NAACP group meets with school trustees on employee complaint

Representatives from the Wichita Falls Chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People appeared before the school board during a called meeting Thursday afternoon at the administration building.

The meeting was held to address a complaint of a former cafeteria supervisor.

The employee, Ilene Hill, was dismissed after working seven years for the school district, the past two as cafeteria supervisor. She was represented by Barbara Wesley, assistant secretary for the Wichita Fails NAACP Chapter.

Other members of that organization who accompanied Wesley to the meeting were Judge Smith, chapter president, and Claude Foster, chapter vice president. Mrs. Hill's husband, Douglas, was also in attendance.

The meeting, originally scheduled to be held in closed session, was instead held in open session. When Board President Keith Fisher confirmed with the parties that the meeting was to be closed, Wesley said they would like to have the meeting opened.

Wesley told the board that their ords indicated Mrs. Hill had re-

Wesley repeatedly asked the board, "What is the problem?" She said they have letters of support from employees Mrs. Hill had supervised, as well as a letter from her supervisor stating, "You are doing a good job. Keep up the good work."

Board President, Keith Fisher, told Mrs. Hill and her council that the board had copies of her evaluation, but not of the letters and other information that was presented. He requested copies be made and given to each trustee.

Wesley asked that the board look again at Hill's termination. She said that, ideally, Hill should be reinstated to her previous position. "If not," Wesley said, "we would ask that she receive an additional three years salary so she could meet her vestiture and draw retirement."

Fisher told Hill and Wesley that the board would need time to review the new information and would get back to them.

Wesley told Fisher that all further contact regarding the situation should be directed to the Wichita Falls NAACP representatives who would inform the Hills.

Following the presentation by Wesley, the school trustees went into closed session. No action was taken when the meeting reconvened. The parents of two students who were placed in the Alternate Education Program for violation of the district's tobacco policy asked permission to address the board. Perry Green and Donna Lively, who had appeared before the trustees at the June meeting, said they wanted to let the board know that they're not giving up on the issue. Both disagree with the form of punishment for the offense.

Two public appearances on council agenda

Speeds at which railroad trains can travel and a request to rezone some lots are both subjects of personal appearances scheduled before the city council Monday night.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Representatives of Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad are to ask that the council amend its ordinance, adopted some eight years ago, to permit the trains to pass through at a faster speed.

Actually, city officials have already been unofficially informed that they have no authority under state law to regulate the speed of trains.

A hearing was held on that request recently by the city's planning and zoning board, and the request was rejected by a split vote.

I've marked my calendar for Saturday, July 13, 1996. It was a very special day I want to remember.

Earlier in the day, I observed a hole in one at River Creek Golf Course. And later that afternoon, I had a telephone call from a long, lost boyhood friend.

Don Hatcher, a former coach for a number of years at Hirschi and now a teacher at Rider, was in a threesome with Earnie Reusch and me.

Don felt he had miss-hit his shot on the par-three 13th green, and had turned his back in disappointment. However, Earnie and I watched it roll onto the surface and straight to the pen, where it disappeared.

Earnie had a hole-in-one last year, also at River Creek, but on the 16th green. Prior to that, my old friend and boss at Littlefield, Bill Turner, recorded the first I ever saw some 28 years ago.

What's the big deal about seeing a hole-in-one? Well, when you've been on as many golf courses as I've been over 50-some years, it's a real treat. And it's more special when a friend does it.

Now, for that telephone call out of the past.

A call for me had been taken by Dolores while I was out playing golf. The number and a familiar name were written down.

With trembling hands, I dialed the number, identified myself, and asked, "Is this really Pete Davis?"

Pete was among a five some of us who ran around together throughout school at Hereford. The other four were a year older than I, but that made no difference to them.

We weren't a gang, by today's standards. But we did everything together, from stealing cherries to playing chess to having rubber-gun battles.

Pete has lived the past several years in Fort Worth, and is retired from Bell Helicopter.

But Saturday wasn't the first time he surprised me by calling my name.

He did it 44 years ago -- just off the coast of Nome, Alaska.

I was a supplyman in the Air Force, stationed at Elmendorf AFB, Anchorage. I had been assigned to oversee supplies and equipment for the erection of the first automatic weather station, which was to be set on an island in the middle of the Bearing Sea.

The supplies and I were to reach the island by boarding a supply ship at Nome. With everything loaded aboard, began climbing up the side of the ship on a davis ladder.

After about a dozen steps on that ladder, I heard a voice call out, "Hey, Ham!'

I almost fell back into the sea. Ham was my nickname at Hereford, and no one in the military ever used it.

Looking upward and slightly to the right, Davis' familiar, smiling face was sticking out a porthole.

