The bid from Monarch for the purchase of 30 computers at \$997 each was accepted. The computers will replace the outdated equipment presently used in the high school Computer Science room.

In the approved budget for 1996-97, \$54,000 had been allocated for the purchase of computers. Since the bid price for the 30 computers was lower than expected, the board agreed to a request from the school's technology committee for additional com-

puter needs at the high school. The committee's request included nine computers for the library, six computers for TAAS Math, six computers for TAAS English, four printers for the Word-Processing class, and software for Computer Math.

Cost for these additions, plus the 30 original computers, would come

They will be accessible to every student and staff member. One will be utilized to handle the catalogs and databases provided by the companies the school deals with. For this reason and because of the media widely used, a CD-ROM drive will also be purchased, as well as a networkable printer to be utilized with the computers.

The 12 computers to be used in TAAS Math and TAAS English, and four printers for the word-processing class will replace obsolete equipment now being used.

The old equipment in the Computer Science room will be used to replace outdated computers used in the Computer Math program, making it necessary to purchase the new



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# As I See It... By Bob Hamilton I knew, just as soon as I saw the headline of a story released last week

by the Associated Press concerning salaries paid head coaches of the going to be a lot of moaning and groaning, and misunderstanding.

The story concerned the salaries paid to the head coaches of all Class 5-A and 4-A coaches in the state. And it gave the average salaries of those coaches and the average salaries of all classroom teachers in the state.

information as to what the salaries cators. were for the assistants to all those misleading article I've ever seen from the AP.

And, right off the bat, representatives of teacher groups, especially those who demonstrate union idealism, became very vocal.

Don't get me wrong. I'm not saying anything about the level of pay classroom teachers receive. I just want to explain things that were not said in discussion of large school

head coach salaries. Head coaches are, in fact, administrators who have staffs which can, in the larger schools, run well into the dozens. Therefore, those folks are in fact administrators, and part of those salaries reflect that.

The article did not say anything about what the "above-base" salary paid a head coach. By that, I mean the salary paid that is above his regular base salary, which is set by the state. Nor did it address years in education, which also has to do with base salary.

The article said nothing about how many hours, days and weeks coaches work that are not included in the 185-day classroom schedule of

One could easily be misled into believing that all those coaches who serve under the head coaches were paid similar salaries.

And when attempting to comstate's larger schools, that there was pare the salaries of head coaches with those of classroom teachers, there's one point that was never mentioned: those football programs were not all money out-going, and did not reflect any receipts the school might receive from ticket sales.

As anticipated, the first article and following articles just had to quote It did not, however, give any one guy I like the least among edu-

He's Richard Kouri, president of head coaches. In fact, it was the most the Texas State Teachers Association. I'm not sure he didn't receive his training from a school offered by the AFL, CIO.

He's complaining that the teachers in Texas should be paid at the average paid to educators over the nation, which is almost \$8,000

Well, because the majority of educators are where the kids are, which is in the big cities, let me point out that the cost of living in a big city is greater than living in Holliday or Iowa Park.

Union spokespersons always want to demand salaries of their people be equal to somebody else's.

I suggest that if Mr. Kouri is so unhappy with his salary -- which was low when he got into education, and he knew it -- he should get out of his line of work and find something more to his liking.

I'd give him a job, right off the bat, and see what he thought about living on the salary of a weekly

#### Program needs support Dear Mr. Hamilton & Citizens of Iowa Park.

Back on Sunday, August 18, 1996, I was moved by the title of an article in the editorial pages of the Times Record News. The article had something to do with the traffic patterns in Wichita Falls, something totally irrelevant with what the title did for me. Yes, these following six words are so appropriate to our situation that I cut them out and saved them as a reminder for a letter like this. Hopefully, as I reveal the six words of mystery they will strike a cord with you as they did for me. They are: Money's got to come from somewhere.

This topic of money and where it comes from has been on my mind for quite some time. As you may already know, CIA is the leading local volunteer organization that, in partnership with the community, rehabilitates the houses of low-income homeowners, particularly the elderly and disabled, so that they may continue to live in warmth, safety and independence. We started here in Wichita County in 1984 and are nine houses away from having repaired one thousand homes.

