7 arrests reported here

Seven persons were arrested during the past week by Iowa Park police.

In addition, two unusual items - marijuana and a swimming pool - were turned over to police.

Jeremie James Brashear, 20, turned himself in at the police department Wednesday morning of last week, on an outstanding warrant.

Brashear, who was wanted on a warrant for failure to maintain financial responsibility, was released four hours later after paying a fine of \$317, according to the police blotter.

Police received a call from an employee of the local Wal-Mart store Friday afternoon, asking them to remove a woman who refused to leave as instructed by the employee.

The woman originally gave a false identification to the officer. Dianna Ross Enriquez, 37, was taken into custody for giving a false identification, a Class C offense.

She was released after paying a \$132 fine at the police station.

Two male occupants of a car stopped by an officer at 12:51 a.m. Saturday in the 900 block of West Magnolia were arrested, but on different charges. Both had outstanding warrants against them.

Clarence Lewis Hawkey, 34, was wanted by the Wichita County Sheriff's Dept. for DWI, and had a \$750 bond required. He was released

to a deputy at 2:44 a.m. to be transported to the county jail.

Jamie Lynn Johnson, 20, was wanted on an outstanding warrant issued here, for failure to maintain financial responsibility and driving with an expired drivers license. He was released at 7:53 a.m. after paying a fine of \$136.50.

Donnie Lee Ross was arrested at 1:34 a.m. Sunday in the area of US 287 and Pacific, on a charge of driving while intoxicated. It was determined he also was wanted by Wichita Falls police on an outstanding warrant for criminal mischief.

Ross was transported to the county jail, where he refused to take a breath test, and was charged with DWI repetition, and then jailed under a \$1,500 bond.

During an investigation of a minor accident at Yosemite and Washington Sunday evening, a computer check of a driver's license determined an individual was wanted on an outstanding warrant.

Larry Gene DeWoody, 24, was wanted by the Wichita County Sheriff's Dept. for theft by check, which carries a \$500 bond. He was taken into custody and turned over to a county deputy to be transported to jail.

Judy Ann Williams, 30, was taken into custody Tuesday afternoon on an outstanding warrant issued by

Parker County Sheriff's Dept., for Class B theft, with a \$500 bond.

Williams was turned over to a county deputy to be transported to jail in Wichita Falls.

Police received a telephone call Thursday afternoon from an individual who said they had found a small bag containing a green leafy substance, and asked that it be identified.

The substance turned out to be less than an ounce of marijuana. It was turned over to police to be destroyed.

Friday afternoon, a resident in the 700 block of Park Plaza told police a Wichita Falls man had left a swimming pool at that location, and stated it had been stolen from the Wall-Mart store in Wichita Falls.

Police checked the store, and were told two pools were missing, but that they could not state it had been stolen there.

The resident insisted that police take the pool, which was still contained in its box, complete with pump and related equipment, because she said she wanted no part of it.

Officers complied, and confiscated the pool.

James Alan Prince, 39, was picked up in the 300 block of Kathleen Friday afternoon and charged with soliciting sales without a city-required permit.

Hunter, Singer, Ward city election winners

Tim Hunter was elected mayor and Joe Singer and Joe Ward aldermen, as result of Saturday's city election.

Results of the election were canvassed Monday night during a called meeting of the council, and the trio will be sworn into office next Monday.

Hunter narrowly edged Bud Mercer by a 39-vote margin. He drew 340 votes to Mercer's 301, and the third candidate, George Witherspoon, received 56.

Singer, a former alderman, drew the largest count of the election, with 468 votes in his bid for Place Four.

The other candidates seeking to fill the vacancy left by Johnny Crawford, were Tim Rich, who drew 122 votes, and Ida Zimmerer, 105.

In the race for Place Two alder-

man, Ward easily won with 427 votes to Terry Johnson's 210 and 54 for David Ohm.

Mercer had vacated Place Two when he chose to run for mayor.

Hunter now fills the mayor's seat which is being vacated by Wayne House, who announced earlier he

would not seek re-election after holding that post three terms.

