There certainly is a big demand for water, according to a comment I heard this week from City Administrator Mike Price.
He told me that the city has had to take water from Wichita Falls during the past week, eventhough
ourwater treatment plant is operating on a 24 -hour schedule

At this time last year, when we were receiving normal spring rainconcern that no one was using even normal amounts of water.

In case you weren't living here at
the start of the 1970s, all three of Iowa Park's lakes dried up, due to lack of precipitation. We had to take water from the irrigation ditch for residential use despite it's being so salty. During tha
ime, the city reached an agreement with Wichita Falls, and built ransmission line to insure adequate, asty water for residents.
I can't comment about the water supply here in the 1950s, because wasn't here. But I do know that Lake Iowa Park and Lake Buffalo, because litule Gordon Lake couldn't do the job by itself.
Of course this community didn cither.
Hopefully, we'll never see any-
hing like the Dust Bowl days of the
1930s again. That's partially becaus
of improved farming conditions, and
onservation practices.
he tail end of the Dunt Be during
tainly I didn't see, nor would I re member, all the problems they ex perienced back in those days. But what I remember is en
to last me the rest of my days. I remember sitting at my school
my face, spending almost the entir

You see, we were four blocks from the house when the dust hit, making vision sodifficult we couldn't even see the hood ornament on the
