The plants are projects grown by the students during the year, and revenue from the sale purchases stock for next year, as well as equipment used in the classes. Shoppers will be able to register for a six-foot Burr Oak tree, to be given away at closing time, according to Wendy Meadows, instructor. Third study ready on golf course here

The city council will take another look Monday at a feasibility study made recently on the possibility of building a golf course.

This will be the third such study contracted by the city, and made by Flatt Golf Services, Inc.

No site for an 18-hole course has been discussed in public. The other two studies made were on undeveloped tracts of land west of the city, on the north and south sides of U.S. 287. No action was taken on either of

the two earlier sites.

Monday's meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

According to the tentative agenda

released on the meeting, a public appearance has been requested by Mrs. Lita Watson. Mrs. Watson, a former city al-

derman and identified by most as being the authority on the city's history, is to request the city to purchase and erect historical markers at the old refinery and fair grounds.

She also will ask that the historical marker located in City Hall Park also be relocated, though the proposed site is yet to be designated.

Aldermen are to consider authorizing Administrator Mike Price to contract with Eddie Mandela for the widening of a concrete drainage

structure on West Magnolia.

Four ordinances and two resolutions also appear on the agenda. The ordinances concern:

* modifying the cost of natural gas service adjustment clause for residential and commercial consum-

* amending the existing ordinance concerning traffic signs on certain residential street intersections;

* allowing building and plumbing contractors to provide a liability insurance policy in lieu of bonds from approved surety companies, and,

* amending an ordinance to prohibit unauthorized persons to use solid waste containers.

The two resolutions are: accepting the annual audit report for the year 1994-95; and renewing a nonannexation agreement with Entex

Aldermen also will be asked to sustain Mayor Wayne House's reappointment of Jerry Reed to the Nortex 9-1-1 Communications District

Telephone solicitor working scam here



2/3 cup sugar 2/3 cup shortening 2 eggs

1 1/2 tsp. salt 6 to 7 cups all-purpose flour

Dissolve yeast in warm water in large bowl. Stir in potatoes, sugar, shortening, eggs, salt and 3 cups of the flour. Beat until smooth. Mix in enough remaining flour to make dough easy to handle. Turn dough onto lightly floured surface; knead until smooth and elastic, about 5 minutes. Place in greased bowl; turn greased side up. Cover bowl tightly;

refrigerate at least 8 hours. Divide and shape into rolls. Place on lightly greased cookie sheet. Let rise until doubled, about 1 hour. Bake in preheated 275 degree oven about 20 minutes.

Roger's Favorite **Chicken Nuggets**

Cut boneless chicken breasts in chunks. How much you use will depend on how many you're feeding. Wash, drain well, and put aside in a

Beat 3-4 eggs in a medium-sized bowl by hand. Add a little milk. In another bowl, put flour, garlic powder, and seasoned salt. Again, how much you use depends on how many nuggets you need. Dip chicken nuggets in egg mixture, flour mixture, then back in egg mixture. Put in deep fryer or skillet with lots of hot oil and cook until lightly browned. (This can be really messy, but they are so good.)


As I See It..

Another Easter egg hunt that remains in my memory was one of great disappointment.

It was 10 years later, in 1945, at Hereford.

Merchants of the community had joined together in sponsorship. That was the first time I had ever heard of prize eggs being hidden. And that was the source of disappointment.

Older members of the Boy Scout troop were recruited to hide all the eggs in the big park which is located in the center of Hereford.

The problem was, the day following the hunt, three of the five prize eggs were redeemed by some of those Boy Scouts.

It was a major embarrassment not only to the Scout movement there, but to the individuals, their families and the community.

Our local Evening Lions Club has for a long time put on an Easter egg hunt, open to all children of the community.

It will be held at 1:30 p.m. Saturday, east of the high school, on the southeast corner of Johnson Road and West Highway.



Morales has discussed the issue with attorneys general of other states and reportedly is picking a team of private-sector lawyers to represent Texas. Florida has hired a team of lawyers from 13 private firms to handle its suit.

Last November, tobacco industry lawyers sought to block Texas and Massachusetts from taking the industry to court, asserting that Morales lacks the authority to bring the suit.

In March, The Tobacco Institute warned that tobacco restrictions by the federal Food and Drug Administration "could cost Texas businesses up to \$433 million in lost sales and eliminate up to 5,088 jobs statewide" according to a study by the American Economics Group.


Ron Dusek, a spokesman for Morales, said about \$6 billion in federal and state funds will be spent on smoking-related illnesses in Texas this year.

Thornberry touts value of health coverage act

U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry voted last week for the Health Coverage Availability and Affordability Act, a bill which would, among other things, allow people to keep their health insurance if they lose or leave their

"This bill makes the changes the country needs without giving more power to Washington bureaucrats," Thornberry said.

"One of the most important of these changes is making sure that individuals who have the opportunity to move to a new job will not be held back because their new health insurance will not cover a pre-existing condition.

"The bill also does three other things that I think will benefit families and businesses. First, it allows people to put money into Medical Savings Accounts (MSAs), which is basically a tax-free rainy day fund for health care expenses.

"Second, the bill allows small businesses to deduct half the cost of health insurance for their employees, which will not only ease the economic burden being placed on small business owners, but could also help create new jobs and spur investment.

"And third, the legislation limits punitive damages in malpractice lawsuits."

According to Thornberry, the bill, also known as HR 3103, will

The provisions included the establishment of MSAs, permitting risk pools for small businesses and organizations, preventing anyone from being excluded from coverage for pre-existing conditions, ensuring portability of coverage, and increasing the tax deductibility for self-employed individuals to purchase health

insurance coverage.

"Today, 85 percent of the uninsured are employed in small businesses -- often because it's just too expensive for an employer to cover just a small group of employees. This bill will begin to address this problem, and provide some much needed relief to one of the most vital sectors of our economy," Thornberry said.