Ironically, it was House who unseated Hunter in 1990. He did it in a landslide fashion, receiving 713 votes to Hunter's 139.

Hunter had been the mayor three terms at that time.

TONIGHT Personnel, closed sessions on school board's agenda

Personnel and two executive sessions key tonight's regularly-scheduled meeting of the school board.

The meeting is to begin at 7:30 p.m., and has been moved to the high school library because of a conflicting meeting scheduled at the junior high library, where most meetings are held.

The first of the two closed sessions is to hear a personnel grievance, and the second is to discuss personnel, according to the posted agenda.

Following the second executive meeting, the agenda calls for action to accept resignations and employ personnel.

Earlier in the regular business session, trustees are to act on requests to add personnel to the faculty for the 1996-97 school year.

Also concerning personnel, during Supt. Glen Mitchell's report, a discussion will be held to set a date with Dane Adkinson, concerning an employee salary plan for next year.

At the outset of the meeting, oaths of office will be administered to Keith Fisher and Randy Catlin. Both were declared winners recently, when neither was challenged in their bids for re-election to new terms.

Following that, the board will hold an election of officers as part of

the traditional reorganization to determine chairman, vice-chairman and secretary.

The Iowa Park Ministerial Alliance will once again begin distributing food commodities, according to Frances Park, coordinator.

