## Rentschlers share interests, hobbies

John and Joyce Rentschler share a number of interests and hobbies, culminating in many pleasant hours during the 46 years they have spent together.

John is an import from Frankfort, Indiana, but has all the qualifications to fit the Texas mode, and Joyce is a Texan, coming from Archer City.

The couple met while John was an instructor at SAFB aircraft engines school and Joyce was working at First State Bank in Archer City.

John enlisted in the Air Force in 1948 and took basic training at Lackland AFB in San Antonio. He went to airplane and engines mechanics school at Kessler Field in Biloxi, Miss., and was transferred from there with the first groups to come into Sheppard when it reopened in 1949.

Their lovely home is punctuated with finished products of their crafts and artistry, or evidence of their collecting interests. And, the two organs and grand piano are indicative there is also a musician in the home.

The Rentschlers moved to Iowa

Park soon after their marriage in 1950. When John was discharged from SAFB in 1952, he went into business for himself, operating J R Well Service which he owned and operated 40 years. He retired four years ago.

Rentschler says he saw a lot of changes during the 40 years he was in the well servicing business. One of the biggest changes he said was in shooting wells. When he started the business, nitroglycerine was used. Before he retired wells were shot with acid or sand thrack.

"The oil field has always had its ups and downs," Rentschler said, "and now the cost of producing oil is prohibitive, we can't compete with the price of foreign oil."

Mrs. Rentschler is an artist, preferring to work on canvas with oils. Many of her paintings add interest to the walls of their home.

In 1956 they built their brick home at 523 W. Texas, the first one west of Pacific Street. Cattle grazed the land immediately north and west of them.

## Community ready for Clean-Up Week

Iowa Park's annual Clean-Up Week begins Monday and will conclude the following Sunday.

The event is co-sponsored each year by the Chamber of Commerce and City of Iowa Park.

Organizations and individuals are encouraged to participate in the activity, by volunteering to pick up trash in public areas, such as roadsides and parks.

Those intending to participate are asked to contact the Chamber office to be assigned to designated areas.

Trash bags are provided by Cryovac, and are available at the Chamber office.

Businesses and homeowners also are encouraged to participate, by doing a little extra to clean up their respective areas.

The city's convenience center will be open each week day between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m., as well as regular hours on weekends, during the period and residents of the city will be allowed to dump their trash, trimmings and rubbish without charge or permit.

All the city government asks, during that period, is that those dumping do so at the direction of the center's attendant.

**City-Wide Garage Sale**

## Teachers' contracts approved by board

Teacher contracts for the 1996-97 school year were approved and a letter of resignation from Michael Bean, third grade teacher, was accepted Thursday night by trustees of the Iowa Park CISD.

The board also heard a request from a parent for better insurance coverage for athletes, a report on the elevator for the high school, a request for air conditioning in three cafeterias, and approved the 1996-97 school calendar.

At the beginning of the meeting, a resolution was passed recognizing Bob and Dolores Hamilton, co-publishers of the *Iowa Park Leader*, for their support of Iowa Park CISD. It was recommended that their names be placed on the Media Honor Roll for Texas Public Schools.

Perry Green appeared before the board with a request for the school district to consider providing an insurance policy that would cover all costs of student athletic injuries.

Green said that medical costs for treating his son's broken leg were considerably more than the school-provided insurance policy paid. He said this creates a hardship for families who can't afford to carry additional insurance.

Insurance agent Carmen Lozipone explained that a better policy could be provided, but would be cost prohibitive. He said the current policy costs the school system \$15,000 a year and is as good a policy as any offered. A major medical policy would cost \$60,000 to \$75,000 a year, and would mean a four to five hundred percent increase in the insurance budget.

According to Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer, Lamar Life is the best company for student insurance the school has worked with in 10 years.

On a premium of \$15,660 for the 1994-95 school year, the company has paid \$25,998.82 with some claims still open. So far this year, on the same premium amount, the company has paid \$7,014.97 in claims.

The trustees told Mr. Green that they would take his request under

consideration.

In a previous meeting, architect Don Daugherty had reported that installation of an elevator at the high school was cost prohibitive and unfeasible for the building structure. Board members decided to consider a chair lift as a possible alternative.

It was then determined that a chair lift couldn't be installed at the local campus because the stairwell is not wide enough to meet A.D.A. guidelines.

Daugherty suggested that the money budgeted for the elevator be used to build extra classrooms and move the present classrooms from the basement.

During his report, Superintendent Glen Mitchell gave the amount of bids to air condition the kitchen areas at the high school, Bradford and Kidwell Elementary. Scott Boren Air Conditioning's bid was \$13,550, and Iowa Park Air Conditioning was \$15,791.50.