The repairs are made by volunteers and the materials are purchased with donations. Fortunately for the past several years, we have applied and have been awarded funds in Wichita Falls under the community Development Block Grant program. However, those funds are restricted for purchasing building materials and can only be used on homes within the city Wichita Falls. Any and all work in surrounding communities, like Iowa Park, must come from donations, mostly donations from Wichita Falls. Unfortunately, for the past 4 years, the donations from the community of Iowa Park have not been there. I say unfortunately, because the future for the Christmas in April program in Iowa Park looks very grim. Unless the community pitches in and contributes financially to the Christmas in April program, there will be no other choice left but to remove Iowa Park from the program. That's a sad fact to face, but from a

business standpoint it's necessary.

Here are the facts & figures from the past four years:

1993 - worked on 5 houses, spent \$1796.94 for materials and received \$321 in donations.

1994 - worked on 9 houses, spent 5504.98 for materials and received \$425 in donations.

1995 - worked on 8 houses, spent \$3443.74 for materials and received \$312 in donations.

1996 - worked on 6 houses, spent \$6328.97 for materials and received \$217 in donations.

Sorry folks, but we cannot continue at this rate. I also need to point out, that since October 1 of this year, we have received 7 requests for applications for our 1997 repair program and I expect that figure to climb especially as the weather gets colder.

In closing, I think you all will agree that Iowa Park needs a program like Christmas in April, but the choice of keeping it lies in the hands of the community. For those of you who have supported us in the past I thank you so very much. And the two businesses that continue to show their appreciation by sponsoring our volunteer T-shirts, I salute you. But, for the rest of the community as hard as it may be to accept reality, the bottom line is: the money's got to come from somewhere.

#### **Questions** qualifications

A couple of weeks ago, the Times Record News printed articles regarding the race for candidates for the position of constable in Precinct 3; several of the facts they set out were incorrect. I wrote a letter to the Editor, but did not receive any response, nor did they correct the errors which they printed. The following states the errors printed in the Times Record News and my opinion concerning the candidates.

In the 1996 Voter's Guide, Fairchild states he has completed 450 hours of peace officer's training at VRJC and 80 hours of civil process training; while the Times Record News gives him credit for having completed 1,250 hours of training. The Times Record News further stated that the voters of Precinct 3

"have every reason to re-elect the four-term official" is incorrect in that Fairchild has only served only one full-term as constable. He was appointed to complete the final months of his predecessor's term, and was elected to the office of constable in 1992.

Furthermore, Fairchild appears to be unaware or unconcerned with the regulations and requirements governing the office of constable; in that a constable must be certified by TCLEOSE within 2 years of his service in office as constable. Fairchild served almost all of his 4 year term uncertified. Only recently did Fairchild comply with regulations and obtain certification.

As a legal secretary, on occasion I have requested Fairchild to serve documents. Due to his lack of knowledge regarding service procedures and legal instruments, he has contacted me with such basic questions as who received which copy, who should the completed return should be sent, etc. Never has any constable from any precinct contacted me with such basic questions regarding procedures.

In my opinion, Fairchild's 530 hours of class room training is not equivalent Yeakley's 28 years of actual law enforcement experience. Yeakley is the better qualified candidate and he would be a credit to the voters and citizens of Precinct 3 in the professionalism he would bring to the office of constable. Sincerely yours,



# Dudley talented in many areas

Describe Martha Dudley with one adjective?---you can't. You can say she is a multi-talented person--but that still would be an incomplete description of the lady.

She is an artist, an organizer, a good conversationalist, has spent several years in three different career fields, and does beautiful crafts. Most of these she does out of her own creative imagination.

She does pyrography which uses hardwood. Martha saw pictures of some finished products in a crafts magazine and decided "I can do that". She has some beautiful pieces she has finished, including egg-shaped pieces, a portrait of a Victorian lady and some Victorian boxes.

Martha had the same attitude about flower arranging. She went into a florist shop and saw an

arrangement that appealed to her and she said, "I can do that". An example of her talent for that may be seen in the picture accompanying this story.

Many other arrangements followed the first. She has made floral wall hangings, window sprays, wall and window swags, in addition to formal and seasonal arrangements, and mantel arrangements. Most of her wall pieces are sold in Lubbock. Some of her crafts are also at the Little Red Schoolhouse in Iowa Park.

She started crafting seriously in 1969 and used to make the different crafts shows, but she said that became too much of a hassel.

Another of her crafts that has been very popular, particularly in this age when so much recognition is given angels. Her angels are beautifully dressed in white net or

tulle, enhanced with seed pearls, sequins and tiny rosebuds, and are complete with lace wings.

Most of Martha's angels are sold in Dallas and some are sold in Georgia.