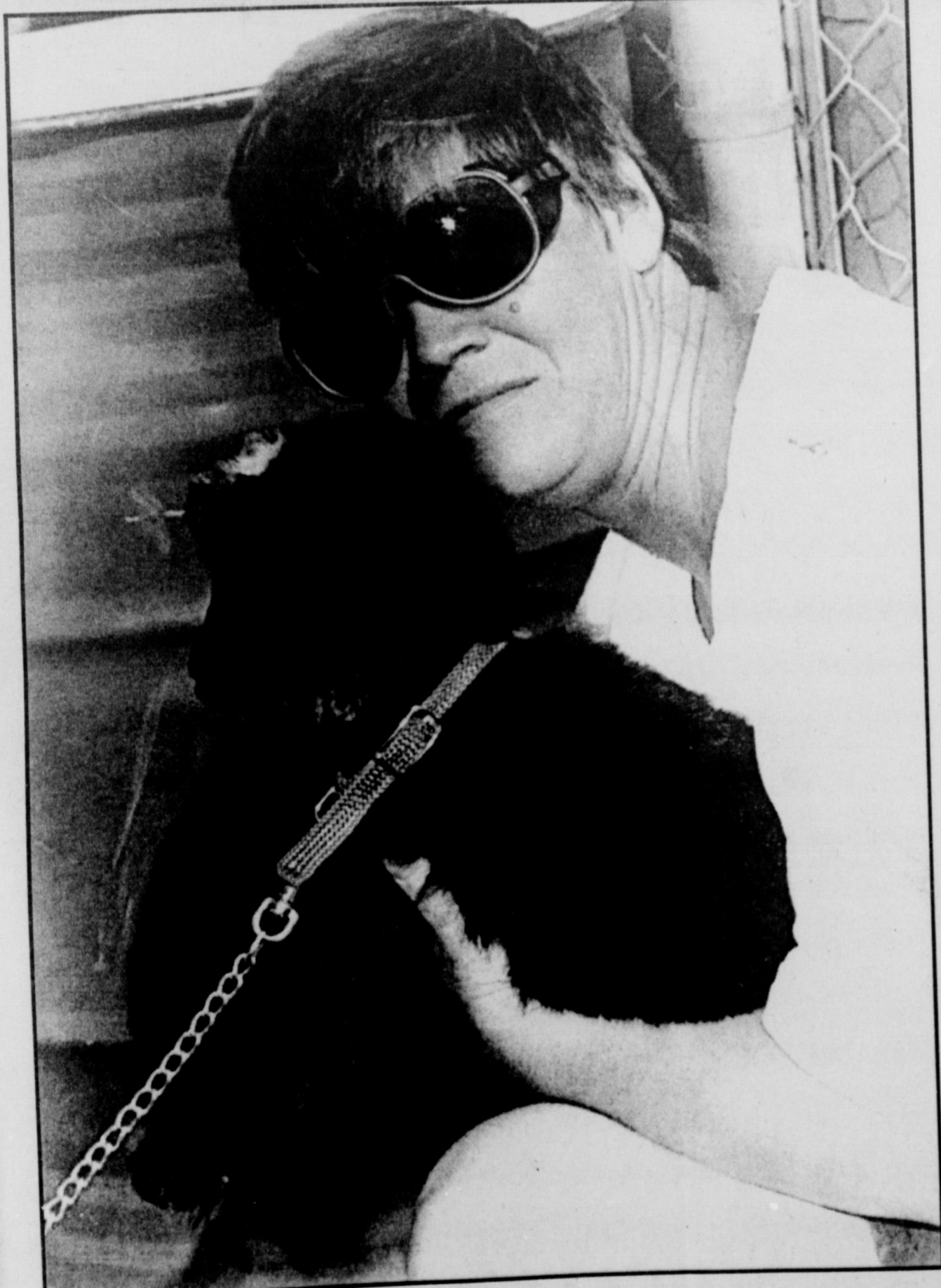

Cook of the Week

Leverne grew up in Electra and is a graduate of Electra High School. Her husband Gene, who grew up in Iowa Park and graduated high school here, is a partner in Owens Oil Co.

As busy as she is, Leverne loves to cook and prepares a hot meal for her husband every day. Recently, she and a friend, Johnnie Brown, prepared chicken spaghetti to serve at a fundraiser to benefit Highland Cemetery Association. The chicken spaghetti recipe she brought for us to

use this week was given to her by a friend, Mary Pike.

The recipe for "Oriental Salad" is different, and Leverne says it is delicious. The "Orange Jello Salad" is one that she makes for most family gatherings.

Mama's Chocolate Cake

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 4 Tbsps. cocoa
- 2 Tbsps. hot coffee
- 1 Tbsp. red food coloring
- 1 7/8 cups flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1 cup sour milk
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Cream shortening. Add sugar gradually then cream until fluffy. Blend in well-beaten eggs. Mix cocoa, red coloring and hot coffee together to form a smooth paste. Blend it into the creamed mixture immediately. Sift flour, salt and soda together and add to creamed mixture. Pour into cake pan and bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

Frosting:

- 1 1/2 cup sugar
- 7 Tbsps. milk
- 2 Tbsps. shortening
- 1 Tbsp. Karo syrup
- 3 Tbsps. cocoa
- 1/4 tsp. salt

Combine ingredients in sauce pan and boil 1 minute. Beat until thick and spread over cake.

Chicken or Turkey Spaghetti

- 2 to 2 1/2 lb. chicken, cooked & finely chopped (save broth)
- 1 small bell pepper, chopped
- 1 small onion, chopped
- Several sticks of celery, chopped
- 1 lb. pkg. spaghetti
- 1 large can tomatoes, blended
- 1 small can chopped pimento
- 1 - 4 oz. can mushroom pieces
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can tomato soup
- 1 lb. Velveeta cheese, cubed
- Garlic powder, salt & pepper to taste
- Saute bell pepper, onion and celery in margarine.

Boil spaghetti in salted water (1 break it in 2 or 3 pieces before cooking); drain.

Combine all ingredients in very large bowl. Pour into buttered casserole dishes and bake 1 hour and 15 minutes in 325 degree oven.

Makes 2 large casseroles and freezes well.

NOTE: Add chicken broth if needed.

Orange Jello Salad

- 1 box orange jello
 - 1 cup boiling water
 - 1 cup powdered sugar
 - 1 small can crushed pineapple
 - 1/2 cup pecans
 - 8 oz. cream cheese
 - 3 Tbsps. lemon juice
 - 1 envelope Dream Whip
- Dissolve jello in water. Mix cheese, powdered sugar, and lemon juice. Let sit. Add pineapple and pecans. Whip Dream Whip and fold in.

