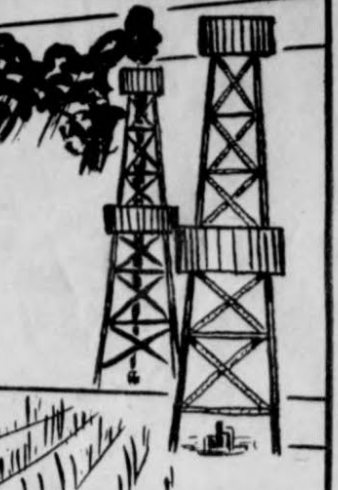

TRUMAN INVITED TO WICHITA RALLY

Building Democracy, a program that means much to the future of America, has taken a momentous jump in the Southwest since the announcement of plans for a giant rally to be held in Wichita Falls on June 9, 10 and 11, being sponsored by all of northwest Texas and southwestern Oklahoma. The entire program hinges on building and keeping America democratic.

Many leaders this day have decided that government begins at home. The support of government naturally is at home. In each community people live and work together and in a country such as ours it is fitting that we commemorate or rededicate ourselves to the cause of a better place to live. We find ourselves looking many times to state capitols or to the national capitol when our problem is right on the good earth under our feet. We should always talk unity, but, on the other hand, we should practice it individually and collectively.

The Building of Democracy program is headed by Mrs. H. W. Weir, Wichita Falls, as general chairman. Much work has been accomplished to make it probably the biggest program ever put on in this area.

Many national and state personalities have accepted the invitation to be a part of the program. The governor of Texas will be host governor. Gov. Roy Turner of Oklahoma and Gov. McMath of Arkansas have already accepted. National figures include India Edwards, of Washington, D.C., executive director of the Women's division of the Democratic national committee; Miss Katherine Ford of New York state; Mrs. John L. Whitehurst, former national president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs and now extension secretary for that organization of both foreign and territorial clubs; and many other outstanding women.

President Truman has been invited and since he is due in Little Rock on June, should he accept, he would be here on June 10.

Official registration will take place June 9 from 10 to 12 a.m. on the mezzanine floor of the Kemp hotel. The first luncheon will be held at noon. An afternoon program from 2:00 to 4:00 for introductory and welcoming speeches will be held.

At 7:00 will be the governors and official guests banquet with speakers and other dignitaries to be announced later. At 9:00 will be a square dance in downtown Wichita Falls with the best cowboy and Western music available, and the top five callers in the entire Southwest: Winfield Ikard of Archer City, Cliff Broadagan of Electra; Bert Lowry, Bill Miller and R. M. Cowden of Wichita Falls.

On June 10 from 8:30 to 10:00 will be a breakfast followed by a gigantic parade at 11:00. Bands, floats, National Guard units, Army and Air Force units, Naval Reserve, cowboys and cowgirls from all over the area will participate.

From 12:00 to 1:30 will be another luncheon, and from 2:30 to 4:00 for the ladies will be a formal tea at the Wichita Falls Country Club, while the men will be entertained at a meeting by the oil men of this area.

From 6:00 to 8:00 will be a chuck wagon feed in the rear of Memorial Auditorium. At 8:00 the Building of Democracy program will be brought in the Memorial Auditorium with outstanding speakers, both men and women, of the entire United States.

On June 11 from 8:00 to 9:30 various breakfasts and committee discussions will take place. From 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. there will be tours over the entire area with Jack Austin of the chamber of commerce in charge. From 5:30 to 7:30 there will be a buffet supper followed by another square dance in the streets at 9:00.

WATER BOND VOTE SET FOR JULY FIRST

In a recent meeting the board of directors of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 (Iowa Park) decided to call a bond election July 1.

As stated in the call for election, the purpose is to vote a \$350,000 bond issue, to be used as follows:

- Stevens Creek Reservoir and pump line to plant, \$202,465.00;
- Purification and treatment plant, \$48,600.00;
- Extending water supply lines, \$10,000.00;
- Acquisition of existing supply facilities, \$68,000.00;
- Miscellaneous, contingencies and interest during construction, \$20,935.00.

The election will be held at the City Hall in Iowa Park with F. E. Hill as presiding judge, Earle Denny as judge, and Mrs. Fenton Dale and Mrs. Roy Edwards as clerks. Any resident of the district who owns property which has been rendered for taxes within the district, and who has a poll tax or exemption certificate will be eligible to vote in the bond election.