What made his being there even more unusual was the fact that his ship had for the past 18 months been transporting arms and supplies from Japan to Korea, and this was the craft's first run northward from Washington after returning from the war zone.

This was only a couple of days after July 4th, 1952. I hadn't seen Pete since the summer he graduated from high school, in 1947.


We were aboard that ship together for about a week, and since that departure, I've not seen nor heard Pete Davis.

And I'll see my boyhood friend for the first time in 44 years!


Yep, July 13, 1996 will long live in my memory as a most pleasant date.

WORTH QUATING

A move to raise the federal minimum wage by some 90 cents an hour has been approved by the U.S. House of Representatives.

This bill was pushed hard by President Bill Clinton and most liberal Democrats. They were able to secure enough Republican votes in the House to get the bill passed.

Politicians whose primary aim is to continue to be reelected were fearful that a vote against the bill might result in a defeat at the next election.

I think pollsters had concluded that some 80 percent of the workers in this country favored the increase in minimum wage. And I feel sure they do.

I might add that you could conduct another poll among the same people and 80 percent of them would be in favor of raising the minimum wage to 50 dollars an hour.

Everybody wants more money. But it ain't always good for the country.

One radio talk show host that seems to be the unofficial spokesman for the liberal Democrats was talking about things like this. He said that many small companies complained that things like raising the minimum wage would force many small companies out of business.

His response to that was we should go ahead and put them out of business. Then the big companies could move in and take over. And they are efficient enough to afford these things.

I have suspected for years that this was the primary aim of the liberal wing of the Democratic party. This, however, is the first time I ever heard a leading spokesman for them openly admit it.

Liberals, of course, have been in bed with big labor unions for many years, and labor unions don't like small businesses. It's too difficult and too expensive to organize their employees.

It has always been difficult for me to understand why so many generally good people in this country would favor more government regulations on private business. Basically it goes against everything they've al-

ways claimed to believe in.

Most all of us have known for years that any time we get the government involved in any private business, it screws that business up for everybody.

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AUSTIN - A proposal passed by the state Senate Education Committee would eliminate tenure the lifetime guarantee of employment for some college professors and a "carrot" often used to attract the best faculty.

The proposal, which is only a proposal, could strip tenure from professors at public colleges and universities or fire them if they are rated poorly for two consecutive years by peers and students, the Austin American-Statesman reported.

Mary Burgan, general secretary of the Washington, D.C.-based American Association of University Professors, said that eliminating tenure would have "a chilling effect on Texas' faculty and a chilling effect on the state's ability to recruit.'

An education committee member, Sen. David Sibley, R-Waco, disputed claims by educators' groups that killing tenure would hurt faculty recruitment.

"What this is saying is, if you're a bad professor, don't come to Texas," Sibley told the American-Statesman, adding that the proposal is not a response to abuses of the tenure system, but addresses a growing belief that tenure has outlived its purpose.

David Merkowitz, spokesman for the American Council on Education, said an "extreme intervention" like eliminating tenure "can do extraordinary damage to Texas universities."

Presently, the Texas A&M University System is under a regents' directive to revise policies so tenured professors could be removed for poor performance. University of Texas President Robert Berdahl said he favors a post-tenure review that would help professors identify their strengths and improve on their weaknesses.

Reform Party Ballots Mailed

The Reform Party sent out million presidential nominating questionnaires last week naming Dallas billionaire H. Ross Perot and former Colorado Gov. Richard Lamm as "the potential candidates most frequently mentioned," but Reform Party members can write in any name they wish. Lamm formally announced his candidacy on July 9.

The questionnaires were mailed to people who signed petitions to get the Reform Party on the general election ballot. Party members will have until July 20 to mail in a response.

Candidates who qualify for nomination will be allowed to speak to a Reform Party convention Aug. 11 in Long Beach, Calif.

The name of the nominee will be announced Aug. 18 at a Reform Party meeting in Valley Forge, Pa.

Ruling: Adultery Not Protected Adultery is not protected by the constitutional right to privacy, the Texas Supreme Court declared last week.

The ruling was against a Sherman police officer who was denied a promotion because of an affair with another man's wife.

The majority opinion, written by Justice Greg Abbott, concludes that the right to privacy "does not

include the right to maintain a sexual relationship with the spouse of someone else" but stipulated that the court's decision does not mean that the government is free "to engage in intrusive investigation methods to determine the sexual practices of individuals."

Uribe Vows to Dissolve RRC

Texas Railroad Commission candidate Hector Uribe of Brownsville says he intends to work on dissolving the three-member panel if he is elected Nov. 5.

He said the offices of the three commissioners are "historical anachronisms" that need justification.