Frozen Fruit Salad

- 2 cups Cool Whip
 - 1/2 pt. sour cream
 - 2 Tbsps. lemon juice
 - 3/4 cup sugar
 - 1 large can crushed pineapple, drained
 - 3-4 large bananas, mashed
 - 1/4 cup chopped Marachino cherries
 - 1 cup pecans
- Mix all together and freeze 24 hours.

Oriental Salad

- 1 head Napa cabbage, shredded
 - 1 head green leaf lettuce, shredded
 - 2 bunches green onions, chopped (including tops)
- Dressing:
- 1 cup sugar
 - 1/2 cup vinegar
 - 1 cup oil
 - 3-4 Tbsps. soy sauce
- Mix in jar and store in refrigerator.

Combine:

- 1 stick margarine
- 2 pkgs. ramen noodles
- 1/4 cup sesame seeds (or less)
- 1 cup slivered almonds

Brown in skillet and drain on paper towels.

Prepare greens and onions. Pour dressing over mixture and toss. Sprinkle noodle-almond mixture over just before serving. Store what you don't use in a closed container.

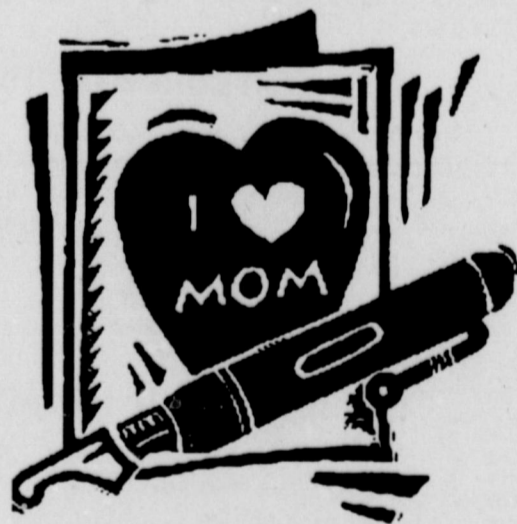

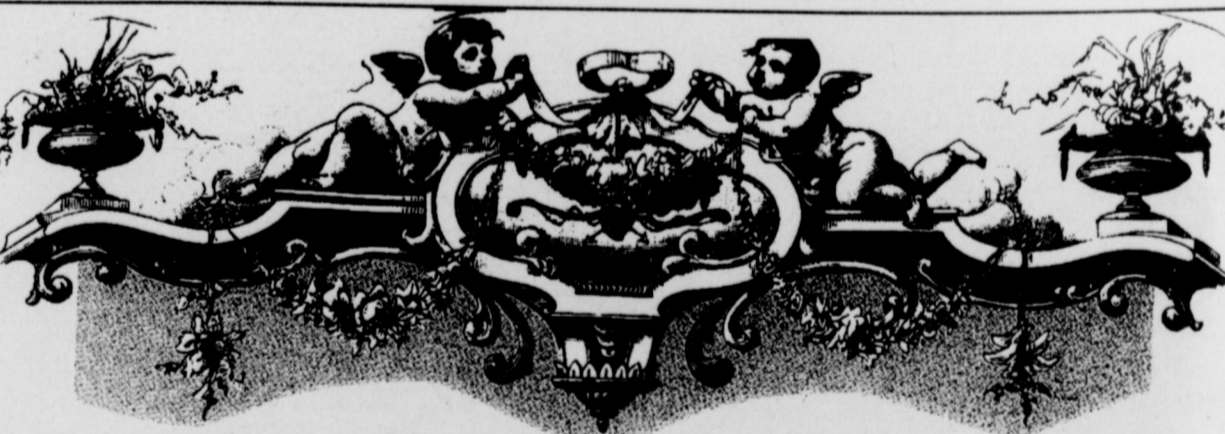

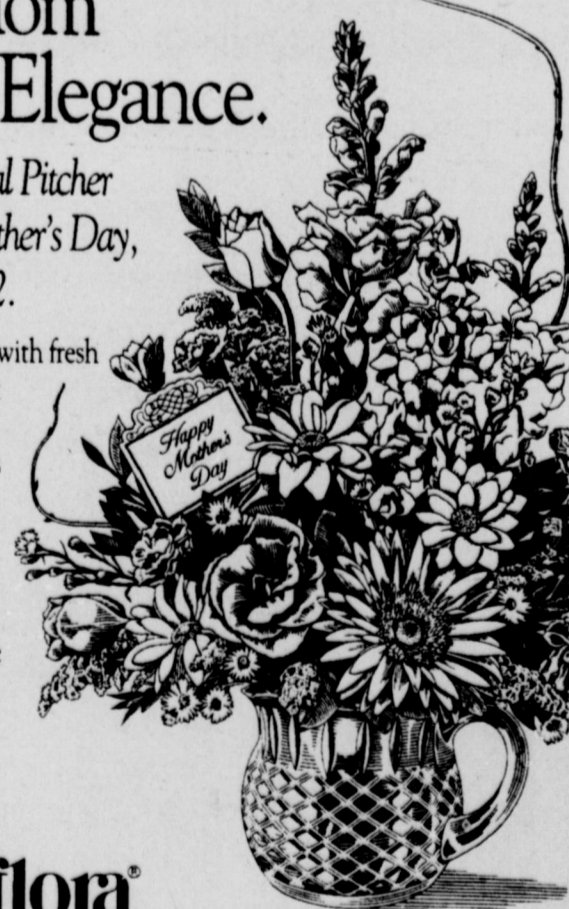

As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



Farmers facing a virtual wheat crop failure likely would agree that we are in a period of drought. After all, Iowa Park has received less than four inches of precipitation thus far in 1996.

But I think it's a little early for the stories that have been published by area newspapers recently which have originated from the *Lubbock Avalanche-Journal*, that compare the current situation with the Dust Bowl era of the 1930s.

There certainly is a big demand for water, according to a comment I heard this week from City Administrator Mike Price.

He told me that the city has had to take water from Wichita Falls during the past week, even though our water treatment plant is operating on a 24-hour schedule.

At this time last year, when we were receiving normal spring rainfall, city officials were expressing concern that no one was using even normal amounts of water.

Of course, Iowa Park's water sales includes all the homes and yard watering, as well as a big portion of water used by the Wichita Valley Water Coop.

