Polio Vaccine Offered Iowa Park 2nd Grade, Parents Must Consent

Next Wednesday at 1:00 students of the second grade of Iowa Park school will have the opportunity of receiving the polio vaccine at chool. They will be among the hundreds of thousands of second graders to receive this vaccine befor June 15 from the National Foun-

dation for Infantile Paralysis. The reason for singling out second grade pupils to receive the vaccination is because they fall within the age group most likely to contract polio.

All students receiving this vaccine must have a written request from parents or legal guardians, Dr. Gordon G. Clark is volunteer-

ing his services and will give the vaccinations. Parents will not have any expense. The March of Dimes fund pays for the vaccine, equipment, records, evaluation studies and all

other costs of the project. All vaccine used in the trials is tested three times in three different laboratories. Shots will be given in the arm and will be only slightly and temporarily painful.

To date there has been no fever and other unpleasant aftereffects. Purpose is to determine whether he vaccine, already proved safe, will give adequate protection from paralytic polio. Results will not be known until sometime in 1955. In the meantime, none of this vaccine will be available to the general public.
