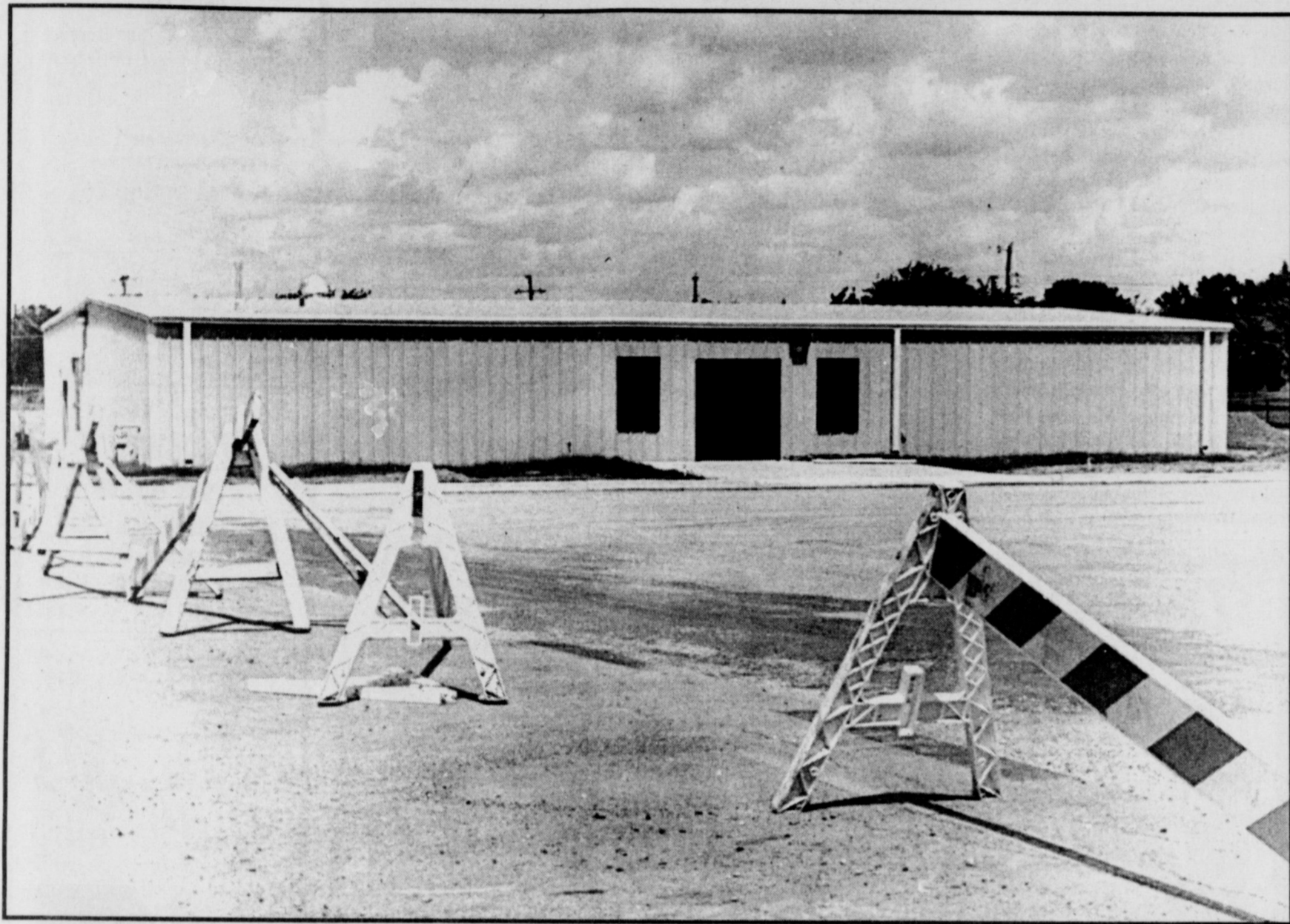

PREPARING FOR BIG MOVE -- Barricades were in place Tuesday to protect the area to be covered with asphalt Wednesday, and when completed, the long-awaited move of the Friendly Door senior citizen center will begin. Plans are to

begin the move Saturday, from the center's location at Wall and Cash into the new facility on Third Street, right next door to the Iowa Park Recreational Activities Club. The new building will be ready for members on Monday.

Fireworks allowed at Lake Iowa Park

While fireworks are forbidden in the city limits of Iowa Park, residents wishing to make a loud noise to celebrate July 4th will be able to do so at Lake Iowa Park.

The city council approved a resolution at Monday night's meeting which permits the activity at the lake. This has been the council's policy since the mid 1980's.

According to the resolution, fireworks will be permitted from now through July 4.

