Members of the city council may not go home as early Monday night as usual, because they face a 17-item agenda.

17 TOPICS

The tentative agenda calls for the meeting to get underway at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Possible highlights of the meeting include a presentation by a firm's representative who will explain how the city might obtain and finance a golf course, rezoning of a business area for residences, and designating Lake Iowa Park as a park area.

Steve Willet, regional manager of National Links of America, has been asked to present his company's various alternatives which could lead to development of a golf course here.

Willet will discuss equity fi-

nancing as opposed to more traditional means usually used by municipalities.

A request will be considered by the council to approve re-zoning of lots in the 500 block of West Washington, from convenience commercial to residential.

The lots are on the north side of an entire block, formerly owned by Thompson Tool, which were never developed.

If approved, an ordinance to be considered would add Lake Iowa Park to the list of designated parks of the city, and add a section to offer a reward for the arrest and conviction of any persons found guilty of committing the crime of theft, destruction or vandalism to park property and

equipment. The action was requested following a recent series of vandalism cases at the lake, primarily in the area of Hammond Park.

If adopted, being designated as a park would also prohibit the consumption of any alcoholic beverage at the lake.

Other items on the agenda include:

* hear a request by Jamie Fulton to approve a waiver which would permit Cub Scouts to place handbills at residences soliciting food donations for the Iowa Park Food Pantry;



Highland Cemetery Association to meet Sunday

Thursday, Oct. 10, 1996 Iowa Park, Texas



The meeting of Iowa Park Genealogical and Historical Society scheduled for Saturday has been moved from the Tom Bunett Memorial Library to the Lawton Worley Center.

The reason for this change in meeting place is due to a conflict in scheduling with the Southwestern Oklahoma Genealogical Society Fall workshop.

Southwestern Oklahoma Gealogical Society will be hosting Leslie Smith Collier, current president of the Dallas Genealogical Society. Ms. Collier will be the keynote speaker for the conference and will be conducting several different conference sessions.

The first session Ms. Collier will be holding is entitled "Sherlock Holmes and the Write Way to Research". Genealogists often get stuck when they get too close to a problem to see it objectively.

She will be discussing a method of stepping back and reassessing the problems to clarify new approaches and records to research.

The second topic Ms. Collier will be presenting will be "Chicken-Scratch Census: Perils and Delights of Pre-1850 Census returns". Don't throw up your wings and let out a fowl cluck with chicken-scratch returns. This talk will emphasize what records were made pre-1850 and what methods are necessary for an attack on those early consus.

Following a family, which was even missing on the 1850 census, the 142 potential households on the 1840 census, narrowed down by 1810 to exactly one potential father, in a specific town, in a specific country, with only one courthouse to search.

The final discussion will be entitled "Faded Pages: Families with Few Records". Researching certain ancestors can make genealogists tear

out what little hair is left on their heads.

Learn the strategy that produces results when you are faced with ancestors who appear hopelessly unremarkable. What other avenues of research records, time periods and places are most likely to shed light on your darkest corners.

Members will be meeting at the Tom Burnett Memorial Library at 6:30 a.m. Saturday to carpool to the conference.

The conference will be from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Worley Center, Great Plains Area Vo-Tech in Lawton. Price of the conference is \$22 which includes refreshments throughout the day as well as lunch, handouts, door prizes, and vendors' exhibits.

Various members of the Iowa Park Society attended the Lawton conference last year and found the conference to be quite helpful. Several members made valuable contacts in their family genealogy search. We hope to see you there.

Remember that Highland is not a perpetual care cemetery and that cemetery maintenance must depend upon donations.

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
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
One appropriate time to send a donation to the cemetery is at the time of death. A card is sent to the family acknowledging the donation in memory of their loved one.


Also, landscape bricks are available for \$25 with the name of an individual, family, or organization and will be used in the landscaping surrounding the new black gazebo.

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

Among the learning opportunities available to 4-H members are food and nutrition; sewing and fashion, consumer decision making, gun safety and trap shooting; craft projects; and photography.


Seminars, schools and competitions are available for each of these projects.







HIGH SCHOOL

Earning credits by examination

Earning credits by examination is possible for Iowa Park High School students. These examinations will be available for all required subjects. and for some electives.

Eligible students must have had no prior instruction in the course for which they are testing. For example, a student currently enrolled in English III could not take a test for that course, but would be eligible to take the exam for English IV. Students who did not pass a course and want to take a credit by exam to earn back credit are not eligible.

