## Junior Hi Names Honor Graduates

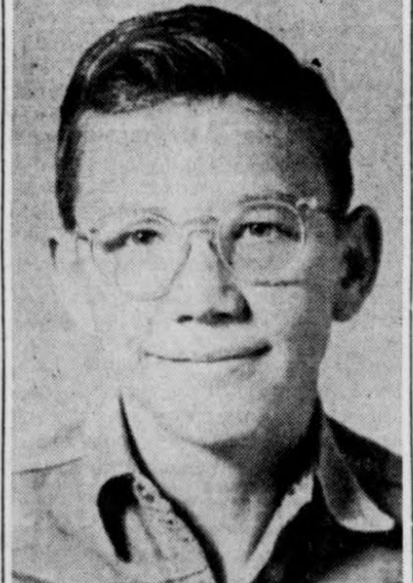
Honor students of Iowa Park Junior High School were named this week by James Elms, principal. Billy Goff, with an average of 93.8, is valedictorian.

**Speaker Discounts Red Score in U.S.**  
Prof. A. F. Edwards of Midwestern university told Lions club members at luncheon Tuesday that Russia is not a communist nation. Rather, said the political science expert, it is a totalitarian dictatorship.

He also said there were more Communists in America in 1929 and 1930 than there are today, because Communism has its greatest influence on people during hard times.

Prof. Edwards pointed out the chain of reactions if South Korea or Indo-China should fall to Red China and Russia. The speaker said Russia is trying to conquer the world, but as long as the free nations co-operate effectively, they should be able to curb the aggressors.

Iowa Park plays here Saturday against Windthorst and Sunday against the Colored Indians.

## Rex Lehman Enters Race for County Hide & Animal Inspector

Rex Lehman is candidate for Wichita County Hide and Animal Inspector, subject to the Democratic Primary July 24, 1954.

Lehman is a native of Hamilton, Texas, having moved to Iowa Park in 1929 with his mother, Mrs. C. H. Lehman, and sister. He has been a successful and respected stock-farmer here ever since.

In addition to stock-farming Rex has sold insurance and been a dealer in cattle, thus acquainting himself with the locations of farms and ranches of the county and surrounding communities.

In 1949 he became an employee of Wichita County in Precinct 3 as a motor grader operator.

Rex Lehman is a member of the Church of Christ and the Farmers Union. He resides two miles north and east of Iowa Park, just a mile from the Kuntz farm where he first located when he moved to Iowa Park 25 years ago. He still farms this land.

In announcing for the County Hide and Animal Inspector, Lehman said:

"I will do my best for a progressive county. I will do my best to administer the county's business on a sound and economic basis. I will serve the people as conscientiously as possible."

Lehman's wife is the former Miss Ida Mae Stowe, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Stowe of Iowa Park. The couple has a nine-year-old son, Garland.

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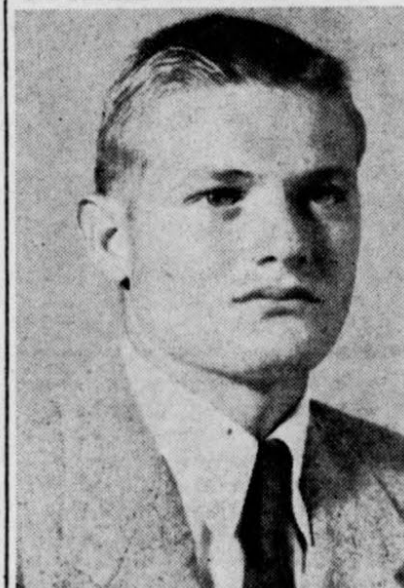
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## VALEDICTORIAN 'SALUTATORIAN

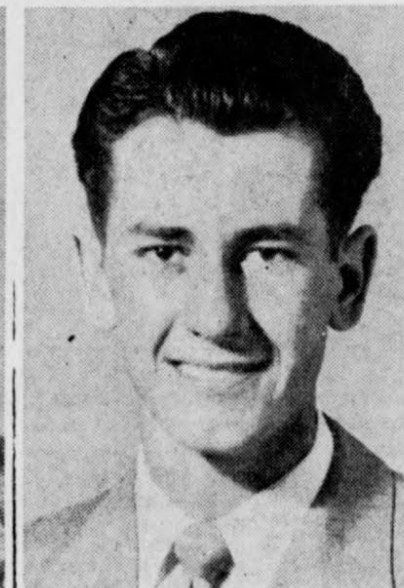

## Polio Vaccine Offered Iowa Park 2nd Grade, Parents Must Consent

Next Wednesday at 1:00 students of the second grade of Iowa Park school will have the opportunity of receiving the polio vaccine at school. They will be among the hundreds of thousands of second graders to receive this vaccine before June 15 from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The reason for singling out second grade pupils to receive the vaccination is because they fall within the age group most likely to contract polio.

All students receiving this vaccine must have a written request from parents or legal guardians.

Dr. Gordon G. Clark is volunteering his services and will give the vaccinations.

Parents will not have any expense. The March of Dimes fund pays for the vaccine, equipment, records, evaluation studies and all other costs of the project.

All vaccine used in the trials is tested three times in three different laboratories. Shots will be given in the arm and will be only slightly and temporarily painful.