Those setting off fireworks are encouraged to dispose of their used or spent fireworks in the numerous refuse containers which are placed at the lake.

Administrator Mike Price explained to the council that allowing fireworks to be set off at the lake has caused a dramatic cutback on the number of fires in the rural areas.

He said, "The reduction of fires in and around the Iowa Park area has outweighed our manpower costs for cleanup, not to mention enhancing our position with local farmers and ranchers who often lose pasture land to fireworks."

In other action Monday, council members approved installation of traffic control signs at four intersections, contracting for replacement of a sewer line, and providing medical and transportation services for all varsity football games played here.

Stop signs will be placed at Colorado and Louisa, Aldine at Third and Texas and Third, while a yield sign will be installed at Colorado and Clara, according to the approved ordinance amendment.

The original clay sewer line in

Police investigating 'disappearances'

Eventhough they were not from Iowa Park, the local police department is investigating a missing persons report filed Sunday when three juvenile girls from Wichita Falls "disappeared" from Lake Iowa Park.

The girls, two who are 13 and one 12, reportedly were driven Saturday afternoon to the lake by one of the girls' uncles.

One girl's parent reported them missing at 11:15 p.m., adding that they had left the lake in the company of five males in a vehicle.

The mother said at that time she did not want to file an official report, but at 6:25 a.m. Sunday, she agreed to file an official report.

Police were notified at 7:54 a.m. Monday of having received a telephone call from one of the girls, who reportedly was in Burkburnett.

The missing juveniles are now being reported as runaways, and one of the males is said to be known and is 19 years of age. His whereabouts also is unknown.

A 16-year-old son and his 40-

year-old father were both taken into custody Tuesday afternoon, after officers responded to an alleged fight in the 300 block of East Cash.

The son, who initially was placed under arrest for disorderly conduct and then, after attempting to run away and being caught on Jefferson, was also charged with evading arrest.

He was transported to the juvenile detention center in Wichita Falls.

The father (name not being released to protect identity of the son) was charged, after the son's capture, with attempting to interfere with an officer's duties. He was placed in the county jail, and later released after posting a \$500 bond, according to the police blotter.

The same boy was arrested, with assistance of local officers, by a county deputy Friday, after being identified by a man who lives in the immediate rural area as having stolen property in his possession.

The youth is alleged to have had

an amplifier in his possession which had been taken from a vehicle owned by the complainant.

Both the amplifier and a fishing pole were returned to their owner, who in turn told the deputy he did not want to file charges because he had his property back in his possession.

An Iowa Park man filed a report with police Tuesday that someone had forged a check on his account at the local Bank of America branch, withdrawing \$1,500 from the account.

Police, as well as the bank's own investigators, are checking into the case.

They were told an unknown man had deposited a check of some \$6,000 on a business in Oregon, and then made a withdrawal of \$1,500.

However, the bank soon afterward learned that the check had been drawn on an account which had been closed, according to police.

Tuesday morning, the city's

The Iowa Park Leader received a first-place award in the Texas Press Association's better newspaper contest for 1995-96.

Judging the contest were members of the Oklahoma Press Association.

Mrs. Smith's award-winning feature was on W.T. Bradford.

The judge's critique stated, "Colorful, real human interest. Good job all around. One question: Were there no photos of him from the old days, in his cowboy gear?"

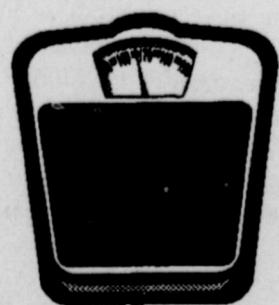

Benny Daniel presided at the cake.