The only special training she has had in her multi-faceted crafts or hobbies was several lessons in painting in oils and acrylics.

Martha, originally from Sweetwater, has lived in many places since her marriage to her late husband, Charles, who was raised in Floydada. He worked with the Alcoholic Beverage Commission.

But in each place they lived Martha carved a niche for herself. When they lived in Fort Worth she worked for the Fort Worth National Bank, when they lived in San Antonio she worked in the Trust Department of The National Bank of Commerce, in Abilene and in Seymour she was employed in the Trust Department of The First National Banks.

When the Dudleys moved to Iowa Park from Seymour, Martha went to work as secretary in the school superintendent's office where she worked seven and a half

She next went to work for Cryovac in the accounting department, working up to buyer of raw materials and production supplies. She worked there 15 years, retiring in 1994 because of her husband's illness.

Martha has served a total of 17 and a half years on the Iowa Park School Board.

A little over 12 years ago Martha used her innate ability to draw the plans for their beautifully appointed home in Quail Valley.

Before they started construction of the house, Charles insisted she pick out the living room furniture she wanted first. They shopped until they found the couch and love seat and other pieces of furniture they wanted, using it as a guide to decorate and select other furnishings for the home.

Their daughter, Marty Maxwell, helped them decorate the house and their son, Charles Jr., who works for Cryovac, installed the plumbing.

Charles and Martha did a lot of the finishing work themselves.

The living room is all cedar with the exception of the brick fireplace. A unique cedar entertainment center takes up one wall of the

Currently Martha is still trying to adjust to her husband's death that ended 47 years of a good marriage. The adjustment has been difficult for Martha and their two children. His influence is still with them all in many ways.

Martha says, "The loneliness of not being able to discuss plans and ideas with someone, who's been there for you 47 years, and especially the loneliness of going places by yourself where you used to go as a couple is hard to get used to".

But, Martha is staying busy with her crafts and does some traveling. She is a member of the Iowa Park Arts and Crafts Association and a member of Loop 11

1 whole fryer (cooked, deboned) 2 jars of Arriba green chili (hot or

1 can cream of chicken soup Cheddar cheese, shredded 18 corn tortillas

Tear deboned chicken into small pieces and set aside. Mix chili and soup together, heat until smooth. Lightly fry tortillas in oil, only until moistened. (Do not overcook.) In 9x13 dish, layer ingredients. (Put a little chili on the bottom to prevent the tortillas from sticking.) Layer in this order: 6 tortillas, thin layer of chicken, chili over chicken, and a layer of cheese over chili. Repeat starting with tortillas. (3 layers in all.) Bake at 350 degrees until cheese has melted, (approx. 30 minutes.) Cut into squares and serve with your favorite side dish.

#### **Broccoli** and Rice

1 - 10 oz. pkg. frozen, chopped broccoli (with cheese sauce)

1 cup rice 1 can cream of mushroom soup 1 can cream of chicken soup 1 small jar Cheese Whiz Chopped onions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Cook broccoli in one pan and 1 cup of rice in another. Saute butter and onions. Mix soups and Cheese Whiz. Add onion, broccoli and rice to mixture. Put in greased dish and bake until bubbly.

#### Mini Cheesecakes


12 vanilla wafers 2 - 8 oz. pkgs. cream cheese, softened

# School trustees

A bid of \$5,235 from Great Plains Siding to repair the windows on the north side of Kidwell Elementary was accepted.

For some time, the windows have caused a problem with heating and cooling in classrooms located in the north wing. The Great Plains proposal involves covering the windows with two-inch foam and using Alcoa exterior siding to match the building.

Trustees approved a request by Supt. Mike Caplinger to form a task force of community members and school personnel to study and make recommendations on school facility needs.

Keith Fisher, board president, appointed Martha Dudley, Jeff Watts, and Dennis Yeager to represent the trustees on the task force.

Following is a proposed agenda of study as presented by Caplinger:

A. Form committees to consider individual campus needs.

1. Develop a uniform time line for completion of committee work.

2. Visit each campus to determine current student needs related to space for the present and for the fu-

3. Meet with campus teaching and administrative personnel to solicit their input on facility needs and possible technology needs.

4. Review the new Education Code (SB-1) for state curriculum changes which will affect future additions in classroom space.

5. Consider alternative uses of existing space to better serve students. (Example: Unused closet space that could be converted to classroom use, portable classrooms that could be renovated to a media area, etc.)

