CIVIC CONTRIBUTION - Three members of the Iowa Park Junior High School Band presented Sherry Wood a \$1,018 check for the Friendly Door Building Fund Tuesday. The money was raised through subscription sales of the Iowa Park Leader. In past projects, the money was used to purchase equipment for the band, but this year the organization decided to donate their commissions to the senior citizen building project. Standing next to Mrs. Wood is Kaycie Myers, who was tops among the students in sales. Zac Miller sold the most renewals and John Schram the most new subscriptions. Each of the three also received special awards, which were presented at the band's spring concert last week.

Five arrests are reported

Five persons were arrested during the past week, two of them on assault charges and the other three on outstanding warrants.

When officers responded to a domestic disturbance at 11:54 p.m. Thursday, in the 800 block of Park Plaza, they arrested Bryan William Davidson, 38, on a Class C assault to prevent family violence.

Davidson was released at 5:20 a.m. Friday, after paying a fine of \$132, according to the police blotter.

Johnnie Wayne Owen, 36, was arrested at 6:18 p.m. Saturday in the 400 block of South Victoria, when police responded to another domestic disturbance.

Owen was released at 10:20 p.m., after signing a personal recognizance bond to appear Tuesday in municipal court on the charge.

Kenneth Michael Frazier, 32, was taken into custody in the 500 block of northwest Access Road Friday morning, after it was determined two locally-issued warrants existed against him.

The warrants were for failure to maintain financial responsibility, a \$327 fine, and driving with an expired license plate, a \$113.50 fine.

Frazier was released some two hours later after paying the \$113.50 fine, and signing a personal recognizance bond on the other charge.

Also Friday morning, a local officer was asked to assist a county constable serve civil papers to Kyle Shannon Bernstein, in the 400 block of West Louisa.

A computer check determined

that two warrants issued by the Wichita County Sheriff's Dept. for Bernstein's arrest.

The warrants were for capus pro fine DWI, a \$566 fine, and violation of probation on forgery, with no bond permitted.

Bernstein was held in the Iowa Park jail until he was turned over to a sheriff's deputy to be transported to the county jail.

Monday morning, Timothy James Smith, 26, was arrested in the 300 block of West Ruby on an outstanding warrant, and was issued an additional charge in the process.

The outstanding warrant was for driving without a drivers license, and

the additional charge was driving while license was suspended, enhanced.

Smith was transported later in the day to the county jail.

The invocation will be given by Jennifer Heichman, and Brandon Herder, class salutatorian, will give the benediction.

