Decision Making Committee, and principals at Bradford, junior high, and high school.

Bean said that the committee has been researching, since October, the possibility of providing incentives to academically recognized students who take the TAAS tests in the Iowa Park school district.

Their research indicated that all schools that had provided a meaningful incentive to their academically recognized students produced significant increases in their overall TAAS scores for their campuses.

The committee worked with the campus improvement committees in designing incentives. The students were asked what incentives they wanted, and a list was compiled from

this information. Total cost of the incentives is \$10,722. Bean said that Iowa Park would receive a minimum of \$10,500 from the state if 80 percent of the students on each campus taking the test pass in each subject area.

TAAS tests cover math, reading and writing. Academic recognition in each subject area is awarded to each student who answers at least 95 percent of the items correctly on that test. On writing tests, the student must achieve a rating of four (on a scale of one to four).

encouraged to give blood at the up coming Red Cross blood drive March 18, at Wal-Mart.

Gayla Fowler, Bloodmobile consultant, encourages people who have never given blood and those who have not given in a while to make an appointment to donate at the Iowa Park blood drive from 3 to 6 p.m.

"Hospital patients depend on the Red Cross for lifesaving blood," she explained. "The Red Cross can supply blood for those patients only if generous volunteer donors in the community give--there is no other

Donors who have taken medications during the month prior to the blood drive must be able to tell the Red Cross nursing staff one of the following: the name, category or purpose of the medication. Fowler

Healthy Iowa Park residents are notes that medications themselves do not usually cause a donor to be deferred. Each health history is evalu-

ated individually. Fowler says giving blood will take a little more than an hour from start to finish, including a mini-health check, and a few minutes in the refreshment center after the donation.

She emphasizes it is important to remember that every step in the donation process is needed to ensure a safe blood supply for hospital patients as well as a safe donation experience for the volunteer donor.

She also said that blood donors are in not danger of contracting HIV/ AIDS or hepatitis. A new and sterile needle is used for each donor and the needle site is made aseptic before the blood is drawn.

Volunteer donors must be 17 or older, weigh at least 110 pounds and be in general good health.

Jarred's sister, Alishia, won her division in the show with a recipe for "Mexican Cheesecake."

Shirley said her mother, Addie Morgan, made red hot rings called "Cucumber Cinnamon Rounds" and gave jar after jar away. She has received numerous requests for the recipe, so it is included in this week's

Shirley has included some of her favorite cake recipes. She said the "Black Russian Cake" is delicious and she has received many requests for the recipe. The "Whole Wheat Pound Cake" is "a wonderful, large pound cake," she said. She got the recipe last year at the Republican Women's tasting fundraiser.

Bubba's Best Meatloaf

1 1/2 lbs. lean ground meat 2/3 cup bread crumbs

1 cup milk 2 beaten eggs 1/4 cup chopped onion 1 tsp. salt

1/8 tsp. pepper 1/2 tsp. ground sage Topping:

6 Tbsps. brown sugar 1/2 cup catsup 1/2 tsp. nutmeg 2 tsps. dry mustard

Mix meat with other ingredients. Shape into a loaf. Spread topping over loaf and bake at 350 degrees 45

Black Russian Cake

1 box yellow cake mix 1/2 cup sugar

1 pkg. (4 oz.) instant chocolate pudding (I use chocolate fudge if I can find it)

1 cup oil 4 eggs

1/4 cup vodka & 1/4 cup Kahlua (or other coffee liqueur) 3/4 cup water

Mix these ingredients together on low speed for 1 minute, then beat at medium speed about 4 minutes. Bake 60-70 minutes at 350 degrees. (Do not underbake.) Cool in pan 10 minutes; turn out of pan. Poke holes in cake and glaze.

Glaze: 1/2 cup powdered sugar 1/4 cup Kahlua

I usually use a little more powdered sugar to make the glaze thicker.

Cream Cheese Pound Cake 3 sticks margarine, softened


8 oz. cream cheese, softened

3 cups sugar

2 tsps. vanilla

6 large eggs

3 cups cake flour More than a pharmacy, we offer



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Combine ingredients, pour into tube pan, and place in cool oven. Bake 1 1/2 hours at 275 degrees. Cool in pan.

Glaze:

1 can evaporated milk

1 cup sugar

1 stick butter

Combine ingredients in sauce pan and cook until thickened.