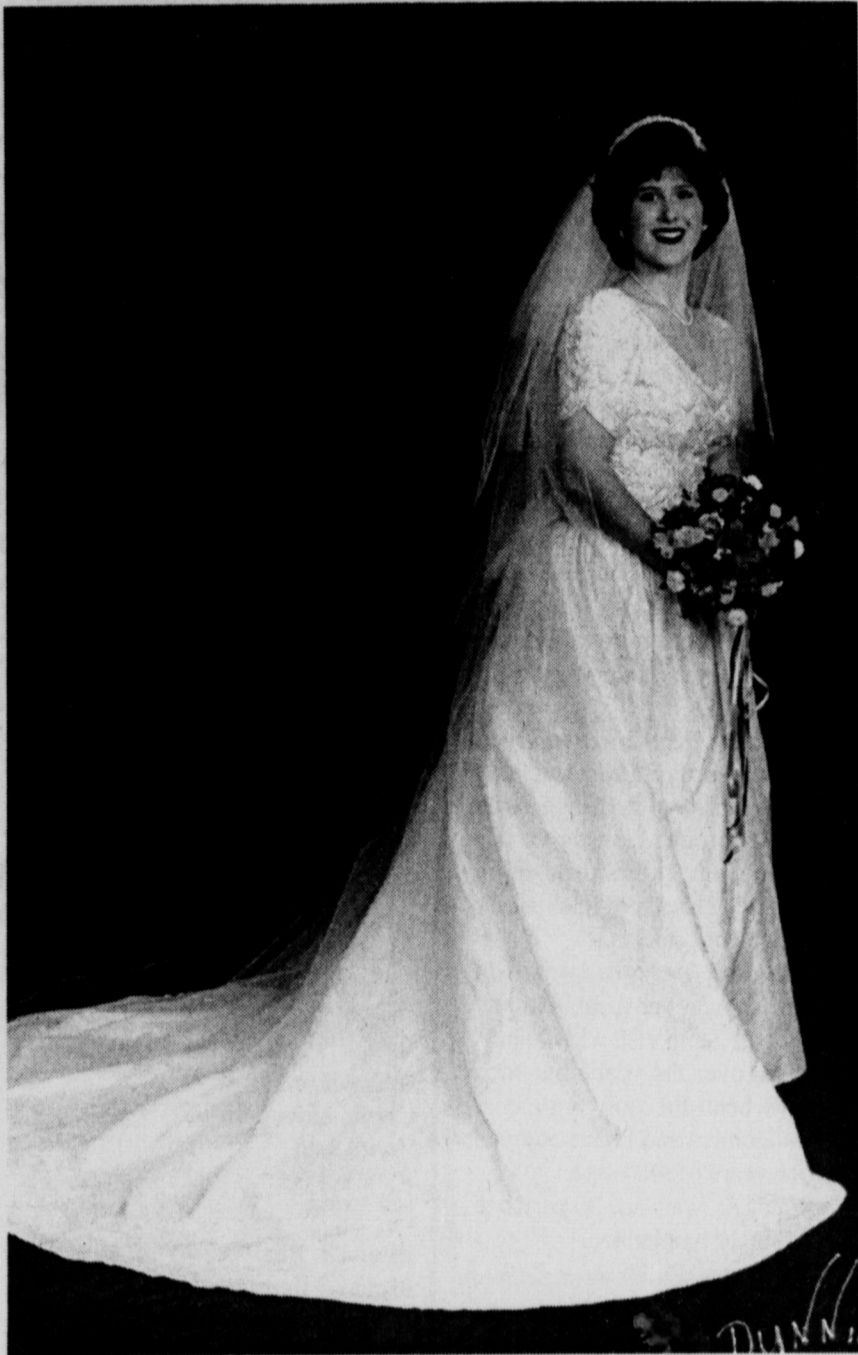
Members of the house party were Miss Emily Nemecek and Mrs. Jami Davis.

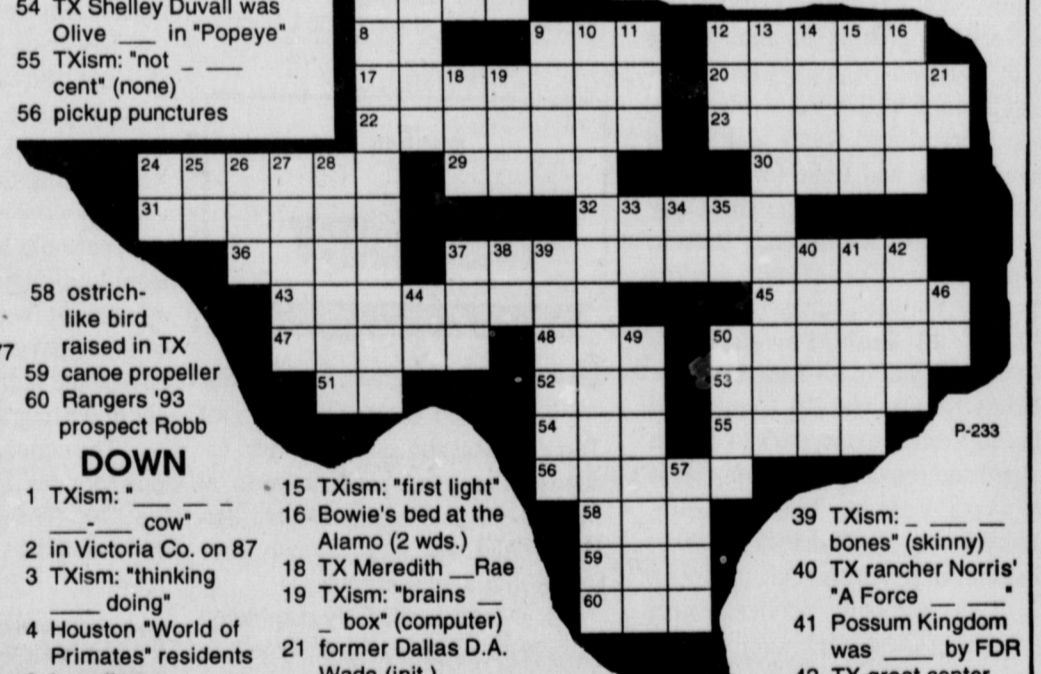

the 200 blocks of West Washington and Alameda are to be replaced by plastic lines, aldermen decided.