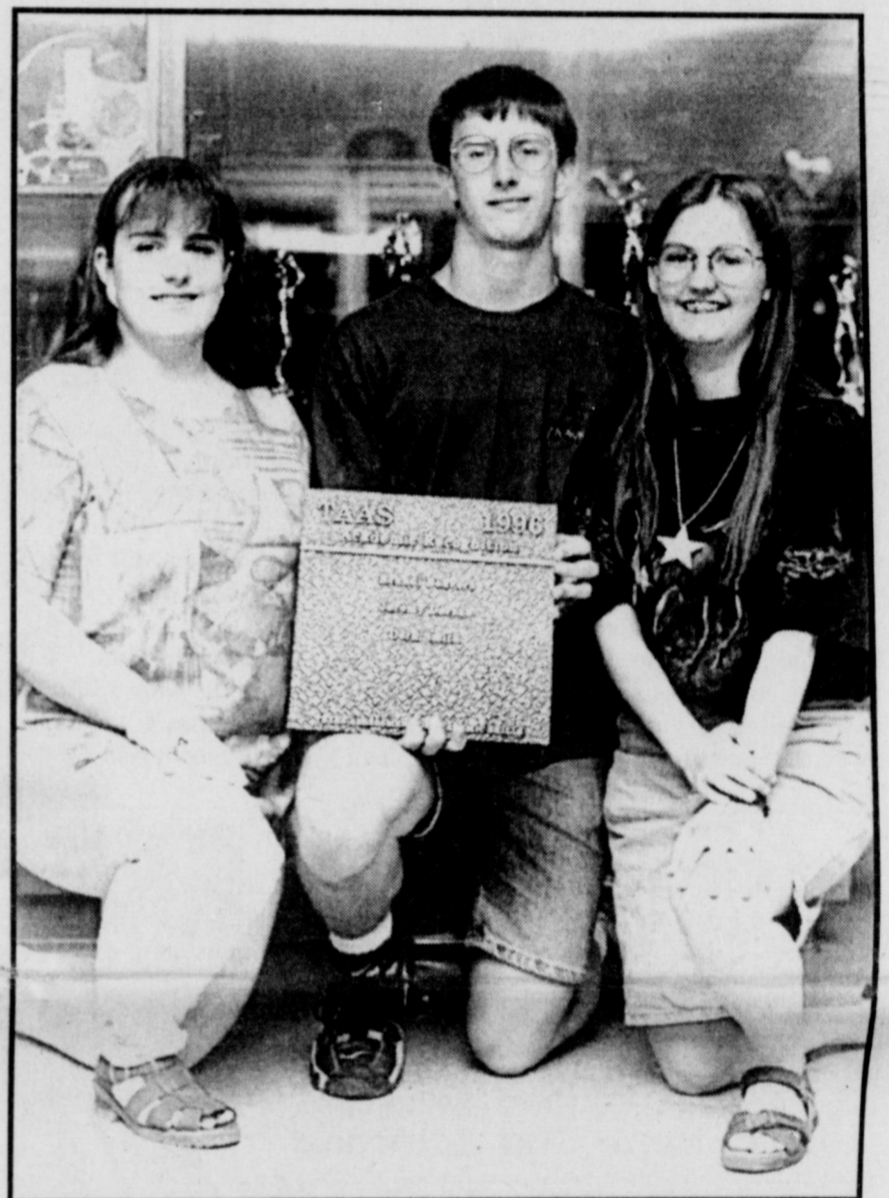
The processional, recessional and special music will be provided by the school band.

Players must turn in their entries to the Chamber of Commerce office by 3 p.m. Tuesday.