For a more complete understanding of the proposed bond issue, the readers are referred to the official publication of the call for election published elsewhere in this paper.

Officials Remind Residents of Existing Sanitation Ordinance

Declaring a need for a cleaner, more healthful community in which to live, the City Council of Iowa Park Health Officer of Iowa Park urge all citizens to join in a united effort in completing the important job of making Iowa Park a clean, healthy community.

"Let's fight polio and all the other communicable diseases by cleaning up the disease breeding places," they say, "and do all we can to make our town a better place in which to live and raise a family."

The city fathers invite all citizens to read the following ordinance carefully and make sure that they are abiding by its regulations.

- ORDINANCE NO. 170**
Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas:
- That on or after August 15th, 1931 it shall be unlawful to dispose of any human excreta within the corporate limits of the City of Iowa Park except in a sanitary water flush closet or a chemical toilet or concrete vault toilet or an approved sanitary pit privy built according to the specifications of the State Department of Health, as set forth in Section 3 below.
 - Every building intended for human habitation or occupancy abutting on a street or alley in which there is a public sewer, or within 150 feet of a public sewer, shall be connected with the sewer by the owner or agent of the premises in the most direct manner possible and with a separate connection for each house or building.
 - The minimum requirements of a privy are that it shall be constructed, built, or rebuilt that:
 - The excreta deposited therein shall not fall upon the surface of the ground but enter into a pit or vault in the ground, or a compartment built for the purpose.
 - The contents of said compartment, vault, or pit shall be inaccessible to flies, fowls, or small animals at all times.
 - Self-closing lids shall be provided for each unit.
 - For a pit toilet the pit shall consist of an excavated chamber conforming to the following dimensions:
 - Minimum width inside curbing 3 feet.
 - Minimum length inside curbing 4 feet.
 - Minimum depth from ground surface 4 feet.
 - The pit shall be provided with a box curbing, fitted closely to the sides of the pit.
 - Over the pit shall be placed a fly-tight seat which shall be ventilated by a flue extending from the pit to 8 (eight) inches above the roof of the building and screened at the top and bottom with 16-mesh wire.
 - All sanitary pit privies in the corporate limits of Iowa Park, Texas, shall be kept closed when not in use. Such pits shall be used only for the disposal of human excreta and no wash water or garbage shall be deposited therein.
 - If any defect occur in the pit privy which would affect its sanitary condition, the defect shall be immediately repaired.
 - All privies existing or maintained within the corporate limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, after this ordinance becomes effective which do not conform to the requirements of this ordinance shall be, and are hereby declared a nuisance, dangerous, and a menace to public health, and the City of Iowa Park, Texas, shall have power and authority to abate such nuisance in accordance with the law, or in accordance with the ordinance of said City of Iowa Park, Texas.
 - It shall be the duty of the Sanitary Officer having jurisdiction, or his duly authorized assistant to enter all premises as may be necessary in the enforcement of this ordinance and he is hereby so empowered.
 - The Sanitary Officer or his duly authorized assistant shall make an inspection of all privies coming within the provisions of this ordinance to determine whether or not they are constructed and maintained in accordance herewith, said inspection to be made every three (3) months and at such other times as may be deemed necessary by the Sanitary Officer. The owner of each privy inspected shall be required to

Swimming Victim at Vashti Was Raised at Iowa Park

More than sixty friends, including her former class mates in Sunday School here, attended funeral services Monday for Janella Sylvester Tuck, 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Comer Tuck of Vashti.

Janella lost her life by drowning last Saturday afternoon, May 28 in a lake near the cemetery where she was laid to rest. Miss Tuck and a girl friend had gone swimming almost immediately after the noonday meal and the two had been in but a short time when Janella found herself in trouble. The girl friend ran for help. When Janella was recovered from the tank a pulmotor was used for several hours, but all efforts to revive her proved unsuccessful.

Janella Tuck was born in Iowa Park on November 4, 1933 and lived here until a year ago when the family moved to a farm near Vashti. She is survived by her parents and a 3-year-old brother and by her grandparents Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Towerton of Iowa Park.

Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3:
To the resident, qualified electors of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 who own taxable property in said district and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:
Take notice that an election will be held in the District on the 1st day of July, 1949, on the proposition and at the place more particularly set forth in the election order adopted by the Board of Directors on the 21st day of May, 1949, which is substantially as follows:
"RESOLUTION
by the Board of Directors of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 calling an election on the question of the issuance of \$350,000.00 of improvement

bonds, payable from the levy of Ad Valorem Taxes adequate to provide for such payment.
Whereas, said district has adopted a plan for improvements designed to furnish a water system; and
Whereas, the plan for improvements thus adopted were prepared for the district by Engineers duly employed for such purpose, such Engineers' report being substantially as follows:

Stevens Creek Reservoir and Pump Line to Plant \$202,465.00
Purification and Treatment Plant 48,600.00
Extending Water Supply Lines 10,000.00
Acquisition of Existing Supply Facilities 68,000.00

Total estimated cost \$350,000.00 and

Whereas, the Board of Directors deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said district for the purposes hereinabove mentioned;
Therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Directors of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3:
1. That an election be held in said Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3, on the 1st day of July, 1949, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:
"Shall the Board of Directors of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 be authorized to issue the bonds of said district in the sum of \$350,000.00, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the Board of Directors, the maximum maturity being not more than Thirty (30) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Four and one-half (4½%) per cent per annum, payable annually or semi-annually, for the purpose of acquiring or constructing a dam, reservoir, pipe lines and other works necessary or incidental to furnishing the inhabitants of the District with fresh water, and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied on all taxable property within said District sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds at their maturity."
2. That said election shall be held at the Iowa Park City Hall, within said District and the following named persons are hereby appointed directors of said election:
F. E. Hill, Presiding Judge, Earle Denny, Judge, Mrs. Fenton Dale, Clerk, Mrs. Roy Edwards, Clerk.
3. That said election shall be held under the laws governing general elections except as otherwise provided by the provisions of Chapter 25, Acts of the Thirty Ninth Legislature, 1923, Regular Session, as amended, and only legally qualified electors residing within said district who own taxable property in said district and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote.
4. The ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:
"For the issuance of bonds and the levy of ad valorem taxes in payment thereof."
"Against the issuance of bonds and the levy of ad valorem taxes in payment thereof."
Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.
5. Notice of said election shall be given under the hand of the President and Secretary of the Board of Directors, stating the maximum amount of bonds to be issued and the proposed maximum interest thereon, the maximum maturity date of said bonds and the time and place of holding the election. Said notice shall be published once a week for four consecutive weeks in a newspaper having general circulation in the County in which said District is located, the first of which publication shall be at least twenty eight days before the date of such election. Said notice further shall contain substantially the proposition to be voted upon and a summary of the Engineers' estimate of the cost of the proposed improvements as shown by said Engineers' report on file in the office of the District as approved by the Board of Directors. Said notice of election also shall be posted by the Secretary at three public places within said district and one such notice shall be posted at the door of the County Courthouse, at least twenty one days prior to the date fixed for said election."

Battered Baseball Cap Worn By National League Stars Finds Way To Sheppard AFB

Millions of words of newspaper copy have been written about hats. Half of a woman's life is spent worrying about her hats, and famous people such as Fiorello La Guardia and Al Smith made certain types of men as ever trod the green diamond. Who was he? Why, Klein, Chuck Klein, one of the greatest left-handed hitters of the game.
"When old Chuck bowed out, a good left-handed pitcher came to the Phillies from the St. Louis Cardinals. He, also, might have been classed with the stars of baseball but for his wildness. Much of his pitching was done for the great Cardinal teams, and when he arrived with us, I was given to him for a practice cap. He took the same good care of me as Chuck had, and soon I became quite attached to this for a baseball hat." Then the famous cap reminisced a bit. He said, "Years ago the Philadelphia Phillies had one of the great homerun hitters of the National League on their roster, and when I was a brand new hat, I was issued to him in spring training in Florida. The first day, he had his name sewed in the sweat band. From that time on, I was with him through his glorious playing days. He wore me when he made the impossible catches in the outfield, and when he belted his 43 homeruns in 1929. I was later with my hero in 1931, 32, 33 when he led the National League in homeruns for three straight years. He was a great ballplayer, and as fine a gentleman as ever trod the green diamond. Who was he? Why, Klein, Chuck Klein, one of the greatest left-handed hitters of the game.
"After he retired from the game, I became part of the Phillies' practice uniforms which the rookies used until one day, a hero-worshipping kid fresh from the Southern Association, appeared in our camp. Seeing the two famous names in my band, he immediately took possession of me, and from that day until now, I have never belonged to anyone else. The kid was a catcher, and a mighty good one. He could belt the ball a country mile, and he was mechanically perfect. Of course he

was a rookie but a comer. He was stamped big-league but his great desire to be in the game kept him from it. This kid catcher could not sit in the bench and watch others play the game he loved, so rather than sit on a big league bench and learn, he went where he could play ball. Then the war took him to service with the Air Force, and today he is a Captain. Who? Captain Norm Whitten, of course."
The baseball cap today "battered and old, but to Whitt, as he puts it, "My most cherished memento of my brief career."