Trustees asked that the item be placed on the agenda for the next meeting and they would take action on it then.

The school calendar for the 1996-97 year was approved with school opening on Aug. 19 and ending May 29. Students will get out for the Christmas holidays on Dec. 19, and resume classes on Jan. 6.

Supt. Mitchell also said that bids for the buildings and property at Valley View would be opened on April 2.

In other business, trustees took no action on a request from Jerry Gilbert for a Quit Claim Deed on two acres of land where the Wyeth School was abandoned; accepted the low bid of \$39,496 from Boley Featherston Insurance Company for property and liability insurance coverage for one year; and cast ballots for the Region IX Education Service Center Board of Directors election.

Also the board authorized the Texas Association of School Boards to conduct an employee pay study, which will cost around \$4,000.

## City's ballot is full; trustees uncontested

Based on candidates filing for the two local May 4 elections, city council and school board, everyone wants to govern the city but no one is interested in overseeing the school.

With less than three hours remaining before the deadline Wednesday for candidates to file, three candidates were registered for each of the three city positions, but only the two incumbent trustees had filed.

All three candidates for the position of mayor filed within the first hour they were being accepted.

Wayne House has chosen not to seek re-election. Candidates for that position are Bud Mercer, George Witherspoon and Tim Hunter.

Mercer has served several terms as a city alderman. Hunter previously held posts of alderman and mayor. Witherspoon has never served in an elected capacity.

In order to run for mayor, Mercer will not seek re-election to Place

Two alderman. The three candidates for that post include Terry Johnson, David Lee Ohm Sr., and Joe Ward.

Place Four aldermen, which is being vacated by Johnny Crawford, has also drawn a trio of candidates, including Tim Rich, Joe Singer and Ida Zimmerer.

Singer filed last Thursday and Zimmerer Friday.

According to a ruling issued recently to the City of Wichita Falls, the Iowa Park school district likely will not have to hold an election, however, no local authorities have discussed that issue.

Incumbents Keith Fisher and Randy Catlin are the only candidates who have filed.

The City of Wichita Falls recently reported it had received a ruling from the state's attorney general, that in the case of no contested places on a ballot, no election is necessary and the candidates are automatically seated.

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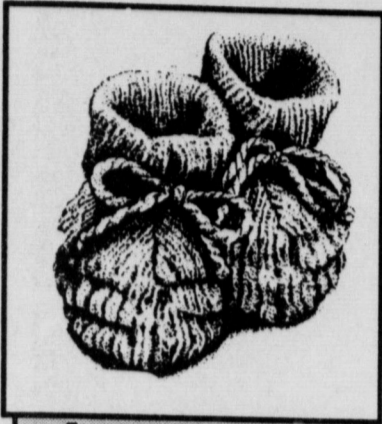

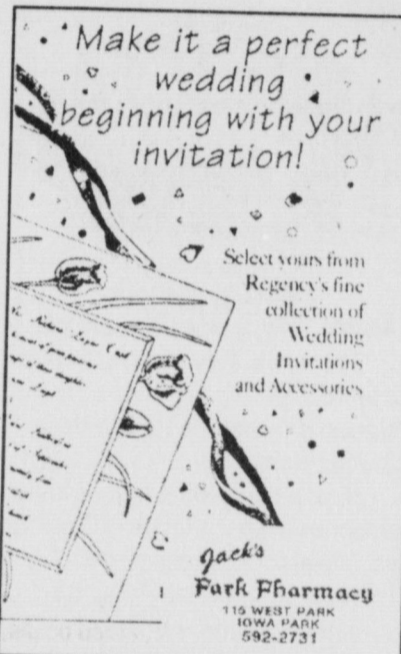

Freddye Skinner brought the Horticulture Display.



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

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

Most of Sheila's recipes are "hand downs" she has gotten at family gatherings. All of the recipes this week are good to prepare for a fish fry.

The "Hush Puppies" were a favorite of her father, the late Hoyt Watson, and "Brownies" is a recipe she got from her mother.

### Brownies

- 2 sticks margarine
- 6 Tbsps. cocoa
- 4 eggs, unbeaten
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 tps. vanilla
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 1/2 tps. salt
- 2 cups chopped pecans

Melt butter and cocoa together over low heat. Cool slightly. Place cooled chocolate mixture, eggs, sugar, and vanilla in bowl. Mix about 1 minute.

Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt. Add with nuts to first mixture. Beat until flour is blended. Pour into a greased pan. Cook at 350 degrees, 25-30 minutes. Cool and frost with a thin chocolate frosting mixture.

### Cole Slaw

Dissolve small unflavored gelatin in 1/4 cup cold water.