But, gosh, our situation is nothing like it was back in 1970-71, or the latter 1950s, and certainly not like the 1930s.

In case you weren't living here at the start of the 1970s, all three of Iowa Park's lakes dried up, due to lack of precipitation.

We had to take water from the irrigation ditch for residential use, despite it's being so salty. During that time, the city reached an agreement with Wichita Falls, and built a transmission line to insure adequate, tasty water for residents.

I can't comment about the water supply here in the 1950s, because I wasn't here. But I do know that a water district was formed to build Lake Iowa Park and Lake Buffalo, because little Gordon Lake couldn't do the job by itself.

Of course, this community didn't have more than 6,000 population then, either.

Hopefully, we'll never see anything like the Dust Bowl days of the 1930s again. That's partially because of improved farming conditions, and conservation practices.

I lived in the Panhandle during the tail end of the Dust Bowl. Certainly I didn't see, nor would I remember, all the problems they experienced back in those days.

But what I remember is enough to last me the rest of my days.

I remember sitting at my school desk with a handkerchief tied around

my face, spending almost the entire day drawing figures in the dust on my desk on days the dirt blew.

I remember my family driving our car over fence rows where blown dirt had collected, while we were out rabbit hunting in the country. You couldn't see either the fencing or the fence posts in some areas.

I remember sleeping under a wet sheet which was suspended by bed posts and brooms, which caught the settling dust and allowed one to breathe.

You've likely heard comments, or read about, being able to see a dust storm approaching from the north or northwest, during the Dust Bowl.

Yes, that's a fact. Riding with an uncle one afternoon in Amarillo, we saw one approaching. Rapidly. That was in the spring of 1938.

Thank goodness, my uncle was an exceptionally wise and alert man, to have been able to get us home when it hit.