Mr. Southard expects the wheat around here to be all gathered and shipped in two weeks.

The office has been covered on the outside with new white asbestos shingles, the inside has two tones of brown and tan panel board combined with knotty pine to make a pleasing appearance.

TRUMAN INVITED TO WICHITA RALLY

Building Democracy, a program that means much to the future of America, has taken a momentous jump in the Southwest since the announcement of plans for a giant rally to be held in Wichita Falls on June 9, 10 and 11, being sponsored by all of northwest Texas and southwestern Oklahoma. The entire program hinges on building and keeping America democratic.

Many leaders this day have decided that government begins at home. The support of government naturally is at home. In each community people live and work together and in a country such as ours it is fitting that we commemorate or rededicate ourselves to the cause of a better place to live. We find ourselves looking many times to state capitols or to the national capitol when our problem is right on the good earth under our feet.

We should always talk unity, but on the other hand, we should practice it individually and collectively.

The Building of Democracy program is headed by Mrs. H. W. Weir, Wichita Falls, as general chairman. Much work has been accomplished to make it probably the biggest program ever put on in this area.

Many national and state personalities have accepted the invitation to be a part of the program. The governor of Texas will be host governor. Gov. Roy Turner of Oklahoma and Gov. McMath of Arkansas have already accepted. National figures include India Edwards, of Washington, D.C., executive director of the Women's division of the Democratic national committee; Miss Katherine Ford of New York state; Mrs. John L. Whitehurst, former national president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs and now extension secretary for that organization of both foreign and territorial clubs; and many other outstanding women.

President Truman has been invited and since he is due in Little Rock on June, should he accept, he would be here on June 10.

Official registration will take place June 9 from 10 to 12 a.m. on the mezzanine floor of the Kemp hotel. The first luncheon will be held at noon. An afternoon program from 2:00 to 4:00 for introductory and welcoming speeches will be held.

At 7:00 will be the governors and official guests banquet with speakers and other dignitaries to be announced later. At 9:00 will be a square dance in downtown Wichita Falls with the best cowboy and Western music available, and the top five callers in the entire Southwest: Winfield Ikard of Archer City, Cliff Broadgan of Electra; Bert Lowry, Bill Miller and R. M. Cowden of Wichita Falls.

On June 10 from 8:30 to 10:00 will be a breakfast followed by a gigantic parade at 11:00. Bands, floats, National Guard units, Army and Air Force units, Naval Reserve, cowboys and cowgirls from all over the area will participate.

From 12:00 to 1:30 will be another luncheon, and from 2:30 to 4:00 for the ladies will be a formal tea at the Wichita Falls Country Club, while the men will be entertained at a meeting by the oil men of this area.

From 6:00 to 8:00 will be a chuck wagon feed in the rear of Memorial Auditorium. At 8:00 the Building of Democracy program will be brought in the Memorial Auditorium with outstanding speakers, both men and women, of the entire United States.

On June 11 from 8:00 to 9:30 various breakfasts and committee discussions will take place. From 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. there will be tours over the entire area with Jack Austin of the chamber of commerce in charge. From 5:30 to 7:30 there will be a buffet supper followed by another square dance in the streets at 9:00.

WATER BOND VOTE SET FOR JULY FIRST

In a recent meeting of the board of directors of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 (Iowa Park) decided to call a bond election July 1.

As stated in the call for election, the purpose is to vote a \$350,000 bond issue, to be used as follows:

Stevens Creek Reservoir and pump line to plant, \$202,465.00;

Purification and treatment plant, \$48,600.00;

Extending water supply lines, \$10,000.00;

Acquisition of existing supply facilities, \$68,000.00.

Miscellaneous, contingencies and interest during construction, \$30,935.00.

The election will be held at the City Hall in Iowa Park with F. E. Hill as presiding judge, Earle Denny as judge, and Mrs. Penton Dale and Mrs. Roy Edwards as clerks. Any resident of the district who owns property which has been rendered for taxes within the district, and who has a poll tax or exemption certificate will be eligible to vote in the bond election.

For a more complete understanding of the proposed bond issue, the readers are referred to the official publication of the call for election published elsewhere in this paper.