Whole Wheat Pound Cake

1 1/2 cups butter

3 cups sugar

5 eggs

1 1/2 cups all-purpose white flour

1 1/2 cups whole wheat flour 1/2 tsp. baking powder

1 cup milk

1 tsp. vanilla 1 tsp. almond extract

Cream butter and sugar thoroughly. Add eggs. Mix baking powder with flour. Add flour and milk alternately to first mixture. Add flavorings. Pour into well greased and floured tube pan. Place in COLD oven. Turn the oven on to 325 degrees. Bake 1 hour and 30 minutes.

Cucumber Cinnamon Rounds

15 large cucumbers 2 cups lime

1 1/2 quarts water or enough to cover

Cut ends of cukes and take out seed (I use spoon) then cut cukes crosswise. Let set 24 hours in lime water then drain and rinse real well. Cover with ice and water; let set three hours then drain. After draining, place in large pan. Add 1 cup vinegar, 1 teaspoon powdered alum, 1 small bottle red food coloring. Let simmer three hours in this solution, then drain and rinse.

Mix the following:

2 cups water

2 cups vinegar

2 bags of red hots (or 8 sticks cinnamon, or 3 teaspoons of powdered cinnamon in a rag)

8 cups sugar

Bring to a boil. Place cukes in a plastic or crock jar. Pour solution of liquid over cukes three mornings in a row. (Reheat solution each time to a boil.) On the third day, place cukes and liquid in a pan. Bring to a boil, then put in jars and seal.

Kahlua Chocolate Cake

1 (18.25 oz.) chocolate cake mix

1 - 8 oz. ctn. sour cream

4 eggs 2/3 cup Kahlua

3/4 cup vegetable oil

1 cup semisweet chocolate morsels

Chocolate frosting Combine first 5 ingredients in a large mixing bowl. Beat at medium speed of an electric mixer 3 to 5 minutes. Stir in chocolate morsels. Spoon into a greased and floured 10inch Bundt pan. Bake at 325 degrees 55 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean.

Cool in pan 30 minutes; remove from

pan and let cool on a wire rack. Drizzle cake with Chocolate Frosting.

Chocolate Frosting:

2 Tbsps. butter or margarine

2 Tbsps. cocoa

2 Tbsps. Kahlua

2 tsps. milk 1 cup sifted powdered sugar

1/2 tsp. vanilla extract Combine butter, cocoa, Kahlua, and milk in a small saucepan; bring to a boil, stirring until butter melts. Stir in pwodered sugar and vanilla. Yield: 1/2 cup.

Mexican Cheesecake

Great when used as a dip! 2 tsps. chicken-flavored instant

bouillon

1/2 cup hot water 3-8 oz. pkgs. cream cheese - softened 1 1/2 tsps. chili powder

1/2 to 1 tsp. tabasco sauce

2 eggs 1 cup finely chopped cooked chicken (canned white chicken may be used)

Choice: Mild - add 4 oz. can of chopped green

chilies, drained Hot - add 3 ozs. fresh or canned

jalapeno peppers Salsa - can omit Shredded cheese Sliced green onion

Tortilla chips Preheat oven to 325. Dissolve bouillon in hot water; set aside. Beat cream cheese, chili powder and tabasco sauce until smooth. Addeggs and mix well. Add bouillon liquid and beat until smooth. Stir in chicken and peppers. Pour into 9" springform pan. Bake 30 minutes or until set. Cool 15 minutes. Carefully run knife blade around edge. Remove side of pan and top with cheese and onion. Serve warm or chilled with tortilla

chips. Refrigerate leftovers. May be baked in 9" pan and spooned into dip bowl and served with chips around the bowl for a great party dish.

TRACING IRISH ANCESTORS Although Irish imigrants have been coming to this country since the early 1600s, it is not all that easy to

trace them.

Many records were destoyed through the political upheaval. Many who came to this country had a legacy of subjugation, poverty, and illiteracy. The religious, political and social history made record keeping

If you have an idea of when your ancestors came to America, there are certain migratory patterns that might help in tracing ancestors back to the homeland.

country on both sides in the Revolutionary War and the Civil War.

The Irish also served in this

Colonies of Irish, apparently Catholics from Tipperary and Waterford, settled in New Jersey as early as 1683.

Most of our Irish ancestors who came to the New World before 1815 were young men. They usually came with another relative or friend. Few were unskilled laborers. Many were artisans, tailors and some teachers.