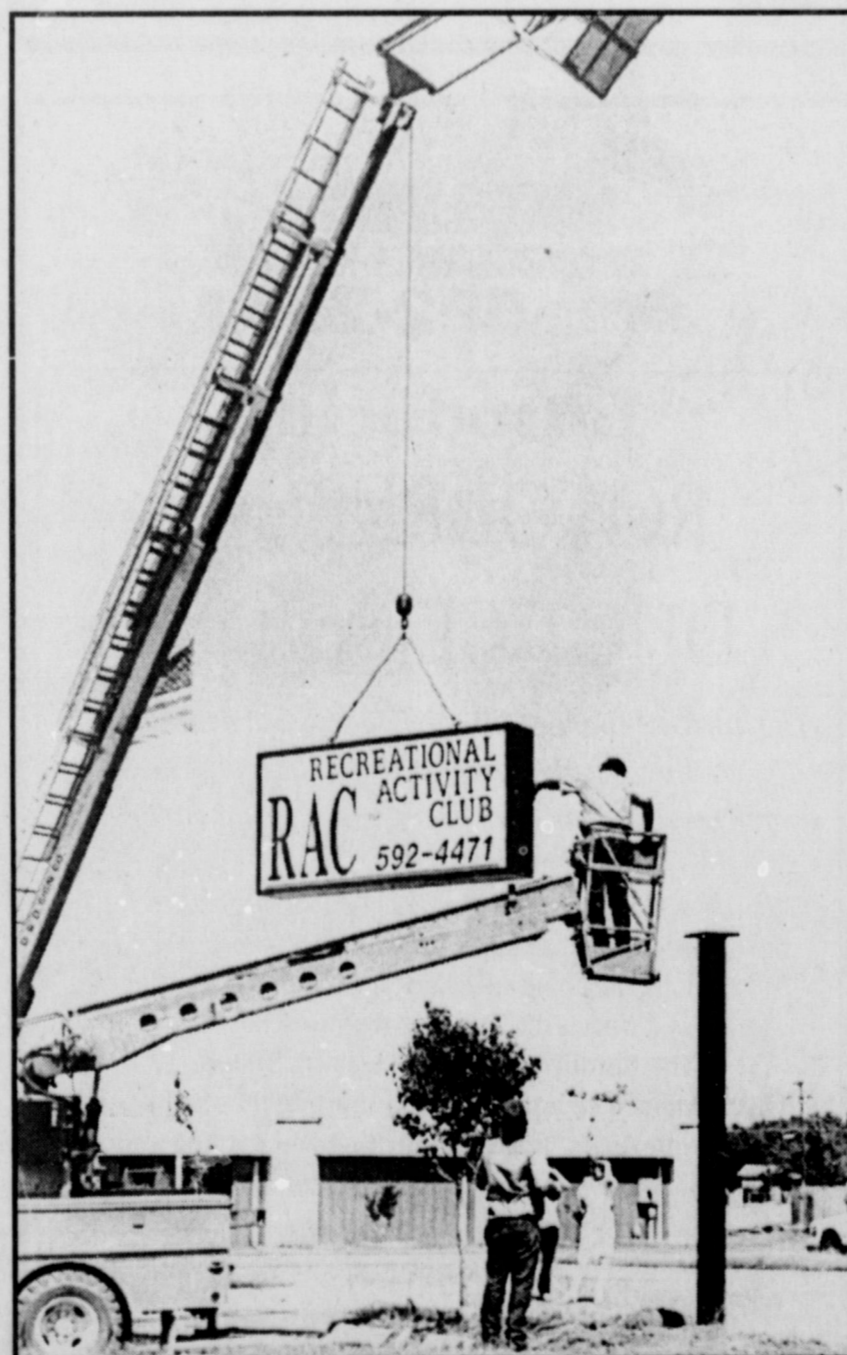
The early entry deadline is necessary in order to reserve tee times at

Life, habits of Mockingbird is topic of Garden Club program

"The Mocking Bird--Texas State Bird" was topic of the program when the Iowa Park Garden Club met May 10.

Mary Ann Gilmore, an authoritative speaker, gave a very informative talk on the life and habits of the state bird.

She described it as being soft grey, turning to a pale grey or white on the lower side. It also has white wing bars and a long tail.

She said its song is a rich varied medley of harsh and musical notes, interspersed with imitations and repetitions.

Mrs. Gilmore suggested that some bits of brightly colored yarn be made available to be used by the mocking bird in making a nest.

The speaker said twice each spring the mockingbird lays four to six eggs, which are light grey blue, some with brown spots. The chicks are born after only 12 days incubation, and will flee the nest after two weeks.

The mockingbird will "mock" people, crickets, frogs, creaking gates, farm machinery, clucking hens or pianos, Mrs. Gilmore said. She told of mockingbirds joining in the pre-

sentation of an outdoor symphony in Washington, D.C.

Freddye Skinner and Joyce Short were hostesses for the meeting.

Bonnie Illingworth, president, reminded members of the field trip next meeting. The group will visit Glen and Helen Miller's rose garden and then go to "Victoria's Tearoom" in Burkburnett for lunch.

"Our purpose for this service is to promote 'saved sex' instead of safe sex being encouraged among our teens lately," said Rev. Ole Olds, pastor of Lakeview Church of God.

In the service direction is given to help students and singles make proper decisions before times of intense temptations.

The service will include a ceremony of commitment to abstinence and purity and also includes an opportunity for parents to show support and commitment to their child, and involves others in their church and community to express encouragement to reinforce moral values.

Parents, grandparents, family members and friends are asked to be present and to participate at the close of the special commitment ceremony.