Officials Remind Residents of Existing Sanitation Ordinance

Declaring a need for a cleaner, more healthful community in which to live, the City Council and City Health Officer of Iowa Park urge all citizens to join in a united effort in completing the important job of making Iowa Park a clean, healthy community.

"Let's fight polio and all the other communicable diseases by cleaning up the disease breeding places," they say, "and do all we can to make our town a better place in which to live and raise a family."

The city fathers invite all citizens to read the following ordinance carefully and make sure that they are abiding by its regulations.

ORDINANCE NO. 170

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas:

1. That on or after August 15th, 1931 it shall be unlawful to dispose of any human excreta within the corporate limits of the City of Iowa Park except in a sanitary water flush closet or a chemical toilet or concrete vault toilet or an approved sanitary pit privy built according to the specifications of the State Department of Health, as set forth in Section 3 below.

2. Every building intended for human habitation or occupancy abutting on a street or alley in which there is a public sewer, or within 150 feet of a public sewer, shall be connected with the sewer by the owner or agent of the premises in the most direct manner possible and with a separate connection for each house or building.

3. The minimum requirements of a privy are that it shall be constructed, built, or rebuilt that:

(a). The excreta deposited therein shall not fall upon the surface of the ground but enter into a pit or vault in the ground, or a compartment built for the purpose.

(b). The contents of said compartment, vault, or pit shall be inaccessible to flies, fowls, or small animals at all times.

(c). Self-closing lids shall be provided for each unit.

(d). For a pit toilet the pit shall consist of an excavated chamber conforming to the following dimensions:

Swimming Victim at Vashti Was Raised at Iowa Park

Janella Tuck was born in Iowa Park on November 4, 1933 and lived here until a year ago when the family moved to a farm near Vashti. She is survived by her parents and a 3-year-old brother and by her grandparents Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Towerdon of Iowa Park.

9. Any person, firm, or corporation who violates, refuses or fails to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance in the corporate limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

10. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Battered Baseball Cap Worn By National League Stars Finds Way To Sheppard AFB

Millions of words of newspaper copy have been written about hats. Half of a woman's life is spent worrying about her hats, and famous people such as Fiorella La Guardia and Al Smith made certain types of men's head wear famous. Now Sheppard Air Force Base has uncovered a famous hat of its own, one worn by fabulous major league baseball stars of the past. Assuming that this hat could talk, the Sports Editor of the SENATOR made a trip to the resting place of this oddity of sport and conducted an interview.
The hat as always in the past was only too happy to see a newspaper man, and to the first question, "How old are you?" the cap answered, "Nearly 29 years old, but you must remember that is ancient for a baseball hat." Then the famous cap reminisced a bit. He said, "Years ago the Philadelphia Phillies had one of the great homerun hitters of the National League on their roster, and when I was a brand new hat, I was issued to him in spring training in Florida. The first day, he had his name sewed in the sweat band. From that time on, I was with him through his glorious playing days. He wore me when he made the impossible catches in the outfield, and when he belted his 43 homeruns in 1929. I was later with my hero in 1931, 32, 32 when he led the National League in homeruns for three straight years. He was a great ballplayer, and as fine a gentleman as ever trod the green diamond. Who was he? Why, Klein, Chuck Klein, one of the greatest left-handed hitters of the game."

Much of his pitching was done for the great Cardinal teams, and when he arrived with us, I was given to him for a practice cap. He took the same good care of me as Chuck had, and soon I became quite attached to this at times brilliant left-hander. We played many innings of ball together, and I was proud to be a part of his uniform. His name was 'Lefty' Wild Bill Hallahan."
"After he retired from the game, I became part of the Phillies' practice uniforms which the rookies used until one day, a hero-worshiping kid fresh from the Southern Association, appeared in our camp. Seeing the two famous names in my band, he immediately took possession of me, and from that day until now, I have never belonged to anyone else. The kid was a catcher, and a mighty good one. He could belt the ball a country mile, and he was mechanically perfect. Of course he

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was a rookie but a comer. He was stamped big-league but his great desire to be in the game kept him from it. This kid catcher could not sit in the bench and watch others play the game he loved, so rather than sit on a big league bench and learn, he went where he could play ball. Then the war took him to service with the Air Force, and today he is a Captain. Who? Captain Norm Whitten, of course."
The baseball cap today "battered and old, but to Whit, as he puts it, "My most cherished memento of my brief career."

Mr. Southard expects the wheat around here to be all gathered and shipped in two weeks.