You see, we were four blocks from the house when the dust hit, making vision so difficult we couldn't even see the hood ornament on the car.

This is where his wisdom and alertness came in handy.

He knew we had to travel two blocks further west, and then two blocks and two houses back to the north.

My uncle knew by heart how many driveways and street intersections there were between where we were and our home.

He continued, obviously very slowly, driving with his right wheels rubbing against the curb. He would count the driveways where the wheels lost contact with the curb.

And when he pulled into the home's driveway, he also knew how far it was to the front porch, and with him holding my hand, we never stumbled in reaching the house.

Nope, it's dry, but we're not in a drought to likes of which I've seen. And I don't ever want to see one of them again.

trict-wide dress code;
* consider a request for transportation for an educational tour of West Texas for seventh grade students;

* consider use of the main gymnasium at the high school for a high school boys' tournament May 18 and June 1;

* consider a voluntary commit-

ment to resolve an agreement with the Office of Civil Rights;

* consider offering Agriculture Science 282 Exploring Agriculture; and,

* consider authorizing Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer to be district representative for federal reports.

In the called meeting held last Thursday, the board officially voted

to employ Michael Lane Caplinger as superintendent of schools.

Caplinger will succeed Mitchell, who submitted his resignation several months earlier.

Caplinger was given a two-year contract, beginning July 1, calling for working 226 days per year.

His annual base salary was set at \$70,000, plus a \$300-per-month in-district travel expense. All out-of-

district travel will be reimbursed at 26-cents per mile, plus expenses.

Additionally, Caplinger's health insurance will be paid, as well as professional dues to TSTA and AASA; dues for two civic organizations; moving expenses (lowest of two bids) from Lubbock to Iowa Park, and also living allowance for three months, with the superintendent to pay utilities.

He has served as an assistant coach since 1990 at Wayland Baptist Univ. in Plainview.

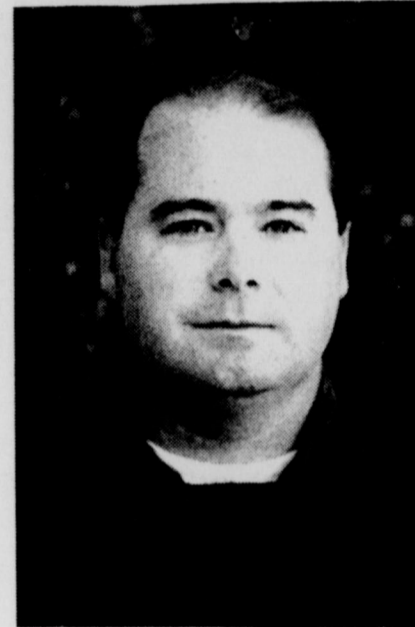
Davis earned his bachelors degree from Wayland, and his master's from Texas Tech Univ.

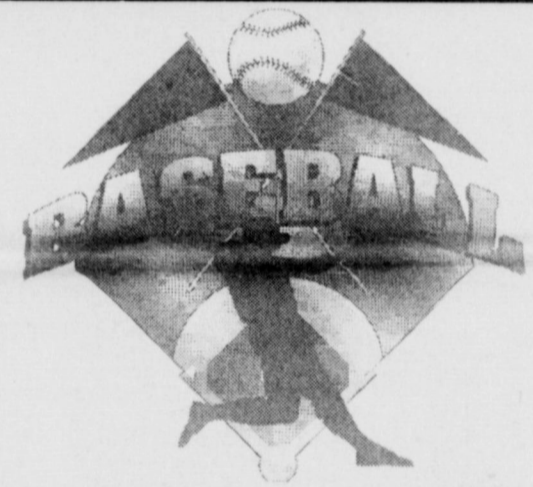

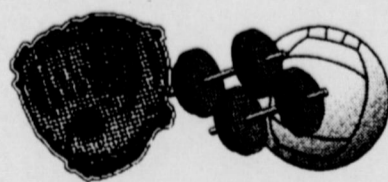

Hawks shut out Steers for crown

Iowa Park's dominance over Graham continued Tuesday afternoon as the Hawks nailed down their second consecutive District crown by beating the Steers for the third time this year, 2-0, to grab the top spot in district 3-3A.