- Mix together:
- 1 cup vinegar
  - 1 1/2 cup sugar

Heat and add gelatin to mixture. Then add:

- 1/2 tsp. celery seed
- 1 Tbsp. salt
- 1/2 Tbsp. pepper

Let cool and set awhile and then add:

- 1 cup salad oil

Grate:

- 8 cups cabbage
- 1 onion
- 1 bell pepper
- 4 cups shredded carrots

Mix well, then pour liquid mixture over cabbage mixture and mix well. Refrigerate 24 hours before serving.

### Rockport Red Sauce

- 1 cup ketchup
  - 3 Tbsps. lemon juice
  - 1 Tbsp. horseradish
  - 3 drops liquid hot pepper sauce
  - 1/2 Tbsp. celery salt
  - 1/8 tsp. salt
- Combine all ingredients and chill. Makes 1 cup of sauce.

### Shrimp Dip

- 1 can deveined shrimp
  - 1 - 6 oz. pkg. cream cheese
  - 1/2 cup Hellman's mayonnaise
  - 1/2 cup finely chopped celery
  - 1/2 cup green onion tops, finely chopped
  - 1/2 Tbsp. lemon juice
- Mix together and chill. Serve with crackers.

### Hush Puppies

- Mix together:
- 2 cups yellow cornmeal
  - 1 Tbsp. flour
  - 1 tsp. baking soda
  - 1 tsp. salt
  - 1 egg, beaten
  - 6 Tbsps. chopped onions
  - 1/2 lb. shredded Cheddar cheese
  - 1 1/2 cups buttermilk.
- Shape into 1-inch balls. Chill. Deep fry.

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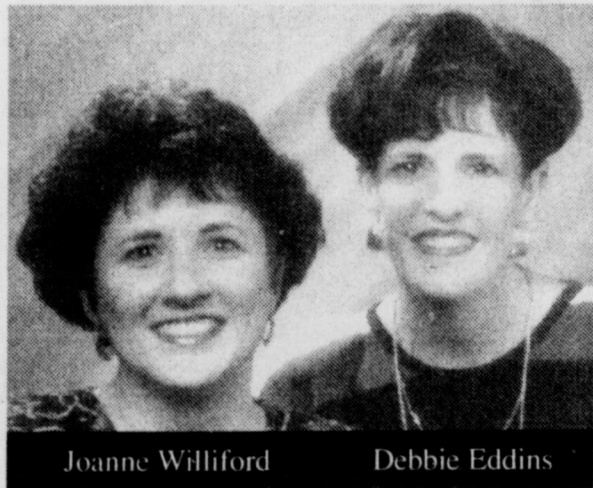
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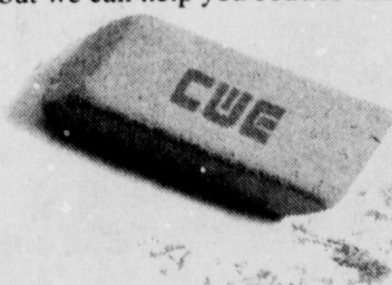
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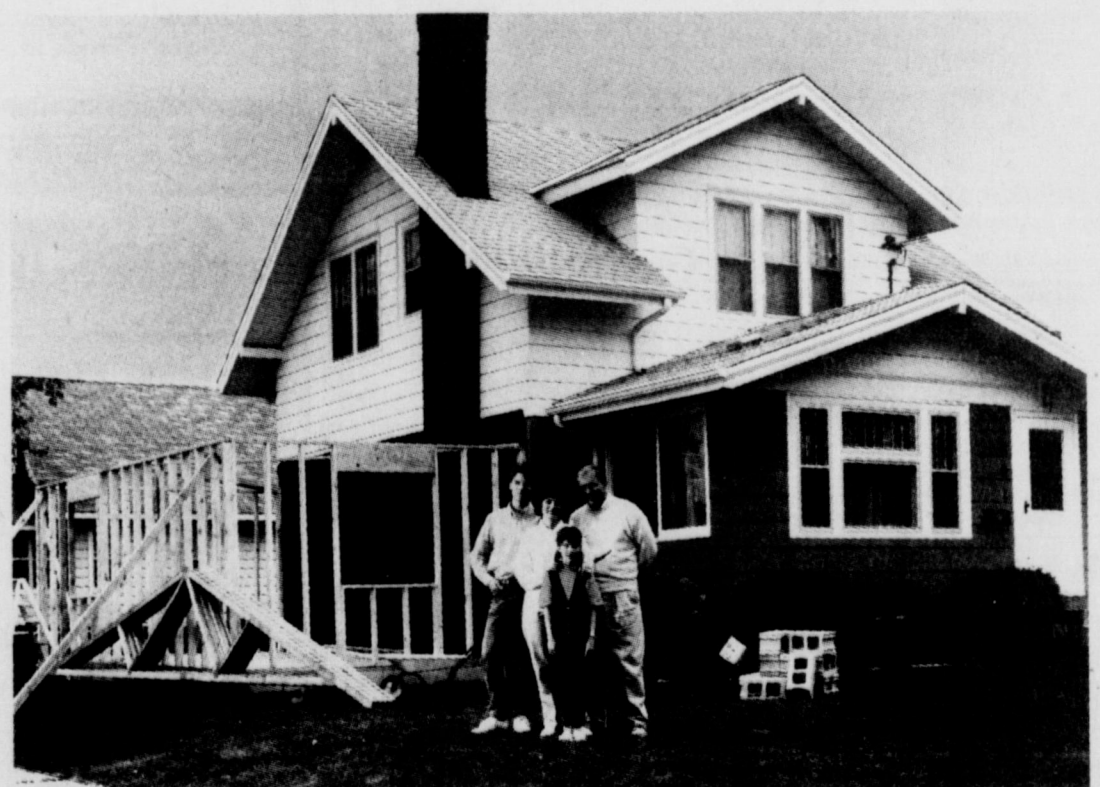
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**NEWS OF THE  
IOWA PARK  
GENEALOGICAL & HISTORICAL SOCIETY**