6. Review the Iowa Park CISD Action Plan for targeted needs and future plans.

7. Review the Facility Study completed by SHW Group, Inc. in July, 1995.

8. Determine possible recommendations to the entire Task Force to meet campus needs of student growth.

B. Present committee recommendations to the Task Force for study and review by the entire Task Force. Question needs and offer alternative suggestions.

C. Review state funding allocations and the local tax rate. Make possible yearly projections for the funding of Iowa Park CISD debt service.

D. Determine what recommendations can reasonably be presented to the Board of Trustees. Consider the estimated cost of each recommendation and the tax rate necessary to generate the revenue to support the recommendation.

E. Consider that individual campus needs may be modified to meet the district-wide financial contracts.

F. Keep in mind that the Board of Trustees has authorized the Task Force at the request of the superintendent. Understand that the Board may choose one of our recommendations, all of our recommendations, or none of our recommendations. They must consider this issue during a difficult financial time for the school

Other action taken by the board

\* appointing Freddie Daume to serve on the Wichita Appraisal District Board of Directors;

\* approving a request by representatives of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service for approval of 4-H as a sanctioned extra-curricular organization; and

\* approving the 1996 school tax



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
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
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# Hawks start slow, win big

Even a slow start couldn't stop the Iowa Park Hawks Friday night as they continued their march to the playoffs with a 28-7 win over the Jacksboro Tigers at Hawk Stadium.

Iowa Park improved its overall record to 6-2, and 2-1 in District 5-3A while Jacksboro fell to 3-4-1 overall and 1-2 in league play.

The win, coupled with Bowie's loss to top-ranked Vernon, leaves the Hawks and Jackrabbits tied for second place at 2-1 in the race for the runner-up spot.

Iowa Park will play winless Henrietta Friday night at home while Bowie has to travel to Jacksboro. The two teams will square off in the regular season finale in Bowie in what could decide a playoff berth.


In the Jacksboro game, it was all Tigers in the first quarter as Jacksboro took the opening kickoff and picked up four first downs and controlled the clock for much of the quarter. Iowa Park's defense, as it has done all season long, rose to the occasion and prevented the Tigers from reaching the end zone when Travis Johnson came up short on a fourth-down run with 3:50 left in

Iowa Park took over and couldn't manage a first down and had to punt. The Hawks ran only five offensive plays in the quarter and failed to pick up a first down as the period ended scoreless.

The Iowa Park offense got on track early in the second quarter when Todd Yeager capped a 61-yard, 9-play drive with a 4-yard run on the Hawks first drive of the quarter. Keith Trammell remained perfect on his point after attempts, kicking the first of his four in the game to give Iowa Park a 7-0 lead with 9:01 left in the half. The big play

in the drive was a 30-yard completion from Yeager to split-end Nick Black. Shawn Fulfer also had an 11-yard run to help keep the drive alive.

Jacksboro tied the game at 7-7 with 4:02 remaining after partially blocking an Iowa Park punt with 5:40 left on the clock.

The Tigers started their scoring drive at the Iowa Park 30. Three plays later, Johnson found Jeremy McCann in the end zone for a 20-yard touchdown as the ball just got over the head of Fulfer, who was defending on the play. Joe Borjon's kick tied the game at 7-7.

Iowa Park quickly answered the challenge as the Hawks marched 82 yards in 11 plays, capped by Calvin Galliton's 2-yard plunge with 1:11 left to play in the half. Brandon Brown and Fulfer were the workhorses on the drive. Brown had runs of 18 and 7 yards, while Fulfer had runs of 15 and 14. Yeager added a 10-yard scamper to help in the drive as the Hawks went back on top 14-7.

The Hawks looked like they would blow this one open when Brandon Holley covered a fumble on Jacksboro's first play following the kickoff giving Iowa Park the ball at the Tiger 27 with 64 seconds left. Iowa Park moved the ball to the 11 with 4 seconds left before Yeager had the ball knocked loose to end the threat.

The third quarter, much like the first, saw Jacksboro control the ball and the clock as Iowa Park couldn't manage a first down in the quarter. Jacksboro's best opportunity to get on the board came on a fourth-and-6 play from the Iowa Park 27 when Johnson's

pass, intended for McCann, was broken up by Chad Wright at the Iowa Park 15 with 3:50 remaining in the third quarter.

The fourth quarter was all Iowa Park as the Hawks scored twice, the first, a 4yarder by Yeager with 8:37 left and the second on a 40-yard reverse to wingback Michael Swenson with 6:28 left in the game.