The Hawks, 22-6 overall and 9-1 in district, have owned the Steers, beating them nine of the last 10 meetings between the two teams. Graham, 17-8 overall and 8-2 in district, advances to the playoffs as the district runner-up and will square off against second-ranked Aledo in a bi-district game to be played later this week.

Iowa Park will play Diamond Hill-Jarvis at a time and site yet to be determined.

Iowa Park beat the Steers in the finals of the Boomtown Classic earlier in the season and spoiled Graham's

opening of its new stadium in a 13-inning thriller to set up the exciting third meeting for all the marbles.

This one started out like the pitching duel it was made out to be. Iowa Park threw its ace right-hander Chris Norris, who came in with a 10-1 record and a perfect 10-0 in his starts, while Graham countered with Ryan Dollar who was unbeaten at 7-0.

The game saw both teams have scoring opportunities early but each time the respective pitchers worked out of jams to keep the game scoreless heading into the bottom of the sixth.

Dusty Owen led off the inning and reached first when the Graham shortstop failed to come up with a ground ball hit to his right. Owen stole second to move into scoring position.

The next batter, David Waterbury, hit a grounder that went between the first and second baseman. The second baseman fielded the ball and tossed to Dollar covering first but Dollar was unable to hang on to the throw and was charged with an error. On the play, Owen moved to second on the infield single and continued to run as head coach David Fuhrman waved him home.

Dollar scrambled to his knees and threw to the plate as Owen just got under the tag to give Iowa Park a 1-0 lead.

Clean-up hitter Clancy Lalumia followed with a shot to right center that went to the fence for a triple to drive in Waterbury for the Hawk's second run.

In the top of the seventh, Graham's first two batters reached

base on walks as Norris lost both on 3-2 pitches that just missed. The nine hole hitter flew out to Owen in center, followed by Dollar who flew out to Jake Dillard in left, leaving the Steers with runners at first and second and only one out remaining.

Norris again worked the count to 3-2 before blowing a fastball by the hitter to slam the door on the district title.

"It was definitely a big win for us," Fuhrman said. "It's pretty obvious we wanted to play the number two team in the other district and avoid playing second-ranked in the state Aledo in bi-district. Although we proved three years ago that a second-place team could make it to the state finals. Graham did it last year.

"It also gives the kids the brag-

ging rights for another year," Fuhrman added.

Leading hitters for Iowa Park included Lalumia, who finished 2x3 with an RBI and a triple, Owen, who finished 1x3 with a run scored and a double. Norris and Waterbury also finished 1x3.

Lalumia, commenting on Graham hurler Dollar's pitching, said, "He was a little wild, keeping you off-balance. He didn't have a curve, just a fast ball. We picked up on that and started driving it."

He admitted he was pumped up

when he smashed that big triple.

The Hawks will try to make it 10 out of the last 11 when they play Graham in a warm-up game Monday at 6:30 p.m. in Graham.

Fuhrman attended the District Meeting in Wichita Falls Wednesday morning to vote on the All-District Teams. The results will not be released until both Graham and Iowa Park are eliminated from post season play.

The Hawks will be making their seventh consecutive trip to the State Playoffs.

The other four members make up the Lady Hawks 800m Relay team. The unit posted its best time of the season in the Regional Meet in Odessa with a time of 1:46.80. The running events are scheduled to get underway at noon on Saturday.

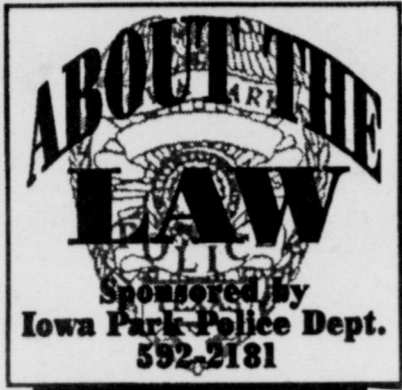