Uribe, who is running against Republican commission chairman Carole Keeton Rylander, acknowledged the passage of a constitutional amendment would be necessary to close the agency, but he said the commissioners' jobs could go unfunded in the meantime.

He also said, if elected, he would accept a fraction of the \$79,000 annual salary while trying to transfer the agency's duties to the Department of Public Safety, the Transportation Department and the Public Utility Commission.



Other Capital Highlights

A report released last week by the state Senate Economic Development Committee says school property tax abatements granted to businesses are hurting both poor and wealthy school districts. The committee adopted a recommendation that will encourage the 1977 Legislature to find alternatives to the abatements as a way to attract business to Texas. Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, who presides over the Senate, has never been a fan of tax abatements.

Literacy projects in Houston, Bryan, Beaumont, Bastrop, Decatur, Mount Pleasant, Devine, Midland, Marble Falls and Paris will share \$150,000 in grant money from the Barbara Bush Foundation for Family Literacy. Gov. George W. Bush and first lady Laura Bush said the grants were part of their campaign to improve literacy in Texas.

Iowa Park Genealogy and Historical Society members continued their documentation of tombstones at Highland Cemetery. Several members arrived at the cemetery early Friday to continue this task. Included in the work crew were Sandi Koonce and Fil Spangler. With completion of the work

done that day, approximately 47 percent of the documentation of the 223 sections of tombstones in Highland Cemetery has been completed.

More workdays have been scheduled Saturday, July 20, and the following Friday, July 26. Those interested in helping with the documentaion effort should arrive at the cemetery office at 7 a.m. to pick up their assignments.

In our last article we asked for the help of the community in acquiring a metal detector to use in locating lost grave markers at Highland Cemetery. We want to thank Taylor George of Iowa Park for coming to our aid in providing a metal detector for our society to use.

We have made several trial runs over the cemetery area and have determined that some grave sites may be either completely unmarked or marked with concrete markers that have sunken into the soil. In either case these graves remained undetected after the use of the metal detector and will require further searching to locate. The metal detector should aid our effort greatly and its use is truly appreciated.

Our articles, in the Iowa Park Leader, about the documentation project have reached beyond the limits of Iowa Park as we have received letters from as far away as Los Angeles, CA., in support of our effort. For all those reading this article, it is important that from time to time you pay not only your respects to your ancestors who have departed and are buried in a local cemetery, but it is equally important that you check up on the condition of the cemetery in which your relatives are buried.

Highland Cemetery has an onsite staff and association monitoring the condition of the cemetery, but many cemeteries in our area do not, and many desperately need your attention. One such cemetery needing attention is the Clara Cemetery.

On a recent research trip John Chapman and I visited the Clara Cemetery, which is located seven miles west of Burkburnett on TX Hwy 240. The cemetery was laid out in the late 1800s and is occupied by the German families who took part in the development of the former city of Clara.

Since the city of Clara has become a ghost town, the Clara cemetery has been mostly unattended more than 30 years. Much of this cemetery has been taken over by waist high prairie grass, leaving many of the graves difficult to locate. Many tombstones have fallen over, and others have been broken due to weather or vandalism.

It is a sorry sight to see the condition of the Clara Cemetery and many of the grave stones are large and ornate, indicating the concern and expense that was originally taken in the property.

It should be further noted that the Iowa Park Genealogy and Historical Society is looking for other grave and cemetery sites in the Wichita County area.

If you know of a private grave site or have a family plot on your property, we would be interested in documenting the location of the site as well as detailing the information found on the included graves.

With the decay of the early stones placed by the early ancestors of the North Texas area it is important that these all be recorded as soon as possible. With the help of the community, not just members of the Iowa Park Genealogy and Historical Society, this is a true possibiliy.

Our next regular meeting will be Saturday, Aug. 10 at 2 p.m. in Tom Burnett Memorial Library. All are welcome to attend who are interested in discovering their ancestors, or participating in our service project. -----FIL SPANGLER

1/2 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. baking soda

1/2 tsp. instant coffee granules

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Spray two baking sheets with vegetable oil cooking spray.

In a small bowl, soak prunes in the hot water 10 to 15 minutes, until plump and soft. Place prunes and the soaking liquid in a blender; process until smooth.

In a medium bowl, which together the prune puree, sugar, yogurt, oil, and egg whites. In another bowl, mix the flour, cocoa, salt, soda, and coffee. Using a wooden spoon, mix the dry ingredients into the wet mixture just until blended.

Drop by tablespoons onto the prepared baking sheets 1 1/2 inches apart. Bake 12 to 14 minutes, or until tops spring back when lightly touched. Cool on wire racks.