Credit will be awarded if a students makes a minimum score of 90 on the exams. The student will receive credit for that course and the test grade will be posted on the student's permanent transcript. This will allow greater flexibility in students' schedules and allow for possible early graduation.

Although they are available to any student, the exams are difficult and will likely be beneficial to only highly motivated students.

There will be no charge for the first attempt at an exam; one re-test from another source is allowed and must be paid for by the student.

Iowa Park High School on Saturday, Nov. 9, Saturday, Nov. 16, and Saturday, Nov. 23. Three testing days will also be offered in June.

Testing is offered

According to Senate Bill 1, TEC 28.023, school districts must offer credit by examination for acceleration in grades K-5.

Dates for these tests are November 22, 25 and 26.

Eligible students must have had no prior instruction in the grades for which they are testing. For example, a student currently enrolled in third grade could not take a test for that grade, but would be eligible to take the exam for fourth grade. If the students passes the exam for fourth grade, he/she would enroll in the fifth grade the following school year.

Provisions for credit by examination in kindergarten through grade five requires that:

A student in any of grades 1 through 5 must be accelerated one grade if he/she meets the following requirements:

A) The student scores 90% on a criterion-referenced test for the grade level he/she wants to skip in each of the following areas: language arts, mathematics science, and social studies;

Hawks smother Seymour


It only took one week to get back on track following the loss to Stamford, as Iowa Park ran it's record to a 4-1 in non-district play with a 50-14 thumping of the Seymour Panthers.

There's no better way to celebrate a homecoming than with a big win and that's exactly what the Hawks did as this one was never really in question.

Iowa Park, behind the running of senior tailback Shawn Fulfer, who rushed for 204 yards in the game and scored three touchdowns, dominated the game from the start.

Fulfer put the Hawks on the board with a 62-yard touchdown run on the second play of the game, while many of the fans were still talking about who was named the homecoming queen. Keith Trammell tacked on the first of his six extra points to make the score 7-0 only 42 seconds into the game.

Seymour took the ensuing kickoff and five plays later the score was tied at 7-7 with 8:52 still left of the clock in the opening quarter. The big play in the Seymour scoring drive came on a half-back pass from Joe Rodgers to Aaron McNeil that covered



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

With the game tied 7-7, Iowa Park scored the next 35 points, 14 more in the first quarter to slam the door on the Panthers.

Brandon Brown scored on a 15-yard run that capped a 4-play, 48-yard drive that was set up by Chad Graham' s interception to make the score 14-7 with 2:29 remaining.

The Panthers were unable to move the ball on their next possession and had to punt the ball back to the Hawks. Fulfer fielded the punt at his own 31-yard line, cut to his right, and scampered 69 yards for the touchdown that gave his team a 21-7 lead with 46 seconds left to play in the first quarter.

The score remained 21-7 until Seymour had to punt again with only 12 seconds left in the half. Iowa Park took over at the Panther 43 and quarterback Todd Yeager improvised and scrambled 43 yards for a score as the first half buzzer sounded giving his team a 28-7 lead. Iowa Park didn't let up as the Hawks scored the first time they touched the ball in the third quarter, going 63 yards in 10 plays capped with an 8-yard touchdown strike to Brown from Yeager with 3:23 left in the third quarter to make the score 35-7.

The Hawks next score was again set up by a nice defensive play. Linebacker Brandon Holley stepped in front of a Panther pass for an interception giving the ball back to Iowa Park at the Seymour 49 with 1:34 left in the period. Eleven plays later, all on the ground, Iowa Park made it 42-7 when Toby Catlin scored from 1-yard out with 8:20 left in the game.

Seymour scored it's second touchdown of the night with 6:42 left in the game on a 59-yard run by Rodgers.

The Hawks made the final score 50-14 with 3:06 left in the game, following the second interception by Graham which gave the Hawks the ball at the Seymour 25. Fulfer scored his final touchdown on a 43-yard run to put him over the 200-yard mark. Brown ran in for the two-point conversion.

Fulfer wasn't the only Hawk to have a good game running the ball as Iowa Park picked up a total of 388 yards rushing on the night. Fulfer's 204 yards came on only 18 carries while Brown picked up 79 on 11 carries. Yeager added 77 yards on 9 tries.

The Hawk defense played exceptionally well in the first half, holding the Panthers to only 33 yards rushing on 22 carries while the Iowa Park ground game averaged over 10 yards per carry in the first half picking up 188 yards on only 18 tries.

This week is National 4-H Week, and to celebrate, the Valley View 4-H delivered "appreciation cookies" to many area individuals and business who support 4-H youth.