Abner has been in full-time ministry since 1979. He served as Youth Pastor at Lakeside Assembly of God in Oklahoma City until 1995. An ordained minister with the General Council of Assemblies of God, he has served his fellowship as youth representative for the Oklahoma City

area. He was twice named State "Rep of the Year" in that position.

Abner travels the nation holding seminars and services. Since beginning this ministry in 1994, more than 4,000 teens have signed commitment cards pledging sexual abstinence. "Worth the Wait!" is similar to the "True Love Waits" campaign, and in the summer of 1995, Abner traveled to Washington, D.C. for the National Conference as a representative for the Assemblies of God in Oklahoma.

"Worth the Wait!" is endorsed by former NFL standout, Dennis Byrd and Oklahoma Congressmen Earnest Istook and Steve Largent.

Abner holds dual bachelor's degrees from the University Center in Edmond, Okla., and Southwestern College in Bethany, Okla.



NEWS OF THE

IOWA PARK GENEALOGICAL & HISTORICAL SOCIETY



At one time or another everyone receives junk mail and some concerns genealogy.

Offers of the history of your family name and other gimmicks to entice you as a short cut to family research. There is no short cut, the books may list a family name and those with the same surname but these are not valid sources, and reveal little or nothing about your family tree.

The family historian wants to leave the best possible genealogy documentation that they can, something that can be continued and built upon and not have to redo because they didn't care enough or take time to cite sources or to cite them properly.

Recording an exact paper trail requires discipline in recording where and how all information is obtained. Many types of records are needed as backup.

Census records, obituaries, death certificates, etc., all are used as guides. When vital records are used document a descriptive title of the record, file number, or volume and page number and, of course, the courthouse or repository where the record can be found. If found on microfilm, the number and title should be given.

If information is from a family Bible, military, correspondence, wills, probate and any number of legal documents, cite the source. Document all family stories, by name and year.

A help for family historians is a manual on how to record all the in-

formation, titled "Cite Your Sources" by Richard S. Lackey. Copies can be obtained (\$14.95 postpaid) from Hearthstone Bookshop, 5735-A Telegraph Road, Alexandria, Va. 22303.

Once we become aware of the importance of family genealogy to our own identity, we often find ourselves wondering just who those people in the so-called family pictures are and where they "hang" on our family tree.

How much easier it would have been if someone had taken the time to write names and dates on all those old pictures found in boxes in attics and basements.

Maybe it's just as well the photos were left unmounted and were stored in a container away from air and light. Many of the older albums had sheets that contained peroxides and were covered with plastic sheets that give off damaging gases.

It may be time to check photos you want to save and place them and other documents in an acid free archival album, which will not only organize and display photos, family trees, histories and stories, but also protect them.

When trying to identify and organize old pictures, it might be helpful to know and understand photographic techniques and tools used at different times, and along with this, a knowledge of the styles of dress worn during the diverse periods being researched.

Reduce heat; simmer 1 minute; remove sauce from heat. Stir in 1 1/2 cups cheese and macaroni. Pour into 1 1/2 quart baking dish. Sprinkle cheese on top. Bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees.

Hawks advance to Area with win over Diamond Hill

Take on Perryton today in Lubbock

When you get great pitching, solid defense and pound out 10 hits, four of them for extra bases, you usually win. When the other team adds six errors, that makes it even easier.

Iowa Park took advantage of another strong pitching performance by senior Chris Norris, who hasn't lost as a starter this season as he ran his record to 12-1, by defeating Diamond-Hill Jarvis 8-2 Friday night in Abilene at Hardin Simmons University.

The Hawks, 24-6, advance to the Area Round of the state playoffs and will face Perryton tonight at 6 in Lubbock at O'Bannon Field.

Graham, the runner-up to Iowa Park in District 3-3A, knocked off top-ranked Aledo last week and will play Stanford-Fritch in Lubbock on Friday at 7 p.m.

In Iowa Park's win over the Eagles, the Hawks backed up Norris with 10 hits while playing perfect defense.

Things didn't look as rosey early as the Hawks were 0-for-7 with runners in scoring position in the first three innings.