Many records are lost in Ireland, so be careful when paying for research, it can be costly and disappointing.

First glean what you can from relatives, someone probably has a scrap of knowledge tucked away, and no one was interested, so always ask relatives and friends who may know first. Next, research libraries for Irish information...

Persons who don't file the report timely could be penalized up to one full month's benefits for the first violation, in addition to being required to repay any overpayment. warned White.

God is Love Ministry celebrates 25 years

The past two and a half decades Janie Hill has dedicated her life to special service for the Lord in the Wichita Falls area through an evangelistic ministry.

Janie Hill is the minister, director, and founder of "God Is Love" Evangelistic Ministry, Inc., a lay ministry which has led into a rehabilitation program helping troubled people change their lives through Jesus.

Mrs. Hill and her late husband, Lt. Col. Arthur Hill, decided to establish a Christian ministry while he was still in the Air Force at Sheppard Air Force Base.

Shortly after that Hill was returning from his last government assignment to join his wife and two children when he was killed in an automobile accident.

Mrs. Hill and her children, David, then 13, and Debby then age 10 formed a musical group and dubbed themselves the "Singing Hills" and began witnessing on downtown streets of Wichita Falls.

Their ministry expanded to evangelistic service singing and testifying in jails, nursing homes, on the streets in bar areas, and other places of outreach where there were troubled people.

As the ministry expanded they began to take converts into their own home and purchased property just east of Iowa Park on Peterson Road. The converts have a part in her services. She has received referral cases from the Texas Rehabilitation Com-

mission, Concern and other ministries or help organizations.

This became established as the "New-Life" Center Christian Rehabilitation Farm which had its grand opening in 1974.

Prior to the ministry Janie Hill worked in the Baptist Association forming graded choir programs in Baptist churches across Texas. She has been a member of First Baptist Church in Wichita Falls many years.

Her life has been filled with a succession of miracles, starting with polio as a child when doctors told her she would never walk, to her 40s when doctors told her she would die from cancer. "But thanks to God I am still alive and have been walking more than 50 years.

When Janie was supposedly on her death bed with cancer she told God that "if there was anything He needed done and couldn't find anybody to do it, that she would." She was healed of the cancer.

Now, Janie is facing another crisis in her life. In late February she fell at the "New Life" Center and hit the top of her head on the shower stall step, breaking her neck between the first and second vertebrae with it turned to one side in excruciating

When she fell she prayed, "Lord, don't let me die."

An operation to fuse the vertebrae, using a part of her hip bone was successful. The doctors called it a miracle because of the nature of the break. With the spinal cord tangled in the break, that it was a miracle she wasn't either killed or paralyzed.

Her head is encased in a neck and body brace, called a "halo", which will have to remain four months until the bones are completely fused together. Janie calls it her "crown of thorns" because it hurts.

She currently is convalescing at Wichita Falls Rehabilitation Hospital where her son, David, is the building supervisor in charge of the building's functioning systems.

The late Dod Wiley, former county commissioner of Precinct One, and close friend of her late husband Art, was a great help to Janie through the years until his recent death. He had promised Art before he had his car accident that he would watch over her.

Wiley assisted her in ministering to county jail inmates, bussing patients from the State Hospital to First Baptist Church services, and in various other ways through the years.

Janie also ran a coffee house on Flood Street in Wichita Falls several years and has taken her Bibles crosscountry in her ministry van. She has commented many times that "America is the greatest mission field in the world". She has done a lot of family counseling and Bible studies at the "New-Life" Center.

The ministry also has an extention of outreach and prayer retreat, called Camp "Earthshine", on a small piece of property in South Texas just north of San Antonio where they reach people in that area. The property was donated to the ministry by Janie's parents before their deaths in the 70s. Her parents wanted her to use it for the ministry.

Ten years ago Janie remarried a long time assistant director, Richard


Neil, who also is from San Antonio. He was converted during a South Texas Crusade and grew in the ministry many years before their marriage. He is a faithful support to Janie. "Rick" is employed at Wal-Mart in Iowa Park to help pay the bills.

David Hill and his wife, Tracey, and two children, Jonathan and Nicky, live in their new home near Thornberry

Janie's daughter, Debby, a graduate of Hardin Simmons University is married to Jonathan Luke Meyer. They live in San Antonio where he is a social worker and she is a school teacher.


At this point Janie Hill sincerely needs and covets the prayers of the public as she continues recovering from her injury.