To date there has been no fever and other unpleasant aftereffects. Purpose is to determine whether the vaccine, already proved safe, will give adequate protection from paralytic polio. Results will not be known until sometime in 1955. In the meantime, none of this vaccine will be available to the general public.

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F. N. (Bob) Todd, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Todd, has just spent a 23 day leave with his parents. He will report back to his ship USS John S. McCain, which is in drydock at Boston. Bob attended Iowa Park High School and entered service in March last year.

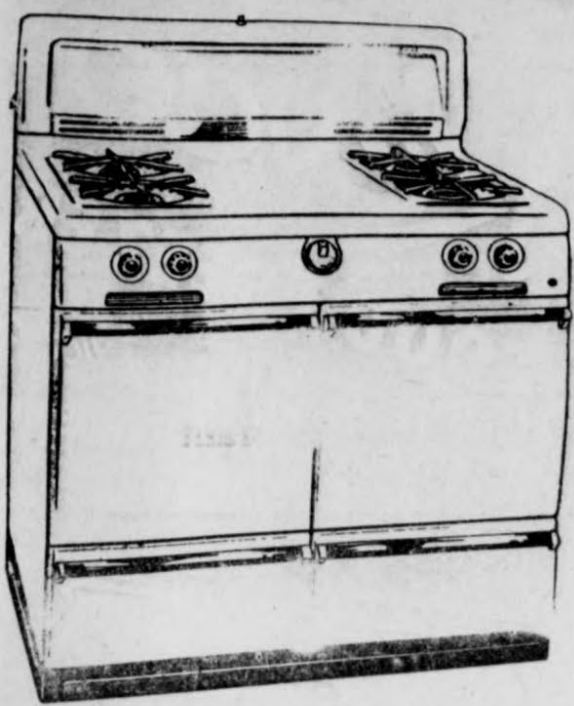

Mrs. C. B. Smith will be moderator for the program which will take the form of a forum including two men and two women. Topics to be discussed are:

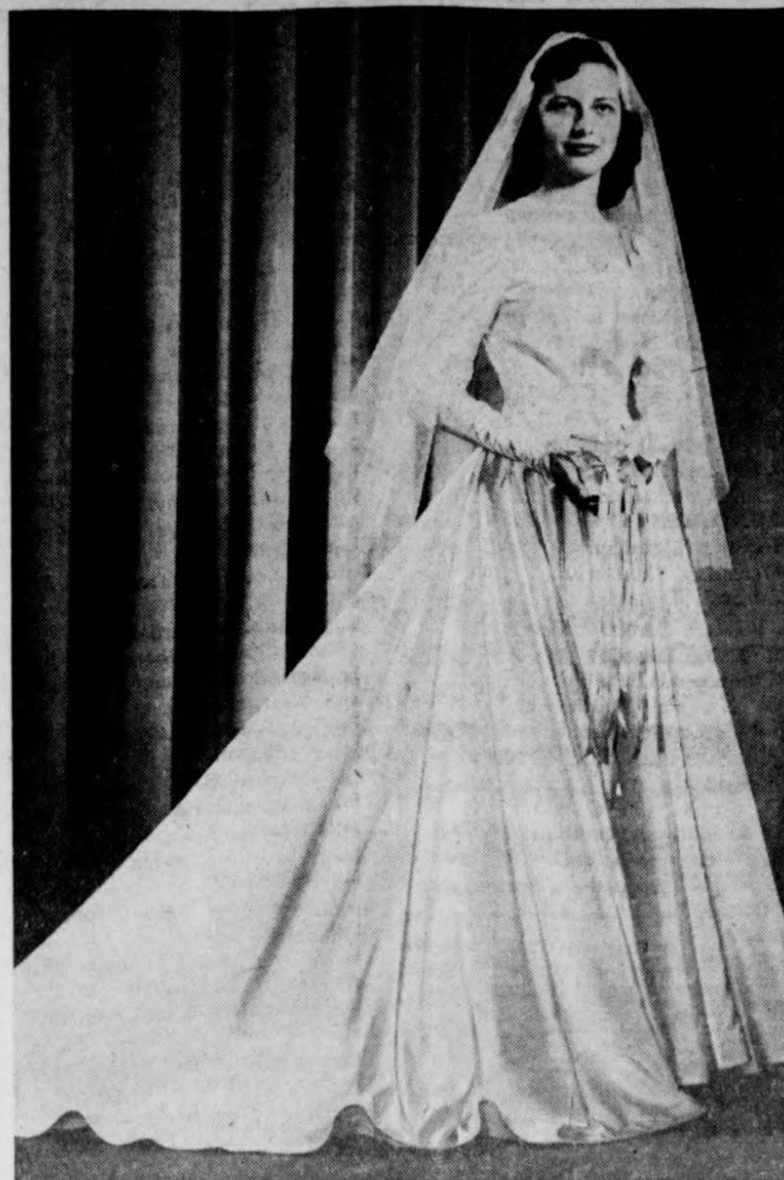

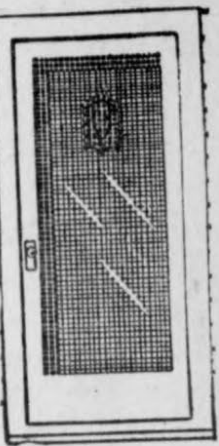