Iowa Park's first scoring opportunity came in the top of the second when Clancy Lalumia, who finished the game as the hitting star with a pair of triples and a 365-foot single that hit the top of the wall in right center, led off the inning with his first three-bagger. But the Hawks were unable to score him from third when Corky Petty struck out, Waylon Stewart popped out to short and Jake Dillard grounded out to short.

In the top of the third, Norris and Dusty Crawford each reached base via errors as the Eagles committed two of their six miscues to start the inning. But with runners at the corners, Dusty Owen grounded into a 4-6-3 double play to end the threat.

"I was concerned early that we were stranding too many runners in

scoring position," said head coach David Fuhrman. "But on the other hand, we were hitting the ball hard and eventually, we knew they would start falling in for us."

Iowa Park lit up the scoreboard in the top of the fourth when Lalumia smashed a one-out triple to left center. Petty followed with an RBI on a fielder's choice as the shortstop threw to the plate too late to get Lalumia. Stewart followed with an RBI single to score Petty to give Iowa Park a 2-0 lead. The Hawks added two more unearned runs in the inning when the Eagles' centerfielder mis-played a flyball by Chad Wright that led to two runs to give Iowa Park a 4-0 lead.

Diamond-Hill trimmed the lead to 4-2 as the Eagles took advantage of a pair of walks and an RBI double by Jose Avelar and an RBI single by Josh Lopez.

"They thought they had the momentum when they came off the field," Fuhrman added. "But I told our kids that we were trying to win innings. We won the last one 4-2, let's go out and win this one 4-2."

The Hawks got their four in the fifth but the two Diamond Hill got in the fourth was all they could muster against Norris and the defense.

In the fifth, Owen reached safely on another miscue by the Eagles, David Waterbury followed with an infield single to put runners at first

and second with no outs. Lalumia, who had crushed the ball in his two previous plate appearances, hammered a ball to deep right center that hit the 365 sign, but when he looked up both Owen and Waterbury were only at second and third and he was forced to settle for a long single.

"I thought it was gone," Fuhrman said. "I didn't want to take a chance at running us out of a big inning so I held the runners."

Petty followed with a base-clearing triple to the gap in right center to make the score 7-2 and later scored on a sacrifice fly by Stewart to make the final 8-2.

"I'd felt good in practice all week long," senior right fielder Lalumia said. "I just wanted to come out and do my job." On the long single, Lalumia said, "Everybody thought it was gone I guess. I saw it hit the top of the wall and I looked up and nobody was running. But Corky came

through for us with a big hit."

Norris struck out six, walked three and gave up only four hits in his six innings of work to pick up his 12th win against only one loss. That loss coming in relief against Wichita Falls High School early in the season.

"I pitched all right," Norris said. "But I thought the main key to our win was our defense. They didn't make any mistakes and then Clancy put on an awesome hitting display. My curve was working real well. I'd set them up with the fastball inside then go away with the curve to get them out."

When asked if he would be ready to go against Perryton Thursday Norris said, "Oh yea, I'll be ready. With each game we win, the challenge gets bigger, we'll all be ready to play."

Tonight's game against Perryton, 22-7-2, will be played at O'Bannon Field which is the field where Lubbock Coronado plays its home games.

"They've got a big left-hander that tries to keep teams off balance," Fuhrman said. "He's not a power pitcher, he just gets people out. They have a good eye at the plate. They didn't hit the ball hard against Muleshoe, but they did put it in play and forced the defense to play. They're a well coached team. Bill Merrell, Bruce's brother, is their coach and does a good job. They've got some speed in their outfield and their infield looks solid."

In the playoffs, coaches are forced to look ahead to schedule fields and times before they play their upcoming game. If Iowa Park wins its game over Perryton in the Area Round, the Hawks will play the winner of the Brownfield, (19-6), vs. Kermit, (24-5), game Monday night at 6 p.m. at Hardin Simmons Field in Abilene.