Price explained the old line had apparently collapsed and could be replaced by a contractor, U.S. Pacific Enterprise of Wichita Falls, for a total bid of \$13,087.

A new requirement by the University Interscholastic League, that medical personnel and ambulance be made available at all varsity football games caused the council to take action.

The city administrator told the council he had been informed that the ambulance service with which the city has a contract, and which has in the past provided the service at the games, would no longer be available.

Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer contacted Price, when he was informed of the company's policy change, to see if the city could provide the service.

Price told aldermen that the volunteer fire department could, and had agreed, to have medical personnel and their emergency van at each varsity game.

He further mentioned that, according to contacts in Austin, the vehicle and personnel must be at the field before a game could get underway, but if they were called to another emergency during the game, it could be continued.

Price also said that the city's insurance would cover the emergency vehicle in case an injured player should require transporting to a hospital, but the school would have to purchase a gurney, which was not in the department's inventory.

However, the fire department is still not permitted to transport the general public to a hospital, aldermen were told.

A fee for providing the service is yet to be worked out between the city and school, and Alderman Bob Hamilton suggested that whatever agreement was made concerning whether payment was made to the city or the department, it should be put in writing for council approval.

The council decided to not meet next Monday, to continue its study of the 1996-97 budget, but to hold the third such meeting on July 15.

An award of appreciation was presented to Tom Powell for his help in leading 4-Hers in craft projects during the year.

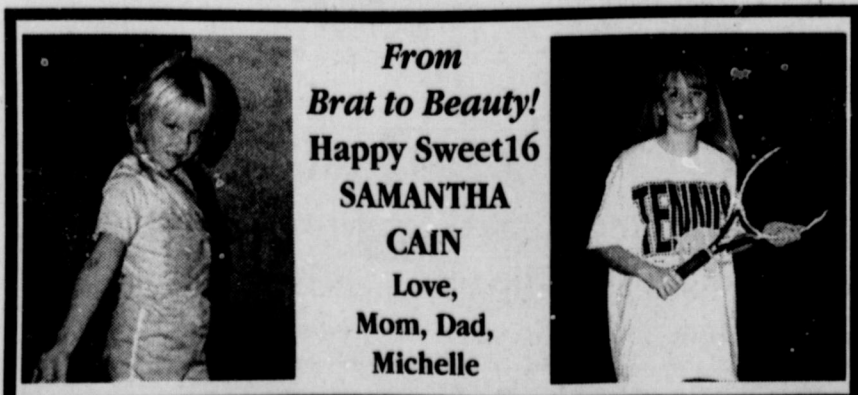

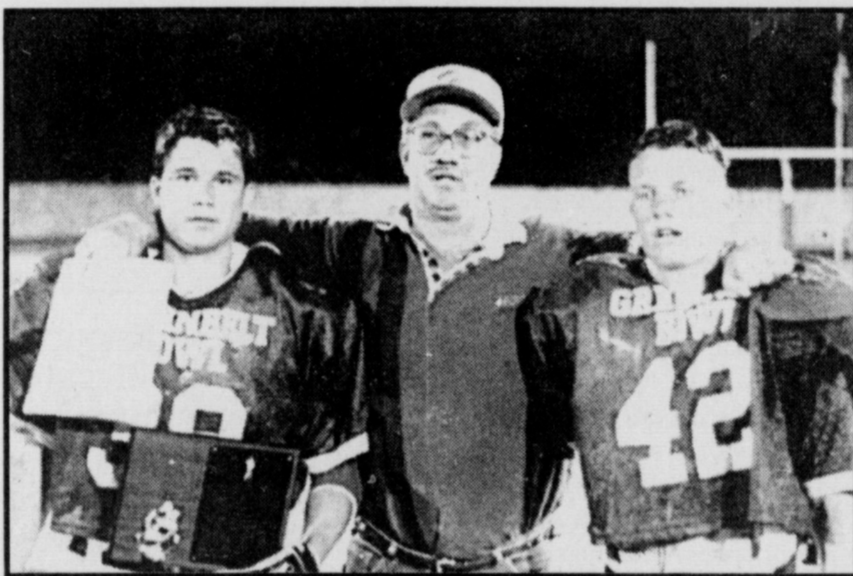