At the March meeting of the Iowa Park Genealogical and Historical Society, President Fillmore Spangler suggested a project to be considered by society members. There are a number of old cemeteries, neglected and undocumented, in our area that are of significant historical importance.

The undertaking of this project would be an on-going coordinated effort with others in the county. The goal would be finding and documenting as many burial sites as possible, and the records made available for genealogists and historians.

Many details found in cemeteries are helpful to the family researcher. After determining where an ancestor lived and was buried, that is often the first place to look for information.

Tombstones tell part of the story. Grave markers were used mainly by the upper class but in the 16th century the middle classes started using tombstones because tombs, murals, and other monuments were too expensive.

Some tombstones in New England date back to the 17th century, and different motifs were used. Three common ones you might discover are the skull-faced death's head (17th to early 18th century), the cherubic-faced winged angel (mid-18th century), and the urn-and-willow (late 18th to early 19th century).

The material used for tombstones has changed through the years. Marble or limestone have been replaced by slate and sandstone. The ancient craft of carving stones has changed to mechanical methods and is a way of determining dates.

Many different clues to our ancestors can be found on their tombstones. Dates of death, age at time of death, and sometimes where they were born.

It was common for a family to have a large central marker surrounded by individual markers for each family member. Remember, someone had to purchase the grave site and it could be your relative.

Many of the grave sites in our area had wooden markers, some only

a large rock, many of the inscriptions are weather eroded and many are overgrown with weeds and brush.

We hope to find and document these historical resting places, and will be using maps, taking pictures and rubbings of engravings. When Iowa Park took the field against Burk Burnett Thursday night in the opening game of the Broomtown Classic, the Hawks were looking not only to put an end to a two-game losing streak against the Bulldogs, they were expecting to win the tournament.

And that's just what they did, knocking off District 3-3A rival Graham in the title game Saturday night by the score of 12-11.

In the opener against Burk, Iowa Park fell behind 3-1 after two innings and trailed 5-4 after 6 1/2 innings, before rallying back to win 6-5 in the bottom of the seventh.

Robert Klinkerman led off the Hawks' half of the seventh with a walk. Jonathan Clubb came on as a pinch runner and stole second on an attempted pickoff throw as he just slid in under the tag to get into scoring position. Clint Norris singled back up the middle to score Clubb with the tying run. Dusty Owen was hit by a pitch and went to second when Norris was caught in a run down. The next batter, Waylon Stewart, hit a shot at the third baseman who threw wildly to first allowing Owen to score the game winner from second.

Norris picked up the win to move his record to 4-1 for the season with some help from David Waterbury, who went 1x2 and scored 3 runs,

Clancy Lalumia, who finished 1x3 with a run scored and Klinkerman, who went 1x2 with an RBI.

In game two against Ft. Worth Castlebury, Iowa Park came out on top 6-4 as Clubb picked up his second win of the season with no losses. 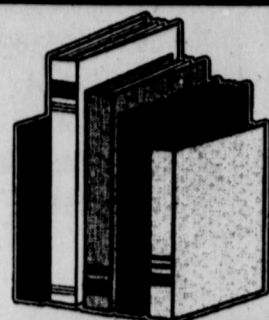
